



The vice presidents of the precinct meetings will get as many farmers as are willing to sign the following agree-


"We the undersigned farmers of voting precinct No. -Nacogdoches county, Texas, hereby pledge ourselves to reduce the acreage of cotton to be planted by us in 1905, 25 per cent below the amount we planted in 1904.

The presidents of the precinct meetings will take the names, postoffice address, and also the cotton acreage they will plant this year, of those who refuse to sign said agree ment, and also have a committee appointed at the precinct meetings to visit every farmer, every landlord, tenant, white or black, who are not at the meeting, to secure their acreage in cotton.

Editor Sentinel: Colman, lowa, Dec. 29.-On Tuesday, Dec. 27th we had for the first time in 17 years a regular Northwest Iowa blizzard. The storm raged in all its tury from early morn until late at night: thermometer from 8 to 12 below zero; wind blowing a hurricane; air filled with snow so that you could not see anything ten feet from you On Wednesday morning what a scene! Snow drifts from 6 to 12 feet deep, streets blocked, traffic stopped, passenger and freight trains snow bound, some at stations, others in deep cuts between stations. But by Thursday noon railroad trains were moving on time, business moving along same as usual in all lines. Years ago such Northwest blizzards were common, but of recent years winters have been much milder. Same thing can be said of cyclones. Years ago certain sections of this state had many "twisters" demolishing whole business blocks and many lives lest, but recent years no such storms. In traveling along railroads in this state you see farm houses and big red barns on every quarter section, school house every two miles, towns every 6 or 8 miles, where you see from two to five church steeples; buildings on farms and towns all nicely painted, denoting prosperous condition. Farm lands selling from \$75 to \$100 an acre, this result being brought about by raising and feeding cattle and hogs and horses. Yes, raising turkeys, chickens, ducks and geese and milking cows and selling butter and eggs. What is true of Iowa is true of Southern Minnesota, Wisconsin and Illinois, Diversified farming is what wins.

With such a prosperous condition among Northern farmers despite long winters what ought the Texas farmer to do where he is not compelled to house his stock and feed six months every year and spend nearly three hundred dollars a year for fuel and warm clothing? Continuing raising cotton will never make you rich. Carl E. Oleson.
