### BRUNO DURST.

Born in Old Stone Fort at Nacogdoches.

Centerville, Tex., Jan. 14. —Bruno Durst, a resident of Leon County since the early forties, was laid to rest yesterday at the family graveyard on the old homestead of his father, John Durst, near Leon, in this county. The services were conducted by the Masons, of which order he has been a member for more than forty years being a charter member of Union Lodge No. 39, located at Leon, in this county, now demised. Mr. Durst was born in the old Rock Fort at Nacogdoches, seventy-three years ago. His father owned, and for some time resided in that historic building in the thirties. About 1840 John Durst, father of the deceased, purchased a large tract of land, the Allen Demory and N. G. Allen leagues, near old Leon, Leon County, upon which he erected an old-time rock residence, moving to Leon County (then Robertson County, Republic of Texas), in about 1841. Deceased was a member of the Legislature from this county shortly after the days of reconstruction. He was a long-life Democrat. He went to school to John H. Reagan when Reagan was a young man. He lived under four governments, and was an ex Confederate soldier. He was a man of fine memory, and could tell many of the early happenings in Texas. He had many friends here and throughout the State who will feel sad to learn of his death. Only one brother survives him, Mr. H. Durst, now living on his father's old homestead near Leona. He has a son attending the Agricultural and Mechanical College, Bruno Durst. He has other sons and daughters and a wife who survive him.

THE biggest branch of the Texas Legislature is the "third house."

A CHICAGO man, the father of nineteen children, was fined the other day for refusing to send all his children to school. Poor fellow.

YES boys give the Government anything it wants, just so it promises and binds itself to spend \$25,000 in a house at Nacogdoches.

ANOTHER gusher has been brought in at Humble. There seems to be a great deal of "gushing" but precious little oil down there.

DIVERSIFICATION is the only salvation for the East Texas farmer. Plant a little of every thing and cut cotton down as short as possible.

THE associated press reports fifty people frozen to death in the provinces of east and west Prussia. Give us Texas for all purposes.

LET us not underestimate the new propositions which are now presented to us. The Baptist College, the Cigar Factory, the Nacogdoches & Southeastern Ry., Depot etc.

IT seems that the Beaumont saloon men have been invading Sabine County. Two of them have been indicted for selling whiskey in Sabine County, each on several counts.

THE Georgia cotton planters have signed a pledge to reduce the cotton acreage 25 to 50 per cent this year. Nothing but the boll weevil can beat that to keep up the price.

Now that we are assured that our soil will produce a fine filler tobacco lets hustle for a big cigar factory. This is one of the best ways to get the industry before the public and outside world.

IT is of course unnecessary to urge the utmost activity in the matter of the negotiations pending with reference to the securing of the Baptist College. Everybody recognizes the importance of the move.

EVERY citizen of Nacogdoches should get interested in factories for the town. We have an opportunity of landing a good cigar factory and must hustle for it. Small factories are the forerunners of large ones.

WOULD it not be a good thing now for Congressman Brooks to have a new U. S. Judicial District established with a Court at Nacogdoches; a good use to put the public building to, and a thing needed as well.

SOME of the claimants of the \$50,000 boll weevil prize are doubtless working harder to convince somebody that they are entitled to the prize than they are to exterminate the boll weevil. It was a fool offer at first and should be cancelled or withdrawn by the present legislature.

THERE is not a "red cent" in the State Treasury to pay the legislators their mileage and per diem, and the boys will have to work on credit till about March 1st, or get "shaved" at the banks. The Austin banks, however, have agreed to cash their certificates at a discount of one per cent.

COL. PEETERS has been over in Louisiana the past week urging cotton planters to reduce the acreage of cotton next year, and it is expected that when the Southern Cotton Growers' Association meets in New Orleans the last of this month a decision will be reached to reduce the acreage at least 25 per cent.

THE depression in cotton trading and the prospect of heavy reduction in acreage has paralyzed the fertilizer business all over the South. The business has slumped nearly 1,000 per cent in some instances. A fair example comes from a big Virginia concern, which says it has sold only 100 tons of fertilizer to cotton planters against 90,000 tons last year.

IT is said that the farmers of the South have already sold over 3,000,000 bales of the present cotton crop at 10 cents a pound; 3,000,000 more at 9 cents and about 1,000,000 bales at a less price. There is still in the hands of the farmer between four and five million bales. The spinners have sold 10,000,000 to 11,000,000 bales of cotton in their future order for goods for the present year. That means that they are about 5,000,000 short. The farmers are long and the spinners are short. With these statistics before us, it appears that the farmer has only to hold fast to his cotton a little while to get 10 cents for it.

THE whipping post is not a legal institution in Mississippi but some of the people there evidently think it should be, judging by the following dispatch of Dec. 28th from Natchez in that state: "A. D. Lewis, a white man 33 years old whose home is in Chicago, was lashed today in the woods near Natchez and ordered out of the state. Lewis was being taken to the county convict farm to serve a sentence for insulting ladies on the street. As he was being taken to the farm a crowd of six white men took him from the guards. They entered the woods three miles from town, stripped him and gave him sixty lashes across the back, then placed him on a train and ordered him to leave the state."

THE first paragraph in Gov. Folk's inaugural message to the Missouri legislature is evidence of his patriotism and proof of his loyalty to his state. There are other legislatures than that of Missouri that would do well to follow his precept. The paragraph reads as follows: "Partisanship is a good thing sometimes; but patriotism is a better thing at all times. Partisanship is well enough when it does not conflict with patri-

otism; but patriotism is a higher virtue than partisanship. Some of you are democrats, some are republicans, all are Missourians. In the discharge of official duties let us be Missourians before we are anything else. Do not forget that you will be aiding the party you may belong to most by giving the public the highest service. You cannot help your party by injuring the public. One may be in private life a democrat or republican, but when he steps into public office he becomes a servant of the people."

THE 29th legislature evidently contemplates in the beginning that it is likely to do those things which it ought not to do and have undone those things which it ought to do. For the first time in the state's history the warmest and most bitter contest was over the matter of who shall do the praying for the body. Rev. G. C. Rankin, Methodist divine of national reputation, was a candidate in opposition to Rev. L. L. Tucker, a blind preacher, of the Baptist faith. The contest waxed warm toward the close of the campaign. It seems that although both candidates were prohibitionists the liquor question was in the fight, with a larger per cent of the antis in favor of Mr. Tucker, who though a prohibitionist is not one of the "don't care a darn who knows it" sort. Speaking of whiskey and preachers calls to mind an amusing incident which occurred in a Baptist church once upon a time. A member who was also a preacher was before the church for trial, charged with drunkenness. He was asked by the moderator if he had anything to say, whereupon with deep humility but with an air of superior wisdom he explained to his brethren that the spirit and the flesh were in constant warfare, the spirit holy sober and altogether good, while the flesh was sinful and full of corruption. In his case the flesh wanted a drink while the spirit with all its might resisted the temptation and the conflict was fierce and terrible. The poor spirit at last weak and exhausted surrendered and the sinful flesh prevailed. That he now with a broken and contrite heart full of humility stood before his brethren and begged forgiveness. A member who had listened with great attention rose and asked if he might ask the brother a question, receiving an affirmative answer he asked: "Which is it that we have before us tonight, the spirit or the flesh?" The flesh said the erring one. Then replied the member, "I am too much puzzled to vote on the question and ask to be excused." "Why are you puzzled," asked the moderator? "I don't know whether I am voting to turn a preacher out of the church for getting drunk or voting the prize to the champion modern liar. Mr. Tucker was elected by the narrow margin of five votes. He is a good man no doubt, but somehow we like an offensive partisan."

## OUR FIRST TANYARD.

A writer in the Beaumont Journal grows reminiscent over the early tan yards of East Texas and tells the following interesting story of how Squire Hamil put in the first tanyard in Nacogdoches county at Melrose:

Every tanyard now in existence between the Trinity and Sabine rivers, in all our boasted East Texas, could be counted on the fingers of a single hand and still have a finger or so to spare. These old monuments of an eventful and historic past have fallen by the wayside and the very places where once they flourished have been almost forgotten.

There was one in Nacogdoches county "enduring" of de wuh," as the good old darkey would say, and thereby hangs a tale.

'Squire Sam Hamil came from the mountains of Tennessee to Texas two years after the battle of San Jacinto had been fought and won. He walked all the way from Natchitoches on Red river to a small village in Nacogdoches county called Melrose, and the looks of the country pleased him so well that he concluded to stop. In fact, his daughter and only child had preceded him a few years before. His wife was left asleep in the old Tennessee hills. When he reached Melrose footsore and weary, it was plain Sam Hamil, but in a few years he was elected as justice of the peace and ever afterwards went by the name of 'Squire Hamil.

Melrose, like all other sections of East Texas, or even Texas at that period of time, was very isolated. Stores were few and far between and nearly all the people's supplies were hauled in wagons from Shreveport, or Jefferson, at the head of navigation on Red river and Cypress bayou respectively. Boys and girls went barefooted till they were old enough to marry almost, because shoes were scarce. 'Squire Hamil was a man of action as well as observation. There were shoe makers in the country, but leather was scarce and very high. However, the woods were full of cattle and people had fresh beef almost every day in the year if they desired it. So 'Squire Hamil went to work to put in a tanyard.

At the head of an ever-running branch oge mile north of Melrose, on a road that led to Martinsville, he put in a vat capable of holding 200 large hides at one time. In fact he put in a number of vats, and having made the other necessary preparations, he went to the woods, felled oak trees, peeled them and had the bark carried and put into his vats. Hides were bought on shares—that is, he would tan a hide one-half for the other.

The business prospered from the very hour of its inception, and people from far and near came to see it in operation. 'Squire Hamil accumulated a large amount of leather of the very best kind, which he sold in Shreveport and other places at splendid prices.

Shoe makers throughout

the country were able to go into business and in turn the people were able to wear shoes.

One night a storm swept across the country and blew down a great number of large oak trees. It was a good chance to save bark, and so 'Squire Hamil sallied out, hired a dozen or so men and boys, and for a couple of days peeled bark from the fallen trees and carried it to his vats at the tanyard.

The little branch took the name of Tanyard Branch; the yard went down a few years after the close of the war and was never revived. 'Squire Hamil long since dead, sleeps far away from the scenes of his pioneer energy and progress, and the little branch still bears the name given it half a century ago.

THE announcement that the situation in Colorado has cleared somewhat is gratifying. Adams, the democrat, has been declared elected governor and Peabody is in anything but a good humor, but the fight will now be narrowed down to a formal contest in which Peabody will lose out and will soon cease to be an issue. It now appears that political strife over in Colorado is rapidly wairing to a close.

"Mr. Armour, of the Fort Worth packing house, says that more than one-half of the hogs slaughtered in Fort Worth are shipped there from outside the state, and that Texas farmers would make more money raising corn and hogs than in raising cotton. This is a reminder that the late John R. Hoxie, when engaged in the packing business at Fort Worth, encountered the same difficulty of which Mr. Armour speaks, and attempted to remove it by importing brood sows and selling them to Texas farmers on credit, to be paid for with hog shipments to his packing house. The question of feed for the hogs was one that he was never able to settle to the satisfaction of the farmers, and he was finally compelled to admit the defeat of his plans. It is apparent, however, that in a land as fertile as Texas hogs may be raised at a profit, and it would be to the advantage of the packing houses at Fort Worth and Dallas, as well as the farmers of the adjacent territory, to cooperate in the investigation of the best methods to increase and make profitable the production of hogs in this State. A continuous and stable revenue may thus be added to the farm owners, and an outlet afforded to energy and capital that are now devoted to the over-production of cotton."

It got in its work in the organization of the senate and showed its hand in the election of the chaplain of the lower house. Dr. Rankin was defeated by five votes by the blind preacher, the latter having the undivided support of the "Third House"—the lobby. The various other offices, however, were filled without the assistance of that "august" body.

If the number of bills introduced is a criterion, the chances are that the present legislature will be in session about five months.

THE deficit in the state treasury Saturday night Jan. 14th, was \$643,924.62. Treasurer Robbins calling in \$70,575.84 of the outstanding warrants on that date.

THERE may not be many elections in Nacogdoches county this year, but if there are any at all you may want to vote powerful bad. Only a few more days left in which to get your poll tax receipt. Jan. 31st is the limit. Don't put it off.

THE Twenty-eighth legislature passed an act requiring the county clerks in the different counties of the state to keep a record of all deaths and births reported to them, and at the end of each month forward the same to the state health department, and there compiled as "vital statistics." These reports have been going in ever since, but due to the fact that the same legislature failed to make an appropriation to maintain the vital statistics end of the department, the act has been practically inoperative.

REPRESENTATIVE DAVIS of San Augustine, has introduced a bill in the lower house of the legislature, the purpose of which is to compel county clerks to show the records to citizens desiring to examine them. This bill is alright but it could hardly be supposed the people of a county would elect a man for county clerk who was so infernal mean that he would refuse to show his records to a constituent or citizen who was not so familiar with records as to enable him to make his own investigations, but some times the people are fooled and doubtless some have seen instances of the like.

The following figures from Poor's Manual will give some idea of the magnitude to which the railroad business of this country has grown: The number of tons of freight carried one mile was 90,522,000,000 in 1893, and 171,290,000,000 in 1903, the increase in ten years being 80,768,000,000 tons, or close to 90 per cent. The average rate received per ton per mile in 1893 was .893 cent; in 1903 it was .781 cent; showing an average reduction of .112 cent, or a little over a mill per mile, amounting to a total rate reduction of over \$171,000,000. The gross income of American railroads in 1903 was \$1,998,000,000, operating expenses \$1,316,000,000, net earnings \$682,000,000, fixed charges \$560,000,000, leaving \$122,000,000 available for dividends.

PLANT TOBACCO.

Mr. W. M. Hinson, who has charge of the government tobacco experiment stations in Texas, is very anxious to have all who are interested in this industry to see him at once, and have the matter of tobacco culture fully explained to them. It is very important that enough farmers plant small crops of tobacco to make up a total of 50 acres. If this is done the government will furnish an experienced man to look after and advise the grower how to cultivate, harvest and handle the crop up to and placing it on the market. If Nacogdoches ever expects to do anything with the tobacco business, now is the time to begin. The experiments already made show that our soils produce the finest filler tobacco grown in the United States. All we need now is the pluck to get into the business, and bring it up to where it will be one of our money making industries. This can only be accomplished by the farmers and truckers taking hold and pushing it. Until the business is more thoroughly established and a market demand made, it would not be advisable for a single farmer to plant too largely, but by taking hold now and planting from two to ten acres by the time the demand calls for large crops, he will have acquired the experience and knowledge to handle any size crop desired. Let us urge you to see Mr. Hinson at once and list with him for a small crop of tobacco for this year.

SPEAKER SEABURRY has been deliberate in the appointment of committees and the old members say he has shown great care in their make-up. Capable men are placed at the head of each committee. Ed F. Harris of Galveston, was given the honor of being made chairman of the Judiciary Committee. W. T. Shannon of Belton, is chairman of the Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence, which was formerly Judiciary No. 2. Wm. D. Williams of Ft. Worth, is made chairman of the Committee on Revenue and Taxation. As the author of the intangible assets bill, which was passed by the House at the last session, Mr. Williams acquired considerable reputation as a man familiar with the tax question, and he will be in a position to wield much influence as chairman of this committee. Huling P. Robertson of Temple, is chairman of the Committee on State Affairs. He has had long legislative experience. W. J. Bryan of Abilene, is chairman of the Committee on Public Lands and Land Office. He has served several terms in the legislature and is perfectly familiar with the land situation in West Texas. Another committee of much importance is that of Private Corporations. Tom B. Love of Dallas, is made chairman of this committee. As was generally expected, A. W. Ferrell of Austin, is chairman of the Committee on Privileges, Suffrage and Elections. The chairman of the Committee

on Common Carriers, which will have to do with railroads, is Richard Mays of Corsicana. These are the more important committees.

GOV. LANHAM's message is a very strong document in many respects. He urges an increase of the rate of taxation to 25c on the \$100 valuation from the present 16 2/3. The governor makes this recommendation as the alternation for meeting the present deficiency as well as for the payment of current expenses for at least the coming year. He does not fail to say that the increase would be unnecessary if property owners would pay taxes on what they own at its value on the existing rate. Governor Lanham truthfully declares that the states present financial strain is merely due to tax evasions in the cities and towns by those whose holdings are largely represented by entangible assets while the small farmer comes up with his dues to the last dollar. While this fact may not be due to a relative degree of civil virtue possessed by the two classes it is nevertheless a fact. Perhaps upon the principle that one man pays his debts because he can be made to do so while another does not pay his debts for the reason that he cannot be compelled to pay. With it all we perhaps see an increase in the present rate and the effect will be that those who pay now will pay more hereafter while the dodger of today will be the dodger of tomorrow.

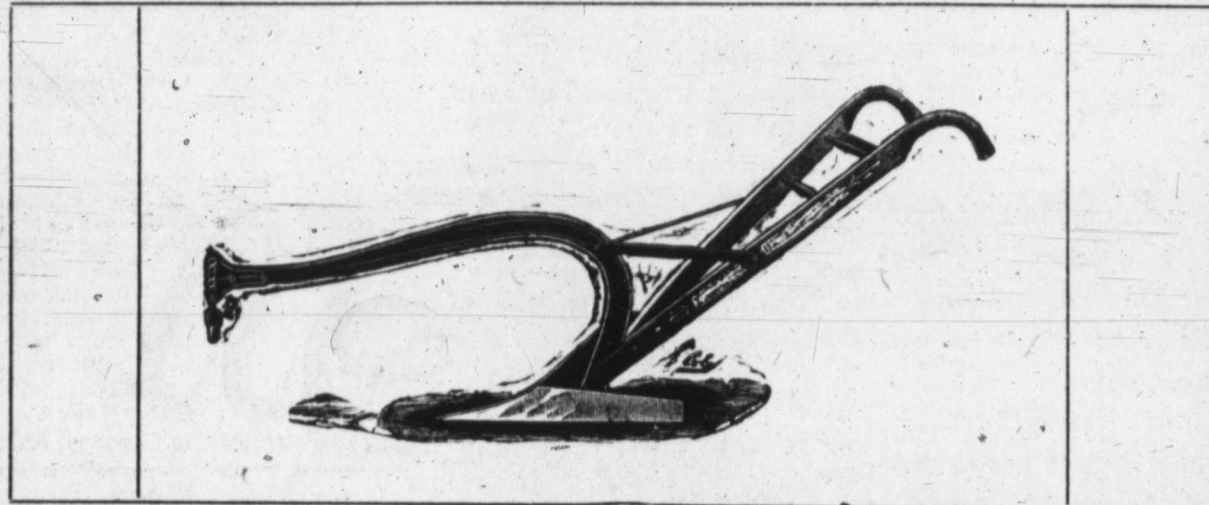

**THE LEGISLATURE.**

**A Few Notes From a Member's Tablet.**

Austin, Jan. 14.—One hundred and four bills, which would seem to cover every ill that a Texan is heir to, were read first time yesterday and referred to the various committees, except one—the per diem and mileage bill. This bill galloped through like a canine in front of a tin can, and carried an appropriation of \$130,000.

An effort to establish a "monstrous" precedent was defeated yesterday afternoon. A resolution was offered creating the office of second assistant enrolling clerk, designating the appointee, who is a pretty girl from the Panther City, and fixing the salary at five dollars per day; The member who introduced the resolution confessed that he had caused the young lady to return to Austin, (she having been defeated for the place of assistant postmaster) to take a committee clerkship, that said clerkship had been awarded by the Speaker to another office for his protegee. The House had the good sense to sit down upon the resolution with an emphatic sit. If the resolution had passed there is no telling where the thing of making places for the disappointed candidates would end. One good lady, who was a candidate for a five dollar position was finally awarded the position of laundress at two dollars a day. There wasn't enough places for all the candidates for pages and porters and an effort was made to increase the number in order to get them all in, negroes and all. In fact I believe the number of porters was slightly increased over the 28th legislature.

There are two republicans among the members of the House and I happen to have a seat between them; that is one sits on the first seat in front and the other immediately behind me. The strange part of it is they are both from democratic districts and say they were elected (to their own surprise) over democratic nominees. One is from Gaudalupe county and represents the 91st district. His name is F. Werner, and he is a German farmer. He is 57 years of age and is a native of Germany. He is a very intelligent man and speaks several languages, but so far

he has inflicted none of them upon the membership of the 29th legislature. The other republican member is from El Paso, and represents the 100th district. He is a merchant and cattle man and a polished gentleman. So far he has not appeared on the floor. He is serving his first term and it is noticeable that first term members are mighty little in it except with their votes during organization. The "gentleman from El Paso" is Mr. A. L. Sharpe, a native of Ohio, and up to recent years a telegraph operator in the railroad service. He is 47 years of age. He is a friend of our honored former citizen Judge Peyton F. Edwards.

Judge A. W. Terrell, of Austin, author of the Terrell election law, is my desk-mate. It took him two days to get acquainted with me, though he is a most congenial and courteous old gentleman. He knows me now on account of an incident that occurred the second day. He is chairman of the privileges and elections committee, of which I am a member, and he wanted to see me. After hunting all over the house for me, he called the journal clerk to his assistance, who brought him back to his own desk and introduced him to me.

A resolution was passed yesterday afternoon allowing each member \$25 for postage. That will pay postage on one letter each to nearly every voter who voted for me in last election, so if any of the boys want to write me while I am in Austin I will take pleasure in answering them as long as the stamps hold out. ### The Hayward Mill.

Few people realize what new enterprises mean to the town, how valuable are our many little industries to the citizens of every class, and of whatever calling. How many people have stopped to consider the immensity of the great Hayward mill plant, which has recently been completed and of its value to the town. - Few people know that this is one of the greatest lumber manufacturing concerns in the country.

This plant employs here at Nacogdoches two hundred men. The salaries of these employes run from \$1.50 to \$7.50 per day. A conservative estimate places the average living expenses of laboring men at \$35.00 per month. Upon this basis the employes of the Hayward mill spend \$7,000 per month in Nacogdoches or \$84,000 per year, and this in addition to the manager and other officials and such of the mills expenditures as are not considered. This goes to the merchant, the doctor, the blacksmith, the farmer, the dairyman, the teacher, and printer, and all classes in their proper and usual proportion are the beneficiaries.

This mill is now cutting two hundred thousand feet of lumber per day. The railroads are, of course, carrying it away, the business of the railroads is thereby increased and necessarily the force must be increased to handle this business, and so the effects of this great enterprise upon the town and country could be enumerated ad in finitum.

And so in proportion do all the smaller industries add their part to the general support of the community. By proper and sufficient effort other great industries can be added until we will forget that we ever had to look to cotton for our support.

The fruit and truck industry is the most practical and available enterprise for this town and country. The forests which cover the hills around Nacogdoches should be at once converted into orchards and vegetable farms, a canning factory would follow with employment for fifty or a hundred people. The box factory would soon double its force and many other things follow this great business.

Then we have the tobacco industry, the infant of recent birth but destined to rapidly grow to immense proportions.

Let us be up and doing about, great opportunities are at hand if only cultivated.

Blount, his certain promissory note of said date, wherein he contracted and promised to pay to the said plaintiff, E. A. #### Taylor & Webb Indicted.

It now transpires that the  
grand jury of Nacogdoches  
county at the September term  
of the District Court; re-  
turned a bill of indictment  
against Alice L. Webb and  
Chas. F. Taylor. They are  
charged with obtaining from  
F. A. Blount of this city, \$3,-  
000 by falsely representing  
that they had purchased from  
S. F. B. Morse 734 acres of  
land in this county known as  
Redfield. Mr. Blount believ-  
ing their statement to be true  
loaned them the money. It  
transpired that they had not  
purchased the property, but  
were by the same representa-  
tion obtaining money from  
other sources. They have  
not returned the money nor  
any part of it. In addition to  
this they made contracts with  
Mr. Hobbs to construct three  
tenant houses and two large  
tobacco barns upon the prop-  
erty for which Mr. Hobbs is  
short the sum of about \$1,500  
in round numbers including  
the value of the lumber fur-  
nished by Mr. Adam Carra-  
way. The work was done  
upon the representation of  
these parties that they owned  
the property, the contractor  
and material man acting with  
the knowledge of ample pro-

tection provided by law in  
such cases. Imagine their  
surprise and disappointment  
when the parties refused to  
pay them when the work was  
completed and they learned  
that the property belonged to  
other persons, who had for-  
bidden Taylor & Webb to  
construct the improvements  
and who did not know the  
contractors and material men  
were being imposed upon.

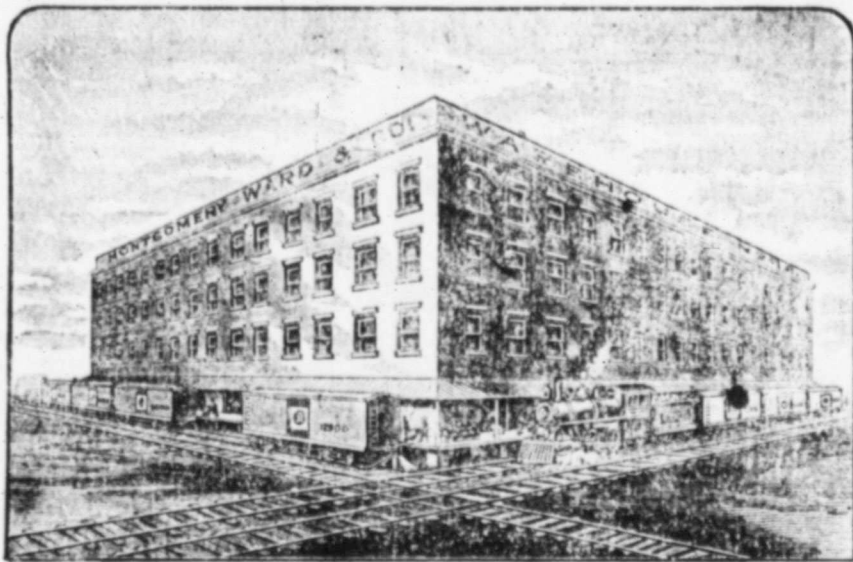
