WE'VE got a smoke coming. Its the real Nacogdoches article.

W. P. BROWN the famous cotton bull has been slated for president of the cotton pool.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT should look after some of the other trusts and their mode of doing business.

EVERY letter written to friends in the old states should contain a few lines about Nacogdoches and her great truck lands.

OUR Republican president is becoming quite democratic in his attitude toward railroads and other corporations.

WHEN the knockers of Nacogdoches shall have passed to the great beyond "from whose bourne no traveler returns," the town will still be doing business at the same old stand.

LAND planted in tobacco, properly handled, will net at the lowest estimate about \$50 per acre. Cotton will net about \$15. Four months is required to raise tobacco, and it requires about twelve for cotton.

THE merchants of Nacogdoches should encourage the farmers to plant small crops of tobacco. The Nacogdoches cigar factory will furnish the market—that keeps money at home. If the factory is forced to purchase tobacco elsewhere, just so much as they buy away from home just that much money is taken out of circulation here.

In commenting on the report of Hon. A. J. Houston contesting the election of Hon. M. L. Broocks, The Houston Post says: "The Hon. A. J. Houston is going to contest, by gracious, and test the efficacy of the Texas poll tax law. The majority of those contesting was 8000. If there had been no poll tax law it would have been twice as great."

ONLY 3222 poll tax receipts have been issued in Nacogdoches county this year. On close of business on January 31 last year 3410 receipts were issued. These figures show that there are 188 of last year's voters out of commission this year should occasion arise for the people of Nacogdoches county to exercise their right of suffrage on any question.

If the emperor of Russia thinks anything of his job, he had better call in his war dogs. Industrial conditions, as they exist at present, are unsatisfactory to the people as was evidenced by the recent trouble in St. Petersburg. Hence if the row with the japs continues much longer, there will be a rebellion in Russian domains that will make the old bear dance to music of the funeral dirge.

NAME SELECTED.

The legal name of the cotton pool formed by the executive committee of the Southern Cotton association has been fixed as the "Southern Planters' Commission and Holding Company." The charter has been drafted by the ablest lawyers of New York and the domicile will be in New Orleans. The executive committee of the Southern Cotton association will finally indorse the complete details of the pool at its meeting in Atlanta next Tuesday. It has been agreed that W. P. Brown, the noted cotton bull operator, member of the local cotton exchange, will be the president, and President Abraham Britton of the New York local exchange and S. P. Walmsley and Frank B. Hayne, member of the exchange, will be vice president, with J. P. Whyte of New Orleans as secretary. Meetings will be held in every township of the cotton belt on Saturday, the 18th, to perfect the organization of the farmers. The warehousing committee of the Southern Cotton association meets in New York on the 4th of next month to complete its report to the executive committee of that association.

A NEGRO school teacher at Burnet, Texas, named C. A. Walters committed suicide Thursday. He left a note saying that he had sold questions on which negroes had obtained certificates last summer to teach school.

In a recent guessing contest conducted by a company that manufactures poultry food, as to the number of feathers on a hen, it was ascertained by actual count that on an ordinary hen there are 8120.

The man who is supplied with plenty of good dry wood in easy reach of the fire place can boast of a comfortable sort of feeling that most people can imagine but few experience these wet wintry days.

The parcels post convention recently concluded between the United States and Belgium went into operation on the first. It is the third parcels post treaty concluded between the United States and European countries, and the twenty-sixth negotiated with any government, most of the existing treaties being with South and Central America. The parcels under the Belgian treaty, as under the German and Norwegian treaties, are restricted to four pounds and six ounces each and \$50 in value.

Now don't lose sight of the cotton mill scheme, or proposition. There is enough surplus cotton in the country to erect a number of mills in this state, but stopping at home, Nacogdoches county farmers have enough cotton on hand to subscribe liberally to the project and at no loss to them. On the other hand they will have invested their cotton in stock of an enterprise that will pay handsome dividends if

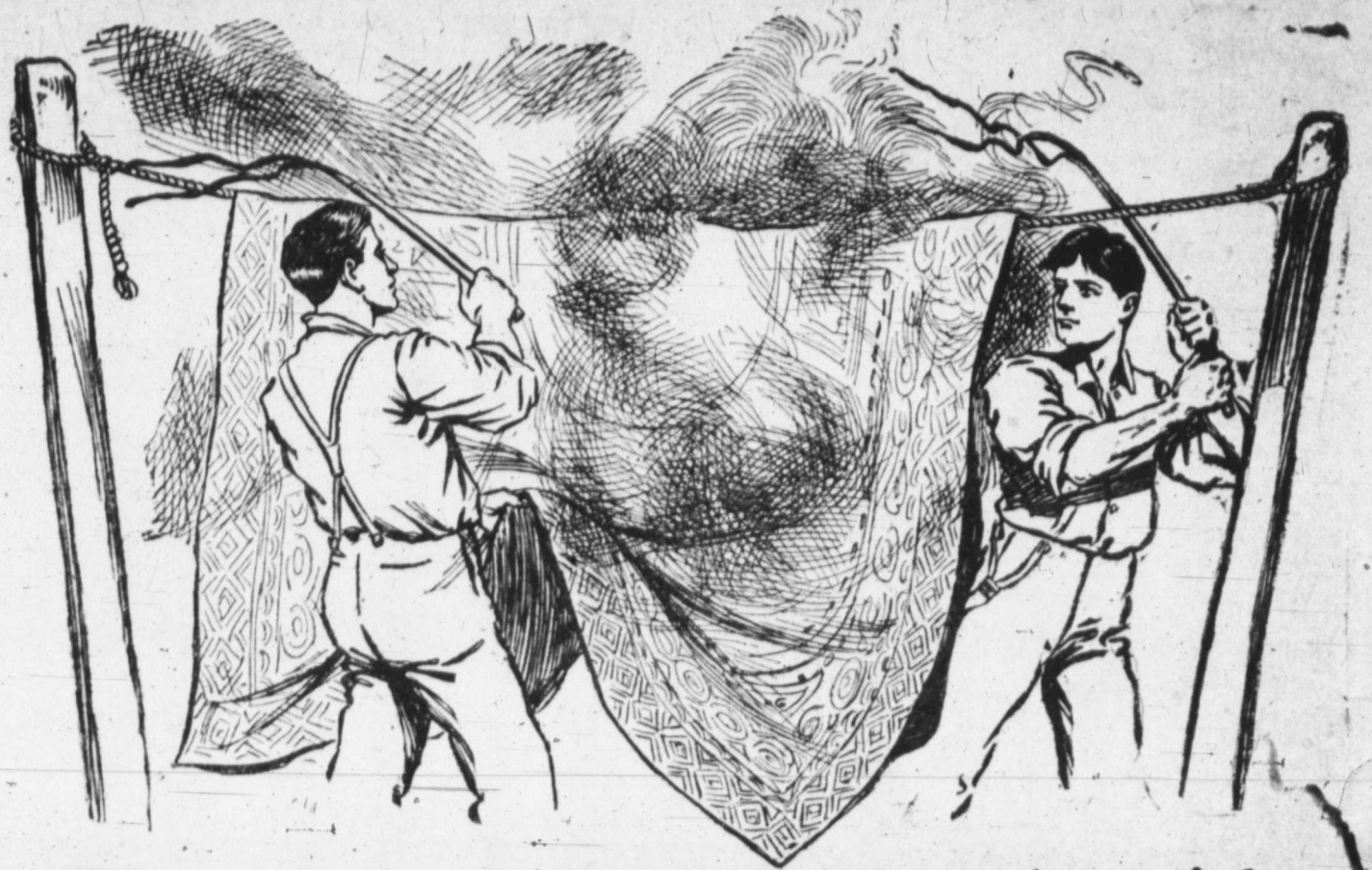
the mill is properly managed. Not only will it be a paying proposition on the money invested, but the mill will furnish a market to the farmers of Eastern Texas for their cotton. The business league should look into this matter at an early date and if possible get the mill erected this year.

City Marshal Gallant spent Saturday and Saturday night in Nacogdoches on business. While speaking to an Enterprise man he said that Cushing has much to boast of in way of peace and sobriety. He said that the calaboose at that place was frequently resorted to to safely keep down the rowdies.—Cushing Enterprise.

What is a little village like Cushing, to be compared to a city like Nacogdoches? Cushing isn't hardly of sufficient importance yet to have a calaboose, although we can testify to occasions when she has needed one.

Ry. was building through San Jacinto county he hauled ties and drove scrapers for the contractors. He secured a place as clerk in a commissary where he studied law until he was given a position in the company's office at Houston at a salary of fifty dollars per month and at the same time continued his studies. After he was admitted to the bar he located at Nacogdoches where he practiced law and was local attorney for the H. E. & W. T. Ry. Co. He remained here for about two years, was a studious, painstaking, hard-working young lawyer. His first promotion was to the position of general attorney for the same road with headquarters at Houston. He was soon made assistant general attorney of the Southern Pacific at Dallas and has continued to rise until today he stands as the general attorney of the entire Harriman System of railroads in the United States with headquarters in New York City. Perhaps few people realize the importance of his position. Alton B. Parker, Elihu Root or David B. Hill would be honored by the offer of the place, and his salary is said to be equal to that paid the president of the United States.

CRIPPLED JIM WANTED.

Fourteen Hundred Dollars Offered For His Arrest.

A few days ago the Chief of Police at Joplin, Mo., was shot and killed and the murderers made their escape. The Missouri officials it is said have offered a reward of fourteen hundred dollars for their apprehension. Three men are said to be implicated, one is charged with the alleged crime and is known by his companions as "Crippled Jim." The three escaping men made their way to Shreveport and the police department of that city had them located, but before the arrest could be made the fugitives made their escape to Texas. Nacogdoches authorities were notified and when the west bound Houston East & West Texas passenger arrived this morning at 4:15 several officials were there.

"Crippled Jim" has the hall of one foot cut off and J. D. Gray recognized his man. Gray commanded the man to halt and consider himself under arrest, but the man wasn't ready to halt, but pulled a monstrous looking gun and took a couple of shots at the officer. Jim's companions it is stated took a few at the officer. Gray shot four times at the fleeing man, but none of the shots took effect.

The fugitives are going towards Lufkin and Sheriff Buckner, Jno. Spradley and Walter Turner are in pursuit with blood hounds.

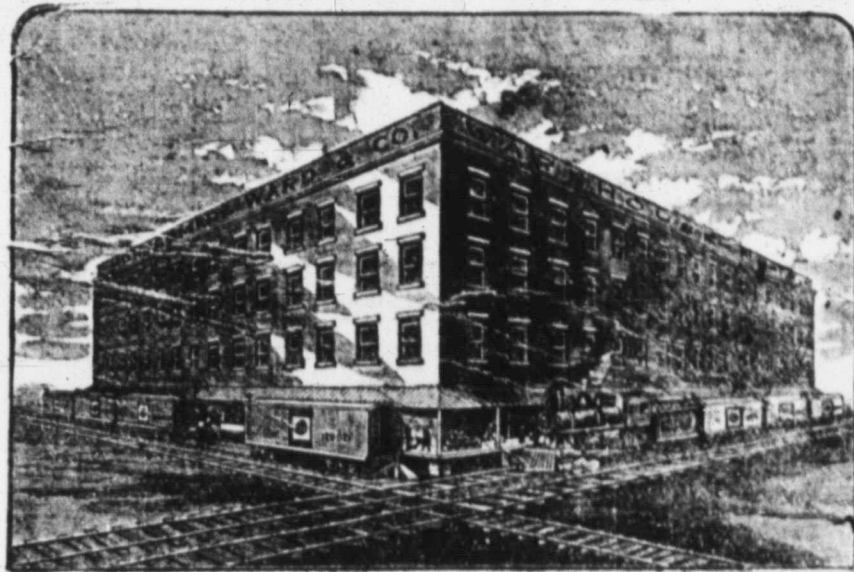

COUNTED THE BONDS.

Total in State Treasury is Over Thirteen Million.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 6.—The task of counting the bonds in the state treasury department was completed Friday evening by the legislative committee appointed for that purpose. The official count disclosed that there are now bonds in the vaults of the treasury aggregating \$13,528,703.05. These bonds are to the credit of the different funds, as follows: School bonds (district), \$982,787.55; school bonds (county), \$7,477,274; state of Texas bonds, \$2,233,000; railroad bonds, \$1,603,317; state university bonds, \$595,700; Agricultural and Mechanical college bonds, \$209,000; Orphans asylum bonds, \$13,200; Lunatic asylum bonds, \$119,700; Blind institute bonds, \$126,500; Deaf and Dumb asylum bonds \$82,000; Medical university bonds, \$5000; general revenue fund, \$1000 in notes; escheated estates, \$815 notes; special loan tax account, \$79,409.50 in a certificate of debt. This makes a total of \$13,528,703.05. The books of the department were found to be in first-class condition by the committee.

The above Associated Press report appeared in the Chronicle this morning and the Sentinel reporter called on the district clerk to ascertain if the papers had been received for correction, and was informed that the papers were corrected and forwarded to the governor last week, and should have been received by Governor Lanham before the date of the above telegram from the State Capitol.

A Galveston Cigar Factory Wanted
Ours Tobacco.

The fame of the celebrated Nacogdoches tobacco lands known as the Orangeburg soil is by no means local—it has become known from the great lakes of the north to the Rio Grande on the south, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The news has been published in foreign countries and foreigners are becoming interested to such an extent that they are investing their capital in companies for the purpose of working up Texas tobacco, and especially that produced at Nacogdoches. They are also investing in Nacogdoches real estate, as will be seen by the following report, which appeared in the Houston Post, it is self explanatory:

Beaumont, Texas, Feb. 1.
—The Nacogdoches Havana Cigar company of Galveston has been organized with a capitalization of \$25,000 and will engage in the culture of tobacco lands in East Texas. Mr. W. A. Kolley of this city is one of the organizers of the company and has been made superintendent. The principal capital has been put up by Michael Tack, of London, England, and Sam Fridner, of Austria. Mr. Fridner is the representative of large capital in Europe which is seeking investment in the South.

The company has purchased 4,600 pounds of tobacco from the government, which was grown at Nacogdoches on the experimental station conducted in 1903 by L. H. Shelter. It is also the purpose of the company to engage in the culture of tobacco on its own account and twenty acres will be planted near Nacogdoches this season. Besides it is announced that the company will enter actively into the market for all Texas grown tobacco.

As soon as this appeared The Sentinel reporter called on Dr. J. E. Mayfield who was the secretary of the Nacogdoches Tobacco Association during 1903-4 and asked what there was in the report, as it was generally known that the tobacco crop of 1903-4 had been purchased by the Nacogdoches Cigar Co., of Nacogdoches, and from the conversation with Dr. Mayfield the following facts are given:

in an application for the tobacco some time ago, and when the Galveston concern was in a position to put in an application, the local company had acquired a title to the goods and the Galveston company will have to handle tobacco from other sources.

Dr. Mayfield is the secretary-treasurer pro tem of the Nacogdoches Cigar Co., of Nacogdoches, and he stated that \$933.50 had been paid in cash for the crops mentioned above and the money forwarded to Washington.

The price paid per pound ranged from 28 to 40 cents. The highest price paid was for the tobacco raised on the Ratcliff land south of town. The tobacco in the warehouse

is crops raised at the various experimental stations in Alabama, South Carolina and Texas. While the crops produced in 1903 are of a very high grade and which were pronounced by experts as being of fine quality, yet these same experts have now given it as their opinion that the leaf grown here last year, both filler and wrapper, will far exceed that of the previous year.

The Galveston people wanted our tobacco and The Sentinel commends their judgment, but the business men of Nacogdoches know a good thing themselves, hence we have a cigar factory of our own and will make up the genuine Nacogdoches tobacco into Nacogdoches cigars with Nacogdoches capital. Will Make Palestine Headquarters.

Mr. W. M. Hinson the tobacco expert who has had charge of the experimental station here the past year, has been transferred to Palestine, and Mr. Henry Wineborg who has been with the government the past two years will look after the government interests here.

The government has proven beyond all question of a doubt that the tobacco lands adjacent to the city of Nacogdoches are the finest to be found in the United States, and also that Anderson and Houston counties have the same similar soil to Nacogdoches. Therefore, the government having proven this by actual experiment that the Texas tobacco lands, in the territory mentioned, is well adapted to the culture of fine Cuba tobacco, the government now proposes to teach the farmers how to raise, handle and cure their crops.

Mr. Hinson will still continue as the superintendent of the agricultural department, and will make Palestine his headquarters, owing to the fact that that place is more centrally located; and further because the lands of Anderson and Houston counties have not been rated as high as the Orangeberg lands of Nacogdoches county. Yet the government states that under the direction of the Superintendent at Palestine the farmers of that county can be taught to raise a very good grade of tobacco.

Mr. Hinson's transfer will in no wise retard the work as outlined by the government at this place. Mr. Wineborg is considered by the department as an expert in tobacco culture, and with such assistance from Mr. Hinson as may be required the situation at Nacogdoches will practically remain the same as in the past.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Things get lively almost every day in the House of Representatives. It is quite different to the Senate, which is too dignified to indulge in scraps except on rare occasions and upon extreme provocation. The House seems to love a scrap and there are many members that will go more than half way to start one. Already on several occasions members have arisen to a question of privilege to apologize to some brother member for seeming discourteous allusions. This generally follows after the said brother member has done a little skinning in resentment of the aforesaid allusions. The scene invariably closes with the tossing of bouquets and the withdrawal of all remarks that were in the least offensive.

There was a big fight over the O'Quinn pistol bill last week, the opposition being to the jail penalty, and there came near being a colloquy or two during the heat of debate. The bill finally passed and now the gentleman pistol toter cannot escape a jail penalty together with a fine, the maximum being \$200.

There was another fight over the Cobbs bill relating to the separate property of the wife, so as to exempt it from sale for the debts of the husband. The bill was finally passed by a vote of 59 to 34.

There are several young limbs of the law serving their first "sentence" to the legislature, who seem to labor under the belief that success as a legislator depends upon much "sounding of brass" and tooting of the bazoo. They make a speech on every bill, no matter what it is, whether of local or general significance. They bob up serenely on all occasions with the statutes and constitution in one hand and a copy of the bill under discussion in the other and give us a set speech of from 30 to 120 minutes in length, not ten words of which are generally heard by ten men in the House. One little fellow who is especially conspicuous for much talking is a little Mexican from Southwest Texas. He is a lawyer and is less than 25 years of age but has the appearance of a beardless boy. He is really a bright young fellow, well educated and polished in manner. He was petted and spoiled at the outset by the individual members, and is still immensely popular, but he has made the House tired on many occasions already.

Among the quaint characters to be found in the House is the gentleman from Anderson county, Mr. Blount. He is a real rustic and patterns after the famous J. Ras. Jones, who used to go to the legislature from Panola county. Blount's hobby is a bill which has for its object the prohibiting of negroes from holding any responsible positions. The bill could not possibly pass and he is very much worried about how to amend it so as

to get it through even partially carrying his point. He has it in for the negroes, and yesterday when there was a fight up over the Hancock juvenile court bill, Blount blurted out that "it was time to call a halt. This bill was only intended to help to negro." Blount doesn't take the floor very often, but when he does he is full of fire and his voice is like the roaring of the lion and his gesticulation is something fierce.

New Schedule.

The Beaumont Journal speaking of the new schedule on the T. & N. O. branch from there to Dallas which goes into effect next Sunday says:

The schedule as printed shows that No. 155, the through train to Dallas, will leave Beaumont at 7:45 a. m., arriving at Dallas at 9:55 p. m. This train will make Nacogdoches the eating point, arriving there at 1:45 p. m., and leaving at 2:05 p. m.

No. 150, the train from Dallas to Beaumont, will leave Dallas at 7 a. m., arriving in Beaumont at 9 p. m. This train will make Cushing the eating point for its passengers, arriving in Cushing at 1:50 p. m., and leaving at 2:10 p. m.

In regard to the eating places at Cushing and Nacogdoches, dinner will be served at a hotel at each place, the railroad company having made arrangements for this purpose with the hotel men. At Nacogdoches a large new hotel is said to be one of the best eating places in the state near the depot.

The United States Agricultural Department after experimenting with two crops of tobacco in Nacogdoches has proven beyond all question of a doubt that the Orangeburg lands near the city will produce the finest of wrapper and filler tobacco. In fact tobacco experts claim it to be equal to imported goods from Cuba. The question now presents itself will our farmers profit by the experiment? A government expert will remain here and teach the farmers how to plant, cultivate, harvest and cure tobacco provided sufficient acreage is planted. A meeting will be held here on Saturday afternoon to discuss the matter thoroughly, and it is earnestly hoped that a goodly number of truckers, and farmers will be present. Now, while on this subject each and every one must bear the fact in mind that we must first create a demand for the tobacco grown here before fancy prices will be paid. While there is a buyer here now making contracts, if a good crop is raised here this year other buyers will enter the field. For the first two or three crops medium fair prices will be paid, but when the smoker of good cigars begins to call for Nacogdoches tobacco then the price will begin to be something fancy. We must create the demand—then if possible supply the demand.

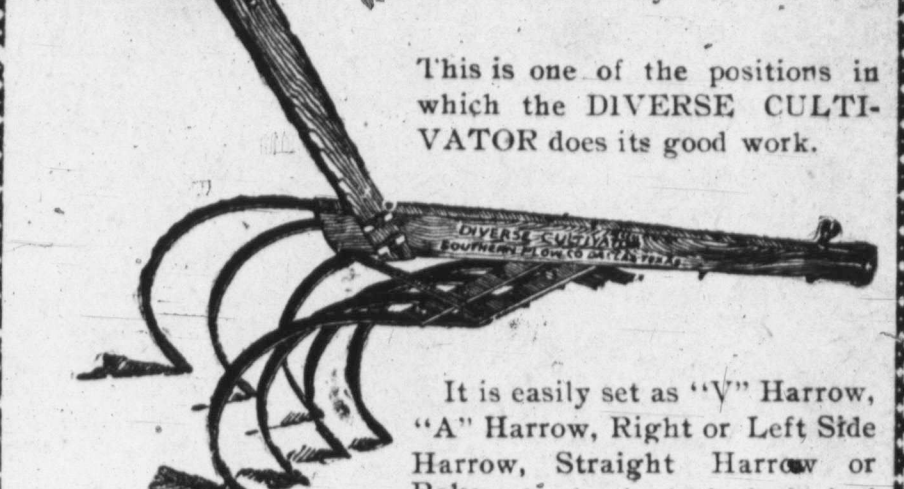
