## CENSUS OF THE PHILIPPINES

The United States Bureau the Census has just pub ished the first complete census of the Philippine Islands. In accordance with an act of Congress, this census was taken by the Phlippine Com direction of Brig. Gen. J. P Sanger, U. S. A., assisted by Mr. Henry Gannett, of the United States Geological Sur United States Geological Sur vey, and Mr. Victor H. Olm-
sted, of the United States Department of Agriculture, who have prepared the analytica ext of the reports.
As soon as the schedules enumerators they were packed in cases and shipped to the United States Bureau of the Census, at Washington, in compliance with the law which uthorized the President to direct this Bureau to compile and publish the results. Up on the arrival of the schedules Census began the task of tab ulation. Several bulletins were issued some months ago The final results as now published are comprised our volums, aggregating
46 pages. These handsome books which have been dt signed by the Bureau of the
Census do not resemble con ventional Government reports They are bound in brow buck
ram, stamped in silver, an bear the seal of the Insular these reports is a large map of the Philippine Islands;there are also many small maps and diagrams in colors, and repro ductions of 280 photographs tastefully grouped in 79 full page half tone cuts (printed in brown, ) illustrating civilize and wild tribes, towns, habitations, churches, agriculture tion, and industries.
