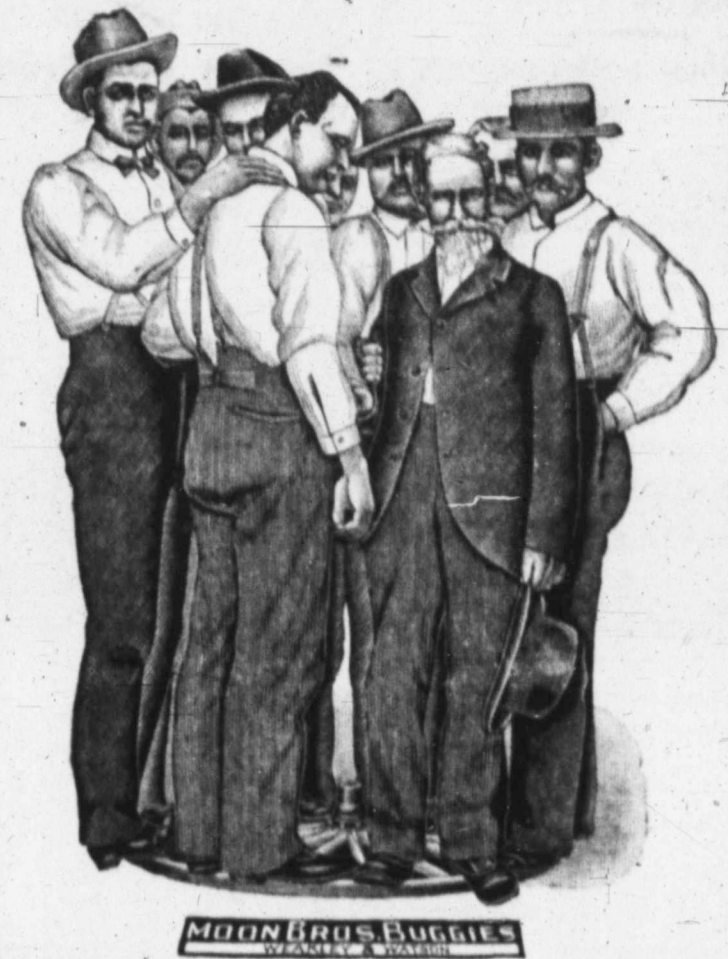
Weaver--Brewer.

ANOTHER victim of the Eldridge Dunovant feud has fallen. Tuesday evening, W. T. Eldrege shot and killed W. E. Calhoun on a passenger train at Wallis. Eldrege killed Capt. Dunovant April 11, 1902, and was acquitted last November. Calhoun was a brother-in-law of Dunovant.

The following from an unknown exchange "hits the nail squarely on the head." When others had spoken hard things the crowd called for Mr. Pinkney. He arose and after a few wise words, he asked the mothers present, if they knew where their boys were at that time. He said the boys were on the streets at night when they ought to be at home receiving the caresses of their mothers. Then, said he, "look after your boys, see that they are with you at night and you will solve the problem before you."—Rusk County News.

Annual Meeting.

The Nacogdoches Grocery Co. held their Annual Stockholders meeting in the office of the Company yesterday afternoon. The meeting was called to order at 3 o'clock with Mr. John Schmidt in the chair.

A full report of the year's business ending April 30th, 1905, was made which seemed to be not only satisfactory, but highly gratifying to all the stockholders present.

As an expression of their satisfaction the stockholders deemed it well to increase their capital stock \$50,000.00, making their capital stock now \$125,000.00, and to establish a branch house, in Timpson, Texas.

The old board of directors were re-elected with the exception of Mr. W. U. Perkins, who expressed a desire to be allowed to retire and in his stead Mr. J. F. Schmidt was elected. The present board of directors are John Schmidt, E. A. Blount, B. F. Harde- man, C. W. Butt, S. T. King, Oscar Matthews, J. F. Schmidt.

A pleasant feature of this session was the presentation of a beautiful gold watch appropriately engraved, to the efficient and kindly Manager, Mr. S. T. King, by the four salesmen, Messrs. G. H. McDaniel, R. L. Harde- man, D. R. Snodgrass and Oscar Matthews. When Mr. Harde- man as spokesman said "I hold in my hand a beautiful solid gold watch purchased by the four salesmen. This watch in its makeup is emblematic of our business. Its well regulated and runs on schedule time. It is a compliment to Mr. King. First, for the very successful management of the business during this year; second, for his very pleasant, congenial management over us, being our superior in rank. We present you with this watch Mr. King, hoping that the morning star of your business life is just rising, and ere it reaches the noon day, we want to see this fair city of ours covering these entire hills and valleys. We then, want to see instead of four sample cases going from this building, a dozen. Then we want to see erected as a monument to your successful management with our labors, this building covering this entire lot, and a veritable skyscraper," he expressed not only the sentiments of the salesmen, but of the entire force, office and warehouse as well.

Although taken by surprise and very naturally overcome by his feelings, Mr. King managed to convey in a few well chosen words his gratification and pleasure at the compliment paid him.

The meeting of the stockholders then adjourned, and immediately after, the new Board of Directors met and elected the following officers: John Schmidt, president. Oscar Matthews, vice president.

S. T. King, secretary and general manager.
J. F. Schmidt, treasurer.
The new Board of Direc-

tors instructed the secretary and manager to open the subscription list, and to sell only \$25,000.00 of the increased capital stock at not less than par, the remaining \$25,000.00 to remain in the treasury. The greater portion of this \$25,000.00 has already been subscribed, and the company does not anticipate any trouble in disposing of the remainder.

Trustee's Sale.

The stock of general merchandise of Jno. W. Davis, bankrupt, was sold today at public auction to Lipstate Dry Goods and Clothing Co. of Tyler, Texas, at thirty-five cents on the dollar. The stock at this place invoices \$20,013.65. The stock at Sacul was also sold. J. H. Cox of Nacogdoches, bought it at 34 cents on the dollar. This stock invoiced \$2,041.00.

The Cost of Life Insurance.

In all this agitation over the question of life insurance, it is well for policyholders in the different companies to keep in mind the fact that the value of their policies, from what might be termed the standpoint of straight life insurance, is not impaired.

The insurance laws of the states in which these various companies are incorporated provide for the maintenance of sufficient reserve to meet the obligations imposed upon the companies as the policies mature, and the insurance laws of other states make this a condition precedent to the companies doing business in these states.

The accumulation of vast surpluses may, however, be taken as demonstrating the fact that policyholders have been paying too high for their insurance. There is undoubtedly something wrong with a system that results in the accumulation of such vast surpluses, since these necessarily are made up of money paid in by the policy holders; but this seems to point to high cost of insurance rather than anything else.

Every insurance company holds out to its policyholders the promise of dividends. All are, therefore, working on mutual lines. Evidently, one of the greatest reforms to be forced by public sentiment, as is suggested by Comptroller General Wright, is the division, at stated intervals, of the surplus among the policyholders. Another and a most important reform is that calling for a standard policy of simple form. As it is, the average policy is so complicated by conditions that it is beyond the understanding of the average man.

Out of the present agitation there are sure to come some radical reforms in the interest of policyholders in all the companies.—Atlanta Constitution.

JUSTICE COURTS INJOINED.

Judge Perkins of the Second Grants Sweeping Restraining Order.

Thursday the district clerk issued twenty-five writs of injunction against parties in Hardin and Tyler counties, on an order granted by Judge James I. Perkins of the 2nd. Judicial district at Lufkin, restraining them from further proceeding with damage suit cases filed in the justice of the peace courts at Village and at Spurger in Tyler county, and also restraining the two justices of the peace from filing or permitting to be filed in their courts any other cases of like character against officers of the Caro Townsite company and also restraining the agents and attorneys of said parties from filing any similar cases in any justice court in the state.

The basis of the suits complained of in the petition is false, deceitful and fraudulent representations made in these justice precincts in the sale of worthless shares of stock in the Caro Townsite company. And the petitioners represent that they are cut off from having any judgment which might be rendered against them in either of said justice courts from being tried or reviewed by a court presided over by a judge who is learned in the law, and that they will be irreparably injured by unjust judgments and multiplied costs if said parties are not legally restrained from proceedings in the cases complained of, and they also anticipate that a great multitude of other suits for various parties will be filed in the justice courts of other counties in the state.

It is claimed that something like one or two thousand certificates of stock were sold in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, and it would appear from the petition for the injunction that this is true, and these parties are afraid they will be overwhelmed with similar damage suits. A large number of the certificates of stock were sold in this and Tyler county.

The writs of injunction are made returnable before the Honorable District court of Hardin county.—Kountz News.

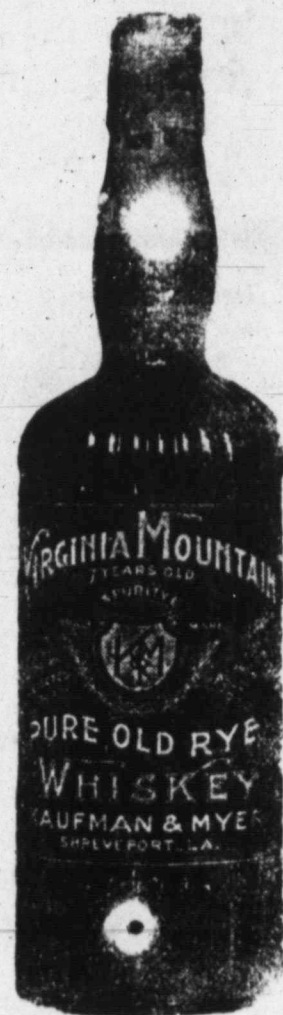

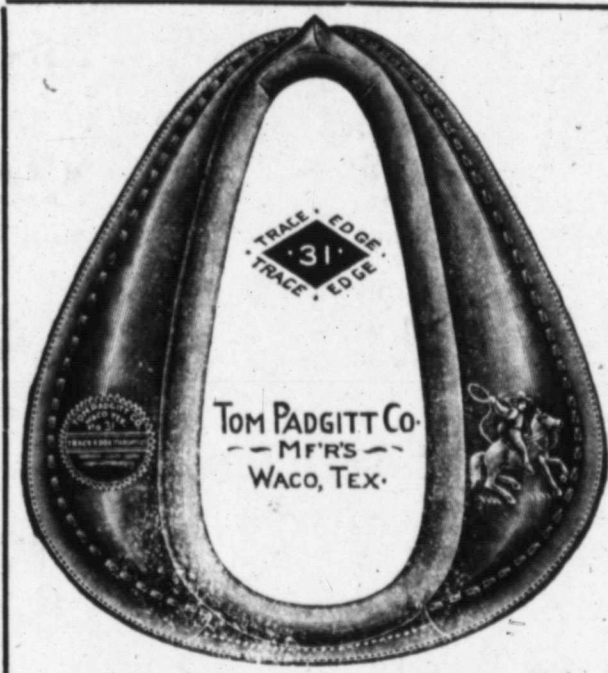
