The Pure Food Law as Passed by the Last Legislature a Law. From Friday's Daily:

The pure food law that was passed by the last legislature goes into effect today and it will no doubt be of much interest to the merchants of Nacogdoches to read the ruling of the Attorney General upon the subject. Merchants who have feed stuff put up contrary to the provisions of the new law on hand today must resack all such feed, and any sold otherwise will be a violation, and will make the merchant liable to prosecu tion. The following letter to the county attorney is self ex-

Austin, Tex., July 12, 1905. Hon. Beeman Strong,

Nacogdoches, Texas. Dear Sir:

We are in receipt of yours of the 11th inst., in which you state that several of the merchants of your city will have on hand at the time the new new law regulating the sale of feed stuff goes into effect, a lot of chops, etc. in 98 pound sacks and corn meal in 32 pound sacks and you desire to know how they can dispose of this property after the law becomes effective.

You are respectfully advised that there is no provision in the law which will exempt from its operation feed stuff on hand at the time it becomes effective. After it becomes effective, it will be unlawful for any person to sell or offer Eph Coon, of the Red Oak for sale corn chops in sacks containing less than one hundred pounds net, or corn meal in sacks containing less than thirty-five pounds net, fractional sacks to contain the same
