A Business Session of the Board Held Here Yesterday.

LETTER FROM THE WEST.

More Information Concerning The Public School Lands. To The Sentinel:

Fort Davis, Texas, Sept. 5.—In writing about the school lands of this section in my last letter I left off some points of information that might be of interest, for want of space. For instance I did not mention the fact that almost every acre of the lands now on the market are fenced up in some big ranchman's pasture, being mostly lands upon which leases have expired. Hundreds of sections of these lands may be found in a body in some parts of the dry districts that have not a drop of water on them except that caught by artificial tanks. During long dry seasons stockmen have to drive their cattle from pasture to pasture, sometimes scores of miles, that they may get water enough to keep them alive until rain comes and fills up the tanks. All sections of land having water fronts are priced higher, ranging from \$1.50 to \$2.50 per acre. If one will take the list issued by the Land Commissioner and examine it he will find that more than nine-tenths of the land is classed as dry "grazing." That means that there is no water at all on the land, but the price will indicate its proximity to water. The nearer it is to water the higher the price.

Lands that can be used for agricultural purposes are almost as high in the arid districts as they are where it rains, or anywhere in East Texas, and it costs probably five times as much to put them in a state fit for cultivation.

I have investigated a little bit, and unless one wants to engage strictly in the cattle business, and take a big risk at that, I have reached the conclusion that there are no "snaps" in land west of the Pecos.

From the best information obtainable, the story goes that yesterday Sapp was on his way to the drug store from the mill to get some medicine for his wife who is quite sick, and while on his way to town he met Mr. Brown, when Sapp stopped Brown and the old matter was discussed again. Both men became angry and when the lie was passed Brown got out of his buggy and proceeded to adjust matters, according to his way of honor. He was getting the best of the deal when Sapp told him that he was on his way to the drug store to get some medicine, and that he was willing to let the matter drop. Brown started to get back into his buggy, when it is alleged that Sapp opened a knife and cut Brown across the breast, inflicting an ugly wound about five inches long. Brown went to the hospital and had the gash dressed, and it was necessary to have a number of stitches taken to close up the gash. After his wound was dressed he came to the city and made complaint against Sapp.

Constable Will McMillan went to the mill and placed Sapp under arrest. Sapp gave bond in the sum of \$250 for his appearance before the justice of the peace tomorrow, at 2 o'clock when the facts in the case will be made known.

Examining Trial.

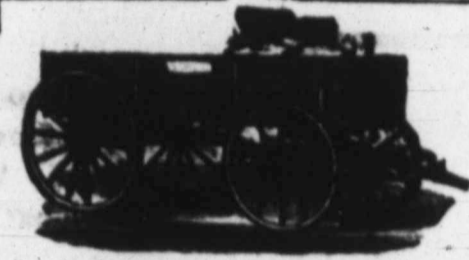
From Saturday's Daily:

"Pigs are born, not made," has been handed down for generations, and the public has arrived at the conclusion that the saying is true. The same can be said of the crop of "suckers" who every now and then bob up serenely upon the stage of life. Not long since The Sentinel man was making his rounds and he witnessed one of the scenes wherein the man from the "sticks" separated himself from a goodly portion of his hard earned cash for a patent device. While it works fine in the hands of the agent and look good to the sucker, yet it is hardly probable that the purchaser of the device will ever get enough out of the proposition to pay him back the original cost of the county right. While the man was a stranger to the writer and may be one of the best posted men in the county on the subject of scientific farming, yet if he is a subscriber to either of the county papers he is one of the biggest suckers in the bunch. Business men who have established for themselves a reputation never started in the patent right business, and what is more never will be found buying such foolishness. If all these things that the agents are carrying around over the country are such good things is it not reasonable to suppose that the manufacturers would put one thing on the market through the regular annals of trade? It looks that way to The Sentinel. The goods which possess merit do not have to be hawked over the country, but the smooth tongued gent who has a county right to sell. "Not on your tintype, Carrie Nation." All these put together has caused The Sentinel to come to the conclusion that "suckers are born, not made."

K. LAMITY says that he has it on good authority that all the candidates for governor, so far, are pronounced anti-prohibitionists. So if the local option question is injected into the campaign next year it will be an even start with the four men who are now seeking gubernatorial honors.

STRENUOUS TED, the president of United States is being covered with bouquets from all parts of the globe because the treaty of Portsmouth happened to end in peace, but if it had perchance gone the other way, gee! but this country would have been the laughing stock of the world and our president would have been termed the chief "butt-in-sky" of the entire tribe.

THERE are many reasons why the farmers of Nacogdoches should attend the meeting of the swine breeders at the court house next Saturday. One instance can be mentioned which is still fresh in the minds of the readers of The Sentinel. Some time in the spring George Blackburn took a car load of fat hogs to the market at Fort Worth and as the market was a little off on the day of his arrival in that city he left the shipment in the haads of a large commission house. They put the

hogs on the market when the advance came, but as the hogs were the breed commonly called the razor back, they brought less money that day than the hogs of good breeds and the commission company wrote Mr. Blackburn that if the hogs had been good stock that they would have been able to dispose of them at a much larger figure than what they got for the razor backs. This letter was published in The Sentinel at the time and comment made on the same. This letter and the comment has gone the rounds of the East Texas press. It has been demonstrated on more than one occasion that the common hogs will eat more than the well bred hog, and that it takes about twice as long to get the common herd in condition for the markets. The facts have been proven and the farmers should try and get out of the old rut and improve their hogs and other farm stock.

SPEAKING of factories and other good things for Nacogdoches, a system of good county roads would be a great benefit not only to the farmers who made this point their market but would be equally beneficial to the merchants. It would enable the country people to bring their produce to market in bad weather, and The Sentinel is satisfied that if there were good roads leading into the city that there would be no "dull days on account of the roads being so bad that the people could not come to town."

A SPECIAL to the Houston Post from Paris says that President E. A. Calvin of the Farmers Union has given out the statement that the state Union has recommended that the minimum price of 11 cents has been placed on this year's cotton crop. The price is based upon the present poor condition of the crop. If the farmers succeed in getting 11 cents for their cotton and \$15 per ton for cotton seed they will make something out of the crop this year. The question now presents itself to The Sentinel will the farmers all stick to this and are they in a position to hold their crop if these prices are paid?

THERE will be a great rush to West Texas this month after the school lands now on the market. Those who buy these lands in some parts of the state had better have large families and take up the full limit for each member of the family. On hundreds of sections of the school land there is not a drop of water and hardly enough grass to feed a Jack rabbit. On the best of the lands in the region of the Rio Grand it is estimated that 25 acres are required to keep up a cow or horse. Such a thing as agricultural lands is almost impossible.

Lidur business in Nacogdoches is proving rather unprofitable for the bootleggers. The law should be enforced if the jail has to be enlarged. —Lufkin Tribune.

Tyler, Texas, Sept. 9—The following is the Assignment of causes in the Court of Criminal Appeals at Tyler, for the fall term, beginning Monday, October 2nd, 1905:

Third Assignment—Two weeks, beginning Monday, October 30th, 1905, are assigned for hearing causes from the counties of Brazos, Fort Bend, Houston, Leon, Madison, Montgomery, Rusk, Smith, Van Zandt, Waller, Walker.

Fourth Assignment—Two weeks, beginning Monday, November 15th, 1905, are assigned for hearing causes from the counties of Angelina, Brazoria, Chambers, Galveston, Hardin, Harrison, Harris, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Newton, Orange, Polk, San Jacinto, Tyler, Trinity.

Fifth or special Assignment—Causes transferred from other branches of the Court and Felony cases sent direct to Tyler from counties not named in preceding Assignments will be taken up at any time during the term upon submission by either the State or the Appellant and the authority by which such cases are sent direct to that term must appear in or accompany the record.

Clerks of the lower courts will forward transcript in appeal cases promptly to this court, and special attention is called to the requirements of Articles 895 to 898, C. C. P., inclusive.

SOME REASONS WHY

Some Fruit and Truck Growers Don't Realize Better Profits.

A great many people who have axes to grind or a reputation to make have been telling the world of the few men who have made fortunes on a few acres of land in East Texas. Our cotton growers have heard so much of this (always the good side) that their dreams were constantly of the golden fruits of the tomato vine and the peach tree. To a certain extent these statements and dreams are all right, but when the cotton grower tries to grow early vegetables and fruits in the same manner he grows cotton his efforts will invariably net him more experience than profits. The successful trucker must be a student, a business man and a thinking man; he must know the how, the when and the why.

Our local growers have lost more being late in the market than perhaps any other one cause, the average being a bout five days behind Jacksonville; this is caused from neglect in early cultivation and letting fruit get too ripe before gathering—the first to market brings fancy prices and to this the grower must look for his profits. Our fruits are not graded and packed as well as it should be. Our pack is up to the average Texas pack but California and Georgia, our only competitors are far ahead of us in this particular.

The next heaviest loss is caused from the lack of system in marketing, and in this we all make many errors, that is a large percentage of the crops are shipped to unreliable markets, but as markets vary at all times it is impossible to always get best results from every car. A season in the Northern markets will convince a close observer that the commission man that does the most traveling, letter writing, advertising and general boasting, is an unsafe man to consign to. The real live honorable commission man (and there are some) doesn't have to resort to these methods to get business. Growers here have suffered a great deal this season by consigning their shipments to parties they did not know. Every grower has the privilege of cutting out the middleman if he desires but he will surely pay dearly for his experience unless he knows the parties he consigns to.

In the above are a few hints upon which volumes could be said, but I will state a few facts as they existed. I handled this past season over a hundred cars of Texas fruits and vegetables, and not a car of good tomatoes netted the grower less than 50c per crate and only one car of peaches netted less than 50c per crate. Many of each netted from 75 cents to \$1.25. I yet believe there is money in tomatoes and peaches and I truly hope our growers will use better judgment in the growing and especially the marketing of their crops.

Hog Law Election Proclamation.

Whereas, a petition signed by more than twenty freeholders and resident qualified voters of the hereinafter described territory asking the commissioners court of Nacogdoches county to grant an election to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats should be permitted to run at large in the following described territory, the same being a subdivision of Nacogdoches county, and whereas, said court granted said petition and ordered that an election be held on the 14th day of October, 1905, for the purposes herein stated, therefore I, Robert Berger, county judge of Nacogdoches county, do hereby order that an election be held at the town of Caro, in said county, on the said 14th day of October, 1905, to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large in the following described territory, to-wit: Beginning at or about the nine mile post on the Nacogdoches and Tyler road where the North Church and Lone Star hog law corners on said road; thence north with said road to Sanchez creek; thence with the meanders of the said creek in a northeasterly direction to where the Linn Flat and Briley Town road crosses said creek; thence east with said road to Bogg Church where it will intersect the Bogg Church hog law line; thence south with the Concord and Nacogdoches road to the Tranquill school house; thence with the North Church hog law line west to the place of beginning.

I hereby appoint W. T. Whiteman, J. W. Seelbach and J. H. Stuckey as managers of said election at Caro, and they shall appoint two clerks to assist them in holding said election.

The Schools of the County.

Editor Sentinel:

Dear Sir—As the scholastic year of 1904-5 draws to a close, it leaves us not without unmistakable evidences of improvement in the educational affairs of the county.

In fact the indications justify the belief, that we are upon the eve of a period of notable activity in educational work, and there are grounds for good hopes that this awakening energy may coincide with and secure and glorify the material development that is opening such magnificent prospects to this country.

To point to some of the many signs of the times to which I refer, attention is called to the number of school districts recently created for the purpose of improving the conditions of school government and support.

Prior to the beginning of the year 1904-5 we had in this county 4 Ind. districts. At the close of the year 1904-5, we have 5 Ind. school districts and 38 common school districts.

A number of these districts have voted a special tax to supplement the state apportionment sufficient to give them a nine months public term. Others are erecting comfortable school buildings, while in all, a better educational sentiment is quite noticeable.

For the year 1904-5 the scholastic population for this county was 6996. This number of children was distributed among 153 school, 34 of which contained fewer than 20 pupils. The per capita apportionment for the same year was \$5.25 which gave to this county \$35,690 as an available school fund. This gave us an average term of 4 4-5 months.

For the present year 1905-6 our scholastic population as approved by the State Supt. is 7452. A gain of 7 per cent over last year. The number of schools has been reduced from 153 to 115, a decrease of 25 per cent, with only 10 schools organized with fewer than 20 pupils, hence you can readily see that this consolidation will give us larger schools and thus enable them to run for a longer term each year.

Our per capita apportionment of \$5.40 for the present year gives us the handsome sum of \$40,240 as an available school fund for the year 1905-6. With this magnificent sum of money from the State, together with our local funds, and the great band of energetic, enthusiastic teachers, and the hearty co-operation of the people, we may expect to see our county, in the near future, occupy the foremost ranks in the educational affairs of this great state.

Let us all labor together to this end.

JUDGE BROOKS SPEAKS.

He States His Position Upon Some of the Laws of the State.

Last night the people of Nacogdoches had the opportunity of hearing the first speech in the gubernatorial campaign which will be pulled off next year.

It was announced in The Sentinel yesterday afternoon that Judge M. M. Brooks of the criminal court of appeals and a candidate for the high office of governor would speak at the opera house at 8 o'clock.

At the appointed time a small, but appreciative, audience ladies and gentlemen had assembled.

The meeting was called to order by Hon. S. W. Blount and in a few well-chosen words introduced Judge Brooks to the audience.

Judge Brooks, stated: "That owing to the fact that he had arrived in the city at a late hour in the afternoon, and that as he did not come here for the purpose of making a political speech, and as the crowd was not as large as he would like to make a campaign speech to, that he would not make the attempt, but would just make a short talk. He also stated that he had been urged to address the people on this occasion, and he deemed it an honor to do so.

"The greatest part of my life has been spent in this grand and magnificent state since boyhood. I came here in 1877, was born in Mississippi, have been in the practice of law for the past twenty years, and 1899 was elected to the position I now occupy—Judge of the criminal court of appeals of the State of Texas.

"My official career is open to the people of this state, as how well I have discharged the duties of that place is for the people to decide. All decisions have been rendered with the law governing the cases, but that there were some people who would claim that I have used the same as official merchandise. Questions of great importance have been decided and the court has been criticised some times, perhaps justly, but many times wrong. I, myself, have been criticised for some of the opinions rendered—it is right for the people to criticise—when an official does wrong he should be criticised, and when he does those things which are right he should be commended for them.

"If I am elected governor of this grand and magnificent state I believe that I can govern the affairs of the state in such a manner that it will rebound to the upbuilding of the state.

If the industries of this state were written up as they really exist and sent to the north, they would read more like a

romance, than a string of facts. I have just left the city of Beaumont with her oil fields and her rice fields and the lumber industries. Ten years ago who would have dreamed of rice being grown in this state, and fields containing thousands of acres. Take the cattle industry, the wheat fields, and the magnificent fruit industry of East Texas. All these things combined would read like a romance to the man in the north.

"A few years ago I was in Buffalo, and a man in the car with me, but occupied the opposite seat. He asked me: "Do you live here" and I answered him in a droll way, "No." Then where do you live" was the next query. "Texas." The next thing then asked me, was "What kind of a country, and what kind of people live there." My friend your questions are too broad to answer, but will say, "That when the Lord created the earth and if there was one peculiar spot where His footsteps loved to linger, that place was Texas. And if there was a place where the chosen angels trod the soil, that place was Texas." He then said to me "I would like to live in Texas," and I told him that if he loved God and home, and would come to Texas and help in making the waste places into places of loveliness that he would be welcomed, but that if he came here for the purpose of groaning and grumbling, that the best thing for him to do was to stay where he was. I told him that the chief characteristics of the southern man was his intense love for home and his chivalric regard for woman—this is the character of Texas man. He considers his mother an angel and his sisters young angels. All these things combined were instrumental in making the matchless citizenship of Texas.

"While it is essential to preserve the homes, it is equally so in the affairs of our government, and to do these things would make us all noble sons of a noble sire. This country will go on to grander heights and as it does it should be watched and cared for as a child when the first symptoms of diseases approaches. There is no government perfect, for there are many evil causes existing—graft and incompetency will always exist. Would any man dare say that the policy of this state could not be improved upon? In one instance—the state of New York has only ten clerks in the controllers office and in the state of Texas it requires the services of forty-four; it may be that the system of books that are kept in Texas requires that many clerks for I am not in a position to know, but I do not think that it would require that many in Texas if it only requires ten in the controllers office in the state of New York.

"In a former speech I said that if I was elected governor of Texas and I found "Augean stables" at Austin, I would clean them out, and for these remarks I have been criticised. Since that time there has been found a grafter in one of the departments, and he has

been discharged. "Public office is a public trust," but there are many who think that a "public office is a private snap."

"The laws passed by the legislature requiring the corporations to pay a part of the taxes of the state are good laws and I am in favor of them. "I am a young man, but in a few years the meridian will be reached and I will start down the hill of time, and when I take a retrospective view of the past I want to hold pleasant recollections of the past."

The Sentinel would like very much to give Judge Brooks' speech in full, but owing to the fact that space is limited will have to give the above synopsis. The speaker referred to the other candidate in the highest terms.
