not most every acre of the lands now on the market are fenced up in some big ranchman's pasture, being mostly lands upon which leases have expired. Hundreds of sections of these tands may be tound in a body in some parts of the dry districts that have not a drop of water on them except that caughy by artificial tanks During long dry sea-
sons stockmen have to drive sons stockmen has
their cartle trom pasture to pasture, sometimes scores
miles, that they may miles, that they may get wat er enought to keep them alive until rain comes and fills up the tanks. All sections o
land having water fronts at priced higher, ranging from $\$ 1.50$ to $\$ 2.5 \mathrm{c}$ per acre. It one will take the list issued by
the Land Commissioner and examine it he will find that more than nine-tenths of the land is classed as dry "graz ing." That means that ther I $\begin{aligned} & \text { is no water at all on the land, } \\ & \text { but the price will indicate its }\end{aligned}$ proximity to water. The
nearer it is to water the high er the price.
