The more factories ocated in a town, and the more people induced to live in the cities and the town means just that much better market or the products of the farm. it matters not what that product may be. For the farmers wife the factories ard the enterpriscs that employ men to run the affairs of the same means a better market for chickens, butter and eggs. The people in towns are dependent upon the products of the best prices for these things Then again the factories cre ates a market for the corn crop, the cotton crop, and
market for the live stock. In view of these facts is it not the duty of the farmers of the south to stand by their local
factories? Is it not their duty to see that so far as in their power lies, that they will render local enterprises an opporunitys to do business and compete with the trusts and ombinations, and until al ing to a better understand manufacturing and industrial velfare of the south this sec ion of the United States will contine in the old rut of having to pay the freight on the raw product to the factories in the east, pay the freight on he finished product back to the south and then pay the profits that each man must ave who has handled the eft the farm until it was purhased from the merchant in he inished product.
