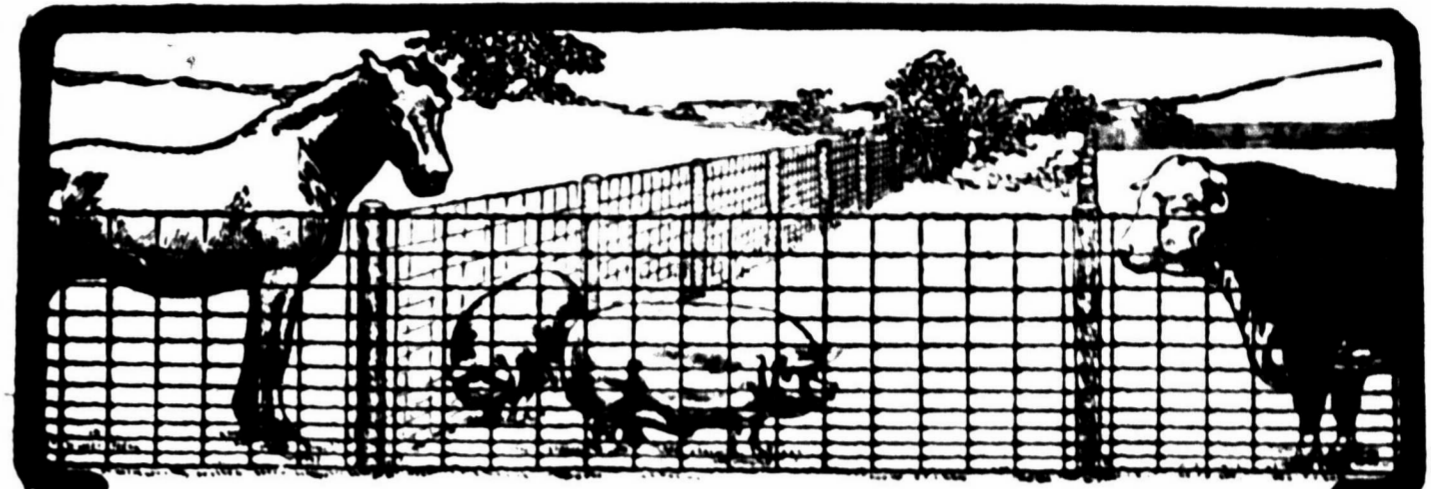

HAD A BIG TIME AT CARO.

A Big Knights of Pythias Lodge Organized in that Town.

Tuesday night the members of LaNana lodge Knights of Pythias instituted Caro Lodge No. 265, Special Deputy Grand Chancellor C. W. Butt having the matter in charge.

The meeting of the Lodge of Emergency was called to order by Mr. Butt, and he invited Supreme Representative John T. Bonner to take the chair and preside over the deliberations.

Work was started at 7 o'clock in the evening, and at 5 o'clock in the morning the new lodge was declared organized. Following is the list of the officers of the lodge: J. A. O'Dell, chancellor commander; R. M. Salmon, vice-chancellor; E. M. Fuller, keeper of records and seal; C. P. Bowen, master at arms; T. J. Hodnett, prelate; J. V. Crawford, master of the work; Walter Transeau, inner guard; S. H. Traxlar, outer guard; E. M. Decker, master of exchange; J. H. Wright, master nce.

The new lodge has a charter membership of twenty-four good men and there is no reason why Caro Lodge should not become one among the best lodges on the grand lodge roster. The personnel of the membership who were introduced to "Paddy O'Gorris" on this occasion was as fine as could be found anywhere in the state.

The Nacogdoches Knights were assigned to homes upon arrival of the train, and the keys of the town were turned over to the boys from Nacogdoches. D. K. Cason, Hal Tucker, Mark Stroud and The Sentinel man were assigned a home at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Hodnett, and The Sentinel can say this much if the other brothers fared even half as well as these four, they certainly had the time of their lives. Mr. and Mrs. Hodnett spared no pains nor expense to show the visitors that they were welcome, yes, thrice welcome to their home. Mrs. Hodnett is a most excellent lady and she certainly understands the art of preparing good things to eat.

At midnight one of the finest banquets ever spread in an East Texas town was tendered the visiting Knights, and here it was discovered that all the ladies of the town of Caro were all past masters in the culinary art. Everything that man could wish for was on the table, except wine, and this article cannot be served at a Knights of Pythias banquet.

Hon. S. W. Blount on behalf of the visiting Knights thanked the Caro lodge for the sumptuous repast, and as one of the candidates wanted to "hear from Mr. Cason again" Mr. Cason also thanked the boys and the ladies of Caro for the splendid time afforded the visitors. Mr. Whiteman was then called upon and he told the boys that they were welcome many

times over and that the Nacogdoches boys had a standing invitation to come again, and as often as they wished.

After the banquet the work was taken up again at the hall and it was six o'clock before final adjournment was taken.

Messrs. Whiteman and Decker saw that the visitors to Caro were properly entertained, and also extended to them every courtesy in the way of side trips to the logging camps, and a visit through the big mill at that place of the Whiteman-Decker Lumber Co. The office of Whiteman-Decker was made headquarters for the strangers within the gates of Caro.

THE TOWN OF CARO.

One of The Busiest Towns in the County—Whiteman-Decker Mill.

The little town of Caro on the Texas & New Orleans railroad twelve miles north of Nacogdoches is certainly a revelation in the way of town building, and it stands today as a lasting monument to the promoters of the town.

The town has a population of about eight hundred and the citizens there are not of the class usually found in places commonly dubbed as saw mill towns. The people of Caro are right up-to-date citizens and there is not a town in the south but what would be pleased to have them.

There is a splendid school building in Caro, and it is in charge of Prof. G. B. Layton, one of the foremost educators in the county, and he is also a Christian gentleman. The school has something over a hundred pupils enrolled.

There is also a splendid church building nearing completion which will approximately cost about \$2000. When completed there will be services in the building every Sunday morning and night by a Methodist minister.

The streets are lighted by electric lights, and a good system of waterworks has been installed and a goodly portion of the town is thus afforded a splendid fire protection.

In this town is located the modern saw mill of the Whiteman-Decker Lumber Co. The company is chartered under the laws of the State of Texas and has a capital stock of \$100,000, and is officered by the following gentlemen: W. T. Whiteman, president; M. W. Jones, vice-president; C. H. Morris, treasurer; E. M. Decker, secretary. In conversation with Mr. Decker, the following facts about the big plant were obtained:

"The timber holdings of the Whiteman-Decker Lumber Co. at the present time is something like thirty thousand acres acres, and this is being added to all the time, and now it is estimated that the company has enough timber to supply the mill with logs for at least fifteen years.

"The mill has a daily capacity of 100,000 feet of lumber, and the large planer, and the brick dry kilns are sufficiently large to handle the output which is about 150 cars per month. There are four large dry sheds which will hold six millions feet of lumber; the

yard capacity is ten million feet, but there is only about three million feet of lumber now on hand. At the mill plant there are two large water pools, one for supplying the boilers at the mill and the other for storing surplus logs. To avoid a possible shortage of water supply a deep well was drilled which has a bountiful supply of the best water to be found anywhere in the county.

"A perfect system of fire protection has been put in at the mill and all necessary hose carts and hydrants, and five thousand feet of hose, a high pressure tank and two large steam pumps are connected to the main water main.

"There are 150 nice cottages on the mill property which are all occupied by the employes of the mill. These cottages are equipped with electric lights and also have water connection. Such houses in Nacogdoches would rent for about \$17 per month, and the reporter was informed that the rent is only \$10 in Caro.

"The Whiteman-Decker stores, two in number, has on hand between \$30,000 and \$40,000 worth of merchandise in fact it is almost a department store, for nearly everything is handled that can be found in the city stores. Six clerks are employed in the stores, and a finer set of gentlemen were never found in any house in the country.

"In all departments of the mill there are 350 men employed and the pay roll is about \$12,000 per month.

"The company is building twenty miles of standard gauge railway, and is using 52 pound steel rails on the main line and 35 pound rails on the spurs; three large locomotives are used on the main line to supply the mill with necessary timber, besides the company has a large steam log loader which is run over the road."

Much more could be written about this modern mill, and The Sentinel will at some other time have something more to say about Caro and the big mill.

"Peanut hay," says the Nacogdoches Sentinel, "promises to become one of the chief farm products of Nacogdoches, judging from the success of the farmers who engaged in the business this year." Farmers generally throughout the State are giving more attention to the growing and saving of the different kinds of hay, and the wisdom of such a course is very apparent.—Houston Post.

In conversation with Mr. Evans, the reporter was informed that it was the intention of the company to get the mill in running order at the earliest possible date, which will be about sixty days.

The Sentinel stated Saturday that the headquarters of this company would be in Nacogdoches. Mr. Evans informs the reporter that this report was an error. The headquarters of the company will be at the mill, but that he will make his home in Nacogdoches.

The company intend making some changes in the cutting capacity of the mill, and also some changes will be made in the planer.

Nacogdoches county is getting to be quite a sawmill center and will soon take its place in the lumber world as one of the leading lumber markets of the south.

SIMON SPENCER MUST HANG.

The Criminal Court of Appeals Affirms Findings of the Lower Court.

At the spring term of the Nacogdoches county district court, Simon Spencer was convicted of having murdered another negro, and the jury assessed the penalty at hanging by the neck until dead.

The attorneys for the negro Judge Middlebrook, and Moss Adams worked faithfully in behalf of the negro as if they had been paid a fee of \$10,000. The argument of Judge Middlebrook before the jury was able and logical, as was also Moss Adams, but the jury understood the evidence differently. The attorneys took the case of Simon Spencer to the Court of Criminal Appeals and yesterday they were notified that the findings of the lower court was affirmed.

When Moss Adams received the telegram announcing the decision, he went to the sheriff's office and in company with the sheriff called on the negro to read the telegram. They found Simon in the jail playing cards, and when the message was read it caused him no concern, and he never quit shuffling the cards he had before him. He did, however, ask if there was any other shot for a new trial, and being informed that there was not he continued his card playing.

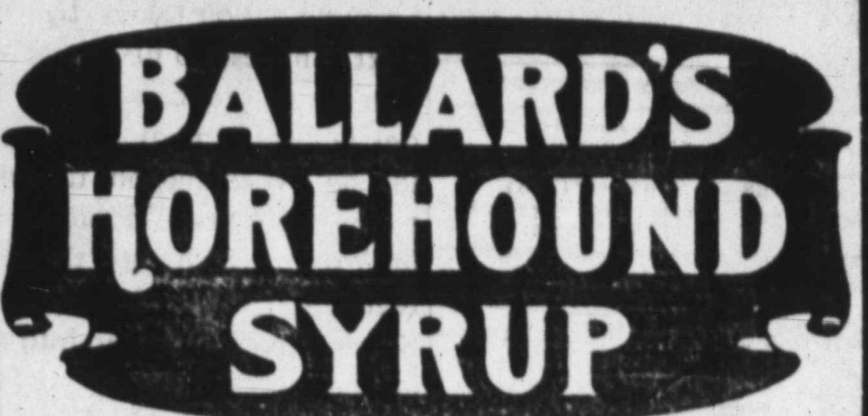

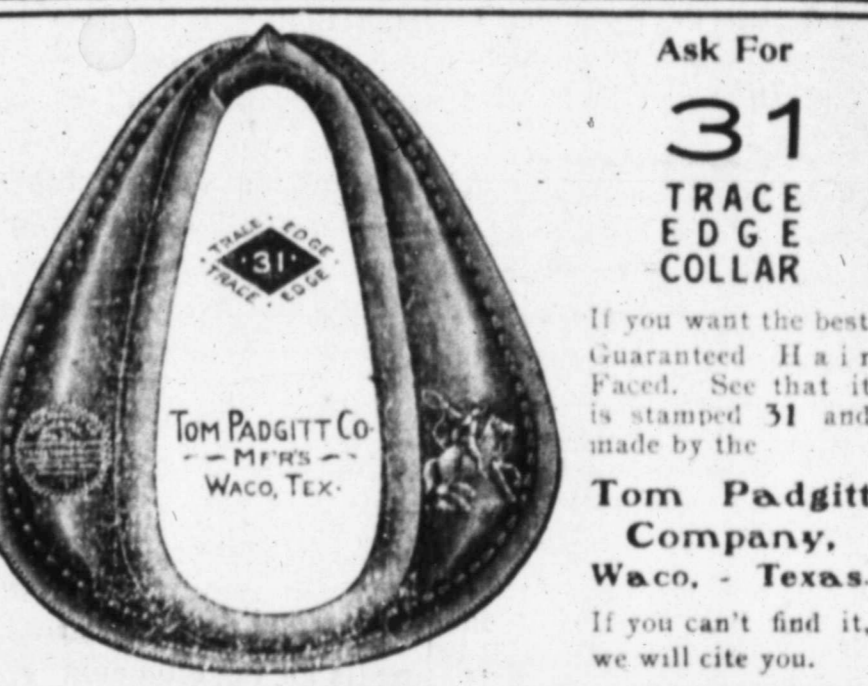

POLK county is the latest one of the dry counties to turn over a new leaf and vote whiskey back.

IT is not necessary to be the son of a prophet to predict that there will be some lively politics in old Nacogdoches next year.

THE president is making hay in the south while the sun shines, on his present trip. Teddy is a smooth artist, to say the least of it.

THE prospects are now that if there is produced in the United States a cotton crop of ten million bales, it can be called a bumper crop for this year.

WONDER how the last report of the cotton ginned in the United States, as compiled by the Department of Commerce and Labor strikes the bears?

IT is passing strange that after all the newspapers have said in the past relative to diversification of crops, that the farmers are so slow in making an effort to better their condition.

THE SENTINEL would like to have a good big crowd of Nacogdoches farmers attend the meeting of the Texas Tobacco Grower's Association which will convene in the city of Houston November 14.

THE commissioners court will convene next month, and The Sentinel suggests that they dig up the report of the grand jury as to the matter of a jail. It costs something to send prisoners to other counties for safe keeping.

THE Business League should see that this section of the state is represented at the meeting of the Texas Tobacco Growers in Houston November 14. Low excursion rates will be in force on that date and a good big crowd should be there from Nacogdoches county.

THAT Nacogdoches county needs a new jail and court house cannot be denied—this being the fact it is now up to the commissioners court to see that ways and means are provided for the erection of a court house that is in keeping with the needs of the county and a jail that will "be a decent place to keep prisoners."

SINCE the bootleggers of bad booze have found out that the officers of Nacogdoches county are no respectors of persons in the matter of enforcing the laws, the bootleggers have given this place wide berth, and it is only the stranger in these parts who has the nerve to trip to dispose of his goods. He never tries it the second time.

FEDERAL CONTROL.

In all probability there will be some action taken by the next congress to place the old life insurance societies under federal control. The following Washington dispatch to the Chicago Tribune is an indication which way the tide is flowing: "Shall the United States government go into the insurance business. This question will be asked with a good deal of force at the opening of congress. Individual representatives from different districts, including widely separated sections of the country have indicated their intention to introduce bills regulating life insurance and even fire insurance business. Inquiries have been made of the bureau of corporations at the department of commerce and labor and other investigators have been studying methods in the office of the controller of the currency. All these researches as conducted by individual congressmen, have had for their one object, the development of data going to show the necessity of federal control of the great insurance corporations. There will be a number of bills introduced at the opening of congress which will sweep away all immediate steps and will provide that the United States government shall go into the life insurance business and into the fire and marine insurance business as well, if such a thing be possible. Of course no one expects that any such radical legislation will be passed at this session of congress, but several members of the house seem to have become imbued with the idea that the time is ripe for a radical and even a socialistic departure in the direction of a more paternalistic theory of government."

WHAT do the truck farmers of Nacogdoches county intend to do next year in the matter of raising tobacco? It is about time that they were getting together and making arrangements for the crop next year. They should also elect delegates to the meeting of the Texas Tobacco Growers which will convene in the city of Houston on November the 14th.

THE report of the government of the number of bales of cotton ginned for the present year, and which report was issued at 2 o'clock on October 25, shows that the Texas crop alone to be 727,398 bales short of the same date on last year. The next report will show a much greater shortage, for on the date of this report it is safe to state that all the cotton in the state had been ginned up to that time. The Texas crop is all in, at least it is in this section.

THE second annual meeting of the Texas Tobacco Growers' association will be held in the city of Houston, on the 14th of November and Nacogdoches tobacco growers should make it convenient to attend the meeting and see what the other tobacco growers of the state are doing. The Texas and New Orleans and the Houston, East and West Texas railroads will put on a

cheap rate from East Texas which will enable the tobacco growers from this section to attend the meeting at a small expense.

NACOGDOCHES county will have several candidates in the field next year for district offices, and will expect the democracy to come to the assistance of the candidates of this county. In the past Nacogdoches county has been loyal to candidates from other counties, and this time will ask for the support of her own candidates.

THE home merchant is the man to spend your money with, you know him and he knows you—if the article is not all right you can take it back and the matter will be settled in a satisfactory manner to all parties concerned, but when you send your money to an unknown concern you are taking chances which are decidedly against you.

THE living we have with us for only a few short days; the dead always. It would be far better to send the flowers and speak the kind words to our fellowman while he is here, and when the acts of love and tender sympathy will be appreciated by him, than to wait for him to die before thinking of him. It is now, and not then, that these little courtesies should be bestowed.

MANY years have passed since Nacogdoches county has had a district officer, and it is now time that the county had representation in the district. Nacogdoches will present the name of one of her leading attorneys for the office of district attorney and will expect other counties in the district to come across and do the right thing. Beeman Strong will probably enter the race for district attorney.

DEL RIO, the capitol of Val Verde county, which probably does not produce more than a thousand bales of cotton a year, has put up the "d'enero" for a hundred and fifty thousand dollar cotton mill. Nacogdoches county, which can raise more than twenty thousand bales a year, has passed up one or two propositions for a big cotton mill. If we had the grit that Del Rio has it would not be long until the spindles would be humming in our midst, and it would not take all the products of a hundred miles in every direction to keep them going.

THIS day marks another new chapter for the historians of Nacogdoches to write. The Nacogdoches and Southeastern is to be placed on the map as a first-class railroad and is authorized to do business as such by the Texas Railroad Commission. This should be good news to the oil men, as they have been holding back on developing the field on account, so they have said, that they had no facilities for shipping stuff to the field. True, while the road does not run directly into the oil field, yet it is only a few miles from the present terminus to Oil City, and the short haul is only a trifle.

CHANGE IN RUSSIA.

IT is to be hoped that from the monarchial ruins of Russia may emerge a reconstructed nation under a constitutional government, such as the people are clamoring for, with greatly enlarged powers, universal suffrage, and liberty. The country belongs to the people and the interests of the people should be governed by them, and not by the favored few. The latest press dispatches from that revolution ridden country tell stories of the hardships of the people that are simply awful. One dispatch says that the students in one of the large college towns were "shot down like dogs" another says that "the Russian army is forsaking the czar." But the best story which is flashed over the wires is to the effect that "Emperor Nicholas has surrendered and Count Witte comes into power as minister president with an imperial mandate which will enable him to convert the farcial national assembly into a real legislative body, elected by greatly extended suffrage and confer on the people the fundamental civil liberties including free speech, and the rights of habeas corpus." Thus is the beginning of the end of the "White Czar." The people have confidence in Count Witte and to him the nations will look to bring order out of chaos.

THERE are many reasons why Nacogdoches county should be represented at the Texas Tobacco Growers' Association at Houston on the 14th of November, but the main reason at this time is to raise a little enthusiasm.

WHILE the cotton crop may be a very short article in Nacogdoches county this year, there is one thing to a dead moral certainty, and that is there is plenty of corn, hogs and ribbon cane syrup to do the thrifty farmers for the next twelve months. The farmers of Nacogdoches county do not have to go hungry.

After a Bad Man.

ON last Saturday night there was a slick crowd of gamblers who worked the little town of Garrison, that is they worked one of the best citizens of that place to the tune of about \$500.

THE gamblers had some vile brand of booze, and after getting their victim under the influence of the stuff, proposed they have a social game. After the sharpers had separated their victim from \$30 at the card table, and he was convinced that he had enough, he started to leave and as he did he discovered that he had been relieved of his pocket book which contained \$400.

THE matter was reported to the sheriff's department and the officers left last night for a trip over the Houston, East & West Texas, and it is thought they will catch the gang, and may recover a goodly portion of the money taken from the Garrison man.

PEANUT hay promises to become one of the chief farm products of Nacogdoches, judging from the success of the farmers who engaged in the business this year.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

ANOTHER line of diversification to keep the farmers from falling into the cotton habit—Sherman Register.

THE Houston Post says: "The Nacogdoches Sentinel warns the public against the 'hot air' stories regarding the fabulous profits likely to be derived from tobacco growing in East Texas, but it insists that proper attention to its culture will be richly rewarded. In this connection it says: 'In the Weekly Sentinel of August 17 is published the statement of Mr. Tom Maroney. Mr. Maroney cultivated two and one-half acres in tobacco, and he kept an accurate account of the expense and receipts of the patch. He harvested 1300 pounds, for which he received \$195. His expenses were \$61.50, leaving him a net profit of \$133.50 on the two and one-half acres, or a net profit of \$53.40 per acre. There is no guess work in these figures, for they were taken from Mr. Maroney's books. Tell the truth about what a country will do when in the hands of the farmer who believes in diversification. Just think of the net profit of \$53.40 per acre, and also think of the fact that the crop is harvested early enough to plant a crop of fall vegetables. The farmer who fails to take advantage of the opportunity to grow tobacco when he has the assistance of a tobacco expert to show him how is certainly sleeping on his rights and is neglecting a golden opportunity.'

THE Sentinel would like to see the business men of Nacogdoches take more interest in the efforts of the Business League to bring trade to this city. The League is trying to pull off a couple of trade and sales days in this city this month, but the business men are not doing their part in the work, and they are the ones who will be benefited by the event.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.
