ANTI-RAPE CONVENTION.

Leading negroes over the state have called a convention to meet in the city of Houston on the 18th of this month to discuss a question that is of vital importance to the race in the south. The meeting is called the anti-rape convention, and at this particular time it would seem that the meeting should be well attended. If there ever was a time when the negroes should get together and discuss one of the questions in which negroes are interested, the time is now. The matter of suppressing the crime of rape, lies wholly with the negro—he himself must send missionaries to his race and tell them of the certainty that if the race continues to permit such crimes to go unheeded, it will ultimately lead to an effort on the part of an outraged south to raise up in arms and exterminate the negro race. The south is the negro's home, and his best and warmest friends are the southern white men. They give the negro free schools; the laws protect him, when he is doing right, and when tried by a jury he receives a fair and an impartial trial. The negro then should be the friend of the southern white man and to show his friendship, should be willing to die to protect the peace and purity of the homes of the south. There are good negroes at the head of the movement to get the negroes to attend the anti-rape convention and their appeal should be heeded, and every county in the state should be represented. If the negroes of this county desire to hold a county convention for the purpose of selecting delegates to this convention at Houston, The Sentinel will publish all notices free of cost.

Now then comes Joseph Weldon Bailey in a long letter to the public in the Sherman Register, and states that he was deceived in the Water-Pierce Oil Co. He says that he was made to believe that the Water-Pierce Co. had no connection with the Standard Oil Co. Now then the question presents itself to the people, will Mr. Bailey make an effort to bring the guilty parties to justice with as good grace as he did to get the trust out of trouble in Texas several years ago? It is time for Mr. Bailey to make good.

Mr. Noble Corrects The Sentinel.

Nacogdoches, Texas.
I wish to correct part of a statement made in your appreciated paper, regarding the capture of the negro, Allen Maddox, who shot H. B. Sossaman of this town, last June. I deem it useless to go into the details, as to what has been done to capture said negro. Will give the facts only of his capture.

Mr. I. H. Hollis of this place was making a trip to Marshall Oct. 19th. While Mr. Hollis was waiting his train at Longview Junction, three negroes came walking up. Mr. Hollis recognized Allan Maddox as one of the three, as said Maddox had worked at Mr. Hollis' mill for many months in this, San Augustine county. It was a mutual recognition, the negro speaking to Boss Hollis. Train time being up, Mr. Hollis was forced to leave, but immediately on his arrival at Marshall telegraphed me the above facts. I immediately telegraphed the sheriff of Gregg county to capture said Maddox, giving him a brief description of the negro. The sheriff of said Gregg county after receiving my telegram, phoned me for better description of the negro, which I gave, telling him, the sheriff of Gregg county, that the negro was working at the Round House, which fact Mr. Hollis stated to me. The sheriff of Gregg county captured the negro (for which I truly thank him) telegraphed me the same. I went and took the negro in charge. Mr. A. J. Spradley having been successful in the capture of fugitives, I had some correspondence with him regarding the capture of this negro. What he has done in this matter I know not; but the mistake is; that Allen Maddox was captured through the instrumentality of Mr. I. H. Hollis; and not through the circulation of circulars, or the skill, perseverance or energy of our peace officers. Respectfully,

AN APPEAL TO TEXAS NEGROES

Every Negro in the State is Urgently Appealed To.

The following circular letter has been received at his office, and the same is published in full, and The Sentinel urges that every community in Nacogdoches county where negroes reside, send a representative negro to the convention. Following is a text of the circular:

"Houston, Tex. Oct. 9, 1905.
"An Appeal to Texas Negroes:
"Dear Brethren:
"This letter comes to earnestly ask, can your aid be given the purposes and objects of the Anti-Rape Convention which meets in this city November 18th, 1905.
"The name of this meeting indicates its purposes and objects.

"That the awful conditions about us call for action, none, acquainted with the state of public sentiment, can question.

"A most withering and stifling suspicion is daily gathering over us, on account of the most revolting horrors perpetrated with frightful regularity by the vicious element of the race.

"The public heart is hourly growing harder against us until now, in the rural districts, any and all strange men of color rest under a cloud sickening to the heart of every respectable negro, whenever contemplated.

"Can we afford to sit idly by while the racial relations in Texas are so sorely strained?

"This awful tension will, as sure as fate, soon find us bereft of that confidence, respect and sympathy which have been so pronounced on the part of the representative Southerner.

"In this very critical period the bonds of friendship between us and the latter must needs be strengthened, for this element has stood out, in season and out of season, for our moral, intellectual and material uplifting, and has insisted that every citizen should have equal rights before the law.

"It is dreadfully to attempt to draw a picture of the fate of the race, should the Christian and conservative members of our white neighbors turn away from us in this our hour of sorest need.

"Unless the thoughtful and worthy among us rise up in our might and lay hands, hard and fast, to this gravest of all questions facing the Negro, the day of bitterest grief will surely fall to our lot.

"Do you ask what can be done to reclaim the good name of the race? I answer that discussing the unfairness of holding all the race responsible for the acts of its criminals will avail but little.

"The reciting of the virtues of the mothers and fathers of the race, as vouchsafed by the gifted and lamented Grady and the immortal Gen. Wade Hampton, will not suffice.

"It is a duty not to be evaded or postponed, to at once begin with a steadfast resolution to wipe out those influences, such as the loafers' rendezvous, the gambling den, and the haunts of vice and shame, that are dragging our boys down, down.

"The work of the church

and the schools does not reach the vicious elements out of which the rapist springs, but we must take upon our shoulders the responsibility of seeing that every law intended to safe-guard the good of society shall accomplish its mission.

"When the conditions that drag down our sons are removed, the violations against home and virtue will disappear.

"The representative white citizens are looking, with much anxiety, to the worthy Negro to assist in the lifting the dreaded suspense hanging over the homes in the rural districts.

"Shall they turn aside in despair? God forbid!

"Stop and listen! From all around we hear the muttering thunder of angry and hate. It rests only with us to avert the impending storm. Else it will sooner or later break upon our defenseless heads.

"I beseech you to at once call together the thoughtful, perfect an organization, and select at least one delegate to the Anti-Rape Convention and advise me accordingly.

HALTOM'S MOVEMENTS

Representative From Seventeenth to Spend a Year at Fort Davis

Houston, Texas., Oct. 31. — Hon. R. W. Haltom of Nacogdoches, representing the Seventeenth District in the last Legislature, and an experienced newspaper man, was in the city this morning en route home. He came in last night via Austin from Fort Davis, where he spent the summer, beginning his visit in May. 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The expense of sending prisoners to other counties for safe keeping and the expense of keeping them there will be more burdensome than the cost of a new jail and court house.

At least give the home man an opportunity of furnishing you an estimate on what you need in the way of furnishings for the farm before sending to out of town concerns.

Some of the country folks are of the opinion that to build a new court house would mean that taxes would be increased at a wonderful rate. This is mistake—the increase in the amount of taxes would not be felt by any one.

What's the matter with converting the present building which used for a court house, into a modern jail, and building a new court house? This strikes The Sentinel as a good proposition, and at the same time would enable the county to build a court house and also provide a jail for her criminals.

The county commissioners will meet next week, and they should take up the matter of building a new court house and jail for Nacogdoches county. The present court house should be remodeled and converted into a modern jail, and a new court house should be built in the center of the public square. This is offered to the commissioners as a friendly suggestion, to consider at their meeting next week.

There is a rumor on the streets to the effect that at the meeting of the commissioners court this week, that there will be presented to the court a petition, praying for an election to determine whether or not intoxicating liquors should be sold in this county. It has been two years since the election, and the local optionists were successful to a very high degree. The antis now want to try the open saloons, provided they are successful in their fight. This is merely a rumor, but it is understood that the election will be held some time in January.

On November 10th the Texas policy holders in the Equitable Insurance Society, will hold a meeting in the city of Dallas for the purpose of discussing matters of importance to the society. The state commissioner of insurance has issued a call for the convention. The Equitable will hold an election on December 6, for the purpose of electing 13 directors, and it is the wish of the commissioner of insurance that the Texas policy holders get together and discuss the insurance situation. This convention will be open to all policy holders in insurance companies authorized to do business in this state.

THE RAIN YESTERDAY.

The Creeks Were Out of Banks and Almost Equal to June Flood.

From Monday's Daily: Yesterday afternoon one of the heaviest rains of the year visited this section of the county, and as a result all the creeks were out of banks and the water was almost as high as it was in the June flood of 1902.

Many people living in the valley had to leave their homes yesterday and go to places of safety, fearing that the waters would come into the houses and many pulled up their carpets.

As the Texas & New Orleans passenger train was pulling into the railroad yards, it is said that the tracks were from twelve to sixteen inches under water in the valley.

"The present facilities for the primary department is too small and we decided to have the old building repaired and will have it cut up into four large class rooms.

"It was our intention at first to have the building repaired and remodeled so as to conform as near as possible to the architecture of the new building, but when the bids for this work were opened, we found that the trustees of the Nacogdoches University did not

have enough funds to complete the work. On account of the crowded condition of the new building, we have decided to repair the old building with what funds we have.
