It is claimed that the railroad has caused this crossing to be in a bad way, and that the road has been notified that it would be necessary to put the crossing in good shape but so far no attention has been paid to the notice. Hence Commissioner Byrd has been instructed to bring suit to have the crossing put in shape.

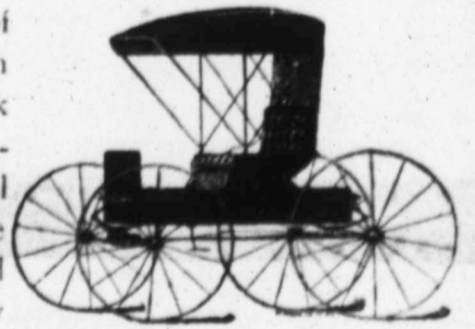

With all the wealth in this county the matter of building a handsome court house and jail should be an easy matter to settle.

HOMESEEKERS are coming into the state every day and East Texas should see that a goodly portion of the newcomers are located here.

THE SENTINEL is in favor of better public buildings and believes that the readers of the county papers will all agree to the proposition.

THE American Tin Can Company, better known as the "Tin Can Trust," is planning to erect at New Orleans one of the largest plants of its kind in the United States.

THE Galveston, Kansas City and Mexico Railroad Company has been chartered in Oklahoma to build a line from Kansas City to Port Progresso, State of Yucatan, Mexico.

THE black land counties in past years have been taking a prominent place in political matters in Texas, and next year East Texas will be heard from, and will endeavor to mix things up a little in a friendly contest for some of the honors.

THE Mexican Central has been granted a concession to extend to the Rio Grande, opposite Brownsville, Texas, and it is reported construction will be pushed to San Antonio, where a connection will be made with Yoakum's new line.

It is not generally known that the Stuyvesant dock and wharf of the Illinois Central in New Orleans, now nearing completion, will be one of the largest in the world. The wharf will be an even mile long, constructed entirely of steel, and viewed from the river will present an imposing appearance.

SOME one has suggested that the tobacco trust is knocking the tobacco interests of Texas, and from the remarks of small man at the Houston meeting of the Texas Tobacco Growers' association, it seems as if this individual was one of the parties interested in the matter of knocking—and that good and hard.

Now that Secretary Wilson has given out the information which leads the cotton grower to believe that there will not be a cotton crop raised this year to exceed ten million bales, it might be well for the Farmers Union, and the Southern Cotton Growers' association to hold what cotton there is yet on hand for 15 cents—it will be worth it, if the farmers never get it.

NEGROES CONDEMN NEGROES

Those at Henderson Say the Lynched Ones Got Their Deserts.

Henderson, Texas, Nov. 15—Everything is quiet as though nothing like a lynching ever happened. No ill feeling exists between the whites and negroes. The negroes are the loudest in their expressions of condemnation of the murder of Mr. Howell, and state that the lynched negroes received just punishment. Crowds of people from the country came to the city early Sunday to see the results of the work of the mob.

The county jail is considerably torn up and the damage to same is estimated at between \$400 and \$500. Work on repairing it commenced yesterday and has been on special guard since Saturday night.

Judge Levy has withdrawn his order for a special term of district court which was to have convened on the 22nd. District Attorney Beard and County Attorney Fulch were both absent from the city at the time the hanging took place.

Home Cured Meat.

The editor of the American Farmer regrets to learn that so many farmers have discontinued the practice so long in vogue of curing their own meat and are depending, just like us poor city folks, on packing house products. It is possible that we are threatened with the calamity of seeing the country-cured ham and bacon go out of fashion and be added to the list of lost arts? Heaven forbid! Some years ago all farmers had their smoke houses and raised and cured their own meat. In those blessed days nobody had heard of the "cured-while-you-wait" abominations of this age, but now it is hard to get the old time luxuries anywhere. We should think it a good custom to revive on a large scale, for purposes of profit alone, to say nothing of once more being able to enjoy that inimitable tid bit—the country cured ham. The latter, properly put up, will bring double the price of the packing house product among the well-to-do in all the large cities, and the patent process breakfast can not compete with that smoked and cared for as in the earlier days. We have suffered enough by modern innovations without being asked to give up the most cherished dish of our childhood—the inimitable country ham, side meat, shoulder and "streaked middling."

WE see from the Nacogdoches press that the people of that county expect to have candidates in the field next time for district offices, and that they intend to stick to their men. Nothing wrong in this. We have no candidates yet, but some few have begun to look pleasant and shake hands in a significant way. This may bear fruit later.—Rusk County News.

Evidence of Diversification.

As an evidence of what a man can do when he tries in East Texas to make a living, The Sentinel reters with pleasure to what Mr. J. T. Booth has done the past year.

He planted 4-tenths of an acre in Irish potatoes in the spring and off of the patch he sold \$30 worth of potatoes and has seed left. After he had gathered the Irish potatoes he planted the ground in sweet potatoes on the 10th of July, and from this he gathered 100 bushels, which at the market price today is worth \$50; making a total of \$80 off of 4 tenths of an acre planted in truck.

He planted six acres in cotton and from this he gathered 800 pounds of seed cotton, and which he sold at \$26. This shows that the truck patch when properly handled will pay the farmer more money than cotton.

In conversation with Mr. Booth yesterday he stated to The Sentinel reporter that it was his intention to plant two crops on every acre of ground cultivated next year, as this year has convinced him that diversification of crops was the only salvation of the East Texas farmers.

He left some of the sweet potatoes that he had raised from the crop of potatoes planted on the 10th of July, and they are the finest specimens brought to this office this year.

HONOLULU merchants are raising funds to establish an independent steamship line between Honolulu and San Francisco in order to secure lower fares and freight rates.

BOND ISSUE CARRIED.

Sabine County Will Erect New Court House.

John F. Goodrich, editor of the Hemphill Messenger, was in Houston attending to business matters and was seen by a representative of The Houston Post at the hotel where he was stopping.

Mr. Goodrich stated that Tuesday an election was held in Sabine county for the purpose of deciding whether or not a court house to cost \$30,000 should be built by the issuance of that amount of bonds. The election passed off very quietly and resulted in a majority in favor of the bond issue. The statement is made in this connection that work on the court house will commence as soon as the commissioners court can get together, declare the result and have the proper legal arrangements made with reference to the bonds being issued as is required by the statutes.

The original capital was old Sabine town on the Sabine river, where it remained for several years and was moved from that place to Milam, from which place it was finally moved to Hemphill, where it will remain for some time, as Hemphill is in the geographical center of the county and also because the election just held fixes the location for a number of years.

The effect of the election Tuesday will be to cause the country around Hemphill to take on a new lease of life and a general spirit of progress and improvement is looked for by the leading people of the community.—Houston Post.

TIMELY WARNING.

Judge Perkins Makes His Orders for the Next Term of Court.

In order that all the lawyers and all other parties interested in court matters may know the "order of court" for the next term of court to be held in this county, The Sentinel has been requested by the district clerk to publish the following order:

"It is ordered that at the March term 1906 of this court the non jury civil docket is set for the first Monday of the term, and will be given the whole of the first week; the jury civil docket is set for the second Monday and will be given the whole of the second week of the term; and the criminal docket is set for the third Monday of the term and will be given such time as may be necessary for the disposition of the business.

"No agreement between parties or their counsel to set cases beyond the term set apart for the docket, on which the case belongs will not be recognized by the court, unless made with the consent of the court specially given.

"Divorce suits will be heard on Friday and Saturday of the first week and at no other time, unless by special order made when the case is reached for trial."

SAYS THE ORDINANCE UNJUST

Peddler From Melrose Thinks the Meat Ordinance Unjust.

Editor Sentinel:

Melrose, Texas, Nov. 20.—Can you tell us farmers what to do? We are facing the hardest year that I have ever seen. I was in Nacogdoches Saturday and was told that the city council had passed an ordinance that was intended to prevent farmers from peddling meat on the streets of Nacogdoches, unless they had the meat inspected while on the foot and for which one dollar must be paid.

Now, Mr. Editor, here is what I am after. I never have sold any beef or pork in Nacogdoches, but what I went to the market men first to sell it to them. Not long since I had some fine pork and went to every market in town and offered it for sale, but was told by one of the men that he could not use it at any price. I went to the Hayward mill and sold what meat I had for \$21.15, and if the ordinance had been in force at that time what would I have done with this pork?

The ordinance provides that we pay a dollar and then sell the meat by the quarter.

Now, Mr. Editor, I have peddled for the past 35 years and if any of these gentlemen will sell as much as a quarter of a beef to any one family, I will treat to the apples. We sell strictly to the ladies and they do not want that much at a time.

I had four fine beeves to sell which were two years old in the spring and I went to every market man in town and tried to sell them—what was I offered for them? \$7.50. I have killed two of them and the dressed part brought me \$19.15 and the hides \$9.50. This is the reason we peddle our meat, the market men will not pay us anything for our pork and beef.

If men have been in the habit of selling meat in the city that was diseased, these parties should be arrested and their names published in the county papers, and they should be placed in the county jail.

Some of the gentlemen who are members of the city council are my best friends, and if they will leave this question to a vote of the citizens in the fire limits, and it carries, I for one will have nothing more to say.

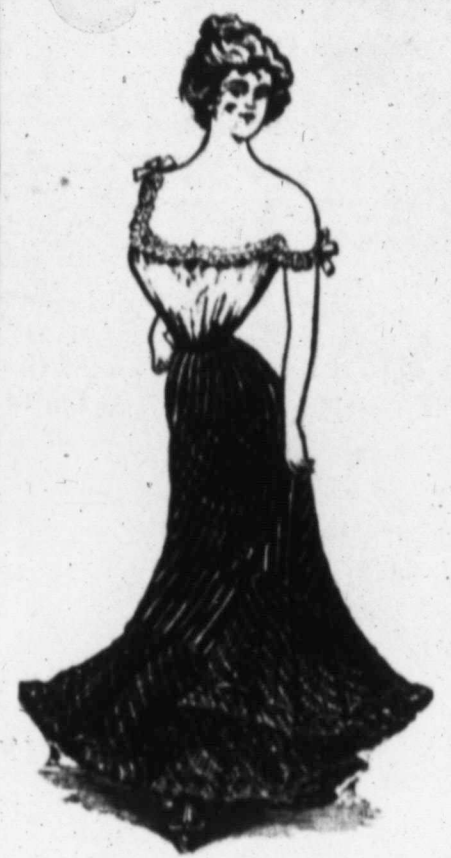
