GINNERS' REPORT.

Shows Only 8,486,000 Bales Ginned Up to December 1.

Dallas, Texas, Dec. 7.—The National Ginnners' Association estimates the amount of cotton ginned to December 1 at 8,486,000 bales.

It also gives the amount ginned as 88 per cent of the total crop, and that 92 per cent of the crop had been picked.

AROUND THE COURT HOUSE.

The Sentinel Reporter Hears Politics and Candidates Discussed.

Yesterday afternoon The Sentinel reporter while at the court house and looking for items of interests, heard quite a lot of county politics discussed.

Of course all the boys around the court house say that Beeman Strong will be the next district attorney and they say that he has a chance on that office. He has made a fine county attorney and older heads say that he could serve the county better as county attorney.

For county attorney there are several who will get in the race as soon as Strong announces for district attorney.

J. M. Jones has intimated that he would give Judge Berger a race for the office of county judge. Judge Berger will be a candidate for re-election.

Green Layton's friends say that he will be a candidate for some office, but that they have not yet been able to locate him.

Prof. Spears will, it is stated, be in the race for the office of county superintendent of public instruction.

P. M. Sanders it is rumored will be a candidate for a second term as county clerk.

R. W. Murphy the present district clerk will probably be a candidate to succeed himself, and John Gilbert will be in the race for re-election for county treasurer.

Tax Collector Martin, will it is stated, be a candidate for re-election, and Eugene Buckner will be in the race for another term as sheriff. While Luther Swift's friends say that he will want his place as tax assessor at least another term.

In Justice precinct No. 1, Frank D. Houston will try and give some men a run for his money. Frank made a good race at last election and was defeated by a very small vote. Frank's friends say that he will be winner this time and that he should have the place. While for the constable's place Will McMillan will probably be a candidate for re-election.

There will be a lively scramble for the various offices when the proper time comes for the boys to announce, and a goodly number will place their names at the head of the list as soon as the new year opens.

So far as the reporter could gather information, the county judge's office, the sheriff's office, and the office of county attorney will be the three principal rings in the political circus in Nacogdoches county next year.

FIFTEEN cent cotton is one of the things that is almost a sure thing.

Cotton selling at twelve cents—that sounds good to the cotton grower. Fifteen will be better.

CAMPAIGN contributions will have an airing during the Fifty ninth session of the National Congress.

The farmers of this county should make an effort to improve the quality of their hogs and stock generally.

W. C. Brown the cotton boll of New Orleans says that there is practically a cotton crop disaster and that what cotton there is in the country as a surplus in the hands of the farmers is worth ten cents.

SENATOR THOMAS believes that the National Banks over the country have been guilty of having made large contributions for campaign purposes, and has introduced a resolution in the United States asking that the controller of the currency look into the matter.

A WISE RULING.

One of the wisest decisions of the postoffice department was the one which recently put a ban on fake papers going through the mails. Every one knows the nuisance of the miserable little weeklies with their impossible love stories and their wonderful cooking and needle work departments. The Circulating Manager has this to say:

"The country publisher now has an opportunity to arise and call the postoffice department blessed. Mr. Madden, in charge of second order mail matter, has issued an order that newspapers and periodicals, to be entitled to a continuance of the second class mail privilege, must be able to show bona fide subscription lists as one made up of paid in advance subscriptions and agreements to pay for subscriptions at stated periods.

The old subscriber who has paid nothing for five or ten years will have to go. He must be made to pay in advance, to agree in writing to pay at some specified time or to be crossed off the list. The fact that he has not ordered the paper discontinued has nothing to do with the case. As a supposedly tangible asset on the subscription books he is to be counted down and out. The fact that he once paid for

the paper and he is presumably good for what he may appear to owe, according to the books, will not have any more effect upon the postoffice department than the flowers that bloomed last summer. If you want to send him the paper, you may do so, but you will have to mark it "Sample Copy," in plain words on the wrapper.

"Why has the postoffice department made this new ruling? To oppress the publisher? Not at all. The why of the thing is found in the department's determination to weed out the fakes."

ONLY a few more days, and the year 1905 will be a matter of history. Suppose you make a little history on your own account during the next year by helping solve the good road proposition. Let the paper know your views upon this question. Your name will not be used unless you request it. But your name must be signed to the article, not for publication, but as an evidence of good faith.

THERE is no its and ands about the good roads question for Nacogdoches county. The farmers should demand that the commissioners court provide ways and means to give this county good roads and bridges.

Taxes are cheaper in Nacogdoches than in other towns in the state with a population of five thousand, but the insurance rates are something fierce. With fire protection the insurance rates would be greatly reduced.

The National Ginners' Association accuse Secretary Wilson of the Department of Agriculture of practicing bad faith in issuing reports of cotton ginned. The association places the number of actual bales of cotton ginned up to the first of December at 8,486,000.

The farmer who held a few bales of cotton until the close of this season has found that the farmers of the country are pretty near masters of the cotton situation once more. That is what they have done by organization. If they will follow the same lines next year and cut the acreage down cotton will again reign as king.

Don't lose sight of the good roads question. This is of more importance to Nacogdoches county right now than most any other question which has been discussed in these columns. Of course good bridges are included in this proposition. The Sentinel would like to hear from

some of its readers on the subject of good roads and the best way to get them.

IMMEDIATELY after the first of the year the county campaign will open up in good fashion. There are several of the boys out for the same place and the scrap will be interesting.

This year will make a lot of new geographical history. Already the map of Russia has been changed, and it is probable that another twelve months will see greater changes in that empire.

DIRECTOR NORTH of the census bureau wants a plan to get the cotton statistics out in such a manner as to avoid speculation based upon cotton reports. He is inclined to issue bulletins every other day, believing that it would be to the best interest of the planters. This proposition was tried once, but the cotton exchanges over the country raised quite an objection and that plan was abandoned at the close of last season. Since that time he has had requests to return to that system by representatives of the planting and manufacturing interests over the country and he thinks will in a large measure accomplish the purpose referred to.

THE name of Capt. A. B. Martindale, of Cushing, has been mentioned by some of his friends as good legislative material. The Sentinel believes that if Capt. Martindale would permit his name to go before the democracy of the county as a candidate, that he would let the voters know just now he stands on public matters.

In a few days many East Texas people will be enroute to the old states to spend the holidays with relatives. They should go prepared to answer any and all questions about this great portion of the grand old state of Texas. Nacogdoches county people have many good things to tell when they are away on a visit.

NACOGDOCHES should begin now to provide some way to get fire protection for the city. The business interests of the city demand some kind of protection against fire. The Business League can play a very important part in securing protection, by appointing some of the good men of the city as a committee to devise ways and means.

Just think of a town with over five thousand population and no fire protection! That's the boat Nacogdoches is in.

The Tobacco Question.

To the Farmers of Nacogdoches County:

After carefully testing the merits of the filler grown in your county last year we find the quality of the same to be as good or superior to any fillers raised in the United States, we therefore have concluded to contract in your county again under the same conditions as last year and at the same price which was 15c a pound delivered at Nacogdoches. To all those who do not think that 15c is sufficient price we will be glad to have them grow tobacco without contract and we will purchase the same when it is grown at its market value. Our reason for contracting again is that a great many farmers knowing that they have no market for said tobacco do not wish to plant without contract. We also call the attention of the farmers to the fact that to purchase something before it is grown or seen by us carries with it a certain amount of risk, and we feel that in paying 15c per pound we are giving the extreme figure possible under the circumstances, and this price is given to stimulate the industry and have enough raised so as to put this industry upon a paying basis.

This notice to the farmers is all that we can possibly do. We cannot go around to each individual farmer and try to persuade him to grow the tobacco for we have not the time nor the inclination, but upon receipt of this any farmer desiring to put in a crop next year they will give notice to Mr. W. M. Hinson, the tobacco expert of the United States Government, who will examine their soil and facilities for raising and if found satisfactory and you are in a position to grow a crop he will so inform you and our Mr. Sol Freidman who has authority to sign contracts is our agent in the State of Texas and he will make contracts with you. We do not feel that it is any risk to the farmers in making preparation for growing filler tobacco in Texas, such as the building of barns and other necessary expenditure, for what we have learned about the filler grown in your county we feel that it is an industry that will not play out and one that you can engage in for a number of years and the sooner you put yourself in a condition to grow this we feel the better off you will be. In regard to the cost of growing a crop of tobacco in your State we do not know but from the experience we have had in Florida we are confident that it can be grown for about the same cost as an acre of cotton. We are also satisfied that you can produce from 500 to 800 pounds per acre which can be delivered to us in August and which we feel will net you from \$50.00 to \$75.00 per acre. We feel this is incentive enough for any good farmer to take hold of the growing of tobacco and we will not offer any further inducements. The Government will place a man in your section to supervise and instruct the farmers how to grow and save the crop. What better opportunity can the farmers ask than to have a man who will pay him for his crop after it is grown, and to have the Government furnish a man to supervise the growing and saving of said crop? We trust that you will make your decision as early as possible and let Mr. W. M. Hinson make the necessary examination and see whether you will be in a position to make a crop or not. He will no doubt have a great many places to look after and it will

be well to give this your immediate attention.

There were a few complaints of the yield of tobacco last year by those who planted, but you must remember that last year seasons were the worst Texas has experienced for 25 years. Has the yield of any crop been satisfactory to you this year? Therefore if you have not made the success with the tobacco that you anticipated you should not be discouraged for it was entirely owing to seasons that you had no better success.

The United States Department of Agriculture will have supervision of the work, and all farmers who will engage in the work are requested to address Mr. W. M. Hinson, Nacogdoches, Texas, and state the number of acres that they will plant in tobacco next year.

This is a matter that every business man and newspaper in the county should become interested in, and to this end The Sentinel will ask the Cushing Enterprise and the Garrison Gleaner to get their people interested in the growing of tobacco.

A WELL filled smoke house and corn crib should be the motto of every farmer in Eastern Texas.

NACOGDOCHES county is very prosperous, and the people should have better public roads than the present makeshifts.

A COUNTY superintendent of public roads would save Nacogdoches county every year many dollars that is now being dumped into ditches under the present system of road building.

PRESIDENT JORDAN of the Southern Cotton Association says that under normal climatic conditions that the present cotton acreage of twenty-seven million acres will supply enough cotton to meet the demand of the spinners.

THE farmers of Nacogdoches county should select committees from the various precincts in the county, and then go before the county commissioners court and put up a good strong talk for better roads and bridges in this county.

THE government's report of the amount of cotton ginned in the United States, up to December 8, shows that there has been ginned 8,684,842 commercial bales of cotton for 1902. This shows conclusively that there will not be ten million bales this season.

THE Farmers Union and the Southern Cotton Growers' Association are educating the people in the cotton growing states how to get a good price for the product of the farm. They are now getting the farmers to organize to take care of the crop next year.

THE SENTINEL hopes that the city council will regulate the shooting of fire works during the holidays. Remember that the city has no fire protection and that if a fire should break out in the central portion of the business part of the city that it would only be a short time until thousands of dollars would be represented by a heap of smoldering embers and ashes.

This is said to be one of the finest trains in America, and Texas people contemplating a tour to California should make it convenient to take the "Sunset Express" at Houston. The Southern Pacific is the route of sunshine and flowers to the Golden Gate.

FIFTEEN CENT COTTON.

The Cotton Growers of the South, through and with the assistance of their organization. The Southern Cotton Association, are slowly but surely winning the greatest commercial battle ever known to the world. They are being applauded by millions of people who are watching the great fight that is being successfully waged by them to throw off the yoke of thieving and speculative manipulation that has held them so long, and has been the means of enabling the spinners to grow enormously wealthy at the expense of the poor farmer.

Those who stood loyal to the Association and accepted its advice, as given last January, to fix a price of 10c per pound on their cotton—demand it and get it—did so, notwithstanding there were thousands who described their efforts by saying: "Impossible, foolish, etc." The amount of cotton held by the loyal ones was sufficient to bring the price to 10c before the present crop was ready for market.

On September 7th, the Association advised the farmers to ask 11c for their cotton as conditions fully warranted that price. Many fixed that price and sold for it.

Now, on December 1st, the fact that the crop is very short has been established beyond the shadow of a doubt, and only a small remnant of that left unsold, also, that the markets are bare of dry goods with future prices enormously advanced, cotton mills loaded down with contracts and orders for goods several months ahead, and only with about one-half enough cotton in sight to fill them. Will they pay 15c for cotton? Why of course, they will if you ask it! If you do not they will take it at .05c as they have done in the past.

Decide for yourselves,—let them have it at actual value, 15c, or let them take it at their price, 05c,—it is yours—do as you please, but remember that if you sell for less than its value, 15c, you are not only injuring yourself, but every other owner of cotton is being denied his price while you are giving yours away, which prevents the advances as long as they can get it at less than its value.

Hundreds of thousands of bales are being pledged to the Southern Cotton Association for 15c, enough to force the price to its value very soon unless buyers can continue to get yours that is not pledged at their price, in this event the price cannot reach its value until yours has been taken out of the way and at their price—then the loyal ones will again reap the benefits of their Association's hard work in their behalf.

"IRRIGATION IN TEXAS."

Taylor, of the University of Texas, and the data gathered by him, in the form of the above publications, are obtained without charge upon request to the Director of the U. S. Geological Survey, Washington, D. C.

COTTON MUST RISE SAYS HAYNES.

Frank B. Hayne, leader of the New Orleans bulls, in an interview in the Times-Democrat is caustic in his comments on Secretary Wilson of the U. S. Department of Agriculture due to the fact that the department's estimate of 10,167,818 bales was based on 500 pound per bale gross, whereas 22 pounds should have been deducted for bagging and ties, making the bale 478 pounds net. Said Mr. Hayne: "If this year's estimate had been made on the same basis as last year's estimate, the figures that would have been read out on the Cotton Exchange today would have been 9,730,434 bales, instead of 10,167,818 bales and it seems most extraordinary that the Department of Agriculture in spite of the protest of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange should have thus willfully created a wrong impression in the public mind by making the estimate on an entirely different basis from what they had hitherto done. The spinners' takings last year were 12,459,000 bales. So far this year they are 184,000 bales more than to the same date last year, which shows that if the supply were there the spinners' takings for two years would certainly be 25,000,000 bales. As the supply however, is less than 24,000,000 bales, it is simply an impossible proposition for the supply to meet the demand. There is but one answer and that is, cotton must advance to a price that will check consumption. The mills have already bought fully 60 per cent of this crop at an average price probably lower than their purchases to this date last year, therefore with far better trade and materially higher prices for goods they can afford to pay very much more than today's prices before consumption will be checked. I feel confident therefore, that every farmer who will sign the pledge of the Southern Cotton Growers' Association to hold for fifteen cents will undoubtedly have an opportunity of realizing that price."

IS NOT GUILTY.

A Verdict Returned in the R. R. Parker Case at Dallas.

Dallas, Texas, December 21.—Judge E. B. Muse of the district court this morning charged the jury in the R. R. Parker murder case.

VOLUNTARILY returned a verdict of not guilty in the case closed yesterday afternoon, but Judge Muse announced at 5 o'clock that the charge to the jury would not be delivered this morning.

It was announced yesterday afternoon that the charge would be delivered at 8:30 o'clock, and at this hour there were a large number of spectators in the room, but the charge was not delivered until about 10:15, at which time there were very few persons present.

The charge was an unusually long one, covering fifteen pages of closely written typewritten paper. The law in regard to murder in the first and second degrees was pointed out to the jury, as was also the law covering self-defense.

Fully half an hour was taken up by Judge Muse in the reading of the charge and explaining some of the points touched on in the case.

Arguments in the case were completed yesterday afternoon a little after 3 o'clock, and from that time until 10 o'clock last night Clerk Floyd Ard of the criminal district court was engaged in writing the charge to the jury, which, it is claimed by many, is the longest that has ever been submitted in any criminal case in Dallas.

The jury, at 4:45 p. m., after four hours deliberation, returned a verdict of not guilty.

R. R. Parker was deputy district clerk when he shot and killed Frank J. Bell, a lawyer. The plea of self-defense was set up, and the motion to change the venue took many days of the court's time. After this was refused, several days passed before the jury was secured. In all the case has taken up seven weeks of the time of the criminal court lacking one day.

Frank J. Bell was, at the time of his death, grand chancellor of the grand lodge of Texas Knights of Pythias.—Houston Post.

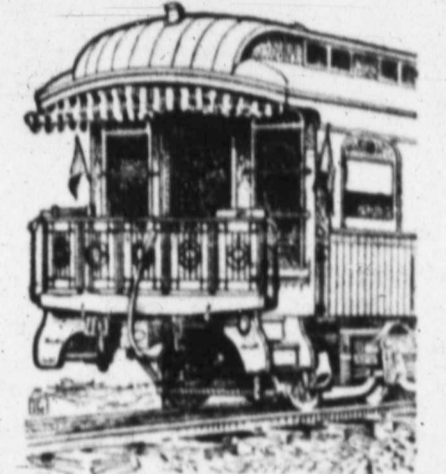
