WRECK SOUTH OF HERE.

A Very Bad Wreck on the Texas & New Orleans—Fireman Killed From Tuesday's Daily.

One of the worst wrecks on the Dallas branch of the Texas & New Orleans, occurred this morning at Dunagan, a small station in Angelina county. A double header work train was leaving Dunagan and after crossing the tram track west of that place, the second engine of the train left the track and turned over.

The fatal engine, No. 615, was in charge of Engineer A. K. Weatherford and Fireman Richard Plaisance, and Conductor E. Dupree had charge of the train.

Members of the train crew told The Sentinel reporter the following account of the wreck:

"We had just crossed the tram crossing and were about 100 feet west of Dunagan, and were not running exceeding six miles an hour. The second engine No. 615 turned over and as it turned the fireman jumped. As he jumped he appeared to be above the engine, but when he hit the ground he did not have time to get to his feet before the big engine fell upon him, killing him instantly. The engineer was in the engine when it turned and he received a number of severe bruises. The fireman was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, and the engineer is a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and both made their home in Beaumont."

Mr. Weatherford was brought to this city for medical attention. He was taken to the Eunita hotel where his injuries were dressed. The reporter called at the hotel to see Mr. Weatherford. He was resting as well as could be expected and the attending physicians were dressing the wounds.

A bad gash was cut across the left side of the ear, and his back was badly hurt. The left hand was badly bruised from a truck falling on it, and both legs were bruised, the right one being hurt more than the left.

Mr. Weatherford said that he had been railroading for the past nineteen years and that this was the first time he had even had so much as a scratch.

Mrs. Weatherford was notified of the wreck and left on the first train out of Beaumont. At the time she was notified she was not known how badly her husband was injured, and she was here in Nacogdoches, where she was waiting for the train to arrive. She was very anxious to get to the hospital to see her husband, but she was unable to do so because of the late hour. She was very grateful to the people of Nacogdoches for the attention given to her husband's case.





MR. BLOUNT'S OFFER.

In another column of The Sentinel today appears the offer of Mr. E. A. Blount to the truck farmers of Nacogdoches county. In view of the fact that the crops mentioned in Mr. Blount's communication have been tried in this county and equal to the same crops grown in other sections, it appears to The Sentinel that every trucker in the county should compete for the prizes. They are worth making an effort to win, and while winning a prize the trucker will at the same time be raising something that there is ready cash in. Tobacco has been tried here and experts claim that it is equal to the imported article. For this crop there is a market insured all who desire to plant under government supervision at 15 cents per pound. It was proven last year beyond all question of a doubt, the tobacco can be profitably handled at that price, and last season was very unfavorable for the successful cultivation of the weed. Mr. Blount's second premium relates to the growing of strawberries. This

is a crop that has been tried on a small scale, but be it said to the credit of those who tried the experiment they found it to be a very profitable crop for the diversifier, but there is not enough acreage planted in strawberries in Nacogdoches county to make the crop as profitable as it is in other sections of East Texas. The soil and the climate in this section of the state are ideal for the successful culture of the strawberry. The Sentinel hopes that the truckers will enter heartily in the contest for the prizes offered by Mr. Blount and would also like to hear from other gentlemen in Nacogdoches who believe as does Mr. Blount that the diversification of crops in Nacogdoches county should be encouraged. The prizes offered by Mr. Blount; and a few prizes from other gentlemen who are in a position to offer some inducement to the farmers to better their condition, would do much toward getting the truckers and farmers interested in the work.

SPINNERS AND GROWERS.

It is estimated that three million bales of the cotton crop grown this year remains in the South, and President Harvie Jordan of the Southern Cotton Growers' Association advises Southern holders to demand 15 cents for what they have on hand. The cotton market is exceedingly uncertain, and each individual holder will be apt to act upon all information he can gather. The chances are that very few in deed will hold cotton for the extreme price named by President Jordan.

The spinners say that 15 cents a pound would seriously check consumption, and that they cannot market goods made from 15 cent cotton. This is what the spinners say, but others say they have goods on the basis of 14 cent cotton, when in fact they paid but 10 cents for it.

Spinners and growers never agree. The mill men want the lowest possible prices, while the producers naturally want remunerative prices. There are always three parties in the cotton market, namely, spinners, growers and speculators. The last named are rarely a unit, and they are quite as apt to be found on one side of the market as on the other. But the spinners are always bears, while the

growers are always bulls. It is impossible to please at the same time both spinners and growers, for their desires and views points are irreconcilable.—Birmingham Age Herald.

RIGHT-OF-WAY-DEEDS.

They Have Been Forwarded to Washington by Mr. Greer.

Beaumont, Texas, January 3.—Hon. R. A. Greer did not go to Washington, as was expected, to deliver the right-of-way deeds for the Sabine route of the Sabine Lake channel to the war department, but, instead has forwarded the same to the department, and upon receipt of the deeds it is expected that the secretary of war will direct that work on the Sabine lake canal be at once begun by the contractors, the Southern Bowers Dredging company. This having been done, it is only a question of a few days when it is expected that actual construction work on the Sabine lake canal will begin.

In this connection it is recalled that had deep water bodies of Orange and Beaumont accepted the proposition of Hon. John H. Brooks, made in September last, to furnish the right-of-way, work on the canal would probably be under way at this time. Mr. Brooks made his proposition in good faith, and as an evidence of sincerity offered to make a deposit in bank, to be forfeited in the event he failed to carry out his agreement. It is remembered that the proposal made by him was in its terms virtually the same as the agreement finally ratified after the hearing before the war department in December last.—Beaumont Correspondent to Houston Post.

The above item should be read and thought over by every voter in this Congressional District. Especially all those who know how hard certain individuals, corporations and associations or persons have tried to launch a boom for Cooper based on the Sabine Lake Ship Channel and its location. It is true that Mr. Cooper did secure the appropriation for the channel just as John H. Brooks prophesied he would do, after his defeat. But it is equally true that to our present Congressman (of whom we are proud) the credit is due for seeing to it, that the money appropriated was not dumped into the lake.

As to the big hearted John Brooks, our Congressman's brother, his head is as long as a zinc well bucket. ABOLISH REBATING.

The word is now handed down to the life insurance agents that the companies will tolerate no more rebating of premiums by agents, and to this end ex-President Grover Cleveland has been selected as referee. The following Associated Press report may be of interest to some of the boys in this section of Texas:

"An agreement to abolish rebating on premiums has been entered into by the New York Life Insurance company, the Equitable Life Assurance society and the Mutual Life Insurance company.

Announcement was made today that Grover Cleveland has been appointed referee to decide all questions in dispute that may arise in such matters; that his salary as referee will be \$12,000 per annum, to be paid jointly by the three companies.

Mr. Cleveland has accepted with the understanding that the officers of the three companies are to second him in his efforts to stop rebating. A similar appointment was held by the late Thomas B. Reed. Any agent who gives rebates will be dismissed from service, and will not be re-employed by any of the companies that are parties to the agreement.

It is the desire of the companies to secure the co-operation of all other life insurance companies in this agreement. It was said today that if rebating can be entirely abolished first year premiums can be reduced. It is understood that that this agreement is the result of a suggestion by President Paul Morton of the Equitable Life Assurance society.

The announcement column continues to grow.

THE UVALDE COUNTRY.

Some Advice to East Texans Who are Diversified.

Uvalde, Texas, Jan. 1, 1906. Nacogdoches Sentinel:

In replying to the many requests of friends to write them of this country, it is very probable that one will reach more of those whose names we cannot recall and those who may be interested by sending to the local press than to attempt private correspondence. Therefore this is submitted to The Sentinel and it is hoped that it will suffice for those to whom we have failed to write.

The town of Uvalde is the county site of Uvalde county, and has a population of about 2,500.

It is about 93 miles west of San Antonio and on the Leona river, and on the Southern Pacific railroad.

The contiguous country is level, black, waxy soil with a great deal of gravel and shells intermixed. And its vegetation consists of grass, cactus, mesquite and huajilla shrub, with the forest growth of live oak, elm and pecan along the water courses.

North of Uvalde is the divide, a low range of mountains, which separate the waters of the Frio, Sabinal, Nueces and Rio Grande tributaries from the Colorado and its tributaries.

In the canons and the hill country is the home of the goat. The Angora goat is very valuable for its mohair, which is now selling for about 20c per pound. Some of those bucks were prize winners at the St. Louis World's Fair and sold for the handsome sum of \$1,400. One buck recently imported from South Africa clipped seventeen pounds of wool and cost the importer \$1600. These are extra fine bucks. The Texas Angora generally sell for from \$3 to \$5 per head.

Sheep and cattle do well in the lower lands, but not so well in the hills. Each offer a profitable investment to capitalist.

Climate is mild and stock rarely need housing in winter. Seasons have been sufficient for the past three years and has enhanced the value of real estate about 75 per cent to 100 per cent. The soil is very rich and only requires sufficient moisture to make this as fine agricultural region as can be found in the State.

Raw lands i. e. unimproved land sells for from \$2.50 to \$10 per acre and improved land sells for from \$10 to \$30 per acre. Proximity to town and to water course generally governing the price.

Water can be obtained at from 30 to 300 feet in sufficient quantity for household and stock necessities.

Improving real estate is rather expensive. Grubbing the mesquite costs from \$5 to \$15, averaging about \$8 per acre, but the wood will pay for the clearing. Cedar fence posts are from \$5 to \$25 per hundred, and lumber for house building ranges according to the class from \$22.50 per hundred feet to \$50 per thousand. Boxing, flooring and ceiling is

worth \$27 to \$30 per thousand feet.

Living expenses here are somewhat higher than it is in East Texas. Board ranges from \$18 to \$40 per month, though good board and lodging can be obtained at about \$25 per month.

For those who own homes in East Texas I would say stay with it, unless you wish to improve land here for the difference in value which is some times a good per cent on labor.

All-in-all one country is about as desirable as another.

Texas Fruits at The World's Fair.

"Texas Fruits at the World's Fair" is the title of a very interesting book of 104 pages and cover which has just been issued by Sam H. Dixon, and published by the Texas Horticultural Society of Houston. The Sentinel acknowledges receipt of this book, and finds therein some interesting facts concerning the fruit industry in this country that may be of interest to the readers of The Sentinel.

Of the orchard companies duly chartered to do business in this county the following are mentioned in the Texas Fruits at the World's Fair.

The Elberta Development Co. with headquarters at Nacogdoches, owns 1000 acres of fine land a few miles south of town; was incorporated under the laws of Iowa with a capital stock of \$2500. The company has 15,000 trees planted and the peach predominates.

The F. W. Mally Orchard Co., with headquarters at Nacogdoches, owns 1500 acres of fruit land near the city; was incorporated under the laws of Illinois with a capital stock of \$100,000. This company has 600 acres planted in various kinds of fruits.

The High Glen Orchard Co. (Ltd.) with headquarters at Nacogdoches, owns 400 acres near Fitz, and is incorporated under the laws of Texas with a capital stock of \$20,000. This company has 18,000 trees growing in a healthy condition.

The Fitz Hill Orchard Co. north of Nacogdoches on the Huston, East and West Texas, owns 500 hundred acres, and was incorporated under the laws of Texas with a capital stock of \$30,000. The company has 12,000 peach trees planted and has its property in a high state of cultivation.

Of the four companies duly chartered it will be seen that there is invested in Nacogdoches county \$175,000 in the fruit business. Now the question which presents itself to The Sentinel is what will become of the surplus fruit from these big orchards? It appears that the fruit and truck interests in this county will in a very short time require a canning factory to handle the fruit when there is a surplus. It would be better to receive a small price for the surplus that to let it remain on the ground and rot.

Several enterprising truckers last year invested a small amount in individual canning plants and they found no trouble in disposing of the output at very good prices.

GETTING STRAIGHTENED OUT.

BEN MILAM'S MARCH.

Notable Event in Early Texas History Recalled.

San Antonio Light:

A most enjoyable session of the DeZavala Chapter, Daughters of the Republic of Texas, was held yesterday afternoon at the residence of Major and Mrs. Walker to meet Mrs. Roberts, a grand-niece of Ben Milam and the mother of Mrs. Walker. The 9th being the seventieth anniversary of the virtual surrender of San Antonio to the Texans, the meeting was most appropriate and the ladies fully enjoyed the event.

Mrs. DeZavala read Johnson's report of the battle and victory. The story, old but ever new, was retold. How bold brave Milam, not daunted by the timidity of the commander and the assertions that the place was too strong to capture, stepped forward with the cry, "Who will follow old Ben Milam into San Antonio?" Three hundred immediately responded. They met at the old white mill north of the city and on the morning of December 5, 1835, entered San Antonio in two divisions, Milam sent Neil with another detachment to the northeast around the division commanded by Milam, the other led by Frank Johnson, Milam's friend. Milam sent Neil with another detachment to the northeast around the head of the river to make a feint upon the Alamo to divert the attention of the enemy from his entry into the city. The brave band dug their way through the houses with crow bars and passed through exposed places in trenches, dug in the night. Milam tell in the door of the Veramendi house and was buried near where he fell. Johnson was elected leader in his stead, and the Texans nerved to avenge his death, fought with renewed energy. They carried house by house and on the morning of the 9th their arduous labors were rewarded by receiving a flag of truce from the enemy and the intimation that they desired to capitulate. San Antonio should ever remember that period in her history and keep green the memory of this most attractive hero who sleeps in our midst. With Milam were many brave men whose descendents are prominent members of DeZavala Chapter.

On motion of Mrs. Smith, seconded by Mrs. M. E. Howard and Miss Adams, Mrs. Roberts was elected an honor-

ary member. A vote of thanks was extended Major and Mrs. Walker for their charming southern hospitality, and little Miss Josephine, the great grand-niece of Milam, was placed on the program for a Daughter's benefit to be given shortly.

Mrs. Roberts and daughter, Mrs. Walker, (nee Miss Joe Roberts) were residents of this city for a number of years, and Mr. Walker also made his home here for a few years and they have many relatives and friends in this city.

Ford and there must be at least five contestants for said prize, and I will give a prize of \$15 for the best acre of strawberries grown within five miles of the town of Nacogdoches, provided there are at least three contestants for said prize which will be awarded by a committee consisting of F. W. Malley, Robert Lindsey and G. P. Parks.

TOBACCO CROP A FAILURE.

Mr. Barber Who Raised a Crop Here Last Year Writes Conditions.

About the last part of November Mr. C. A. Barber who raised the crop of experimental tobacco here last year for Dr. F. C. Ford and associates, left for Cuba to study the tobacco situation from the American's point of view.

After spending a month in Pinar, Del Rio he wrote Dr. Ford a letter describing an situation as he found it. The Sentinel has permission from Dr. Ford to use the letter.

LasOrvas; Pinar Del Rio, Cuba, Jan. 1, 1906.

Dr. Ford:

Dear Sir—I have traveled all over Del Rio Province and found it in bad shape. It has been raining here continually for the past month and the tobacco crop is almost a complete failure throughout western Cuba. This is reported as the worst tobacco crop in fifty years.

There will be nothing doing here so I expect I will cross over to Florida soon.

This had ought to give Texas tobacco a send off on the market next fall.

I met a Cuban by the name of Geromimo Pando who says he had a position under you during the war.
