Houston, Texas, March 7.—At 10:30 o'clock this morning ex-Governor J. S. Hogg died at his residence in this city. He had been in bad health for several months and while everything that medical science could do for him was done yet the end came today. Arrangements have not been made for the funeral at this hour.

NO GRAFT EXISTS.

Waco Judge Says Texas is Free From Evil.

Waco, Texas, March 6.—In charging the grand jury yesterday Judge Sam R. Scott of Fifty-fourth district court spoke for an hour on alleged graft in Texas, resenting the idea that the state was honey-combed in that way. He said some newspapers were claiming graft existed everywhere, and said these papers were recreant to their trust if they did not expose the cases as the libel laws were so framed that the papers could safely do this and that they could not hide behind the claim that the libel laws were too strict.

LIQUOR CARRYING

Bill Will Be Reported Soon Despite German Objection.

Washington, March 6.—The Hepburn-Dolliver bill governing the transportation of liquor from one State into a local option community of another will in all probability, be reported to the House this week—possibly tomorrow. The Williams bill on the subject is a much more drastic measure, and for that reason has failed to get the support of a majority of the committee. The Williams bill simply forbids common carriers to transport C. O. D. packages of liquors into communities where the sale of liquors has been interdicted. The Hepburn-Dolliver bill is a slight extension of the existing law. It provides that all liquor shipped from one State to another shall "upon arrival within the boundary of such State, before and after delivery," be subject to the laws of such State. The words in quotation marks are the additions to the existing law, but an entire section is added to the law, the salient part of which is in this clause: "But nothing in this act shall be construed to authorize a State or Territory to control in any wise its territory with the transportation of liquor intended for shipment directly through such a State or Territory and not intended for delivery thereon or to control in any wise its territory with the delivery in the State or Territory of any bona fide interstate commerce shipment of the liquor intended solely for the personal use of the original consignee and not intended for sale in said State or Territory in violation of the laws thereof."

FOR KIRBY'S ROAD.

Locomotives are Now Due—Extension Under Way.

It is learned at the Board of headquarters of the Burns Ferry, Brownfield and Chester railroad that two engines which were purchased from the L. A. works several months ago will soon be ready to ship and they can be put into service in the road as soon as the first rail is laid. A. Thomas and tons of steel rails are also on hand and ready for shipment. The project between Rockdale and Albridge is under construction eight miles east of Rockdale and ready for the machinery to be set. The capacity of the plant will be 100,000 feet per day, and it will be one of the feeders for the new railroad.

TEXAN DROPPED DEAD.

Fort Worth Stockman Attacked by Heart Disease in Shreveport.

Shreveport, La., March 7.—While working on the court house square this morning at 7:45 H. L. McKay, said to be a prominent stockman of Fort Worth, Texas, suddenly dropped dead of heart failure. McKay arrived there last night with a car of horses, on his way to Mississippi, and was going to the Texas and Pacific depot to look after his stock when he suddenly fell dead on the street.

The body was removed to the morgue and his relatives in Fort Worth notified of his death.

NEW HEADQUARTERS

To Be Moved—Dallas and Fort Worth are Candidates.

Omaha, Neb., March 6.—Sovereign Commander Root of the Woodmen of the World made the statement yesterday that it had been finally decided to remove the headquarters of that order from Omaha, Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas, and Waterloo, Dubuque and Cedar Rapids, Iowa, are reported as having made the most favorable offers, and the choice of location will be made Wednesday by the executive committee of the order, which meets in Omaha, probably from these five places.

While the question of taxation of the reserve fund in Nebraska has not been finally passed upon, Mr. Root professes to have inside information that a decision will be handed down shortly which will be adverse to the order.

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MR. CHANDLER SHOT

Dock Watson is Charged With the Crime—He Surrendered.

From Tuesday's Daily.—Last night about 11 o'clock Chas. Chandler, a prominent citizen of the Swift community, was shot and it is feared that he was mortally wounded. Immediately after the shooting Dock Watson telephoned the city marshal to come and arrest him, that he had killed a man.

City Marshal Spradley arrested Watson and turned him over to Deputy Sheriff Hall.

The shooting occurred in front of the drug store of Perkins, Kleas & Mast, and there were some ten or twelve men standing nearby when the shooting began.

As to what brought about the trouble The Sentinel has not been able to learn, and from those who were standing within ten feet of the trouble say they have no idea what it was about.

This morning the attending physicians state that hopes for recovery are very poor.

Bond Readily Given.

Dock Watson was released this morning on a \$500 bond. He was charged with the shooting of Chas. Chandler last night.

ALLEGED SWINDLERS

Bexar County Sheriff Goes to California for His Prisoners.

San Antonio, Texas, March 7.—The Sheriff of Bexar County has gone to California to bring back E. C. and M. S. Swindley, who were arrested here for swindling operators connected with the promotion of a stock worm industry. People were victimized for sums ranging between \$1,000 and \$5,000. Respiration papers have been forwarded for the prisoners.

PIERCE IS WANTED A STUDY OF TYPHUS

Hadley Calls for Him Inside of the State of Missouri.

St. Louis, March 6.—In compliance with an order of Special Commissioner Anthony. Attorney General Hadley today issued a subpoena for H. Clay Pierce, former president of the Waters Pierce Oil company, now in New York and for Charles H. Adams, secretary of the company, commanding them to appear in St. Louis and testify in the oil hearing which is set for March 10. The subpoenas are not binding outside of the State of Missouri.

New Orleans Physician in Mexico for That Purpose.

Mexico City, March 6.—Dr. Bernadn Jacoby of New Orleans has arrived here to make a study of typhus fever and, if possible, discover the bacillus which is supposed to be its cause, a study in which many eminent Mexican bacteriologists are now engaged. There have been 130 new cases since the first instant, with thirty-two deaths. The sanitary campaign in the poorer quarters of the city is energetically prosecuted.

The year nineteen six will bring to Nacogdoches free mail delivery. The receipts at the postoffice here the past quarter is something over the amount that is required by law to secure same. The Sentinel has been informed that a petition will be forwarded to the proper authorities at an early date asking for the service here.

There will be a fine fruit crop this year. That is the indications are now that there will be a bumper crop. There will be a surplus in this county, and there has been no preparations made to take care of the same. Some of the farmers and truck growers should investigate the home canning plan that has been adopted by some of the fruit growers and when there is a demand for canned goods place the output of the home canner on the market.

When the smooth Yankee farmer comes in and gets control of all the fine tobacco land in this section, then it will be that the farmers of East Texas will see where they lost out by not learning how to grow and cure tobacco for market. This is furnished to them now free of charge, but the time is coming when they will pay dearly for what they now get for the mere asking. When others engage in the tobacco industry here and there is a good market established for the product, then they will say with the poet, "The saddest words of tongue or pen, the saddest are these, it might have been."

There is one thing to a dead moral certainty, and that is that the negroes themselves will have to look to the education of some of their race that the best thing or them to do is to let the white women of the South alone. A few more episodes like the affair at Shreveport, and some of the hot headed youths of the South will arm themselves with Winchester and what a slaughter there will be. True there will be some good people hurt and many a home will be made sad, but then the men of the South cannot stand for their homes to be invaded by the rapist much longer. The time is coming just as sure as the sun will rise tomorrow that there will be a bloody race war.

TEXAS A PEACH.

Texas has been the recipient of many eulogies and complimentary mention at the hands of the press, but the following from the editor of the Choctaw (I. T.) Inquirer is unique and completely covers the whole question: "Texas is a whopper. She's a peach. She's the widest, broadest, and longest country on earth, extending from east to west and also from north to south. She could put Rhode Island in her vest pocket. She could swallow three or four states like Maryland and wash 'em down by drinking the Mississippi dry, and could digest 'em without ever having the colic. Texas is the empire state of the Union, without any Kaiser Bill for Emperor. She is the chiefest among ten thousand and altogether lovely, wild, and reckless. She's one of the blue hen's chickens. She's the pebble on the beach. She's the cock of the walk and the democrat of the world. She's a wolv, and it's her day to howl. Texas is bounded on the east by the alligators of Louisiana and huckleberry thickets of Arkansas. She is bounded on the north by the tomahawk and the war whoop of the red men. She is bounded on the west by the chile con carnio of New Mexico and the hot tamales of Old Mexico, and if it wasn't for that measley body of salt water she would extend beyond the South Pole."

It is easy for such fellows as Judge Bradley, of Fannin county, to assert that graft exists, but like him, when called upon to say where graft is going and name the guilty, they all lose courage and jump the track. What the country needs is men that will put the screws to grafters and officers guilty of malfeasance and see that they are prosecuted and punished. Any old wind-jammer can get on the rostrum and howl graft fraud, robbery and so forth, but men are few and far between that have the grit to do something to relieve the public from the terrible evils that they declare is practiced so commonly.

THE ABUSE OF DIVORCE.

There are more divorces granted in the United States every year than in any other country except Japan. The recorded divorces during the year 1903 were 70,000, and in 1900 nearly 200,000 divorced persons were living in this country. Whatever one's views may be as to permissible causes for divorce, there can be no question that these causes are too common. Many may agree that infidelity, desertion, cruelty and drunkenness are just grounds for divorce; but they must also, in face of the figures, agree that these offenses against the marriage relation and against decency and good order as well as occurring in this country with alarming and constantly increasing frequency. If you can do somewhat to limit and check a stream which promises ere long to be a flood you may well be content." Thus Governor Pennypacker warned the national divorce congress at Washington of the enormous difficulties to be encountered in seeking to secure uniformity in the divorce laws of all the states. Three states failed to send representatives to this conference. Any one of these three, in practice, able to nullify any divorce legislation upon which the other forty-four states might agree, for the states are required by the constitution to give full faith and credit to the laws of every other state. One state remaining outside the agreement would become a haven for divorce seekers from all other states and its decrees would have to be accepted everywhere. The present muddle of state laws, ranging from no divorce to one because of incompatibility, is not only demoralizing and immoral, but a direct incentive to marital inconstancy. Absolutely uniform legislation is perhaps impossible. But it is most significant fact that forty-three states are awake to the evil of the abuse of divorce. National conferences such as that at Washington can not fail to exercise a strong influence for good upon the national intellect and conscience.—Beaumont Journal.

IT WAS RECENTLY announced in Wall Street that the Standard Oil company is preparing to increase its capital stock from \$100,000,000 to \$600,000,000 by issuing six shares for each one share now outstanding. It is not designed to raise immediately any money on this new issue, but simply to divide the present high priced shares into six and give them to old stockholders. The New York correspondent for the Chicago Tribune referring to this move, says: "The company has two objects in doing this. One is to try to dispel public criticism that arises every time the Standard declares a 40 or 48 per cent dividend. The other is to bring the stock among a larger number of holders, so there may be missionaries in every town to help stem the rising tide of opposition to the trust. It is argued that the salvation of the steel trust is enormous number of small stockholders; and the Stand-

ard at list is seeking cover a few more months a well from anti-trust sentiment. When the present stock is cut up into sixths the price will drop from 690, which it was today, to about 115, and dividends, instead of being more than 40 per cent, will become about 7 per cent. No stockholder will be a loser, because he will hold six times as many shares as before. On the contrary, he will gain, because when the stock is reduced to figures where people can afford to buy it the price is pretty sure to rise above one-sixth its former value. As capitalizations go nowadays the Standard with \$100,000,000 is undercapitalized. It claims to have real property worth more than \$500,000,000, so the increase in capital will not be watering the oil. The lowering of the value of the certificates would permit quicker conversion of securities and juggling the stock market such as H. H. Rogers, the present ruler of the Standard, has delighted to do with Amalgamated Copper."

The Receipts at the Post Office the Last Quarter Were Large.

The following is a copy of a letter mailed to Congressman Brooks in reply to one asking for information concerning the post office at this place:

Nacogdoches, Tex., Feb 23. Hon. M. L. Brooks, Washington, D. C. Dear Sir:

Being very desirous of, and feeling the necessity for the location and erection of a Federal building in our city, I beg herewith to submit to you and your committee a few facts and figures for your consideration:

Postal receipts for the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1899, 1194.04

Postal receipts for the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1906, 2545.56.

Increase in five years 213 per cent.

The building now occupied by me is inadequate in every sense; the floor space being 1440 square feet, when my needs at least call for 3500 square feet of floor space. The Government's lease on the building I now occupy expires October 31, 1907, and rents have advanced in the past five years fully 50 per cent, so you can readily see that if they continue to advance, as they no doubt will, since our city is rapidly growing, the Government will be forced to pay a much higher rental than it now pays for these inadequate quarters.

Three rural routes go out from this office and application will soon be made for city free delivery to which we are entitled. I estimate that fully ten thousand people call for their mail at this office.

I earnestly hope that your efforts in our behalf may be successful; and that if I can serve you further in this matter do not hesitate to call on me. With best wishes, I am, Yours truly, H. H. Cooper.

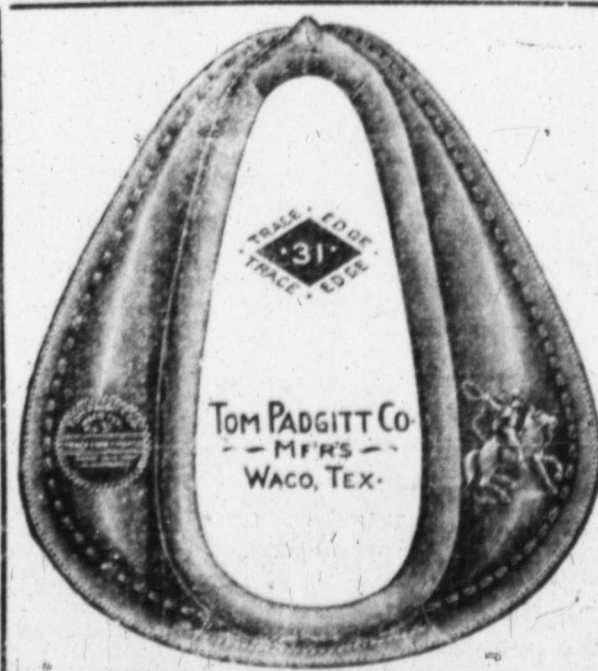

THE weather for the past few days has been ideal for the farmers, and they have certainly taken advantage of the same to get their land in fine shape for the crop of this year.

FROM reading the good articles in the exchanges that reach this table on the good roads subject, the people in other counties are getting interested in the matter of good roads.

NACOGDOCHES is supposed to hold an election some time in April for the purpose of electing some aldermen and other officials, but so far the candidates are rather shy about announcing.

NACOGDOCHES county will have all kinds of fruit and truck to ship this year, and yet the truck growers are without an organization, and when the time comes for finding a market they will be like a flock of geese without a leader—they will be lost.

THE world mourns the death of Ex Gov. Jas. S. Hogg, which occurred last Saturday. The great grief of Texas knows no bounds. A more fitting illustration of the universal wave of sorrow that swept the State could not have been produced than the simple cut, representing Texas, girded with mourning, which appeared in the Houston Post Sunday. The hearts of all true Texans are saddened. The State has suffered an irparable loss, the people have lost a friend whose place can never be filled and the cause of reform has lost a champion that could only be overthrown by the grim reaper. Jim Hogg will, though dead, never be forgotten. All honor to his memory.

THE U. S. senate passed a pure food bill with a whoop. Only four votes were cast against it, one of them being Senator Bailey of Texas. Senator Bailey, however, was not opposed to pure food legislation, but opposed the bill upon the ground that it was an encroachment on the police powers of the states. He declared he would like to see every state have an effective law for the punishment of those who manufacture fraudulent and deleterious food-stuffs, but that it was not in the province of the federal government to undertake this task for the states. In support of his assertion that the states had ample power to punish those who sold impure foods, even though brought from another state and sold in unbroken packages, Senator Bailey cited a case in Massachusetts where a dealer in oleomargarine had been convicted, although the product which he sold was brought from Illinois and disposed of in unbroken packages. "My opinion is," Senator Bailey remarked, "that the people of every state can best take care of their own health and moral."

For Representative.

I hereby announce myself as a candidate for re-election to the office of Representative. I am convinced that my health is sufficiently recovered to enable me to render the service that may be expected of the delegate to the Thirtieth Legislature. I almost feel well enough now to come home and take my old post, but the physicians advise me to remain in the west during this summer. This precludes the possibility of my making a campaign. It has never rendered them ineligible to re-election. I want to try it again and I do not believe the people will consider me a failure because I did no service in the 29th. If I am elected I will do my best, feeling that the acquaintance and even short experience that I acquired last session will enable me to render better service than I could as a "first timer," even in robust health. I announce subject to the action of the democracy of Nacogdoches county and earnestly ask the support of all who participate in the democratic primaries.

THE Denison cotton mill has enjoyed continuous growth and prosperity since its establishment, and it has been found necessary to greatly enlarge the plant. Plans have been perfected for the extension of its manufacturing capacity and will next season turn out cotton cloths as well as yarn, which is the sole product of the mill this season. The force of 150 employees will be increased to 350. The mill was started with 7000 spindles, but with the installation of new machinery there will be 12,000 spindles in operation. The output of the mills is now between 26,000 and 27,000 pounds of yarn a week. With the increased facilities 40,000 pounds will be produced each week. During the summer months 320 looms for weaving cloth will be put in and by September 1, when next year's cotton will begin to come in, the mill will be ready to turn out this product. The class of yarn that the mill is turning out is of the highest grade and the demand for it has been increasing. It will take the mill till May 1 to fill the orders that have already been received.

LETTER TO TEXAS.

NACOGDOCHES, TEX., Jan. 13 '06—Dear Mr. Gullion, Citizens, Friends and Fellow Members of I. O. O. F.: The Order which I found to be very beneficial for the short time that I have been a member. I will at this endeavor at this time to write you some of the many things I have seen and heard. I have seen flowers, roses of many kinds ever since I entered the Lone Star Monarch State of Texas. It has been my duty as well as my privilege to think of the many friends and promises. I have left behind—promises to write to so many that should I endeavor to write each a personal letter, I might not get around; so I will take this means of reaching you. I have seen beautiful prairies for hundreds of miles; one ranch of over one million acres belonging to Mrs. King, the land cattle queen of earth, I presume. She owns about 40 miles square. I also saw a part of Mr. E. D. C. Lasaters' ranch of 300,000 acres, which includes the town of Falfurrias. This is where the fine lemons grew that attracted the attention of Mr. Stiles, was the judge of the lemon show at the World's Fair, and who has been one of the best known and most successful orange growers of California until he moved to South Texas as this past summer. I had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Stiles and he says South Texas has a great future, and he is backing his judgment with his money and experience. He has moved his nursery from California and seems well pleased with South Texas, and his prospects in growing citrus fruits. He also expects to grow almonds, walnuts, pecans, and in fact add several things of importance to the already large list of Texas products.

Lands can be bought from \$1.50 to \$25. Around towns in the south of promising importance \$25, is one mile of town; more than one mile, \$15; lands away back, I know not what kind, at 1.50; large tracts 5 to 7 miles from railroad, \$3 to \$7.

While this country has a fine climate, not excelled by any, as far as the Californians seem to know, they seem to be well pleased with it. A gentleman from North Dakota said:

"I have been all over the Northwest, also California, but I have not seen anything like South Texas. Kentuckians ought to be delighted with, and are wherever I find them here. Oranges and roses ought to bring a pleasing expression to smile forsaken face. If I had money I would own an orange grove in Texas in years. So, if any friend or friends would like to co-operate, shall be glad to hear from them. Some one said he wanted the truth, so I have tried to give it to the best of my ability. A man without some money does not need South Texas, for there are plenty of Mexicans here that can be hired for 50 cents per day, and are said by the whites to be worth two negroes.

I think anyone wanting a location for general farming had better go to North Texas.

Sothwest is good for trucking and fruit growing.

Hoping to have the kind wishes of all, I remain.

SPEAKING of pure food, how is this for instance? It is from the Galveston News and is compiled from an authentic source. What is done in Germany is easily copied in America. How do we know when we eat Bologne sausage that we are not eating the rehashed contents of the garbage barrel or the ground up carcass of an old dead cow, or maybe a horse, or still worse, a pig which died of cholera. The Lord and the manufacturer only know what we are eating out of cans, canvass and cartoons. The News says: "Consul General Guenther, of Frankport, writes about the trial of the proprietor of a sausage factory in Munich, and the verdict arrived at, which has been much discussed by the German press and public. The defendant was charged with violation of the pure food laws, and it was proved that in his factory large quantities of spoiled hams, decayed sides of pork, sausage covers that had been used before, the intestines of cattle and scraps of meat which had been designated for dog feed, and even deleterious parts of meat extracted from garbage barrels, were by him converted into sausages and sold as good quality products. In his defense other butchers and trade experts testified that the use of some of these substances was customary in sausage manufacture. The states prosecuting attorney demanded that the accused be sentenced to one year's imprisonment and five year's loss of civil rights, but the court imposed only fourteen day's imprisonment and \$238 fine. This model sausage manufacturer also supplied the army barracks and other public institutions with his vicious products."

Mr. W. M. Hinson of Palestine is in the city today looking after the tobacco interests in this county. He informs The Sentinel that prospects were never brighter for the tobacco grower than at the present time. The crop of Nacogdoches county will be packed and placed on the market here this year, and he also says that there will be several buyers in the field for the Nacogdoches product.

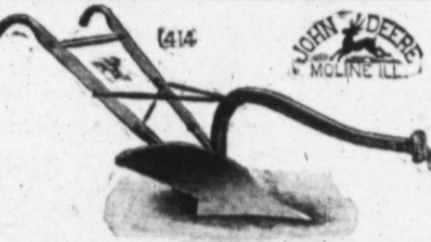

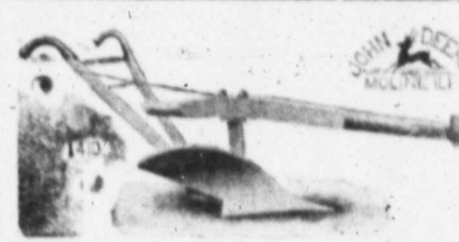

Intensive farming was the subject discussed at an institute this winter. The speaker said, "Too many farmers are trying to farm more land than they can handle well. There are too many half section farms managed by quarter section men. Many a man gets a poor living from 160 acres who might do exceptionally well on 40 acres." There is a great deal of truth in this.

More farmers are trying to do too much than there are who farm too little. The size of the farming ability of the owner.

Few men seem to realize that it is better to get 80 bushels of corn to the acre from 45 acres than get 35 bushels per acre from 80 acres.

Other grains would run about the same way. A man will boast that he has cut 100 acres of meadow. But how much of the hay spoiled in the harvest? "The fact is, I got caught with about half of it—couldn't get the help I needed." So it goes. Extensive farming is a risky business unless one has a sufficient equipment and force of workers just when he needs them. The help problem is getting more serious each year.

Some believe that big business will develop big business men. Not so. Big men develop big business and business is not measured by the acre, but by bank account.

Intensive farming, carried to extremes calls for specialization. This is fraught with danger. Diversified farming

is always the surest. But we believe that most farms could be reduced in acreage to the betterment of the land and the fuller expansion of the pocket book—Texas Farm Journal.

THE SLOT MACHINES.

A Bill to Prohibit Gambling in the New States

Washington, March 5.—The bill to prohibit gambling in Oklahoma, Indian Territory, Arizona, New Mexico and Alaska has been finally whipped into shape by the senate committee on territories so as to include slot machines. The committee in making its report dwells at length on the "wide open" towns and licensed gambling prevailing in Arizona and New Mexico. The report shows that the legislatures of these two territories have licensed even the invidious slot machines, which pay an annual tribute of \$50 per machine. This policy is condemned and the committee recommends the passage of the bill as amended. The bill as amended is sweeping in its provision and takes in every "banking" or percentage game played with cards, dice or any other device, whether for money, checks, credit or any other representative of value, and it effects the owner, renter or occupant of any abode of land and water, failing to take into account only the possibility of an airship Monte Carlo.

KU KLUX KLAN IN SHREVEPORT

Negroes Fled With Cries of Terror From the Ghostly Visitors.

Shreveport, La., March 2.—This city experienced a revival of Ku Klux Klan last night when a party of 50 mounted drapen and masked men rode over the city, causing a stampede in the negro districts. The raid was a result of the trouble this city has experienced during the last 10 days and followed last night after the execution of the negro rapist, Charles Colman.

The raiders were costumed in the manner of Thomas Dixon's "Clansman" except the mask and Toga were black. The patrolmen were on the alert and as soon as the masked body appeared reports from all over the city were telephoned to headquarters. The police made no arrests, having learned that the Ku Klux was composed of the best citizens of the city and the leader promises that no violence should be used. They were to warn negroes what would happen in the event of a repetition of former crimes.

Wherever the swift silent horsemen moved during the night the negroes were panic stricken and fled in wild terror. No violence was used, but the presence of the Klan struck terror to the negroes and caused a panic among them.

Saloons, dives and all negro quarters were visited. The horsemen reigned up in front of the negro resorts, and as soon as negroes looking out on the streets saw the ghostly figures on horses silently standing with mysterious motions they became filled with a vague fear and fled with cries of terror to any place of safety that appealed to them. No word was spoken and no violence used. The Klan came in the form of a warning to negroes, which was understood. The action is approved by the best citizens of the city, and for this reason the police refused to interfere.

COLEMAN IS LEGALLY HANGED IN THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

The Murderer of Margaret Lear Paid Penalty of Crime.

Shreveport, La. March 1.—

Today Charles Coleman the convicted and confessed negro murderer and rapist of Maggie Lear, a 15 year-old white girl, paid the death penalty in the parish jail here. At 12:37 the trap was sprung and at 12:50 the physicians pronounced the negro dead. A great crowd gathered around the rope cordon at the jail which militia still guarded, and when it was learned the trap was sprung great cheers were sent up.

Coleman was locked in his cell for sometime this morning with different ministers, among them being some of his own race. One of these conducted him to the foot of scaffold from which he was hung.

Coleman did not lose a particle of his nerve. He walked with a slow, but steady step and took his position on the scaffold when motioned to by the hangman.

When asked if he had anything to say, he replied: "I am guilty of killing that little girl. I am sorry of it, that's all I have to say."

He smiled once when the hangman touched his chin and pointed upward. The cap was placed over his head and the rope adjusted.

Just as the hangman placed his foot on the trigger, Coleman exclaimed: "Good bye."

The trap flew open and his body shot through. He was pronounced dead in 13 minutes, his neck being broken.

One of the murdered girl's brothers witnessed the execution. There is strong talk of burning the negro's dead body if the men can get at it, but the governor, who arrived this morning and the mayor have taken steps to prevent this and will give him a decent burial.

Coleman confessed to the murder of Niss Lear before he met death, and also admitted having killed a negro at Cypress La., several years ago.

IN THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

A Nacogdoches Boy Writes of the Interesting Things There

Troop "B" U. S. Cavalry, Camp McGrath, Batangas, R. I. January 8, 1906.

To The Sentinel:

In view of the delicate situation existing between the States and China at the United present, I wish to call the attention of your readers to the Philippine Islands, for it is necessary that these Islands be brought to the front and increased in importance in the event the United States should become involved in a conflict with China, which is not a remote possibility. Therefore, I presume that it would be pardonable in me to the attention of the readers of your paper to the geography and history of the islands. They are only a short distance south-east of China, the Pacific Ocean is on the east, the China Sea on the west. Luzon and Mindanao are the largest of the islands. There are nine other large islands and more than one thousand smaller ones. These islands are in the torrid zone, summer the year year around. There are only two seasons, the wet and dry, each of six months duration. The total area of the islands is about equal to that of all the New England States and the states of New York combined. They were discovered by Magellan, a Spaniard, on his famous voyage around the world. Spain took formal possession of the islands in 1569. Conquest of islands attempted by Chinese in 1574. War declared between Spain and United States in April, 1898. Spanish fleet in Manila Bay destroyed and arsenal captured in May. City of Manila surrendered in August. Islands formally ceded to the United States in December. Native insurgents protested against American occupation and warfare continued, wherefore the necessity of United States soldiers in the Islands. Forests are very extensive, as yet practically untouched. Agricultural resources of country unsurpassed. Large proportion of cultivable area undeveloped. Soil is of extraordinary fertility and richness. Cattle, sheep and goats introduced from Spain. Number in islands not large. Carabao, or water buffalo, principal beast of burden and of general usefulness. Cigars are the staple article of manufacture. Rice and bananas are the principal food product. Natives subsist almost entirely on rice, yet they do not raise as much as they consume. Value of imports nearly twenty millions, exports, nearly twenty five millions. Gold, iron, copper, lead, petroleum and marble of fine quality exist. No systematic mining has been undertaken. Population estimated at something over eight million, of which over one hundred thousand are Chinese. The retail trade and banking business of the island are almost wholly in the hands of the Chinese. The only line of railroad in the islands is one of one hundred and twenty miles in

length extending from Manila to Dagupan. Systems of schools are very good. There is an agricultural school on the island of Negros. The religion of a majority of the people in Roman Catholic, introduced by the Spaniards, previous to acquisition of islands by the United States, exercise in any other was prohibition and punished. Silver is the basis of currency. The silver dollar over here has more silver in it than our silver dollar in the States. And yet it is only worth fifty cents in gold. The real value of the Philippine Islands to the United States is made apparent now that there is a possibility of serious troubles with China, and no doubt it was in view of some such possible contingency that our government saw fit to retain the islands. While I doubt the policy of the government at the time, I am now fully persuaded of the policy pursued. The natives around the coast towns are bright and intelligent, the masses, however are simple children of nature, and are virtually clothed in the dress that nature gave them—in a rude state.

Their houses—when they have any—are of bamboo, thatched over with a kind of straw called Nipa, which makes a very fine roofing. It would burn like a fodder stack if set on fire. There are no fire places, indeed, they have no need for them. They do their cooking out of doors.

I flatter myself that I have presented a not altogether unlovely picture of the islands, and yet a truthful one. However, if one should come over here with the expectation of finding a bonanza, I am afraid that he would be grievously disappointed, for he would find a great many obstacles confronting him, and barriers impeding his progress. This is true from various causes, but I do not wish to consume any more of your valuable space and time by going into detail, therefore will not weary you further. Trusting that you will kindly give space in your paper to this article, and that it may prove not altogether unprofitable to your readers, I beg to remain,
