EIGHT YEARS IN PEN. ANOTHER TRAGEDY.

Dock Watson Declared Guilty of Murder in Second Degree.

On the fifth day of March Charley Chandler was shot in front of Perkins, Kleas & Mast drug store, and Dock Watson surrendered to the sheriff alleging that he had killed Chandler. Chandler lived a few days after the shooting and at his death Watson was rearrested on a charge of murder. The grand jury when it convened returned an indictment and yesterday the case went to trial. The charge was given to the jury late yesterday afternoon and this morning when the court convened, the jury announced ready to report.

"We, the jury, find the defendant, Dock Watson, guilty of murder in the second degree and assess his punishment at confinement in the penitentiary for a term of eight years."

of 8 per cent. This looks to

giving a very good profit on
the investment the amount of
money paid out for help
amounted to a nice sum, and
all that was spent in the town
of Brenham with the trades-
people. A mill would be a
good thing for the farmers and
the merchants in this part of
the state, and it is a matter
that some of the capita lists
should look into. The town
has grown beyond the point
where the farming interest
must be depended upon to
give it the support that it
should have. It takes facto-
ries to build up cities. A cot-
ton mill here would give em-
ployment to several hundred
people, and they would spend
their money here with the
Nacogdoches merchants, they
would spend quite a lot of
money with the farmers not
only for their cotton crop, but
they would spend a very large
amount of money for chickens,
butter, eggs, and the general
run of the good things that
are raised on the farm, that
cannot be grown in town. The
farmers of Nacogdoches coun-
ty are able to build and equip
a cotton mill themselves in
the event the merchants and
capitalists do not care to in-
vest. Let some good man
start the ball to rolling and

Will Can Fruit.

Mr. J. T. Booth one of the
Nacogdoches farmers who is
an enthusiastic diversifier, was
in the city this morning on a
business trip that will in the
near future prove to the farm-
ers of this county that there is
yet a good lot of money that
can be made even if the cot-
ton and the corn crops are a
failure.

Mr. Booth has purchased a
canning plant for his neighbor-
hood and will this year put up
about 10,000 cans of fruit and
vegetables. He stated to the
reporter that his plant had a
capacity of 1000 cans per day,
and that it was his intention
to put up every thing that he
grows on his farm in the way
of vegetables. As an experi-
ment he proposes to put up a
lot of sweet potatoes and be-
lieves that he will find a good
market for his product.

For some time past The
Sentinel has been advocating
that it was a good thing for the
farmers of Nacogdoches coun-
ty to put in canning plants for
their own neighborhood work-
ing up the surplus fruit and
vegetables and hold the goods
thus canned for a time when
there would be a market, there
s money in the canning busi-

of this extra money them-
selves.

COMMITTEE HAS ADJOURNED.

Election Law Error Inquiry Devel-
oped No Criminal Act.

Austin, Texas, April 6.—
The house legislative investi-
gation committee that has
been looking for the "rascal",
who mutilated section 120 of
the election law completed its
labors today and adjourned.
The committee's findings show
there was no criminal in-
tent, and that no kind con-
nected with the change made
in section 120. The recom-
mendations will be valuable to
future legislatures.

Mt. Enterprise to Have Railroad.

The old town of Mt. Enter-
prise is right now on the eve
of a great boom. Mr. R. H.
Thompson, one of the interest-
ed promoters is just back from
that place, and in conversation
with the News reporter says
that old Mt. Enterprise will
soon pass away, and a new
town of greater proportions
will spring into existence,
that the railroad is now grad-
ed to the old Star house and
that the graders are pushing
onward. This is only about
three and one-half miles from
the new townsite. The town
is being laid out, and as soon
as completed building will
begin. The Whiteman-Deck-
er Co. will put in a large
planer and be ready to run by
the time the railroad is com-
pleted. They will also put in
an electric light plant that will
be up-to-date. Money is al-
ready subscribed for a Nation-
al bank with \$35,000 capital.
There is also men enough
that have pledged themselves
to grow tobacco to secure a
government station for next
year. There is a telephone
line being built with the rail-
road coming to Mt. Enterprise
and an exchange will be put
in as soon as the building be-
gins. Negotiations are now
under way for a first-class
newspaper man to locate and
start an up-to-date paper in
keeping with the town and
county. The country round
about this town will bloom as
never before.—Rusk County
News.

WOODMEN MEETING.

Reports From Camps in The
County Indicate Good Meeting.

April 17 there will be held
in the city of Nacogdoches a
meeting of the Woodmen

Nacogdoches' crack team will
put the work on for the vis-
itors.

Getting Improved Stock.

that in the long run is much
cheaper to raise than the
common breed. The latest
to get improved stock is Mr.
J. V. Edwards. He received
this week a fine Jersey from
the Riverside Jersey Farm
and will in the future raise the
best of stock.

Mill In Operation.

Mr. A. V. Simpson of Gar-
rison was in the city Saturday
on a business trip. He stated
to the reporter that the new
mill of Simpson & Harris was
completed and in operation.
The mill is located on the
"Windy" road about nine
miles from Garrison, and right
in the heart of some of the
finest timber in East Texas.
The mill has a capacity of
30,000 feet per day.

THE city council will have
the streets posted and the
houses numbered within the
next few months.

LARGE ORANGE GROVE.

Part of 31,000 Acres Near Brown-
ville to Be Put Out.

Brownville, Texas, April
5.—Thirty-one thousand acres
of land have recently changed
hands at Raymondville, 40
miles north of Brownville.
Of this tract 12,000 acres were
sold to Chicago parties, the
balance being sold to the
Town and Improvement Com-
pany lands at Raymondville.
The balance, 19,000 acres,
was sold to Illinois parties
for colonization purpose.
In addition to this a company
formed with \$100,000
capital for the purpose of
planting out a large orange grove.
Experts have pronounced
this section superior of Cali-
fornia for orange growing and
great development is confi-
dently looked for in the near
future.

Saw Mills.

The past few months has
been principally monopolized
in a business, way, with the
erecting of saw mills. In this
city a number of business men
have either made them side
issues along with other inter-
ests or are giving their entire
attention to them. Lumber
is at its maximum now and is
as profitable an investment as
as one will find. The last
one about to begin operation
is being placed south of town
below Reed's pond. L. C.
Bailey and Bowen Smith are
the promoters. The capacity
will be about 10,000 feet aday
and with these men pushing
it will become quite an im-
portant factor in this neigh-
borhood.

Order of Commissioners' Court.
Declaring the result of Prohibition Election and forbidding the sale of Intoxicating liquors in Nacogdoches County.
Nacogdoches, Tex., March 19, '06
Whereas, the Commissioner's Court of Nacogdoches County, Texas, at a special session of said court held on the 19th day of March, 1906, opened the polls and counted the votes of an election held throughout Nacogdoches county on the 8th day of March, 1906, for the purpose of determining whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors should be prohibited in said county of Nacogdoches, and it appearing to the court that said election was held in conformity to the laws of the State of Texas and the court having counted the votes, found that (1599) fifteen hundred and ninety-nine votes were cast "For Prohibition," and (953) nine hundred and fifty-three votes were cast "Against Prohibition," and that a majority of the votes are "For Prohibition."

And, whereas, said court declared and ordered that the sale of intoxicating liquors is absolutely prohibited in Nacogdoches county, Texas, except for the purpose and under the regulations specified in the laws of the State of Texas, until such time as the qualified voters of said county of Nacogdoches, at a legal election held for that purpose, by a majority vote, decide otherwise.
Therefore, I, Robert Berger, in my official capacity as County Judge of Nacogdoches County, Texas, do hereby order that said order of the Commissioner's Court of Nacogdoches County be published as the law requires, in The Nacogdoches Sentinel, a weekly newspaper published in Nacogdoches County, Texas.

AMENDMENT TO LAW.**Gillett of California Hopeful of Securing Its Passage.**

Washington, April 7.—Representative Gillett of California is hopeful of securing the passage at this congress of a bill amending the bankruptcy law as to make traveling salesmen preferred creditors along with workmen, clerks, city salesmen and servants of the bankrupt. The federal courts have decided that the original act is not broad enough to include traveling salesmen. The judiciary committee to whom the bill was referred has made a favorable report, in which it says:

"Traveling salesmen being away from home a great portion of the time have not the opportunity of protecting themselves as other employees of the bankrupt have. There is no opposition to the bill from any source. The creditors' association over the country favor the amendment, saying that it is just, and request that it be made."

The amount of the claim preferred is limited to \$300 and must have been earned within three months prior to the bankruptcy proceedings.

On top of the big increase which is bound to come the legislative appropriation for next year is \$20,000 less than what it is for this year, and this of course will put this great state institution in a bad way. The only recourse left for the faculty will be to turn students away.

California on the west, Missouri on the north, Tulane on the east, and the City of Mexico on the south are the only universities anywhere near Texas, and that explains why the attendance is increasing so rapidly.

\$500 CASH BOND.**The Young Man Charged With Swindling Gives Bond.**

G. P. Blancand, the young man who was arrested at Athens and brought to Nacogdoches on a charge alleging that he had by fraudulent means secured \$98.50 from the firm of Miller & Irion, was released from the custody of the sheriff yesterday afternoon on a \$500 bond made through the Commercial National Bank.

The reporter called on Mr. Blancand this morning and found him to be quite a pleasant young man. He stated that his house was in a position to do everything set forth in the contracts as were made by the advance agents, "if the house cannot do it I am willing to forfeit the \$500 deposited with the Commercial National Bank."

The proposition the Oilo Manufacturing Co. makes to the merchants is something like this: The Oilo Manufacturing Co. sells the merchants a certain number of picture frames, one lot costing \$1 each and another \$2 each. The company agreeing to enlarge pictures for the merchant at \$1.50 each. The merchant agreeing to give an enlarged picture to customers who spend as much as \$15 in cash, the only condition to the free gift, being that the customer would have to buy the picture frame from the merchant paying \$2.50 for the dollar frame and \$3.50 for the two dollar frame. By this scheme the merchant would be out nothing for the picture and frame.

In the course of a week or ten days the frames arrive and the collector calls and gets the price of the frames only. Blancand is only a collector for the company and is not an advance agent.

BREHAM MILL MAKES MONEY

Annual Dividend of Eight Per Cent for Stockholders.

Brenham, Texas, April 4.—The Brenham cotton mills began operations about September 1, 1903. They now employ about 100 hands, run 5000 spindles and 170 looms, consume about 1500 bales of cotton per annum and turn out about two and a half million yards of cloth annually. The amount paid out for wages is about \$30,000 annually, which is all spent here in Brenham. The amount paid for freight on goods shipped is about \$4000 per annum. Interest and taxes amount to about \$3150 annually. During the year 1905 the mill made a profit of over \$12,000, or approximately 8 per cent on amount invested, and the mill is now being run at a fair profit.

It is estimated that the manufactured cloth brings about 6 cents per pound more than the raw cotton, so the 1500 bales of cotton consumed by the mill net the town of Brenham about \$45,000 annually. At the last annual meeting of the stockholders the board of directors were authorized to issue bonds sufficient to double the present capacity of the mill, which they probably will do some time this summer. The mill now has enough cotton on hand to run it for several months. Altogether the outlook for the future of the mill is encouraging.

DEFENSE OF NATION.

Coast Defense Board Proposes to Better Protect Capital

Washington, April 4.—The creation of an artificial island in the middle of the entrance to Chesapeake bay is proposed by the joint board on coast defense as absolutely essential to the defense of the national capital and Baltimore, Norfolk, Newport News and even Richmond. Daring exploits of Japanese naval captains during the recent war convinced army engineers that it is no longer safe to rely on defenses at Fort Monroe to control the entrance to Chesapeake bay.

The board concluded that the island could be erected to command Norfolk side of the present main channel, and the only proper site for this fortress is to be on what is known as middle grounds. The water is shoal, but there is no land above tide and therefore the government must dump into the bottom of the bay, as it did when it built ripraps for the entrance of Hampton Roads, until foundation is secured for the defense.
