IN A DYING STAGE.

Divorced Wife of Brodie Duke Succumbing to Nervous Collapse.

New York April, 14.—Mrs. Alice Webb Duke, divorced wife of Brodie Duke, is dying of genral nervous collapse. Dr. Willard H. Rogers, who has attended Mrs. Duke since she was taken ill, said today: "Mrs. Duke is a very sick woman. She has had two or three very severe hemorrhages within the last few days. I have little if any, hope for her recovery."

Mrs. Duke, who was Mrs. Alice L. Webb, was married to Brodie L. Duke Dec. 10, 1903. Three weeks later Duke was torn from his bride at the Park Avenue hotel and later confined to Bellevue hospital. From there he was removed to a sanitarium on Long Island. A commission declared Mr. Duke sane and he was released.

Mrs. Duke was arrested and confined to the Tombs for 16 days on a charge of grand larceny, preferred by the authorities of Nacogdoches county, Texas. When requisition papers failed to arrive she was released.

Mrs. A. C. Ireson and little daughter, of Nacogdoches, started home this morning, but stopped over at Garrison for a day or two. They were accompanied by her mother, Mrs. T. J. Todd—Timpson Times.

A SAD ACCIDENT

The Little Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Sharp Killed.

Last Saturday evening there occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Sharp a peculiar and sad accident. Mr. Sharp had put up a wire fence around his place and there was a piece of a bundle of the fence wire in the yard. The children were in the yard playing with the piece of wire. The little boy was standing on the bundle of wire and his sister was standing in front of the roll. He jumped off and as he did the wire whirled over, and the loose end struck the little girl on the forehead over the right eye, one of the prongs from the wire entering the skull.

The child fell to the ground with a scream, and the little boy seeing that his sister was hurt ran into the house and told his mother that "Vaila was hurt" and then tried to phone for a doctor. Mrs. Sharp ran into the yard and found the child in an unconscious condition. She picked her up and took her in the house.

Mr. Sharp had left the place only a few minutes before the accident occurred. He was breaking in a new horse and was out exercising the horse. The little boy ran down the road to where his father was and told him what had happened, and then came to town for a physician, but before the arrival of the physician life had passed from the little body to the great beyond.

Mr. Sharp is mail carrier on Route No 2, and the patrons of the Route will join The Sentinel in extending condolence to the family in thier sad hour of affliction.

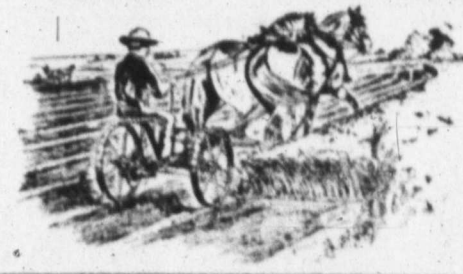
Wash Mitchell in jail

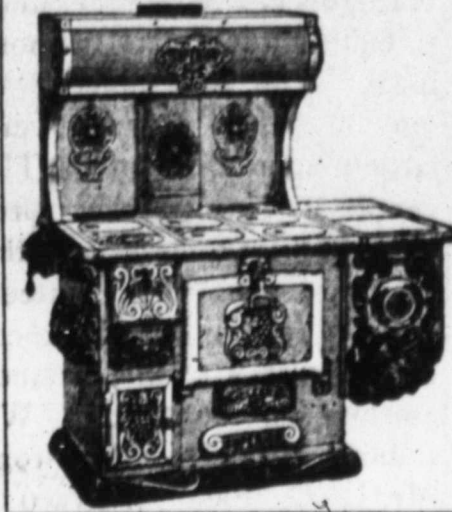

FIELD crops that were not caught in the late freeze are looking extra fine.

The city council should look after the posting of the streets and the numbering of the houses at the next regular meeting of the body.

NACOGDOCHES people after viewing some of the work turned out by the Nacogdoches Show Case and Manufacturing Co. should be proud that such an institution claims this city headquarters.

To prove that the Nacogdoches oil field is a good thing, an expert driller has agreed to put down a test well and the proposition he made the Business League is meeting with favor where ever presented.

WHILE making calculations to improve the condition of affairs as they now exist, on the farm, make a notation of the fact that a well bred stock is one of the items that should be placed on the list of wants.

As the Business League has taken up the matter of investigating what here is in the Nacogdoches oil field, there may be something doing there within a very short time that will demonstrate that there is a fine field there.

REPORTS from farmers who have engaged in tobacco culture this year in Nacogdoches county is to the effect that their plants are in fine shape and that prospects are that the this year will be the finest crop ever raised here.

THE city council will have to hurry up the matter of having the houses numbered and the streets posted. Nacogdoches is entitled to free mail delivery now and the matter should be attended to at the earliest possible time.

THERE are divers and sundry rumors of what the Business League will do for the welfare of the city. If you have the interest of the town at heart, make it convenient to attend the next meeting of the League and have your name enrolled as a member.

THE prospects are exceedingly bright for a genuine oil boom to hit this section square in the face at an early date, and the people of Nacogdoches will have to get ready to take care of the rush when it comes. Just when it will arrive depends entirely upon how liberal some of the Nacogdoches capitalists subscribe to the fund that is now being raised to sink a test well in the field.

UNLESS the governor intervenes, Nacogdoches will have a neck tie party next Friday. Simon Spencer furnishing the main feature of the attraction.

KEEP on talking of the good things in this county for the homeseeker. Write to the folks in the old states and tell them how the people of Texas are eating garden sass at this time of the year while the people in the states farther north are keeping close to the warm side of the stove.

TALK up a cotton mill. Nacogdoches is an ideal location for such an enterprise, and there is enough cotton produced in this county alone to keep a first-class mill busy. In the meetings of the Farmers' Union this question could be discussed with profit. The farmers, or cotton planters, of this county alone could raise the necessary amount to put a cotton mill in operation.

THERE should be located somewhere in East Texas a cotton mill, and Nacogdoches should be the place for the mill. Farmers should become interested in this, for it is to their interest to have a mill in this section of the state. It is no longer an experiment as to whether a mill is a paying proposition. Other places have made reports on mill properties, and they show a good healthy condition, and in nearly every instance, the reports show that the mills were being enlarged to take care of the increasing trade.

THE farmers of Nacogdoches county are getting in shape to live at home this year. A number of the enterprising farmers have purchased small canning plants and they say that they will put all the vegetables grown on the farm this year for their own needs and will have a few cases left to be sold. The idea of the home canning plant is good and The Sentinel would like to see every community in the county that has plenty of fruit have a small canning plant. When the market is glutted with fruit and vegetables the canning of the surplus fruit and vegetables in every community will be a great help in the way of getting good prices for the fruit later on.

PROPER efforts will be put forth very soon to get the Nacogdoches & Southeastern to build into Oil City without delay. The development of our oil fields depends very largely upon this road. The people of Nacogdoches provided in their contract with the Hayward people for sixteen miles of road and will expect the completion of this distance as early as practicable. We publish today a letter from Mr. J. C. Field of Waco of The Brownie Oil & Pipe Line Co., which shows that several oil companies organized expressly to operate in and around Oil City are anxious to develop their holdings as soon as they can get an outlet. It is to our interest, it is to the interest of the Hayward people, it is to the interest of every body that the road be extended into Oil City at the earliest practicable date.

Dear Sir: Your article to The Sentinel on the oil situation was timely and to the point. I do not understand why you live business men are not more active along the lines suggested by you. It is a well established fact that there is oil in paying quantities in the Oil City field and there are several companies organized expressly to operate in and around Oil City. Our company, the Brownie Oil & Pipe Line Co., owns several small tracts located around Oil City and we are anxious to develop our holdings as soon as we can get an outlet for our oil, but do not care to commence operations under present conditions. Indications are that if the Nacogdoches road is not extended these small companies will get together and develop their holdings and build a pipe line and it would be quite likely it would be to some other point than your city. By proper effort Nacogdoches should be able to handle every barrel of oil produced in this territory. We are not beginning on any gushers, but expect to sink a number of wells in bunches that they may be cheaply pumped and we it can get from 25 to 50 barrels a day from each well we will be satisfied. Order of Commissioners' Court. Declaring the result of Prohibition Election and forbidding the sale of Intoxicating liquors in Nacogdoches County.

Nacogdoches, Tex., March 19, '06. Whereas, the Commissioner's Court of Nacogdoches County, Texas, at a special session of said court held on the 19th day of March, 1906, opened the polls and counted the votes of an election held throughout Nacogdoches county on the 8th day of March, 1906, for the purpose of determining whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors should be prohibited in said county of Nacogdoches, and it appearing to the court that said election was held in conformity to the laws of the State of Texas and the court having counted the votes, found that (1599) fifteen hundred and ninety-nine votes were cast "For Prohibition," and (953) nine hundred and fifty-three votes were cast "Against Prohibition," and that a majority of the votes are "For Prohibition."

And, whereas, said court declared and ordered that the sale of intoxicating liquors is absolutely prohibited in Nacogdoches county, Texas, except for the purpose and under the regulations specified in the laws of the State of Texas, until such time as the qualified voters of said county of Nacogdoches, at a legal election held for that purpose, by a majority vote, decide otherwise.

Therefore, I, Robert Berger, in my official capacity as County Judge of Nacogdoches County, Texas, do hereby order that said order of the Commissioner's Court of Nacogdoches County be published as the law requires, in The Nacogdoches Sentinel, a weekly newspaper published in Nacogdoches County, Texas.

The defendant being unable to employ counsel the court appointed T. B. Lewis, A. T. Russell and G. B. Layton to defend Waggoner. WOODMEN ORGANIZE

Nacogdoches Log Rollers' Association Had a Time.

TWENTY THOUSAND KILLED

Severe Earthquake Destroys the Business Portion of San Francisco.

Special to The Sentinel.

Houston, Texas, April 18.—Just as the news has been flashed across the continent that Mt. Vesuvius has become calm, and the statisticians are compiling the history of the eruption, its duration, and the damage done to the surrounding country, the information was received in this city at the cotton exchange, that a most disastrous earthquake occurred at San Francisco early this morning, and destroyed a large portion of the business section of the city. Twenty thousand people are reported to have been killed and many thousands injured—the exact number of dead and wounded will not be known for several days.

As to the amount of damages done to buildings and stocks of goods will run up into the millions several times over.

The people of San Francisco had no warning of the approaching danger and the quake came as a clap of thunder from a clear sky, and occurring at the time it did, about 7 a. m., it caught many thousands going to their places of business.

The people are panic stricken and the outgoing strains over lines which have not been damaged are crowded with people who fear that a repetition of the earth's troubles will occur again.

Wires are down and communication cut off.

Special to the Sentinel.

Dallas, Texas, April 18.—Fire has been burning in the ruined district of San Francisco since the earthquake this morning, and a special from Los Angeles states that the fire department has gone to the stricken city. The water supply, however, in San Francisco was completely wrecked in the earthquake and the fire is ranging with no prospects of quenching it.

San Francisco, Cal., 2 p. m.—Valencia Hotel between 17th and 18th streets piled into streets burying 75 people in debris.

Crevice on Valencia Street six feet wide car tracks torn and twisted. Earthquake shock felt across continent the Seismograph at Washington recording each shock. No way of recording number dead, some reports reach into thousands. Santa Fe round house and machine shops at point Richmond across the bay has collapsed, flames spreading and unless wind changes nothing can prevent destruction entire city; rapidly approaching Western Union building, and Associated Press offices, when expected all communication with outside world shut off.

Two Reported Dead and About Thirty Others Injured.

Bertram, Texas, April 12.—The town of Briggs, eighteen miles north of this place, in this county, was visited by a cyclone about 5 o'clock this afternoon and almost completely destroyed. Two reported killed, and thirty injured.

The cyclone was preceded and followed by a heavy rain and hailstorm. Crops were considerably damaged. The path of the storm was southwest to northwest. The town contains about 250 inhabitants and is situated in the best farming districts in Burnet county.

THE CONTRACT LET.

For The Extension of The Santa Fe to Timpson.

Mr McDowell a prominent citizen of Timpson, was in the city today and made the statement that Mr. Griggsby told him that he had the contract to build the Center and Timpson extension of the Santa Fe, and had ordered two hundred teams from the Territory with which to do the work. Mr. Griggsby further stated that the teams would arrive and work would be begun within the next thirty days.

Some people are inclined to the idea that it would have been impossible to have awarded a contract until a survey had been made and the line adopted. Sufficient proof to offset this theory is the fact that several surveys have been made in the past from which a basis for the estimate could be easily made.

The management have made the statement that they will finish the work in eight months from the time of beginning, hence if a beginning is made by the 15th of May trains will be in operation by the 15th of January.

It will probably take about the same length of time to build the Pickering mill, and it, too bids fair to begin construction about the same time as the railroad. Altogether, there will be something along industrial lines around old Center this summer, and the old town will be some larger than its present proportions this time next year.—Center News.

THE FILIPINOS GETTING WISE.

They Are Able to Commit Crime or Forgy Already.

Washington, April 13.—A sample of Filipino cleverness and imitateness has been unearthed at the war department in the course of examination of some old claims by the church authorities for the property alleged to have been destroyed by American troops in the early days of the insurrection.

The church authorities in this particular case alleged that some of their valuable herds of cattle had been stolen by American troops, while this claim was met by the charge that the insurgents seized the cattle. In support of the latter statement was what appeared to be a pass issued in due form by General Stanley, commander of the eight division, in February, 1901, to Belluzar Ramon and 20 fellows who alleged that they were sample herders, but were charged with having really stolen the cattle from the church.

A curious feature is that this pass in every line is executed by pen, although the body of the document is supposed to be clean English printed characters. The imitation was so clever as to almost defy detection and this would not have been the case save for the curious idiomatic blunder made by the forger whose mission was set out in the pass as "for the purpose of, to buy biffs, horses and caribo."
