Colmesneil, Texas, May 12.—The Texas Central is putting in a long distance telephone line from Nacogdoches to Beaumont. The linemen reached Colmesneil yesterday and say that the work on this line will be completed in 30 days. This new line will add much to the convenience of business men and the general public, as the service on the long distance has been very unsatisfactory for several months, communication with Corrigan and all towns along the line of the M., K. & T. having cut off.

The service between Woodville and Colmesneil has again been discontinued.

The new line of the Texas Central will end all troubles of the East Texas people along the line of the T. & N. O. railroad.

APPLEBY LOCAL NEWS.

A Party Returnig From A Meeting Badly Hurt.

Appleby Texas May 13.—Yesterday afternoon as Mesdames S. R. Coon, E. C. Coon, M. Hill, T. B. Carlton, W. M. Green and Mila More were returning from a meeting of the Ladies Aid Society, the team they were driving became unmanagable and ran away. The wagon struck a fence with such force that the occupants were all thrown out. Mrs. S. R. Coon was hurt so badly that she is not expected to live through the night, her left arm was broken in two places between the elbow and wrist, her shoulder badly bruised and two bad gashes cut on her head. Mrs. E. C. Coon, Mrs. T. B. Carlton and Mrs. W. M. Green were all badly bruised, but not seriously hurt. Mrs. E. C. Coon and Mrs. Hill both had their babies with them and Mrs. Coon's baby has several severe bruises on it, but is not thought to be seriously hurt.

It is almost a miracle that all were not killed. The wagon was torn to pieces. The wreck occurred within 100 yards of the square and within a few minutes a crowd reached them and the worst bruised were carried to nearby houses and medical aid secured. Walter Roark, son of Mrs. S. R. Coon reached here this morning. Two other sons, W. R. Roark and E. C. Coon can't be reached by wire and have not heard of their mother's serious condition.

With a modern tobacco packing house in Nacogdoches there will then be a market for the Nacogdoches tobacco. The packing and warehouse is a certainty.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

It was last winter that there appeared to be a question whether farmers could be induced to raise tobacco under Federal supervision about Nacogdoches. A tobacco firm offered to take all the tobacco raised under such supervision, and the papers intimated that it was hard to get the farmers to engage in the business. It now begins to look as if the farmers mentioned were converted to the tobacco idea. This is good news. The Agricultural Department at Washington long ago declared that as good tobacco could be raised in Nacogdoches County as could be raised anywhere. Indeed, some men connected with that department were so impressed with the adaptability of the soil to this plant that they resigned and went into the business. The product heretofore raised in that locality brought a fine price, and it sounded strange to hear that some difficulty was experienced in getting the people to embark in a business so profitable. But if they are going to have tobacco warehouse it is sure that they are going to have tobacco.—Dallas News.

"The people of the Second Congressional District will show by their votes in the primary that they disapprove of the theft of nominations.—Beaumont Enterprise, Friday, May 4th., 1906."

The above item taken by itself, indicates that the old Enterprise is advocating honest politics—good if true. But don't talk too big brother Enterprise. Sexton in 1892, and has been vigilant in seeing to it that no nominations have been stolen since that time, though in doing so she has once since learned well that she had no boy's job while preventing it.

The Burglars.

As a rule, the public or the people of the counties look to the local press for the local news and expect to get it correct, but it seems by some hook or crook, facts are not given and erroneous ideas are formed. Every laudable act of public officials as well as private citizens should be commended as an endorsement of the press and to encourage in others in worthy acts.

The midnight burglar is one of our most dreaded and dangerous characters. They will burn towns and private residences and even commit murder to cover up their crimes. They operate in shadow of the night when honest people sleep. The Cushing burglary should have more than passing notice and the officers who have taken special interest in the case should have all the credit that they are entitled to. This pair of burglars are a daring and dangerous couple who go armed with deadly weapons to protect themselves against officers and honest men, and Mat Spradley and Will McMillan run a risk of their lives when they approached these armed negroes not knowing their character. One of them is an old offender who has escaped from the penitentiary and judging by articles he was selling previous to the Cushing burglary, he is a professional burglar, his partner admits that he does nothing but gamble.

Simon Mintz induced me to go with him to Cushing but when I arrived there I took no apparent action as I did not want to interfere with the work or plans of the other officers. I realized that the officers were going to accomplish nothing, and without an intimation to anyone except Lee Carter, who printed me circulars describing these negro burglars, I called up Mat Spradley and City Marshal Matthews at Jacksonville and requested them to guard both ends of the road that night, and not till next morning did anyone except Carter, Mat Spradley, McMillan and Matthews of Jacksonville know anything about my plans. Had Mat Spradley refused to carry out my instruction these burglars would have went their way rejoicing and innocent white men at Cushing held under suspicion.

The public would believe from what was printed in The Sentinel that three white men are connected with this crime, and while the sheriff is chasing these imaginary white burglars, there is none in this crime. These two negroes alone did it.

The negro in jail is named Sam Smith, is a railroad section hand and his father lives at Denison. The one that escaped is named Lee Thornton, was sent to the penitentiary from Dallas and escaped from Cunninghams farm; mother lives at Palestine makes his home in Shreveport under the name of Charley Johnson, age 28 years, black; 6 feet 3 inches high; weighs about 180 pounds; has large scar on neck; wears blue jumper little finger on left hand been broken and has knot on it.

The location of the deep well to be bored by the Frazier Oil Co. is an excellent one. It is less than one half mile south of Oil City, within 200 yards of Oil Springs branch and about one hundred yards from the right-of-way of the Nacogdoches & Southeastern railway, and but a short distance from a shallow well standing full of oil and running over.

After deep oil had been struck on Spindle Top very few people believed that gushers would be struck anywhere else. On acres of land a hole dug with a spade two feet deep will fill in at the bottom with oil and dug twenty feet deep will stand several feet in oil and be agitated violently by escaping gas. Only shallow wells have yet been sunk, and our gushers, like a great many unfortunate men, have never had a chance to show the world "how big" they are.

There are several loci in the Nacogdoches oil field and the land owners around each of them would be willing to give options at low prices and leases on a great number of acres to any oil company that will sink a deep well. Hun-

dreds of men and many oil companies have holdings around Oil City and many of them are ready to begin development. The Frazier Oil Co. blazing the way is but the beginning of bigger and better things.

Chicken Chatter.
 Don't forget the ax after you have tried all other remedies. Don't misrepresent in making sales. Don't fail to advertise when you have stock and egg to sell

Don't allow the males to run with the flock except when breeding. Don't have small poles nor wide boards for roosts, a two by four set on edge is best.

Don't have dirty nests, nor nests exposed to the light. Don't deprive fowls of plenty of fresh air during the day.

Don't crowd your fowls on the roosts. Don't keep fowls after they are two years old.

Don't feed damaged grain. Don't forget to clean the dropping boards once or twice a week.

Don't forget to kerosene the roosts and whitewash the walls and nests occasionally.

Don't forget to have plenty of grit, oyster shells, charcoal, ground bone and fresh water before your fowls continually. Eggs cannot be produced from nothing.

Don't forget that silted coal ashes, not wood, are good for the hens to dust in and to eat.

Don't hesitate to exhibit your stock at the fairs and poultry shows; it is the quickest way to find out where you are at.

THE people of Texas last year paid \$11,679,682 as premiums on life insurance, and \$6,347,714 for premiums on fire insurance.

A FAIR and honest discussion of candidates and political questions is good for the people and the candidates themselves, but abuse is not wanted at any time.

A. J. Spradley Announces for Sheriff

Every American citizen, born or naturalized should feel proud of his citizenship, as this is the freest country on earth, where every free man has the right to follow the dictates of an honest conscience, where it does not hamper the rights of others. An Irishman returning from the United States to his native country, said, the "United States and especially Texas is a great country, and inhabited by great people, every man there is as good as every other man and some times, a darn sight better."

As there is no measure applied to a man's fitness to run for office, and believing that I am about as good as the other fellow, take advantage of the situation and hereby announce my self a candidate for sheriff, subject to the democratic primaries. For this action I expect to hear some criticism by designing persons, but for the past I have no apology to offer. I believe in the democratic principles of our fathers regardless of what banner they float under.

Some people believe that offices were created just for the purpose of a job for some one and want to give it to the fellow that needs it most.

Sheriffs ought to prevent crime when he can and not encourage it. Every crime that is prevented is saving the cost of prosecution and often the lives and property of the people.

The criminal class operate where the chances are the least to be caught. In my opinion trained dogs with the knowledge how to operate them prevents more crime in a county than would an armed policeman at every cross road, however, some people object to hunting criminals with dogs.

Every country have their criminals and some of the worst born criminals are being turned loose daily from the penitentiaries. It is said, "once a criminal, always a criminal."

I believe every officer should do his full duty and enforce every law on the statute books as far his duty extends and think the oath that he takes ought to be a sufficient pledge that he will do so, but as the local option law is the hardest to enforce and the one that is violated most, I want to say that if I am elected sheriff that I will give that law my special attention and run down every bootlegger that operates in the county if it is possible for me to do so, and to make his punishment the more severe I will see that he is presented to the Federal court when the county is through with him.

I don't wish to say anything that would unjustly reflect on the present officers, but if all the crimes that have been committed in Nacogdoches in the past 12 months were made of record it would astound the people. For which few have been accused or arrested. There has been enough property destroyed by the incendiary match to pay the sheriff's wages for ten years. I have no inclination to criticize Mr. Buckner as he has done as well as most any new man. It is not every good man that can successfully preach.

Some men are endowed with certain faculties and other none. There are born warriors, born poets, machinists and musicians, and etc.

Take my friend A. W. Daniels, he is a natural singer, an admiral gift. Singing has softened the hearts of more sinners and saved more souls than all the preaching. I can't sing at all. Let Mr Daniels go on with his good work.

Mr. Buckner was born a machinist and has handled machinery until it has become second nature with him he can listen to the escaping steam and tell it there is the least friction where it ought not be. If I ever put up machinery I will try and get Mr. Buckner to run it but would never employ him as a man catcher.

Bill Campbell, the old type of a true Southern gentleman, a good man and good farmer, the most useful men in their place in the country, the kind of men our country boys should pattern after on the farm. No better judge of a mule in Nacogdoches county than Bill Campbell. It is said that he can hear a jack bray a mile away and correctly tell you his pedigree. We need more Bill Campbell's Jim Haltom's and Dunk Spradly's on the farms to keep up the country.

There is my friend George

Blackburn, an honest, brave, handsome fellow, a man who would back his judgment with his last dollar. If I had to compete with him in a game of chance I would never back my judgment on the run of the cards but would surrender the jackpot without a contest. George spends lots of money with the farmers for their fat yearlings and if he is elected sheriff the price of yearlings will go down and the farmer will be the looser, better keep George right where he's at.

Now there is Tom Brown I had like to forgo, but the jolliest fellow in the jolly lot. He is the prince of good fellows and while it seems he was not intended for a warrior, a poet or preacher, yet he is a safe fellow that never gets too high or too low in life. He ought to have made an excellent officer if he had been intended for such as he was raised in the sheriff's office under his father and has held office most of his life, but he was trained in the old school when the mails were hauled around in ox carts and the neighbor women carried around the local news. In this fast age when people travel by electric cars and the news is flashed over the wires with the speed of lightning, it is a little too quick for Tom's makeup, but Tom is alright and can pull a bigger load with a pair of Texas ponies than most men could pull with a pair of Missouri Norman draft horses. TWO WERE KILLED.

Steve And John Beason Dead Near Conroe.

Conroe, Texas, May 9.—This morning at Beach, a saw mill located about two miles east of Conroe, Steve and John Beason were shot and instantly killed by Harry Bendy, the foreman of the mill. The Beasons had been working at the mill for a long time and were accounted good workmen. Yesterday they made trouble and were discharged, which greatly angered them.

This morning they returned to the mill and undertook to close it down, driving away many of the hands. Bendy used every persuasion to induce them to leave and they appeared partially mollified, but shortly thereafter they started to drive the foreman away also. They were advancing upon Bendy with drawn knives when he fired with a shotgun at short range, dropping both of them and they died almost instantly.

Justice of the Peace M. C. Kelly held the inquest and examination result in Bendy being released upon \$300 bond in each of two cases, wherein he is nominally charged with manslaughter, but the evidence adduced at the examination goes to show self-defense.

Bendy stands high in the community and has many friends who regret the necessity for the tragedy, but have no doubt of the outcome of the trial.—Houston Post.

Robber Captured

From Friday's Daily:

When the officers arrived at Cushing yesterday they found that the burglary of Sim'n Mintz's store was the work of amateurs, and they were not long in finding a clue.

The officers phoned City Marshal Spradley late yesterday evening, that the robbers were headed this way and to look out for them. They said it was negroes, and that they were carrying the goods with them.

Marshal Spradley and Constable McMillan went beyond the tank and lay in wait for the robbers.

They were not long in waiting for soon, two negroes came along with socks on their backs.

The officers commanded them to halt, and upon the threat of death one was made to lay his pistol down. They carried them to the light plant to question them and examine the contents of the sacks, when in front of the light plant door, one of the negroes dropped his sack and broke to run, when only a few steps away, Marshal Spradley fired at him with a shot gun. The negro fell to his knees, but immediately recovered and ran off into the woods. Constable McMillan came to town and placed the other negro in jail.

In the meantime the blood hounds were phoned for, and put on trail. The dogs took the trail at the light plant and tracked him about two miles in a circle finally coming back to Wm. G. Reid's old soda water plant. The trail was lost for a time, but was finally taken up and followed up Taylor ave., and Hospital street a short distance, and then lost.

After losing the track, the officers brought the goods to town, and also had an interview with the prisoner in jail. The negro in jail said that there were three white men up the railroad with the rest of the things tied up in dresses but this is thought to be false. Upon examination of the sacks the officers found that the sacks contained light suits of clothes, several pairs of shoes, handkerchiefs, silks ladies skirts, and other articles too numerous to mention. The negro in jail, when arrested, had two new white hats on his head.

The officers watched the junction, and both trains but found no trace of the other robbers, that is if the negro story is true.

The officers are on look out and will probably capture the escaped negro and others who are suspected of being connected with the robbery, today.

A Tribute to Hardeman Perkins

Hardeman Perkins was born in Giles county, Tennessee, February 10, 1823. In 1846 he was married to Elizabeth Barham. In 1834 he joined the crowd of home seekers which was drifting towards the Southwest and made his way to Rusk county, Texas. He settled first at Caledonia in that county, where he lived one year. He then moved to Glenfawn in the same county, and a few years later to what is now known as Laneville. In 1893 he moved to Nacogdoches, where his sons were already engaged in business, and there he lived until his death on April 26, 1906.

It was a strenuous life that Hardeman Perkins lived. In attention to private business or in the discharge of public duty he was always energetic, decided, and forceful. He was essentially a man of action and it would be hard to find one that more nearly filled the measure of his opportunity. Unwavering in his convictions and brave and strong in their support, he became a leader in his community and a promoter of every good and beneficent social enterprise. No man was firmer in his integrity, none more uncompromising in his devotion to what he regarded as right, and withal none that was more generous in his affections and his charities. In all the relations of life, as husband, father, friend, and citizen, his ideals as manifest in his own character and conduct were eminently high and noble. Absolutely sincere himself, he was at times perhaps too careless of being misunderstood. This, however, was only because he did not recognize the judgment of men as final, but knew that appeal would always lie to the supreme tribunal of Eternal Justice.

There was a time in the life of the subject of this eulogy when his faith wavered, and he saw beyond the grave only a great mystery with but a slight gilding of hope; but long before the end he was convinced of his error and came to look upon the approach of death with perfect resignation. May the grief of the loved ones he has left behind be tempered by the reflection that he is not dead, but has only fallen asleep to await the Master's call.

God give him the rest of which, while yet living, he knew so little, and the peace which falls with the divine benediction "Well done."

Small Coins Scarce.

Washington, May 9.—Unless congress comes to the rescue, there promises to be a shortage of small change in all parts of the country that are distant from the United States treasury at Washington. The cost to the government of ending minor coins to various parts of the country ranges from \$25,000 to \$30,000. Congress had appropriated only \$18,000 for this expense for 1906, and this appropriation has been entirely exhausted.

Secretary Shaw has asked for an additional appropriation of \$10,000, and advises that unless this appropriation is promptly made he will have to notify the public that no more minor coins can be sent out by the government at its own expense.
