YOUTHFUL BURGLARS.

Four Boys Locked up on Charge of Burglary.

Late yesterday evening P. C. Richardson reported to A. J. Spradley that some one had broke into his house on the Banita creek south of the square, and requested Spradley to take his dogs and put them on the trail. From sun down till dark the dogs kept up a lively chase, up and down the creek, over logs, railroad trestles and such places as rambling boys resort to. The trail was brought to town and four boys, three from Lufkin and one who lives in Nacogdoches were suspected when they were presented with criminating circumstances, one of them broke down and give the whole transaction away. The Lufkin boys were locked up in the calaboose to prevent them from leaving as witnesses and the elder one of the three was soon found at his home by City Marshal Spradley and locked up. These boys told of other burglaries recently committed in Nacogdoches where \$14 was taken at one time and \$12 at another.

ASSESSING CANDIDATES.

Heavy Drains on Aspirants for Office Under the New Law.

Austin, Texas, June 26.—Candidates for state offices are being hit hard in some of the counties. They are being notified to send in some cash if they want to get their names on the ticket. The attorney general has ruled that if the cash is sent in by July 2 it will be in ample time to assure the candidate that his name will appear on the ticket.

Most of the counties are assessing the candidates \$1 each, and with 224 counties in which elections are to be held, it makes an item of expense that many of the candidates were not counting on when they entered the contest. This, with other expenses attached to the campaign, makes running for office a somewhat expensive luxury.

PACKERS should be required to place the date on every can of stuff they place upon the market.

THE country debating societies are now discussing the question: "When will Colquitt withdraw from the race for governor?"

THE treasury of Texas is again busted, and the holders of the state's paper will have to shave it or wait about nine months for their pay.

THE directors of the Equitable Life Assurance Society at a recent meeting voted unanimously to amend the charter of the society and make it a mutual organization.

THERE is a vast amount of land in Nacogdoches county that would make farms, and there is a cordial welcome awaiting the thrifty farmer who decides to cast his lot in this county.

SENATOR LODGE of Massachusetts says that the packers should be required to place a date upon every label of canned goods turned out from packing houses. The people have the right to know what they are buying.

AN Arkansas man and several of his children were killed a few days ago from eating bologna sausage. If you can't raise your own meat and sausage, better live on vegetables unless you want to see the coffin trust prosper.

UNLESS something is done to check the inroads the trusts are making in this country in the way of grabbing everything, the country by the "tail feathers and a down hill pull" in a few years.

WHAT the country needs right now is a pure food law for the people. In Texas a pure food law was passed for stock by the last legislature. Now let the next legislature pass a pure food law for the public. There has been enough devilment unearthed in the late packing house scandal to cause the people to demand such a law.

TYPOGRAPHICAL Union No. 173, has issued bulletin No. 4. The matter of graft is handled without gloves and to back up the claims of the Union, photographic reproductions of the transactions are printed in the bulletin. If the allegations are true, there is a good shot for some high officials in Texas counties to be ousted from their present official positions.

THE good prices received by the truck farmers of Eastern Texas this year for their products should give the business a good boom for next year. But in planting next year every county truck growers association should study the conditions of the market months before planting time, and plant intelligently. Plant with the view of not flooding the market with vegetables of one variety.

HOME CANNING.

In canning tomatoes the first step is to scald the fruit just sufficient to loosen the skin so that it can be slipped off. To do this, we use a large iron kettle, commonly called a "wash pot." The tomatoes are placed in a cheap tin vessel, holding about one-third of a bushel, that has been punched full of small holes, and dipped into the boiling water and allowed to remain about one minute, or until the skin will slip readily. The fruit is then peeled, sliced and filled directly into the empty cans. The cans must be well filled for good results. This finishes the first step. The filled cans are then passed to the second stage of the operation. The tops of the cans wiped dry with a clean cloth, the cap placed on and soldered around the rim, the small hole or vent in the center of the cap being left open. Then we are ready for the third step, that of exhausting—expelling the air out of the cans. This is accomplished by submerging the cans in boiling water (in the boiler) about two-thirds of their length. They are held there until they come to a boil, or for tomatoes ten minutes. They are then removed, the small hole in the center of the top closed with solder, and the cans are then completely submerged in the boiling water or processed for twenty minutes, which is the fourth and last step in the operation.

Tomatoes, string beans, asparagus, rhubarb, okra, cauliflower, strawberries, blackberries, raspberries, peaches, plums, cherries, figs, apples, etc., can be successfully canned in a somewhat similar manner. Corn and peas can not be successfully preserved in this manner unless the cans are processed—boiling, etc.—for three and one-half to four hours. But even then there will be many losses from swelled and spoiled cans. A bushel of tomatoes will yield about twelve 3-pound cans of finished product. Do not try to figure up the comparative cost of home canning as against the price of the cans you buy at the store. When you can your tomatoes, or other vegetables or fruits, you know what is in the cans. When you buy canned tomatoes or other products, you know only by hearsay what the cans contain—according to the best information, a fair if not generous proportion of hurtful preservatives, poisonous coal tar coloring matter, and the like. Can the home product, therefore, plant enough of the same to supply a canned supply for the winter months.—From report of Louisiana experimental station in Texas, Farmer.

THE REPUBLICAN CALL.

Faithful Summoned By Chairman Lyon to Gather In El Paso.

El Paso, Texas, June 20.—The call for the republican state convention, to meet in this city August 14, is out. It is as follows:

To the Voters of Texas: By direction of the republican state executive committee a delegated convention is hereby called to meet in the city of El Paso, Texas, on the second Tuesday in August, at noon, for the purpose of nominating a state ticket, selecting a state chairman and a state executive committee, and for the transactions of such other business as may properly come before the convention.

No delegate will be seated who is not elected in accordance with the general election laws of the state of Texas, and the rules governing the republican party in this state.

The basis of representation in the state convention shall be one vote for each three hundred votes or major fraction thereof; provided that no organized county shall have less than one vote. (Notice is called to the fact that no provision is made for electing more than one delegate for each vote a county has.) An alternate should be elected for each vote of the county.

The meeting of the state executive committee, which authorizes this call, was held in accordance with the general election laws of the state of Texas, in Dallas, Texas, on June 11, 1906.

A letter of instructions will be issued to party officials in due time.

BANNER TOBACCO CROP.

Shaded Leaf will Yield Approximately 1500 pounds per Acre.

The tobacco crops of 1906 will remove all doubt of the great possibilities of tobacco culture in Nacogdoches—not from a productive standpoint alone, but financially as well.

A representative of The Sentinel visited the Redfield farm today and found more than half the present crop ready for harvest, the Cuban leaf having already been cut.

On the Redfield farm they have five acres under canvass which will be cut Monday, yielding on a conservative estimate 1500 pounds to the acre. The stalks have pushed upwards to the canvass covering nine feet above and the dense foliage makes it almost impossible to distinguish the rows.

Through the courtesy of Mr. J. L. Gill, who has superintended the growing of the present crop, The Sentinel representative was shown over the entire farm which covered all stages of growing from the plants to the harvested crop. The prizes which have been offered in tobacco culture for the present season has caused a great deal of good natured rivalry among the growers, with the chances in favor of the Redfield farm at the present time. Mr. Gill is of the opinion that his 1500 pound production will carry off the acre prize, but it is doubtful if there will be as much as 200 pounds difference in the acre on shaded crops. Many of the wrapper leaves now measure more than two feet and are all in perfect condition.

With favorable weather, conditions and expert attention the present tobacco crop has been as near perfect as possible. In a walk over five acres now ready for harvest, not a dozen leaves could be found punctured or otherwise damaged.

On the Redfield farm they have thirteen acres in cultivation, one-half of the acreage in Nacogdoches county, five acres under canvass and five under slat shade. The Cuban leaf is already being harvested while cutting will begin on the five acres under canvass Monday. The slat shaded is now thirty days old and will be ready for harvest in about a month from now. The present crop outside of its monetary value will be worth thousands of dollars to Nacogdoches county in establishing the industry on a firm basis and removing every vestige of doubt regarding its stability and the profit in its culture. The present crop will demonstrate that the Redfield farm alone is capable of producing more wealth than all the cotton acreage in the county. In addition to that the tobacco market is more stable and the crop a great

deal more dependable. All the industry needs is more men with the skill and ability of Mr. Gill.

The culture is simple, the fear of venturing in the past being due almost entirely to the ignorance of the farmer regarding the crop. Fifteen hundred pounds of wrapper tobacco produced on one acre will yield the farmer \$700 in the barn—an amount equal to fourteen bales of cotton at ten cents per pound. More than that it requires less labor to cultivate an acre of tobacco than an acre of cotton while the excellent condition of the present crop is not only a matter of gratification it will no doubt direct greater attention to the industry and cause a substantial increase in the acreage for 1907.

Dies, candidate for the senate, opened the discussion by stating that he was a democrat and believed in admitting every person, white or black, in the democratic primaries if they would subscribe to the test that they were democrats and would support the nominees of the democratic primaries, but that he did not believe in prohibiting the negro from voting in democratic primaries if they were willing to take the test.

The pledge finally adopted for the participation of all persons, without regard to color, who pledged that they would support the democratic nominees of the primaries

Indiana State Chemist Analyzes Samples of Packers' Art.

Indianapolis, Ind., June 22.—As a result of a trip through the city market, during which H. E. Bernard, chemist of the state board of health, bought 49 samples of sausages, hamburger steak, wienerwurst, bologna, ham loaf, veal loaf, tripe and pigs feet jelly and analyzed them, he found that only 16 samples were legal, while 33 were illegal, because they contained chemicals prohibited by the law.

THREE BONDS ABOUT DUE.

Aggregate \$1,647,000 and State of Texas Will Refund Them.

Austin, Texas, June 21.—State Treasurer Robbins announced today that the state of Texas will, on July 1, refund three of its bonds, aggregating \$1,647,000, which become due on that date. One of these bonds is for \$1,447,000, owned by the permanent school fund; the second for \$165,000, held and owned by the permanent university fund, and the third for \$35,000, held by the Agricultural and Mechanical College funds. These state bonds were issued in 1876 and are 30 years after date, bearing 5 per cent interest.

They are to be refunded with 3 per cent manuscript bonds, maturing 40 years from date, with an option of five years.

HE WAS NOT IN CONTEMPT

Comptroller Stephens Discharged by the Supreme Court

Austin, Texas, June 25.—At special session of the supreme court Saturday it handed down an opinion in the contempt proceedings of Comptroller Stephens growing out of the receivership proceedings of J. F. Salsbury against the Colonial Security Company et al.

The court discharged the comptroller.

The court says: "Our conclusion is that the district court was without power to order the comptroller to draw his warrant upon the treasurer and that, therefore, the order was void. The relator is accordingly discharged."

The court held that the funds being in the hands of the treasurer, they are secure, and that the purpose of the law was, that the fund remain in the treasury until the final adjudication of the rights of all persons interested in it. The court declined to pass on the question as to whether the district court could order the funds withdrawn even after final adjudication.

Comptroller Stephens, it will be remembered, was fined for contempt for refusing to draw his warrant on the treasurer for funds in the treasury.

In South Texas.

Beeville, Texas, June 21.—Dear Sentinel: According to promise, I write you hurriedly of our trip to South Texas and to Dr. Simmons' Ranch in Live Oak county.

We left Nacogdoches on noon train, 10th (negro day), we found everything dry from Lufkin to Beeville. I mean dry for lack of rain. They claim in Houston it has not rained since 18th of March.

The run from Nacogdoches to Houston was monotonous and the country we passed through dreary excepting the saw mills, at nearly every station. The conductor had a time handling the crowds of negroes, only one got killed during the day, that we heard of.

At Humble the numerous derricks boring for oil were in evidence. Oil will be an important industry in East Texas for ages to come.

After spending a night in Houston at a hotel where it was too warm for comfort, we set out for Beeville, a stretch of 183 miles over the prairies. Beeville is a nice little town not quite so large as Nacogdoches. It is at the terminus of one branch of the S. P. R. R. out of Houston and the San Antonio and Arransas Pass, and is surrounded by a good farm and ranch country.

Historic places on this run beginning with Nacogdoches, Richmond, Victoria, Goliad nearby is the old mission house where Fannin and his men were put to death on that ill fated spot.

Our trip has been very pleasant. Will write you again from Simmons' Ranch.

Mrs. Chapman was born in Georgia and was about 56 years of age at the time of her death. She had been an active member of the Methodist church since early girlhood. "JUNETEENTH" IN WEST TEXAS

Del Rio Not a Shining Light in Politics

Del Rio, Texas.—The colored population here took a two days sweat at celebrating the "Juneteenth." There are not many negroes in any of the western towns, and there were hardly enough in Del Rio to make a good show, but the "cullud folks" all up and down the line, from Uvalde to Sanderson were invited and when the "big day" came off there was a surprise to the citizens in the unusually large procession of colored people. There was a great barbecue, a copious flow of oratory and a diversity of entertainment, just as is carried on by the colored people of East Texas.

This is the dullest country politically I ever saw. It seems to be very little interest in the state campaign and not a single announcement has yet appeared in the local papers for county offices. This is due perhaps to the fact that party lines are not drawn here. It would be hard to tell what the political complexion of Val Verde county is, and it is only one of its kind which cover the entire portion of the State between San Antonio and El Paso. A "slate" is made, regardless of the political tendencies of candidates, but usually only the Democratic ticket is submitted to the voter. It is probable that if party lines were drawn the republicans would predominate. It is very common to find a republican whose only answer is, if asked why he is a republican, "I had sheep when Cleveland was President; you know the rest." The sheep men are republican almost to a unit. I have been thinking about getting a sheep ranch, but am afraid it might make a republican of me.
