SAM JONES ON BRYAN.

Says Hearst Is Only Menace to Nebraska Being President

Cincinnati, Ohio, July 28.—Rev. Sam Jones, evangelist, was in Cincinnati today. In the course of an interview he said:

"I have been in over twenty states in the last few weeks and I find that William J. Bryan is more universally popular today than ever. I believe that he will be the only democratic nominee for president in 1908, and that he will be elected.

"William R. Hearst is the only menace of Bryan's candidacy. If Hearst is elected governor of New York, then there will be something doing in the folds of the democratic party.

"On the republican side, Roosevelt is the only one that could beat Bryan, and my observations are that he won't run."

PALESTINE IS ENTHUSIASTIC

Returns from the governor's election were shown by a stereopticon Saturday night and about 1000 people were present to see them.

As all the East Texas and many other counties were given showing that Colonel T. M. Campbell was leading, thunders of cheers rent the air and everybody wild. All the state papers received here the next day were eagerly bought, and the Palestine daily got out a special edition about 4 o'clock Sunday morning and the copies went like hot cakes.

Hon. A. W. Gregg will be reelected congressman from this district, J. J. Strickland will be the next representative.

THE campaign is now over and all that remains is the "hurrah, for hurrah."

SHAKE hands over election differences and let every man in Nacogdoches and the county now get busy and do something for the town and county.

THE Southern Pacific Co. in transferring Geo. S. Bruce to the industrial department has lost a good man in the advertising department. He has kept the advertising of the company up to a high standard, and his successor will have to work early and late to keep it up to the standard George Bruce has made.

THE SENTINEL would like to hear from the readers of the paper, on the matter of a new court house for this county. The old bat roost which adorns the south side of the square is a disgrace to the county and not only that but it is not a safe building. If you write on this subject, sign your name, not as a matter for publication but as an evidence of good faith.

PROSPECTS are that there will be a good crop of ribbon cane syrup made in Nacogdoches county this year, and as there is practically a bumper corn crop already made, the thoughts of hot corn cakes and ribbon cane syrup is enough to keep the average East Texan in good spirits during the hot weather. Yes the cotton crop will be good too.

A FEW days ago the Palestine Herald published as a news item that the tobacco crop of Nacogdoches county would be packed in Palestine. Mr. Freidman of Palestine, and Mr. Gill of this city have a few acres of shade tobacco that will be sent to Palestine to be packed as it has been sold to Tausig & Co. of that place. The Sentinel begs leave to inform the Herald that every pound of cigar tobacco has been promised to the Nacogdoches Cigar Co. of this city, and the president of the company has made all arrangements to have the crop packed here this year.

With cotton bending to the ground with fruit that has practically matured, the people are now assured that there will be a good cotton crop raised this year. With everyone prosperous and the county out of debt, and something like six or seven millions of dollars of taxable property in the county the commissioners court should consider the proposition of placing the matter before the voters of the county to build a new court house. The people of neighboring counties have erected handsome temples of justice, and as the old bat roost on the south side of the square is practically obsolete, it is now time that the voters of Nacogdoches county should build a court house and jail that will be a credit to a county like Nacogdoches.

Precinct Conventions

Last Saturday afternoon Giles M. Haltom, democratic chairman of precincts 1, 2, and 3, held a meeting of the precincts in the county judge's office. Mr Haltom stated that it was the purpose of the convention to select delegates to the democratic county convention, Saturday August 4.

On motion Mr. Haltom was selected as chairman and W. O. Crain selected secretary. Mr. S. W. Blount moved that the chair appoint a committee to ascertain the basis of representation of the three precincts, in the county convention and recommend delegates to the county convention. The motion prevailed, and the chair appointed the following committee: S. W. Blount, C. D. Mims, and C. A. Hodges.

The committee asked for a little time to look up the vote of the precincts at the last general election, which was granted.

The committee made the following report: "We your committee appointed to ascertain basis of representation to county convention, beg leave to report as follows: Nacogdoches, east, 9; Nacogdoches, south, 9; Nacogdoches, west, 6. S. W. Blount, C. D. Mims, C. A. Hodges.

"We your committee appointed to suggest delegates to the county convention from these precincts, report the following as our selection:

Beeson, J. M. Weeks, R. F. Davis, S. W. Blount, E. A. Blount, V. E. Middlebrook, F. R. Tucker, Giles M. Haltom, C. A. Hodges, J. C. Harris, C. D. Mims.

Respectfully submitted, S. W. Blount, C. D. Mims, C. A. Hodges.

Upon motion the reports were unanimously adopted.

No further business appearing, the meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chair.

Finest In State.

W. M. Hinson, the government's tobacco expert was in the city last week from Palestine, and inspecting the crop grown here this year and it is his opinion that the Nacogdoches crop is the finest grown in the state this year.

In this connection it can be said that this crop will not be sent away from Nacogdoches this year. The president of the Nacogdoches Cigar Company has contracted to buy every pound of tobacco grown here this year, and has made arrangements to have the same packed here under government supervision.

What Two Acres Netted Owner.

The man who can make two blades of grass grow where one grew before is said to be a benefactor. If that be true, what ought to be said of the man who makes two acres of Camp county land produce as much as eight acres of black land? He, too, is a benefactor in that he sets an example for others to follow who are trying to learn the short-cut road to an independent living. There are many instances every year of remarkable results from small farms and the Gazette is always glad to publish them. One for this season is reported by Mr. W. W. Turner of Leesburg. He raised two acres of tomatoes and up to last Saturday had canned and sold from less than one-half of the crop \$197.50 worth of the products. He says the remainder of the crop will bring him about \$200, making a total of nearly \$400 from the two acres. The total cost of gathering and canning the crop was a little less than \$80, giving a net profit of \$320, or \$160 an acre. Besides this, he fed twenty-seven head of hogs from the refuse and could have led ten head more. His entire output of tomatoes was sold to a wholesale grocery house of Paris, and Mr. Turner says he could sell ten cars if he had them. He also has a crop of peaches which he will can and which has heretofore proved a very satisfactory crop. He finds a ready market for his peaches and says his fruit is worth about a dollar a bushel more when sold in crates and shipped North.

The Gazette is glad to note the tendency on the part of many fruit and truck growers to can their own products. It is at present an undeveloped industry and when properly managed will mean much for the county—Pittsburg Gazette.

Oil City Leased.

Rumor is current on the streets this morning that the Houston Oil Company, of Houston, had leased 500 acres covering Oil City, in this county to the Higgins Oil Company of Beaumont.

COOPER APPEARS TO HAVE WON

Beaumont, Texas, July 29.—In the congressional race in the Second district the returns to date indicate that S. B. Cooper has defeated M. L. Brooks by a substantial majority of the popular vote, probably amounting to more than 1000. The convention vote is close with Cooper in the lead by one or two convention votes. Mr. Cooper's friends here, in the light of the incomplete returns, think that he has been elected by a reasonably safe majority. Mr. Brooks' friends all but concede Cooper's election. Mr. Geo. C. Greer, brother-in-law of Brooks, stated this afternoon that if Mr. Cooper has carried Shelby county that Brooks is defeated, and the best of information is that Shelby is safe for Cooper.

An analysis of the vote from the several counties in the district in the light of the best information to all parties concerned is about as follows:

Nacogdoches county (5 votes in the convention)—For Brooks by 50 majority.

Orange county (5)—For Brooks by 73 majority.

Jefferson county (5)—Cooper's majority exceeds 500.

Hardin county, (3)—For Cooper by 600 majority.

Angelina county (3)—For Cooper by more than 500.

Shelby county (5)—For Cooper by a bare majority.

Cherokee county (5)—For Cooper by 153.

Panola county (4)—For Brooks by about 700 majority.

San Augustine county (1)—For Brooks by large majority.

Sabine county (2)—For Brooks by fair majority.

Tyler county (2)—Cooper's majority will be large.

Newton county (2)—For Brooks by about 100 votes.

Jasper county (2)—For Brooks by 50.

Harrison county (2)—About a tie with three boxes to hear from.

From a careful computation of the returns from the several counties, the indications are that Cooper has received enough votes to secure his nomination.—Houston Post.

Reaching Dyersville, a small place about 50 miles from here, they bought some canned sausage and ate heartily. Upon arrival here Boone became very ill and lingered for several weeks. An autopsy confirmed the diagnosis that death was caused by ptomaine poisoning.

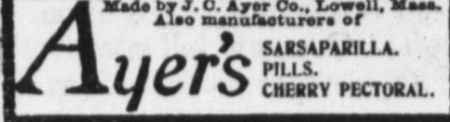

Port Arthur Canal and Dock Company Directors Meet.

Texarkana, Texas, July 27.—A meeting of the board of directors of the Port Arthur Canal and Dock Company was held at the office of Glass, Estes & King in this city. The directors authorized the officers of the company to transfer to the federal government the canal, which extends from Port Arthur to the Gulf of Mexico, together with the docks. This transfer was authorized on the part of the government by act of congress of June 16. It will also result in the government extending the canal from Port Arthur to the Neches river, which will give deep water to Beaumont and Orange, Texas.

In Colorado.

Denver, Colo., July 24.—One of the sensations of the Elks' reunion, in this city, was a visit to the Silver Age-Frankling mines of the Producer Mining Co. at Idaho Springs, 38 miles from Denver. These are among the oldest mines in the United States and are so situated as to be easily accessible to tourists but heretofore have not been open to the public.

The privilege was extended to the Elks of roaming through the underground workings, which consisted of over four miles of tunnels, laterals, drifts, etc., and thousands availed themselves of the privilege of inspecting the subterranean passages of these great properties and breaking out samples of the rich silver and gold ores. The workings show exposed to view over \$10,000,000 worth of the precious metal, the mineral glistening in the roofs and floors of the tunnels and stopes like diamonds.

Every phase of economical mining was demonstrated, from the operations of the hoisting plants by compressed air to pumping water by the same medium from the pumps.

Bore the Elks' Reunion convened, J. E. Manning and W. H. Knowles, the owners of these properties, had extended invitations, through the press, to Elks throughout the country and had arranged for the visitors by having the underground workings lighted, so that they would be presentable and safe during the inspection of visitors. This is the first time, at a Grand Lodge meeting, where the delegates were enabled to inspect mines.

The ore in the majority of western mining properties is so rich in places that at least a portion of the underground workings have been closed to visitors. In this instance the entire property was at the disposal of the Elks for two hours and they were given the privilege of helping themselves to ore in the stopes and pillars or tunnels in all portions the mine. It is estimated that at least \$5,000 worth of ore was carried away by the visitors, each of whom took a specimen home with them.

The trip included a railroad ride through the famous Clear Creek canon and a carriage ride of three miles through Virginia canon to an elevation of over 10,000 feet, or nearly two miles above sea level, where a panorama view showing hundreds of miles of show-capped mountain peaks was disclosed to view.
