THE FIRST BALE OF COTTON.

The New Crop of 1906, Was Placed on Market Today.

From Friday's Daily:

Five days earlier than in any past year, is what the old cotton men said today when the first bale of new cotton for 1906 arrived in the city. It was raised on the farm of B. F. Moore at Chirene, and was raised by Louis D. Miles a negro.

As soon as the bale arrived on the streets this morning T. J. Roquemore started a subscription list around the business houses, and soon had quite a nice sum amounting to something like thirty-five dollars, as the premium for the first bale.

Constable Will McMillan was called on to auction off the new bale. The first bid was made by L. Zeve at 10, it was raised to 10.25, 10.50, 10.75, and then John Schmidt of the firm of Myer & Schmidt bid 11 cents. No further bids being offered it was sold to this firm.

The seed was sold to T. J. Roquemore who bid \$11 per ton.

The bale weighed 540 pounds at the gin yesterday afternoon, and it there is no loss it will bring the grower \$59.40, with \$35 premium and the price of the seed, the first bale of cotton and the seed will represent a value of \$100.

The party was composed of the following gentlemen: M. F. Chandler, John Fountain, John Caney, Chas. Kennard, Bob Ramin, of Appleby, and Hiram Smith of Libby. They expect to spend a month in that section and will return via the Panhandle where they will spend a few days in Wheeler county.

The Tobacco Crop.

The cigar filler tobacco that was grown by the Nacogdoches farmers this year is being brought to the city and placed upon the market, and the Nacogdoches Cigar Company is buying every pound of the weed that is placed upon the market. Wilton Ratchiff, acting for the president of the company is paying the limit for the leaf at this time.

Between four and five thousand pounds of the crop has been placed in the packing house of the cigar company, and there will probably be about two thousand pounds to come in within the next few days.

A trip through the packing house with the expert in charge, Mr. Otto Olson, reveals the fact that the crop in this county this year is the finest grown since the first experimental crop was planted.

It is also the opinion of experts who have closely examined the crop that the leaf raised here this year is by far the finest grown in the state.

The farmers who have assisted in making the growing of tobacco a success in this county should pay the packing house a visit and there see the crop as it passes through the various stages of curing.

NACOGDOCHES county should send a strong Campbell delegation to the state convention. Mr. Campbell carried this county practically solid and his friends here should see that the delegates from this county are died in the wool Campbell men.

THE next session of the commissioners court should order an election for the purpose of issuing bonds to build a new court house and jail. The county needs such buildings as the present ones are totally unfit for the purpose for which they were built.

THE newspapers published in the territory are full of election news since the territory became a state and politically the state went democratic. The Sentinel extends congratulations to its exchanges in the new state upon the success of the party.

NACOGDOCHES has something over six millions of taxable property and the county is in a prosperous condition and the people happy. With all kinds of prosperity in this part of the state, and the county free of all debt it will be an easy matter for the county to build a new court house.

THE SENTINEL has the highest regards for Mr. C. K. Bell, but that campaign manager of his is certainly a peach. The young fellow is claiming that Mr. Bell will receive the nomination at the hands of the delegates who will attend the convention. How in the world the young man can figure it out is a mystery to The Sentinel.

NACOGDOCHES should have a new court house and jail. The court house should be fire proof so that in the event of fire the records would be safe. As it is, should the present building burn, the property holders of this county would be more than likely thrown into litigation that would cost the people of this county thousands of dollars.

Prospects are that there will be a good crop of ribbon cane syrup made in Nacogdoches county this year, and as there is practically a bumper corn crop already made, the thoughts of hot corn cakes and ribbon cane syrup is enough to keep the average East Texan in good spirits during the hot weather. Yes, the cotton crop will be good too.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

It will take all of that to make the people down there forget that hot political campaign, but when they get to eating that good old ribbon cane on some hot flap jacks they won't care much about who is representing them in congress.—Sherman Register.

THE CONGRESSIONAL CONTEST.

Hon. S. B. Cooper has defeated Hon. M. L. Broocks for the congressional nomination of the Democratic party. Both were on the fair list of the Legislative League, and Mr. Cooper doubtless received the votes of quite a number of labor unionists, but organized labor certainly can not and does not claim the credit of his election. A great majority of the trades unionists voted for Mr. Broocks, and have no favors to ask of Mr. Cooper on the ground of having supported him.

As to what consideration they may expect from the member in the next congress, it will depend entirely on what strength and unity they may exhibit in their demands. Mr. Cooper is not an especially bad man, nor an especially good one; he is simply a politician, and, like all of his kind, will respond with more or less alacrity to the popular will. In the absence of any special pressure from the common people, he will doubtless serve the interests which secured for him his nomination—and that not organized labor.

If organized labor unites, educates, seeks alliance with the great mass of the common people, they will get all they demand from their public servants; if they do not, they will get all they deserve.

As to the defeated candidate, it is needless to say that he is as worthy and popular now as he was a month ago. The result of the primaries is an incident which leaves on him no reproach or stain, and in no way affects his character or ability. He will be heard from again.—Beaumont Common Sense.

The politicians have tried very hard to get the Farmers' Union tangled up in politics this year, but it "was no use." The farmers have profited by the experience of their organizations in the past and refrained from taking part in political matters. The individual members will exercise the right of suffrage guaranteed them, but as a body there will be no politics in the Union.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

During the campaign it was a common occurrence for hints to be dropped by the "workers" for each candidate to the effect that the Farmers' Union was for their man. The Union being quiet in regard to what it does and is going to do, these "workers" could with impunity represent the organization as they saw fit, since no one was in a position to dispute what they said. But when the vote is scanned now it appears that the Union membership voted as each member thought best, and that they did not go to the polls in droves and vote for any certain man. All of which the people note with great pleasure. For no organization, outside of political parties can succeed if it embarks in a political struggle. The Farmers' Union has most effectively crushed the allegation or that it is under the leadership of politically ambitious men. If it has failed in any place to do this it should do it at once.—Dal-Gal News.

Mr. Bryan would like to have the presidency, but he would not get it by unclear or corrupt methods. Mr. Bryan doesn't want anything with dirt on it, and he is right.—Sherman Register.

It was issued during the reign of Carolus III. The coin created considerable interest when exhibited and the old stories about the Spaniards having had a lot of money in Nacogdoches county years ago is being revived.

SCHOOL FUND APPORTIONED
Per Capita Will Be Only \$5 This Year.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 1.—At a meeting of the state board of education today the controller and state treasurer submitted estimates of receipts of the available school fund for the next scholastic year as follows:
From tax rolls... \$2,500,000
Land sales and leases 1,000,000
Interest on bonds... 500,000
Occupation taxes... 250,000
From Bowser bill... 80,000
From Kennedy bill... 35,000
School tax of unorganized counties... 5,000
Estimated balance in treasury October 1, 1906... 85,000

Total... 4,455,000
The total estimated scholastic population of the state for the same period is 870,515 or an increase of 71,840 over the scholastic population of last year. This increase is partly due to the new law, which requires the enumeration of children between 7 and 8 years of age. Today the state board declared a per capita apportionment of \$5 for the scholastic year beginning September 1, 1906, and ending August 31, 1907. This apportionment for each of the 870,515 scholastic aggregates \$4,352,575 and exceeds the total amount apportioned last year by \$159,531. If the receipts should later justify it, a supplemental apportionment will be made. The apportionment last year was \$5.25 per capita.

ATTWATER AFTER DATA

Taking a Trip Over The Texas & New Orleans

Prof. H. P. Attwater, chief of the industrial department of the Sunset Route is making a trip over the Texas & New Orleans from Beaumont to Dallas for the purpose of securing available information relative to farm lands mining territory fruit statist and other useful knowledge to be used in inducing settlers to come to this region. He will spend several days on the trip and upon his return will be in possession of accurate data that will be of great aid and assistance in volunteering information relative to that section of the territory traversed by the Sunset line of Texas. Any data gathered by him will be available to prospective settlers in that section the aim being to establish them there with a working knowledge of conditions under which they will have to labor. Professor Attwater is peculiarly fitted to work along these lines, having had years of experience in doing emigration missionary work in connection with his other duties with the railroad company.

It is the opinion of Professor Attwater that in certain counties along that part of the Texas and New Orleans road lie inexhaustible quantities of iron ore and other mineral deposits that will make the independent fortune of the man or men who exploit them. Heretofore the necessary information has been more less hard to procure, but after this trip over the territory it will be easy for any one to get all the pointers he needs with reference to what will be encountered in that section. It is understood that Professor Attwater's researches will include everything that may be of value to incoming settlers, and upon his return he will leave the work in other hands to be continued until the full compilation of available information is completed. This, as stated, will apply to all the settlers in the early stages of settlement of the lands.

It is recognized that it is a territory which ought to be built up and is hardly receiving the attention it deserves from investors or possible settlers. Why this is so can not be explained, unless, as adduced by the railroad men, there has not been an outlet for that section until the Sunset completed its line through it. Now that it is completed, however, there is to be a strenuous effort made by the Sunset to land settlers for that territory instead of permitting all of them to go to Southern and Western Texas, as has been done for years past. As asserted by a well known passenger official, the trouble will be in a short time that instead of there being plenty of land for all comers, there will be hardly enough to go around. It is in anticipation of a demand for high grade farm land or mineral deposits that the Sunset has placed its expert on the work of gathering what information is wanted.—Beaumont Enterprise.
