The convention was a regular black and white and tan affair, and the reports from Houston state that the delegation was ninety per cent negro.

### NEGRO TROOPS ON WARPATH

Garrison Breaks Loose, Killing One Man and Wounding Another.

Brownsville, Texas, August 14.—An outbreak of negro troops from Fort Brown occurred last night at 12 o'clock. Volley after volley was fired down Main street. Twenty-three shots entered the residence of Louis R. Cowen and quite a few through the residence of F. E. Stark. Mounted Policeman Joe Dominge had his firearms and hand shattered and his horse killed under him. Frank Natus, a barkeeper at the Ruby saloon was killed. A Krag-Jorgensen bullet passed through his heart.

A couple of brick were shot out of the wall of the Miller hotel very near the window where guests were sleeping. Great excitement prevailed last night, but all is reasonably quiet.

After leaving the garrison the negroes took direct course up the alley back of Elizabeth street. There are many conflicting stories as to the cause of the outbreak. People came from all directions with guns and pistols.

Dallas, August 15.—(Convention Hall)—The convention convened this morning at 9:30 as per adjournment, with Hon. Howard Templeton of Sulphur Springs in the chair. When the convention was called to order, Governor Lanham was called to the rostrum and in one of the hottest speeches of the year, he defended his record, and poured hot shot into the camps of the opposition, just about the time the governor was under good headway, Senator Chas. A. Culberson came into the

convention hall, and when the senator made his presence known Governor Lanham was cried down.

Senator Culberson then addressed the convention and scored the whiskey traffic and one would believe that the senator thought that the whiskey element was trying to dominate the convention. The Colquitt forces were exceedingly wrathful over the remarks of the senator and there is all kinds of rumors afloat as to what effect his speech will have upon the nomination of the next governor of Texas.

The Campbell forces are urging nomination speeches but the convention is in such an uproar at this hour (2:40) that it is hardly probable that anything will be done this afternoon.

The nomination of Hon. T. M. Campbell is now practically conceded by every one in attendance on the convention.

**THE SENATORIAL RACE.**

The withdrawal of Judge Ingraham from the race for state senator leaves the delegates from this county free to vote for their choice of the three excellent gentlemen who are now in the race. The total number of votes received by the three candidates remaining in the race is 631, this divided by the convention vote (5) represents that every 126 votes represents a convention vote, and when the vote is prorated among the three candidates, will be as follows in this county:

Kellie.....96

Total vote.....500

As the Terrell election law does not provide for the selection of first and second choice the delegates are free to cast their vote as they deem for the best interests of the district.

It costs something to run for governor. Mr. Tom Campbell has filed his expense account, it foots up to the snug sum of fifteen thousand dollars.

PROSPECTS are now that the democratic party will be united in the next campaign, and that William Jennings Bryan will be the candidate of the entire party.

THE intention of the Terrell election law is all right, but there are some sections in this law that makes it the biggest thing a candidate or the people ever run up against.

THE oil boom will probably strike the oil field some time during the winter. There are several big, rich, concerns making preparations to begin work in the field at once.

WHILE the boll weevil has not done as much damage to the cotton crop this year as last, yet the rainy weather is causing a lot of the grown bolls to rot before opening.

To increase the pay of the members of the legislature without cutting down the representation, will put about \$80,000 in red ink on the other side of the ledger. Additional taxes will have to be raised, or the representation, cut down before Texas can pay legislators \$1000 for the first session.

Now then if the road will but build the line to a connection with the other roads entering the city, and build a depot down town, the people will feel satisfied for having contributed to the bonus for the road.

**MUST LIVE ON LAND.**

Homesteaders Who Swear They Do and Do Not May be Indicted.

Austin, Texas Aug. 10.—The attention of Attorney General Davidson has been called to the fact that many men who have purchased State lands as actual settlers have made affidavit to the State Land Commissioner that they were living upon the land, when in reality they make their homes elsewhere. Attorney General Davidson today announced that all parties who are guilty of this offense are subject to indictment and prosecution for perjury in the District Court of Travis county. He has ordered an investigation into the matter and as soon as he receives reports of the names of those who have been thus violating the law he will lay the matter before the grand jury. It is said that there are a great number of this class of offenders scattered through the western and southwestern portions of the State. Instances have been reported to Attorney General Davidson of men who made affidavit to the Land Commissioner that they are living upon the land as homesteaders when as a matter of fact they were living in some town many miles away. Attorney General Davidson says that this condition of affairs is one of the greatest evils of the present land system of the State and that the law requiring the purchasers of the land to be actual settlers must be lived up to. It is probable that if those parties who are thus holding land obtained from the State unlawfully will vacate title to same at once they will save themselves from prosecution; or at least, that this fact would be taken into consideration by the Attorney General in passing upon their respective cases.

EVERY now and then the report reaches this office that a farmer has gone to some other section on a prospecting trip, with a view of bettering his condition. This is one of the privileges accorded every man who lives in Texas—he can go whenever he gets ready provided he has the funds to pay his way. But after carefully reviewing the situation over it does appear strange that a man would look for a better location than Nacogdoches county.

**THE FARMERS' UNION.**

Executive Held Interesting Session—Will Copyright Union Label.

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 8.—At an executive session yesterday afternoon crop reports were heard and the general trend of the reports was of a very optimistic kind.

It was decided that the union label now used by the organization should be copyrighted.

The president announced the following as a constitutional committee: M. C. Fields, Falls county; W. Q. Connolee, Eastland county; Tom B. Taylor, Coleman county; R. S. Terrell, Hunt county; J. D. Bond, Grayson county.

The appointment of a convention committee was also announced.

President Calvin's address was a review, in part, of the work of the year. In regard to a union label he said:

"Every farm product when put on the market should bear the union label. This label should be a badge of honesty and a guarantee that the package bearing it is honestly put up. Every bale of cotton sold by union men should have attached to it a union label. Nothing will do more to advertise the union and give it standing with the spinners throughout Europe than this.

It is to the mutual interest of the cotton growers and the cotton manufacturer that the staple shall take the most direct route from the field to the factory and as little expense as possible shall be incurred from the beginning to the end of the journey. It is also a matter of vital importance to both the producers and the manufacturers that there shall be stability of price and demand which can only exist for one when they exist for both. As a result of the Washington conference we have the assurance of the manufacturers of cotton that the matter of direct marketing is a question that is entirely with the producer. In other words, it is only a question of getting ourselves in shape to sell and deliver the goods. There is but one way to do this, and that way is through a properly organized warehouse system."

He urged that no more cotton be sold in the seed and that cash be paid for ginning. He criticized what he designated as the oil trust and said that early next year this matter must be taken up and pushed through.

"Every county, union in the state which is strong enough should buy or build an oil mill and where a county union is not strong enough two or more counties should be put in a district for this purpose," he said.

"Every union man in the district or county should have an interest in the mill. The profits to the stockholders should come from the increased value of seed, and for this reason all union men in every county or district should be interested and own a small share in the mill."

President Calvin gave his hearty indorsement to the cotton warehouse movement. "It means," he said, "that

the time will come when the farmer will place his cotton in his warehouse, take his receipt and meet his obligations with them, close the door, turn the key and say to the manufacturer, "If you want to spin my cotton you must pay a just and equitable price for it." It means that the farmer will come into that independence of which he can never enjoy as long as he is compelled to sell his products on the auction block. It would be difficult to say how many warehouses will be ready for operation this fall, but I confidently believe that the number will reach 150 or 200."

He also said that the grain growers of Texas must build and own their elevators and sell their grain in a business like way.

THE three amendments to the constitution have been published in all the leading papers of the state and the people will have to vote upon these amendments at the next general election. Read these proposed amendments and then vote as you think best.

From Judge Ingraham.

To the Democracy of the 14th. Senatorial District."

The figures I have show that in the Primray election held on July 28th. E. I. Kellie received 3053, votes, E. B. Pickett Jr. 3049, votes, W. W. Dies 2714 votes and I, 2448 votes for senator, and the law being, that the candidate receiving the least vote shall be dropped from the convention upon the first ballot, I do not care to cause the convention so much trouble and believing it would be wrong for me to get the nomination of the convention through any combination I therefore withdraw from the race for Senator. I am still in favor of prohibition, a white-man's primery, that excludes the negro, a broad and liberal policy towards all educational matters, of not repealing the occupation tax law until some better method is found of raising the same amount of taxes, of the "Pay-as-you-go Policy" of liberality towards all of the Asylums for the unfortunate, and the Confederate Veterans, of good roads, of giving all corporations a living chance and compelling them to obey the law, of a pure food law, of giving all laboring men an equal showing before the law, of a blanket primary that will furnish a democratic candidate with a majority of the party that nominates him, in economy in governmental affairs, and the enforcement of the law; and am un-qualifiedly opposed to the issuance of free passes to any officer of the Government, to nepotism, and the proposed amendment increasing the pay of members of the legislature. I am grateful to the democrats of my county for the thousand majority they gave me and to all others that voted for me and regret that the democrats in the other counties did not know a "good thing when it was presented to them." I am glad that I made the race, although I did not make a strenuous canvass, but I enjoyed the whole thing, and retire

with the best of feeling towards all other candidates and the voters. I hope hereafter that a blanket primary system will be used that will let the nominee know that a majority of his party is in his favor and not furnish him the poor consolation of knowing that 75 per cent of the voters in his district are in favor of some other man as this hybrid system of a primary election at the bottom and a convention at the top does. I have no control of the 2450 votes received in the primary, nor the five and a fraction votes I have in the convention, if I had I would vote them all for E. I. Kellie. I voted for him in the primary, and think he is the man who ought to be nominated, if my strength does not go to him it will be contrary to my judgment and against my wish. So far as Nacogdoches county is concerned, her interest is in the hands of her delegates, S. W. Blount, D. K. Cason, W. U. Perkins, T. J. Williams and V. E. Middlebrook leading representative men of the county and they will take care of it. They are under no instructions how to vote, but will vote according to their best judgment, which I would risk in any thing that would concern me. Hoping whatever is done in the Senatorial matter, will be for the advancement of the democratic party, and for the good of Texas, assuring you, that I will do my best to elect the nominee and to make his service an honor to him and a benefit to you and thanking you for your consideration of my candidacy.

**WINE OF CARDUI**

**FOR SUBSIDIARY COINAGE.**

The Government Will Purchase Silver Tenders Are Invited.

Washington, Aug. 9.—For the first time in thirteen years the Government announced today its purpose to purchase silver for coinage purposes. Tenders are invited at the office of the Director of the Mint on Wednesday, the 15th inst., up to 1 o'clock p. m. and every Wednesday thereafter until further notice. These tenders are to be for delivery at the Philadelphia, New Orleans or Denver mints, settlement to be on the New York basis of bullion guaranteed 999 fine.

The Treasurer reserves the right to reject all tenders or accept such part of any tender as may suit its convenience as it is understood, that anticipating that its appearance as a purchaser might temporarily disturb the market unduly the treasury has already obtained considerable amounts for future delivery so that it is in position to drop out of the market for several months if desirable. The average requirements of the treasury throughout the year will probably not exceed 100,000 ounces per week, and it will be the policy of the department while keeping a reasonable amount on hand to so distribute its purchases throughout the year that its demand will be uniform and not be an element of uncertainty in the market.

For the resumption of specie payments in 1879 down to the year 1900 the constant increase in the stock of subsidiary coin required by the growing population was supplied by the recoinage of old and uncurrent subsidiary coins which accumulated in the Treasury under the resumption act. In 1900, as this stock was running low, authority was granted in the monetary act of March 14, to the Secretary of the Treasury to divert bullion purchased under the act of July 14, 1890 for the coinage of silver dollars to the coinage of subsidiary pieces. Under this authority about \$33,000,000 has been coined since 1900.

The stock of bullion in the Treasury was exhausted more than a year ago, and since then no bullion has been available for the subsidiary coin-

If the matter of selecting a candidate for governor was left to the delegates from Nacogdoches county they would give the nomination to Mr. Campbell on the first roll call.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 30, is the date set for the arrival of Mr. W. J. Bryan from his tour around the world. There will be something doing in national politics from the date of his arrival until the election of a president in 1908.

It is estimated that the people pay the steel trust nearly \$10 for each family. If this estimate is correct what is the toll exacted by the other 186 combinations legalized to rob the people of the United States under the present tariff?

NACOGDOCHES county has over six millions of taxable property rendered on the rolls of the assessor, and to issue bonds for the erection of a new court house and jail would be a matter that would not be felt, even by the poorest tax payer in the county. At a very extravagant estimate the tax would not exceed six or seven cents on the hundred valuation. It is estimated that about five cents will build the court house and jail.

## THE NOMINEES.

The democratic nominees have all been selected by the voters of Nacogdoches County, and in several instances the nominee was chosen by an overwhelming majority; others by close majorities. While some excellent gentlemen were defeated in the primaries, it is to be hoped that the successful candidates, when elected, will discharge the duties incumbent upon the several official positions to which they were chosen, with credit to themselves and their constituents.

SAMUEL BYERLY is a clerk in the American Express company's offices in New York City. When Secretary of the Treasury Shaw called for bids for Panama canal bonds, Byerly sent in his bid. In the terms of the bond call, no deposit was required as an evidence of good faith, so all that was necessary for Byerly to do was to write his bid, address it to the secretary of the treasury, and spend two cents for a postage stamp. In the award Byerly was given the canal bonds, amounting to \$15,806,000, and was notified by the treasury department to have his money forth coming August 1. He sold his option to a New York firm, reaping a profit thereon, amounting to \$20,000.

THROUGH the courtesy of Prof. H. P. Attwater of the Southern Pacific Co. The Sentinel has received a copy of the special edition of the Uvalde Leader-News. The edition is gotten up in a book form and contains forty-eight pages and cover. It is a handsome piece of work and is profusely illustrated. The Uvalde country is well written up, and to those who desire to locate in the southwest, this special edition will be of great benefit.

The first copy is a splendid paper from the view point of the Union, and contains many good articles ably written on subjects that are of interest to every farmer in the state and south.

THE Bryan boom will take on a good head of steam when the great chiefs of the party welcome the Nebraskan back to the United States. The boom has been simmering along in a half hearted manner for some time, but after the speech making at the banquet and reception in New York a little enthusiasm will be injected into the boom.

THE democracy will have to do something with the present tariff law. That law needs revising, and that badly. The cost of living has been steadily advancing for the past ten years and today the people of this country are paying about fifty per cent more for everything they use than they did in 1897.

## POOR MAN IS BARRED.

By Terrell Election Law From Being Governor of State.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 13.—The recent primaries held in the state of Texas demonstrated the fact, which is already apparent to many, that in future a poor, or even a man of moderate means, can never aspire to the honor of being governor of Texas, unless, of course, he does not mind ruining himself financially. Under the Terrell election law the candidates for all offices in the state are required to file an itemized account of their campaign expenses, and those filed by the four candidates for the office of governor show plainly that not one of the four candidates will get back what he expended on the campaign. The lucky candidate in the state convention this week will get at the outside \$8000 out of the office for the two terms and this will leave him from nearly \$2000 to \$7000 in the hole at the end of his term or two terms.

According to the sworn statements made by the four candidates in the recent campaign, Colonel Campbell spent \$15,666.88, Judge Brooks \$13,852.54, Commissioner Colquitt \$9806.50 and Judge Bell \$9734.65. Thus it will be observed that not one of these candidates will get out of the office the amount spent in getting it. As only one candidate can get the nomination there will be three who will be out the total amount expended, besides the disappointment and the year or two of work in stumping the state in the contest.

This condition of affairs will more than likely be looked into by the next legislature, as unless something is done, it will be only the rich who will be able to afford the luxury of running for governor of this great state. There is already some talk here of the introduction of a bill during the session of the Thirtieth legislature to increase the salary of the chief executive of this state to \$10,000. Similar measures have been introduced in previous legislatures, but in each instance these bills have died on the calendar. All the recompense that the successful candidate for governor gets is the honor of being and having been the governor of Texas. The honor, however, is dearly bought, as none of the former governors of Texas, at least in recent years, have come out of the executive office with enough money to buy a railroad ticket to their old home.—Houston Chronicle.

### Placed in Jail.

Chas. Hightower, a gentleman of color, was arrested yesterday by Deputy Sheriff G. H. Hall and placed in the county bastille on a charge alleging the carrying of concealed weapon. There are several other charges placed opposite the name of Hightower and when he settles with the court in full for the violations of the law he will be much wiser concerning the manner in which the laws are enforced in this county.

**MURDER AND SUICIDE.**

**Tom Bean Husband Killed His Wife and Then Himself.**

Tom Bean, Texas, August 13.—About 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, J. W. C. Wilder, who lives about half a mile east of Tom Bean, killed his wife by braining her with a smoothing iron, and immediately shot himself with a shotgun, inflicting a fatal wound. The charge of shot entered his left side about midway between the lower rib and the top of the hip bone, and a little to the front, and ranged upward, disemboweling him.

The tragedy was witnessed by three small children. The room where it took place was spattered with blood and presented evidence of a struggle. The woman's throat was gashed, apparently with a knife Wilder can only live a few hours. The spectacle of the three small children was indeed pitiful.

The eldest of the children, a boy about 7 years old, with his younger brothers, made their way to the house of a married sister, who lives in Tom Bean, and gave the alarm.

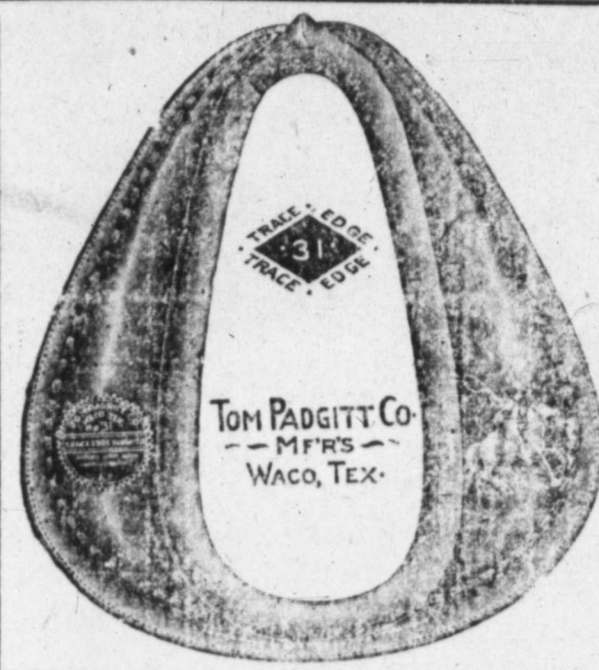

### THE WATERS-PIERCE SUIT

Attorney General Is Preparing Petitions in the Case.
