### Made a Profitable Haul.

Yesterday afternoon sixteen sons of Ham were arraigned before Justice J. M. Jones on a charge of "shoot-in' craps." Deputy Sheriff G. H. Hall and City Marshal Spradley made the raid. Each of the sixteen entered a plea of guilty, and the judge placed the amount of the fine and costs at \$19.80 each. Three of the sports had enough money to pay off the indebtedness and were given their liberty.

The others had to give convict bonds for the amount of their fines.

One of the negroes also has a pistol "toting" charge pending against him, and for this he was fined \$72.50. After totaling up the days work the justice found that his court had taxed in fines and costs against the sixteen sports the small sum of \$389.30.

### DISTRICT COURT.

Court Convened this Morning With all The Officers Present.

From Monday's Daily:

District court convened this morning with Judge Perkins on the bench, District Attorney Imboden, Clerk R. W. Murphy and Sheriff Buckner present.

The following is the grand jury for the term: Chas. Hoya, foreman; J. F. Tucker, Joe M. Fuller, John Lowery, Jr., W. R. Stripling, D. W. Bruce, J. P. Fountain, B. Y. Lloyd, Joe Martin, J. B. Owens, J. P. Bruton, Ed Hogan, Sr.

After the jury was sworn Judge Perkins delivered his charge to them. The heavy expense of conducting the court was called to the attention of the grand jury and yet they were cautioned not to let economy interfere with the thorough investigation of all the matters coming before them.

The oath of the grand jury was reviewed. There was a great tendency on the part of some to fail to recognize the importance of it. The grand jury was the representative of the people of the county. In this county they represented some twenty five or thirty thousand people, and the duty of the grand jury was to ferret out the crimes committed and protect the citizens of the county.

The prohibition laws was called to the attention of the jury, and they were instructed to investigate every violation. The local option law was one enacted by the people themselves, and every good citizen should bow to the will of the people when they have enacted a local law themselves. The bootlegger was an irresponsible person and was not entitled to sympathy at all.

The pistol "toting" habit was referred to and the grand jury was cautioned to look into this bad habit. Perhaps the older ones were guilty of the habit from a "force of habit" while the younger generation was guilty of the habit because they thought that it would increase their social standing in the community, and with their friends. If these young fellows were required to spend thirty days in jail for one offense they would hardly be guilty of the second offense.

The road law was called to the attention of the grand jury, and they were requested to investigate where the road overseers had been guilty of neglecting their duty, and it found to be negligence, to bring the guilty parties to an accounting, this would be the only way to get good roads. There are some pretty good fellows in this county as road overseers, but they have some mighty bad roads.

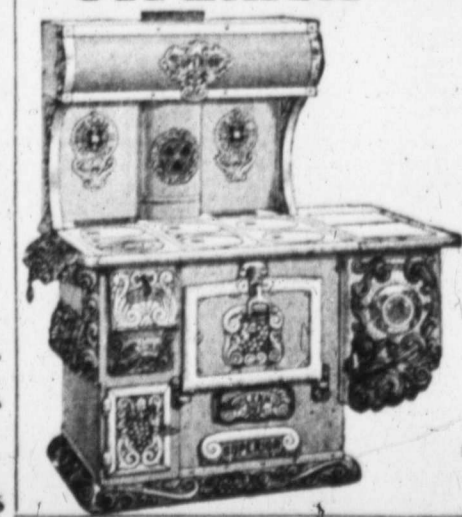

THERE are merchants in Nacogdoches who take care of their advertising just the same as they do their stocks of goods, and it is not necessary to point out to the stranger who are advertisers in this place.

ONE feed of corn will not fatten a horse, and it is just the same in business. One feed of advertising will not keep the stock of goods moving.

THE president of the Southwestern Louisiana Industrial Institute, says that the Filipino is a negro and he will not permit them to enter the school. Good for the president of the Louisiana school.

COL. CAMPBELL has left the state for thirty days to take a rest. He will have plenty of good hard work on his hands when the legislature meets, and the rest will do him good. He must remember that it will be four years before he will have a day of rest after he takes his seat as the governor of Texas.

### FALL PLOWING.

Dr. S. A. Knapp, special agent in charge of the Bureau of Plant Industry of the United States, has issued circular No. 30 "Suggestions for Fall Treatment of Soils," from which the following is taken:

A thorough preparation is half the cultivation. Deep fall plowing is one of the best means of preparing for the next year's crop. Loamy or sandy soils that are well drained and so situated that they will not wash are best broken flat. This breaking should be deep and is the best done with a disc. In the absence of a disc a two or three horse turning plow will answer.

If the land is inclined to wash this can often be prevented by terracing. It impracticable to terrace then break such lands in good high rows that circle the hill. Close, sticky land—like post oak and all lands that need drainage—should never lie flat but always be thrown into ridges, the higher the ridges the better. Fall plowing allows the cold of winter to penetrate the soil, aiding in the dissolving of plant food and at the same time the cold of winter kills many insect enemies and reduces their ravages another year.

The subjection of the land to the alternate freezing and thawing action of winter makes close tight lands loose thus insuring a better seed bed for the next crop. Fall plowing enables the soil to absorb and store up the winter rains, placing a larger quantity of moisture at the disposal of plants the next year mitigating thus the effect of drought.

Lands subject to the ravages of the boll worm and boll weevil are especially benefitted by deep fall plowing. The boll worm hibernates in the soil and this plowing exposes him to the cold and wet—conditions he cannot withstand. By deep plowing we mean nothing less than eight inches.

The exceptions to this rule are lands that have been merely scratched over for a period of years. In this instance there is some danger of bringing up too much inert matter. These instances are rare however and are entirely obviated when the disc plow is used. Not only should the land be plowed in the fall, but if it is to lie fallow during winter the benefit would be even greater were this breaking repeated at least once or twice before the spring crops are put in. This insures a thorough airing of the soil and better tilth. To get the full benefit of fall plowing lands that are stiff or inclined to run together should be well drained. Otherwise water will clog them and prevent free access of air.

THE next session of the commissioners court should take up the matter of a new court house for this county. Think of a county with something like six millions of taxable property and the county out of debt, and the officers of the court compelled to do business in the old shack on the south side of the square. The good men who have been selected as jurors for this term of court should take note of the condi-

tion the old bat roost is in, and when the matter is submitted to the people, they will be able to tell their friends just how much the county is in need of a court house and jail.

EARLY in the spring Col. E. A. Blount and others offered prizes to farmers who would plant tobacco for the market. The judges will be ready to award the prizes within the next few days, and those who have promised prizes will please be prepared to pay the same as soon as the awards are made.

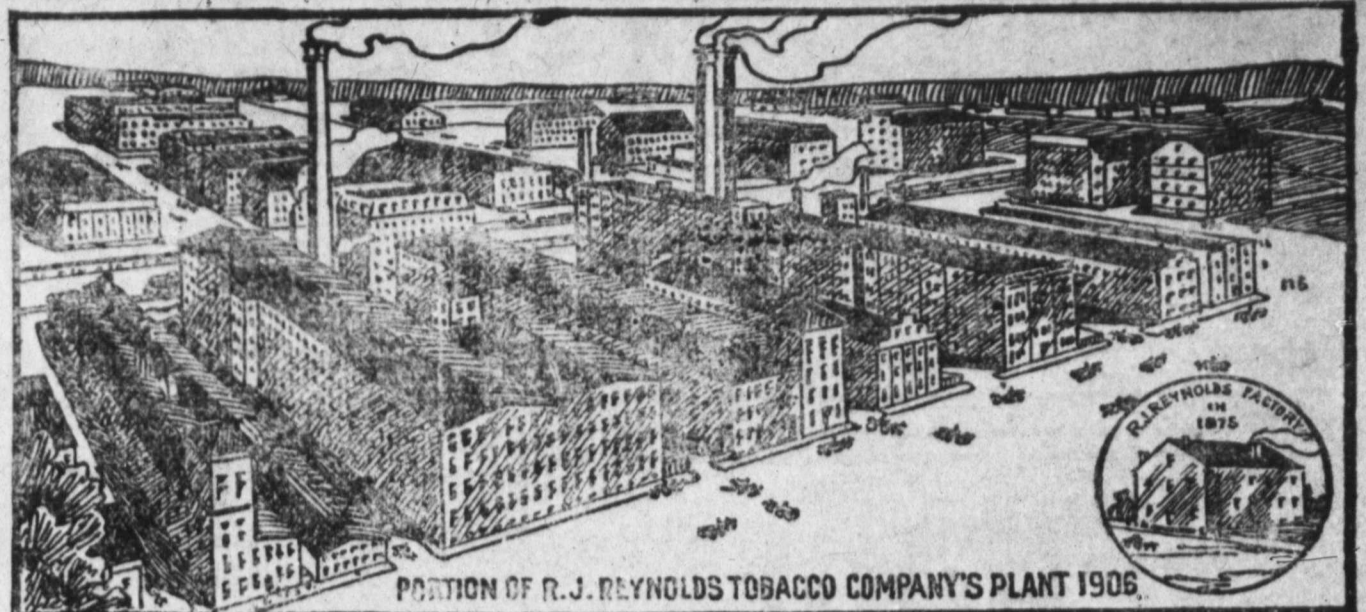

A GENTLEMAN from one of the counties north of this city was here today and he said that it was his candid opinion that Nacogdoches was the best town in Eastern Texas and that Nacogdoches was one of the best counties in the state. This gentleman is a man who has traveled over the state quite extensively, and his opinion is worth something. The Sentinel would use the gentleman's name, but did not ask permission to do so.

"THE railroad owes a duty to the public fully as much as it does to the security holders and the latter certainly recognize this fact as an established principle in making their investments," says Mr. George Gould. This is true and the roads throughout the south should recognize this fact. Take for instance the Texas & New Orleans running through this part of East Texas. The line runs from the city of Beaumont on the south to Dallas on the north, and through this vast territory there is only one passenger train a day. There is enough business done over this branch of the Texas & New Orleans for the company to put on two trains per day each way, and if the management would put the same construction upon the duty of the railroad to the public as Mr. George Gould has done, the good people of Nacogdoches would get better service than at present.

Dear Sir: We shall feel obliged if you write how you came-out on your first few jobs Devoe, as to gallons expected and used.

### HIS FIRST TOBACCO CROP.

H. M. Boozer Plants One and Three-quarters of an Acre.

Early in the spring when the tobacco growers were breaking up their lands for this year's crop, Mr. H. M. Boozer of the Blake community made application to the government tobacco expert to plant two acres. The expert went out to Mr. Boozer's farm and selected the land best adapted to tobacco culture.

Mr. Boozer planted the crop and cultivated the same under the supervision of Mr. Olson the expert, and when the crop was harvested, it was ascertained by the judges of the prize committee that he had complied with the rules of the contest awarded Mr. Boozer the cash prize of \$15 offered by Mr. E. A. Blount.

The Sentinel reporter saw Mr. Boozer Saturday and from him learned that the crop grown by him this year was raised on one and three-quarters of an acre, and on this land he netted \$141.15 from his tobacco crop. This amount and the cash prize from Mr. Blount made the crop net 156.15. Mr. Boozer said that it was his intention to plant again next year, for it was a good money crop and one that does not require the work to raise and harvest as cotton.

He also said that there were several neighbors who would plant a crop next year for the first time. The acreage in his neighborhood will be doubled the next season.

### Staking the Grade.

R. R. Rotzler, civil engineer for the Nacogdoches and Southeastern railroad begun the work of staking the grade of the road from Hayward to Nacogdoches this morning. It is the intention of the management of the road to begin the work of extending the line into the city the early part of next month.

**GETTING READY TO BUILD.**

Nacogdoches and Southeastern to Build Into The City.

Col. M. C. Bay, the general traffic manager of the Nacogdoches and Southeastern railroad, stated to The Sentinel reporter this morning that the work of building the line into Nacogdoches and to a connection with the other roads entering the city, would be started about the first of October. In fact the bridge crew will begin the work of driving piling perhaps next week, and as soon as the work of grading the extension from Woden has been completed the contractor will begin the work on the line into Nacogdoches.

This will be a great convenience to the public and business men of Nacogdoches, and the road will do a better passenger business than in the past. As it is now passenger have to go a distance of over a mile to get to the depot of the Nacogdoches and Southeastern. The depot site and the right of way through the city has all been secured, and there is nothing now in the way to stop the construction of the road.

THE boll weevil has made great inroads in the cotton fields of Louisiana the past few weeks. A special from New Orleans says: "The march of the Mexican boll weevil through the cotton fields of Louisiana has been more rapid this year than ever known before. In one week the State entomologist reports that the pest moved eastwardly fifteen miles. The greatest advance is in the central portion of the State, and the pest is now within thirty miles of the Mississippi river. The pest is now in its migratory period and during the past month has advanced forty miles. It will get into Mississippi before the end of the season, according to the best authorities."

## TOBACCO GROWERS.

On Saturday afternoon there will be a meeting of the farmers of Nacogdoches county held in this city for the purpose of organizing the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers' Association. This is a step in the right direction and The Sentinel is pleased to see the farmers taking the proper interest in the matter of growing tobacco for profit. The soils of this county have been tested by the Department of Agriculture, and it is the universal opinion of all who have watched the industry from the first experimental "patch" until today, and they say that the products of the Nacogdoches tobacco farms are the equal to that grown on the Island of Cuba. Be that as it may, the tobacco is a very fine article and at the present prices the farmers are satisfied that it is a good thing as a diversifier. The weed grown on the famous red sandy soils of Nacogdoches county has stood the test and the smokers all say that it is the "real stuff." The business men of Nacogdoches should take a kindly interest in the movement about to be organized, and assist the farmers in their efforts to bring this section of the state to the front as a tobacco producing country. Last spring Mr. E. A. Blount of this city, single handed injected a little enthusiasm into the tobacco industry by offering a cash prize for tobacco growers, and this offer of Mr. Blount's was supplemented by several smaller prizes. Now then if the business men of the city would put up a little prize money for the best efforts during the next year, the tobacco acreage will be greatly increased. A committee of business men should attend the meeting of the growers Saturday and offer a few prizes for the best crops grown.

### Will Organize.

Mt. Enterprise, Tex., Sept. 18.—All the citizens of or contiguous to the town of Mt. Enterprise are requested to be at the new town on Saturday evening September 20th., for the purpose of organizing a truck growers' association.

Mr. Hodnett of Mahl, Nacogdoches county, will be present to give us the benefit of his practical knowledge as a truck grower.

Come, we mean business, Committee.

The work of grading the extension of the Nacogdoches and Southeastern from Woden to near Oil City was started today. M. Peterson of Cushing has the contract, and when the grading on that end is finished he will move his outfit to Nacogdoches and begin grading the line through the city to a point near the compress where a connection will be made with Houston, East & West Texas, and the Texas & New Orleans railroad.

## PROPER TREATMENT OF BURNS.

Dr. Pugh Gives a Valuable Remedy for Their Cure.

"Future events cast their shadows before them." and as the time of year and season is at hand for building fires and usually with kerosene oil—and this inflammable liquid is very explosive. There are more people during the cold season, winter and fall, burned and die from its use than any other kind of inflammable or combustible. Not long since I noticed three children burned near Hearne, while kindling a fire in the yard. I will give you an infallible cure as I have found it in burns, no matter how bad. Take eight ounces of linseed oil and place ounce of carbolic acid in it; then shake well and apply with a feather all over the burned surface. Then dust finely pulverized charcoal over this and then bandage up and leave for several days. If the burn is extensive, leave four or five days. As an internal treatment give 1-100 grain of sulphur or atropine every hour until the pupils of eyes are well dilated. Before you get through anointing the burn with the linseed oil solution the pain will cease as by magic, and the patient will go to sleep and be at perfect ease. I have never lost a case from burn since I discovered this, my treatment, in 1888. So if you will clip this and keep in your scrapbook and use or have your family physician use it, you need never lose any member of your family from fire burns. In nearly every paper I see there is a report of some one burned to death, and to my mind the cause is the lack of knowledge of how to treat these cases. This is the prime motive of my communicating this article.

Mr. Boozer planted an acre and three-quarters and from this he netted \$141.15, and the \$15 prize made his crop net him \$156.15. Thus Mr. Boozer netted (including the prize) \$9,28 per acre from his efforts as a tobacco grower. Now The Sentinel would like to hear of a cotton planter who can say that it does not pay to plant a few acres of tobacco. For the next year Mr. Blount proposes to put up a cash prize of \$50 for strawberry growers, the conditions of the contest will be published later, or those who are interested can call on Mr. Blount and he will take pleasure in giving the same.

Table with financial data: Mony received: John Arthur \$ 7.00, Sam Stripling 2.50, Arch Price 1.00, Total \$10.50. Expenditures: Paid Frank Lee \$4.00, Wallis Smith 1.00, Bob Stevens 2.00, Stripling and children 90, Lee girls 90, Total \$ 8.80, To balance 1.70. Grand total \$10.50.

You will observe that I received only \$10.50 in money and that I expended of this amount \$8.80, and as I had not employed any more extra help, I was holding this balance \$1.70, but since this accusation has been brought against me, I will add the following, itemized statement of the amount of labor, feed and board contributed by myself and wife at sundry times, and ask if I am not entitled to retain this balance (\$1.70) of the money donated:

Grand total \$26.17

The whole thing summed up is that I have expended \$26.37 on the crop grown this year for Mrs. Arthur and in return I have received the sum of \$10.50. In view of the foregoing statement I hardly think that those who have been guilty of accusing me of keeping that which did not belong to me, can continue to do so after this.

The grand jury is now in session, and it would only be becoming to parties who, if they have possession of facts, to present the case there and then a full investigation can be made.

### EARLY OIL HISTORY.

Capt. L. T. Barrett Tells the Story of How it Happened.

In a recent issue the Houston Post published an account of the discovery of oil in Nacogdoches county. The write up, while quite elaborate, fell short in some of the details of the first discovery of oil in this county, and in the South. The reporter called on Capt. L. T. Barrett and from him secured the story of the discovery of the first oil indications in the South. The following is practically the story as told the reporter by Capt. Barrett:

"In my early life I discovered indications of oil near Melrose at the Skillern spring south of the town of Melrose about five miles. I proposed a contract for a well with Mrs. Lucy W. Skillern, who with the heirs of her deceased husband, (I. C. Skillern owned the land on which I discovered the oil indications, when I drew up this contract (showing the original) you see it is dated December 15, 1859. The contracting parties being Mrs. Lucy W. Skillern and L. T. Barrett, and the witnesses being John J. Barret and James S. Skillern.

"The war (Confederate) come on and stopped my preparation to make a development of my find.

"Immediately after the war, I with others organized a company styled The Melrose Petroleum Company, capitalized at \$3000, that is we would have been chartered for that amount had the undertaking been carried out as first proposed.

"I made another contract with Mrs. Skillern and heirs and with home made machinery bored a well 106 feet deep. During the progress of drilling the well the drill passed through several veins of oil. In the last of which the auger, or drill, dropped about six inches, when gas, water and oil spouted over the top of the well—this was in October, 1866.

"I then went to the oil fields of Pennsylvania and carried with me specimen of oil and other indications and presented them to Prof. John F. Carll, state geologist, who after examining the same

entered into a contract, as the representative of Messrs. Brown Bros., of Titusville, Pa., with me to come to our oil fields in Texas with about \$5000 worth of machinery suitable to the development of oil, all of which was accomplished in the latter part of 1866 and the early spring of 1867, but, and unfortunately for me, on day that the test of my well with the use of the machinery was made, Prof. Carll received instructions from the company he represented that on account of the low price of oil and the unsettled condition of the country (political re-construction then existing) it would not be advisable to prosecute the work further. The test made of my well was entirely satisfactory to Prof. Carll as to the property being valuable, and he verbally agreed with me to prosecute the development of the field in the future, but the above mentioned instructions vetoed the whole thing, and as Prof. Carll was not financially able (individually) to prosecute our oil enterprise, the consequence was that the machinery was left on my hands (an elephant).

"The engine and boiler was sold to Messrs. Simpson Bros. for a nominal price and the other machinery—casing, tubes, etc.—was shipped to New Orleans and sold for less than cost of transportation. Thus ends the early old history."

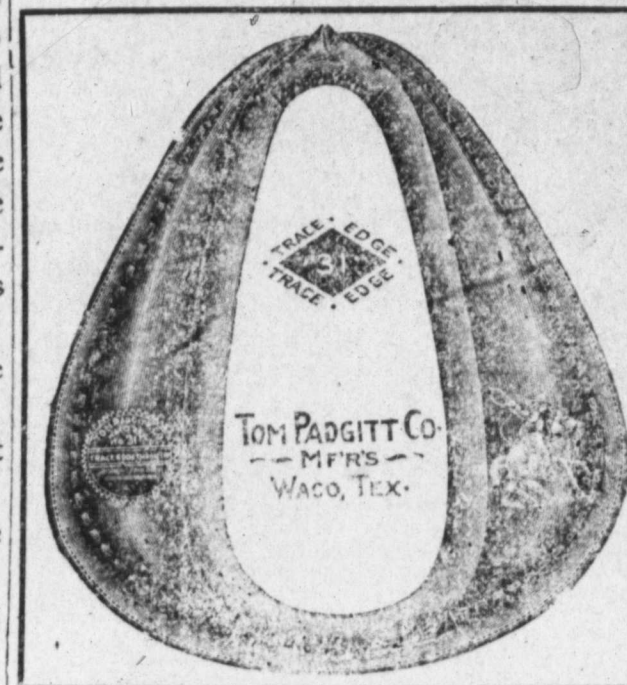

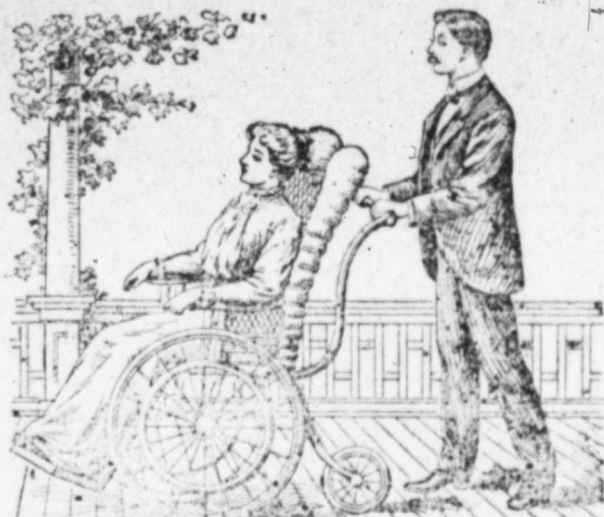
