CLOSED BIG TIMBER DEAL.

H. H. Peden of Timpson Sold Large Body of Timber Land.

Mr. H. H. Peden of Timpson was in the city yesterday and to The Sentinel reporter he stated that he had just closed a big timber deal whereby the Twin City Lumber Co., of Texarkana, purchased 4800 acres of the finest pine land in East Texas. The land is situated in the eastern part of this county and near the town of Attoyac.

Mr. Peden says that it is the intention of the lumber company is to erect a very large mill at Attoyac, and build a railroad to a point connecting with the "Windy." The company will build about eight miles of track.

Mr. Peden did not know at what date construction of the big mill would be started but it was generally understood that work would be started in the immediate future.

THREE MONTHS IN JAIL.

Joe Bug Roquemore and Charley Slay Each Fined \$100.

The district court this morning settled down to business and the prospects are that the court will be busy the remainder of the term, is very bright.

The case of the State of Texas vs. Joe Bug Roquemore and Charley Slay was called this morning. The indictment returned by the grand jury alleged assault with intent to kill, but the state agreed to try the case on the charge of aggravated assault. Both defendants waived jury service and the cases were tried before Judge Perkins. Each defendant entered a plea of guilty to aggravated assault, and after hearing the testimony, the judge passed judgment assessing a jail sentence of three months and \$100 fine against each.

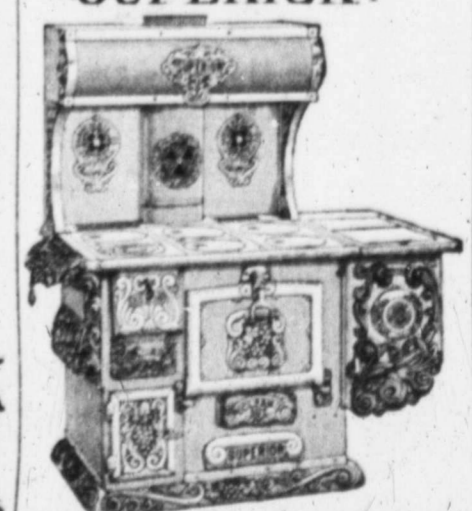

Work in the Oil Field for Deep Oil To Be Started at Once.

After so long a time the prospects are now very good for active work to be started in the Nacogdoches oil fields. This time the work will be carried on by the Higgins Oil Co., which has ample capital to prosecute the work to a successful termination, that is if there is gusher oil in the field, which is something no one doubts.

Yesterday afternoon three car loads oil well machinery belonging to the Higgins Oil Co. of arrived, and the cars were transferred to the Nacogdoches & Southeastern and shipped from here to Woden where the machinery will be hauled to the property of the company at Oil City. The machinery is of the latest known to the oil well business and machinery for deep well boring.

The Higgins people have lumber on the ground for four derricks and as soon as the machinery arrives the work of setting the same up will be started.

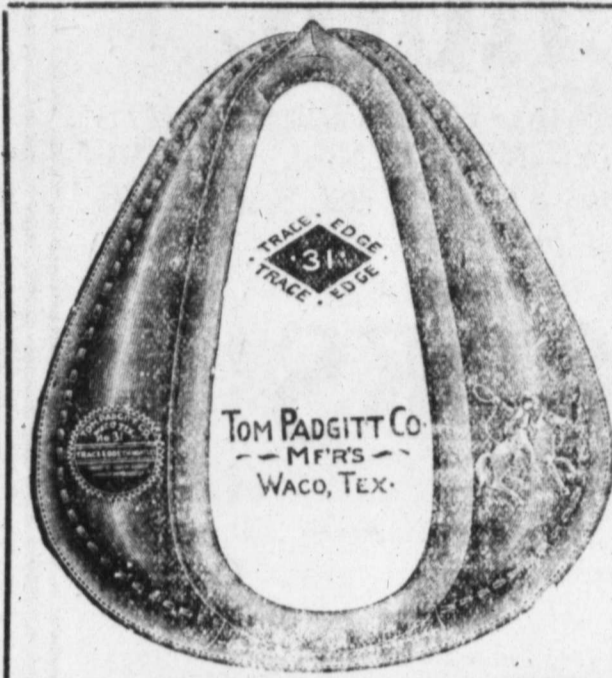

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MADE HIM HOMESICK.

The Senior Editor Saw a Bale of Cotton.

Del Rio, Tex.—I saw a wagon with a bale of cotton pass by a little while ago and it made me homesick. There is a small acreage of cotton grown in Val Verde county this year and there will be several hundred bales produced. There is but one gin in the county. It is here in Del Rio, within two hundred yards of my house and I can hear it running day and night. The crop is about all gathered and is being rushed into the gin. Cotton growing was not a success here this year on account of the boll weevil, and the yield will be no greater per acre than our East Texas land will produce, notwithstanding the strength of the land and the entire independence of drouth. I drove through a cotton patch the other day and the cotton was higher than my head seated in the buggy, but there was nothing on the stalk. It all went to weed and the boll weevil got most of the fruitage. At best I don't think any of the farmers who tried cotton this year will make a better average than the lands of East Texas do. And it must be remembered, too, that water for irrigations purposes costs \$2.50 per acre, and it costs approximately five dollars more per acre to manipulate the water.

Hay farming seems most profitable. Hay is worth eight dollars a ton and from four to five tons per acre is the average crop. But the hay farmer has suffered too this year on account of so much rain. The most profitable farming here is done when there is no rain at all.

My little "tribe," including myself, are enjoying pretty fair health at present. I had a tussle with bilious fever a short time ago that set me back several notches, but I am climbing up again. It has not rained much for the past month and my health improves with the dry weather. The incessant rainy weather for the past year has caused almost as much malarial sickness here as there is in East Texas. Ordinarily this country is free from malaria and is noted as a health resort for that reason.

There is a good deal of truck farming here on the small scale, but it is not sufficient for the local demand. The bulk of everything used here, for man or beast, is shipped and the price of the home product is governed by the price of goods shipped in.

For instance, sweet potatoes are worth 3 cents a pound or \$1.50 a bushel, cabbage 5c a pound, tomatoes 7½ cents a pound, watermelons 2 cents a pound, etc. Eggs are worth 35 cents a dozen and never get below 20c, frying chickens 25c each. There is a fine opening here for a truck and poultry farm on the large

scale, and it would be a bonanza.

Miss Ella Perkins, daughter of Judge Jas. I Perkins, who has been here some time for her health, has gone to San Antonio to take a course of treatment in the Sanitarium there. She has a peculiar throat ailment, which seems to trouble her more externally than otherwise. She has enjoyed good health here generally but has suffered much pain from an external swelling of one side of her throat.

Other East Texas folks here are doing well. Mr. and Mrs. Dallas Foreman have just returned from a visit to their old home at New Salem. They passed through Nacogdoches.

I had a letter a few days ago from Mr. J. W. Brown, formerly of Hayward mill. He is now at Uvalde for his wife's health.

Prof. O. H. McCall, of Nacogdoches county, was here recently, but it was when I was sick and I failed to see him. It was "unpretty" in him not to come to see me. I heard he made some investments in Uvalde. Haltom.

The Rabbit Wreck.

Marvin King, brother to our fellow townsman George and Steve King, was in a very serious wreck about one and a half miles North of Garison yesterday. They were carrying an extra engine to pull the passenger coaches in on account of a wreck near Tenaha. The engine to the passenger was crippled. Mr. King and his engineer were running, tender in front, when it jumped the track, engine following, down a fifteen foot embankment, copping entirely and landing top side down. They crawled out and it was found the engineer had his shoulder knocked out of place and several other injurers none of which will prove fatal. Mr. King was considerably bruised in the side and some other smaller hurts, but without complications, both will soon be ready for service again.

Alabama State Fair

Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 15—From Texas and Tennessee, from Florida, Georgia and the Carolinas and from the more distant states of the north and west former Alabamians are gathering in Birmingham for the home-coming week which began today in conjunction with the Alabama State Fair. With an unusually large attendance already assured the state fair this year promises to eclipse all former exhibitions held in Alabama. New buildings have been erected and these are filled to overflowing with choice exhibits illustrating the resources and industries of the state. A week's race meeting is one of the leading features of the program.

Theodore H. Price thinks that the farmers of the south should have 12 cents for their cotton this year. The Sentinel thinks so too, and if the farmers will stick together and abide by the majority of the Southern Cotton Association and Farmers' Union, they will hold the fleecy staple until the market reaches the 12 cent mark.

TWELVE CENT COTTON

Theodore H. Price Says the Present Crop is Worth It.

The following paragraphs were taken from a letter to The Sentinel from Theo. H. Price, which tells the story of the cotton crop this year:

As my friends and enemies in the South are probably aware, I have never hesitated candidly and forcibly to express my views in regard to the cotton market. Two years ago I was the first to foresee the probability of a crop in excess of 12,000,000 or 13,000,000 bales, and, realizing that the impact of such a crop would greatly depress the price of cotton, from the commencement of the season I advised everyone to sell.

As regards the present season, I have since last spring felt that cotton was destined to sell very much higher. This belief was based not so much on the expectation of a short crop as it was upon a recognition of the enormous demand for cotton goods and consequently for cotton itself, and because I foresaw what everyone is now coming to realize, that the labor available in the South could not properly cultivate this crop. Events, I believe, are working out exactly what I anticipated.

I believe that the demand for cotton during the present season will be measured only by the supply. It really does not make much difference whether the crop is 11,000,000, 12,000,000 or 13,000,000 bales. Every bale of it will be needed.

In the two years ending September 1st, 1906, the world had been supplied with two American crops aggregating 25,000,000 bales, and at the end of the season 1905-6 there were only 800,000 bales left, mostly unspinnable cotton. This much would not have been left had it been of a quality that made it available for spinning. It was the raffra of two crops and practically unspinnable.

Cotton producers of the South will have only themselves to thank if they part with this season's crop at an average price of less than 12 cents a pound. Spinners can afford to pay this price, and being under contract for goods at figures which permit of its payment, they will readily buy it at this price if producers do not sell more cheaply.

Del Rio, Texas, Oct. 13.—I think The Sentinel is mistaken in the assertion that Senator Bailey is not the democratic nominee to succeed himself. I believe that the expression of the people at the polls and the subsequent declaration of the State democratic convention makes him the nominee beyond any question, and unless there can be something done by concert of action throughout the state to rescind the vote of the primaries and the action of the state convention, there will be no alternative for the members of the 30th legislature but to vote their instructions and re-elect the junior Senator. More's the pity. Bailey has bullied the democratic party of Texas until he absolutely carries it in the palm of his hand. The agitation at present is unfortunate, unless it were possible to submit the matter to the general election. It will not defeat Bailey and will do the party great harm. But the people should have their eyes opened after this, and if Senator Bailey ever comes before the democracy of Texas again he should be forced to practice democracy, not merely preach it, before he gets another endorsement of the people.

Senator Bailey's course is no surprise to The Sentinel. It is one of the original anti-Bailey papers and can say with impunity, "I told you so." It has always regarded him as a bully, dangerously approaching the black guard politically. His habit of denouncing everybody that opposes or disagrees with him as liars, spiteful, personal and political enemies, back-biters and such is evidence that The Sentinel has not been far wrong in its estimation of him. But what's the use ventilating these things now? We have got him on our hands for six more years, and we had just as well become reconciled and make the best of it we can.

I had a letter from a Nacogdoches friend a day or two ago informing me that he was "one of the boys that helped to elect Hon. S. B. Cooper." But my friend is out of order as well as tardy. I am a Cooper man myself, now, and am one of the boys that will help to elect Mr. Cooper if I have a vote in his district. I always yield to the action of the democracy, from precinct to nation.

I thought I would have an article for the paper about the "revolution," but the thing failed to "revolute." The little skirmish that did take place was only the invasion of a band of outlaws, about fifty in number, upon the little town of Jimenez, on the Mexican side of the Rio Grand, about twenty-five miles from Del Rio. There were so many soldiers stationed along the border in anticipation of an uprising that this little band was squelched as if by the waving of a magic wand. The leader of the raid upon Jimenez was de la Fuente, a wealthy Mexican citizen of Las Vacas, the little village opposite Del Rio on the

Mexican side of the Rio Grand. Fuente has a brother who was my nearest neighbor when I first came here. I have seen him at his brother's house. Fuente is an outlaw only because he is a fugitive from the law. Last February, as the result of a feud that has existed for half a century between the Fuentes and Garcias, Fuente killed one of the Garcias, since which time he has been "in the hills." Probably he headed that Jimenez expedition for pastime or recreation. He was not captured, though a number of his men were taken and the band completely youted. Nothing has since been heard of the revolution.

In another letter I may give the story of the Garcias feud, if I can "work it up."

NEW YORK politics is getting warmer ever day and W. R. Hearst the democratic nominee for governor is holding his own and the chances are that he will be the next governor of that state.

The young men and ladies who graduate from the Nacogdoches schools do not have to enter a preparatory school before entering the State University. This is one of the advantages of sending your children to Nacogdoches to get an education.

The cotton gamblers are having a time trying to keep their head above high water. The Southern Cotton Association and the Farmers Union have agreed to get close together and assist each other in getting a fair price for the cotton crop this year.

THERE is not a farmer with in six or seven miles of the city but what has been experimenting with truck and diversified crops. The Sentinel would like to have the experience of these farmers so that the advantages of Nacogdoches county can be properly written and placed before the people of other sections.

The Panama canal commission has decided that the quickest way to get the canal completed is to let the job out to contractors. The Sentinel suggested this as the better plan some time ago believing that if the ditch was ever completed that it would have to be done by private contract.

FROM the exchanges received at this table the farmers who make a specialty of raising blooded chickens and farm stock generally receive better prices for their product. One farmer near Athens a few days ago went to town with a coop of Plymouth Rock fryers and it is claimed that he received 50 cents each for his chickens. It costs no more to raise the larger breed of chickens than the small kind—but what a difference in the price when you take them to market.

A FARMER from the Indian Territory wanted cotton pickers and he went to Fort Worth in search of negroes to pick his cotton crop. He interviewed the sheriff and found that there were a number in the county jail who were indebted to the county in small sums. He made a proposition to the officers that he would pay the fines if the prisoners would be turned over to him. The proposition was accepted and the farmer soon separated himself from a sum aggregating \$200. The prisoners were overjoyed over the turn of affairs.

A LOST OPPORTUNITY

There are many opportunities presented to Texas people, and especially the farmers, which are never taken advantage of. If these opportunities were embraced at the proper time there would be more money deposited in the banks of Texas by the farmers and truck growers, and times would be correspondingly better than at the present time. The Sentinel right here wants to emphasize the fact that if the truck growers of East Texas would pay a little attention, even to the potato crop, that there would be plenty of prosperity in many homes in this part of the state. At this season of the year merchants are shipping in potatoes grown in Colorado, and these potatoes are being sold at fancy prices. There is no good reason why the farmers and truckers in this county could not have Irish potatoes for the fall market. The soil and the climatic conditions are ideal for the successful cultivation of the Irish potato, and with a little extra effort put forth to keep the potato until October the merchants of this city would gladly buy from the farmers. The Lord above knows that the East Texas Irish potato is far superior to any potato ever shipped in here. Nacogdoches truck farmers should try and see what they can do with a few acres of potatoes for fall market.

"SILENCE IS GOLDEN"

This is a free country it is true, but it does look strange that in a community that is as progressive as Nacogdoches that there are some who are entirely void of enthusiasm, and are content to let well enough alone. By united action of the business men of Nacogdoches this city would be a city of 10,000 in 1910.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

United effort, not of localities only, but of Texas also is what is needed to develop the industrial interests of our great State. When you can not utter words of encouragement keep your lips closed and remember the old: "Silence is Golden."—Dal-Gal News.

The Southern Pacific Co. is taking quite an interest in the tobacco culture of this part of the state. Mr. Geo. S. Bruce was here a few days ago getting the price of tobacco lands and the amount that is on the market. Important Amendment.

Among the Amendments to the State Constitution, to be submitted this year to the vote of the people, is one of particular importance to those interested in the cause of education.

At present the young men and young women of this State are fitted for the University and higher institutions of learning by the City High Schools and by private Academies. This State does not make any provision out of the public fund for preparatory school work.

Under the Constitution the buildings used for purposes are exempted from taxation, but the cash endowment for the maintenance and improvement of the schools, and for free scholarships etc. is taxable.

The earning capacity of these educational endowment funds is about six per cent, but this income is cut in half by the combined municipal, county and state tax, which usually amounts to about three per cent.

Thus the utility of these funds is impaired, and the cause of educational endowment is seriously retarded.

Leland Stanford and Chicago University, and the large Universities of the east would never have been possible if the generous donors of endowment had been confronted with taxation laws that would reduce the working power of their donations 50 per cent.

The state can very well afford from a pecuniary standpoint to assist non-state schools by reasonable tax exemptions, because these institutions are providing for thousands of students who otherwise would be a heavy burden on the public funds.

Endowment funds are used to a considerable extent (in some institutions exclusively) for the purpose of affording assistance to poor but deserving students who would otherwise be unable to avail themselves of the privileges of advanced education. Is it right to tax the funds so that one-half of these students shall be refused assistance?

One thing to be carefully remembered is that the proposed amendment, provides only exemption of cash endowment. There is therefore on danger that any corporation or individual can tie up large tracts of real estate and hold the same (without taxation) in unfair competition with other legitimate property interests.

The future good citizenship of our country depends on the facilities afforded for the best and highest education.

The time has come in the progress and development of this great Lone Star State when we should encourage and foster the principle of large and generous endowments for educational purposes.

Why should not Texas have a Leland Standford or a Harvard of her own, and make it possible for her sons and daughters to get at home every educational advantage offered by other states?
