### A HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.

Man Was Torn to Pieces at Wallisville Lumber Mill.

Wallisville, Texas, Oct. 20.—Charles Parker, supposed to hail from Garrison, Texas, was killed instantly at Cumming's mill while attempting to replace a belt on a pulley. His jumper caught, was wound up with the shaft and he was whirled around the shaft. One arm was torn from the body above the elbow and both legs literally torn in fragments to the knees, being beaten off—a piece being carried on the conveyor and bones and flesh flying in all directions.

### Experiencing a Shortage of Cars.

Mr. C. C. Hayward of the Hayward Lumber Company says that in all his experience as a mill man he never experienced such a shortage of cars for the movement of lumber. His company has many orders for points west, Del Rio and Mexican points, and no cars can be secured for shipping the lumber. The yards are full of lumber that has been sold but there are no cars to be had. He says that when they do receive a few empties that they will not remain in the yards but a short time.

The health authorities of Philadelphia have caused to be issued warrants for the arrests of several agents of Armour & Co. They are charged with using boric acid in meats.

### TWO YEARS IN PENITENTIARY.

Joe Bug Roquemore Convicted on a Charge Alleging Robbery.

Yesterday afternoon the jury in the case of the State of Texas vs. Joe Bug Roquemore returned a verdict finding the defendant guilty as charged in the indictment and assessed his punishment at confinement in the penitentiary for a term of two years.

A few days before Charley Slay was convicted on the same charge and his punishment was fixed at two years in the penitentiary.

The crime for which Roquemore and Slay were convicted, is alleged to have been committed during the early part of September. S. L. Derring and wife arrived in the city from Hunt county on a visit to relatives near Black Jack, and while looking for a conveyance to take him to his destination, Derring met with the young men and invited them to drink with him, the trio soon became quite chummy and several more drinks were taken. Derring soon became intoxicated and while in this condition it is stated that the young men took him to the sample room. When Derring was found by the officers some time during the early part of the night he was asked if he had any money. He replied in the affirmative and pulled out his pocket book to show the officers he had, but when he opened his book he found that his money was gone.

The next morning Charley Slay and Joe Bug Roquemore were arrested for the alleged crime and they readily gave bond to await the action of the grand jury. When the grand jury convened both were indicted jointly with having committed the crime, but the cases were tried separately.

Messrs. King & King, attorneys for the defendants have made a motion for a new trial, and if refused the cases will be appealed to the criminal court of appeals.

### Carpenters on Strike.

The carpenters working on the new hotel building quit work this morning and demanded of the contractor \$3 per day for all men on the building.

Mr. D. Rull, the contractor, says that in making an estimate on the building that he made it on the union's scale of wages, and that he cannot afford to grant the increase in wages at this time. There are some of the men who he would be willing to grant the increase, but that to give every man on the building \$3 per day would bankrupt.

E. L. Cordova has rented the building formerly occupied by C. Heitman, and has opened up a stock of fancy groceries.

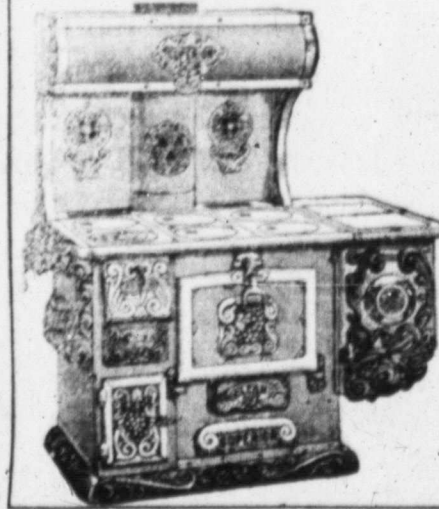

MRS. JEFFERSON DAVIS.

The South mourns the death of the widow of the president of the Confederacy. Mrs. Davis was a lady of many admirable qualities; like the virtuous woman in Proverbs, "her own works praise her in the gates." But among the Southern people she has been the most honored woman in Dixie because of the memory of the lost cause and her illustrious husband.

The Confederacy belongs to history. The men who fought in the great war are becoming fewer with the years, and one by one the Southern women of that time are joining their predecessors in that bourne to which we are all travelers. Who shall record the fame of the woman of the Confederacy. Surely some mighty poet will one day celebrate their deeds and heroism, their love and faith and suffering even to the uttermost for their country and their country's gray-clad defenders.

The South mourns for Mrs. Jefferson Davis, but mingled with the grief at the death of that gentle lady who was, as it were, the widow of the Confederacy is pride at the memories associated with her name. What Southern heart north or south of the Mason and Dixon line does not thrill with mention of the name of the name of the hero of Buena Vista, the secretary of war of the United States, the president of the Confederacy, who suffered for the South as the nation's prisoner? Who does not sympathize with his imprisonment, admire his fortitude and respect his integrity. Fearless, with both physical and moral courage, of absolute rectitude, a Christian with a martyr's endurance, a patriot of more than pagan virtue, Jefferson Davis was a man whose character has not only rendered his own name immortal, but has shed lustre on his country. In the South's pantheon Davis, the statesman, stands by the side of Lee, the soldier. With both men love of the South was a ruling principle, and there was no limit to their self-sacrifice for their country. For this reason the South honored Mrs. Jefferson Davis during her life and mourns for her in her death.—Houston Chronicle.

**The Proposed Amendments.**  
Del Rio.—There are three proposed amendments to the constitution to be voted upon at the general election November 6. They are all important, and as the election is close at hand it would be well for the voter to look them up and give them a little study in order that he may vote upon them intelligently. They may be found by referring to any issue of The Sentinel during the month of July.

One of the proposed amendments is to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors. The amendment leaves it optional with each county to levy such tax and does not make it obligatory where it is not wanted. It simply changes the wording of section 9, article 8, by adding the words, "and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors." Under the present system it frequently occurs that jury scrip cannot be cashed at par, even when a county is able to meet all other obligations dollar for dollar. The jury fund is made up of fines, forfeitures, etc., which is not often sufficient to pay promptly for jury service. The amendment ought to be adopted.

The proposed amendment to section 24, article 3, provides for fixing the salaries and per diem of legislators and preventing the acceptance of free passes. It eliminates the words, "not exceeding five dollars per day," etc, and substitutes the words, "not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election, and payable in equal installments, on the first day of January, February, March, and April of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said member shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile."

It shall be unlawful for any member of the legislature during his term of office to accept any free transportation over any railway line or lines in this state, and any member of the legislature violating the provisions of this Act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, use, have or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded to the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons, firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this state. Any member of the legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of the Article.

The Sentinel has no advice to offer upon this amendment. It prefers to withhold its

opinion, leaving the voter to pass his own judgment upon it and cast his ballot accordingly.

The proposed amendment to section 2, article 8, is the best of all. It relates to our educational institutions, and provides for the exemption of cash endowments from taxation, by adding the following words to the section as it now stands: "Also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer."

WALTERS, the nigger bishop, is seeking notoriety for himself and hunting trouble for his race. In New York a few days ago he delivered himself of the following: "If the ignoble work of disfranchisement in the south is persisted in, a conflict is sure to come in which the negro will not be the only sufferer. Business will be paralyzed, credit destroyed and desolation and ruin will surely follow. The quickest and best way to peace is for those who are in authority to proclaim to the nation that every negro able to meet the qualifications of the revised constitution shall be allowed to register and vote without molestation." There is no law or condition in the south that justifies such intemperance of speech, and the only effect it can have will be to incite the negroes of the south to deeds that will bring trouble on their own heads. Nothing is needed so badly in the south as for the negro question to be let alone.

Texas has lost another one of her greatest men in the death of Prof. J. S. Kendall, which occurred last week at Denton. Prof. Kendall was not great because of his prominence in politics or his widespread reputation as a statesman though he was both to an extent, but as an educator and a promoter of the school interests he had no superior and few equals. At the time of his death he was president of the State Normal School at Denton, which place he resigned the position of state superintendent of public instruction to accept.

Texas was honored at the New Orleans convention of the supreme lodge Knights of Pythias, in the election of Judge H. P. Brown of Cleburne, as supreme vice chancellor. Texas Pythians have worked hard for the election of Judge Brown and their "efforts have been crowned with success." At the next bi-ennial convention he will be advanced to supreme chancellor of the order.

The Higgins Oil Co Purchasing Supplies for Their Camp.

From the way supplies are being purchased for the camp outfit of the Higgins Oil Co. at Oil City, there will be some thing doing in the way of development of the Nacogdoches oil field. Mr. L. J. Black, general superintendent, and F. W. Michaux arrived in the city yesterday and begun work at once getting things in shape to start the work of sinking a well.

Enough material is already on the ground for a well 2000 feet deep. The material was shipped to Woden and from there it is being hauled to the field, Henry Millard of this city having the contract to move the machinery and piping.

It is the intention of the Higgins Co. to thoroughly test the field and they have ample capital to successfully carry out the proposition.

**A CONTINUOUS TERM.**

State Supt. Cousins Makes Ruling Regarding School Funds.

Austin, Texas, Oct. 19.—State Superintendent Cousins of the educational department made a ruling today, in an appealed case, holding that the law contemplates a continuous session of schools after they are opened, and not a splitting up of regular terms. Also that funds set apart by the apportionment for next year, cannot be used this year.

Del Rio, Oct. 18.—United States Marshal Eugene Nolte, arrived in Del Rio Sunday from San Antonio, and, accompanied by two deputies, proceeded in the investigation of rumors that a conspiracy had been entered into here against the Mexican government. The investigation resulted in the arrest of Pedro N. Gonzales, Demetrio Castro, Crescencio V. Marquez and Trinidad Garcia, all Mexican subjects of the United States, who were brought before U. S. Commissioner Garner Monday morning for preliminary examination. The prisoners were charged with conspiracy to set afoot a military enterprise against Mexico, complaint being made by Capt. Luke Dowe, collector of customs at this port. The defendants waved examination and Commissioner Garner fixed the bonds of each at five hundred dollars. The bonds were promptly made, and the prisoners were released until the meeting of the federal court in Del Rio next Monday, Oct. 22nd. Assistant U. S. District Attorney C. C. Cresson was present and conducted the case on behalf of the United States.

There are several other indictments against Mexican citizens and the officers are still making investigations, but so far no other arrests have been made. There is quite a little excitement over the affair and it has about put a stop to the night meetings of a political organization, which have been of frequent occurrence of late.

Arrests have been made at several points along the Texas border near here.

The last few years have witnessed a great change in all this; Southern jobbing houses and factories are getting a share of the business which formerly went to other sections, thus keeping in circulation here the money we get for our great staple crop. But the fetish of Eastern superiority as a wholesale market still persists in too marked a degree; it will take concerted effort to dislodge this idea and encourage the "Home Market" plan among our merchants and dealers.

To us in Texas the "Home Market" plan is of especial importance. We have in every one of our communities manufacturing and wholesale industries which represent the effort of business ability of the very first order to keep at home the profits of our farms and fields. We have firms which import the products of every foreign clime and class, giving to Texas merchants opportunities in Texas cities of purchasing their requirements in these lines which cover every conceivable character of merchandise. We have factories, not enough it is true, which can compete in Northern markets with their pro-

ducts both as to grade and price.

Any one versed in even the A B C of political economy or finance knows that it is to the interest of every one of us to seek our commercial independence, to encourage the industries of our State, to keep in circulation at home of our cotton and grain money, to keep in our banks for the benefit of further development of Texas business of foreign export balances.

With these propositions in mind it seems to us to be the duty of every one of us to aid in carrying out to the fullest degree the "Home Market" idea. Every one of us can do a part; every family should be an agent in spreading the "Home Market" propaganda; every merchant can do his share. One great difficulty in the way is the foolish doctrine, which of course every Eastern and Northern merchant encourages, that the Texas merchant must go out of the State to get his requirements. Once we have this foolish doctrine on the run, all will be easy. We will enter on a new period of internal prosperity which will put us in the van of the great States of the Union.

Let every one of us insist on getting and using Texas products; let every Texas manufacturer let us know what he makes and that it is made here; let every merchant give our Texas houses the first call on all he needs in his business; let the wholesalers give our smaller merchants part of the benefit of their advantageous buying; let us give a long pull, a strong pull and a pull together for mutual good.—State Topics.

### THE CARPENTERS SIDE.

An Open Statement to The Public Concerning Their Demands.

Nacogdoches, Texas, October 23.—A statement to The People of Nacogdoches:—We, the members of the Local Union of Carpenters, of Nacogdoches, wish to put ourselves square and plain before the good citizens of this unavoidable circumstance that has transpired between ourselves and the contractors of the town.

The whole secret of the cause is the high price of groceries, high priced dry goods, and the high price of every other conceivable thing that one has to have to sustain life, and the cheapness of labor.

It is a well known fact that no reasonable man would attempt to dispute that the price of living has in the last three years increased at least one-third, and it is also a fact that the carpenters of Nacogdoches are working for the same wages that they received three or four years ago, and some are even working for less.

It is also a fact that we cannot take our wives and children to church or any other public gathering in Nacogdoches, and it is all because we cannot dress them in such a manner that any lady would feel at ease in good society. Now, why can't we do this? Any sane man can answer. It is because we do not wish them to go? No, a thousand times no. For they are just as dear to us in their cheap

clothing as if they were dressed in the finest apparel that money could buy, but the cause is this. We don't get enough for our labor to be in such a condition as to enable us to have the real necessities of life, much less any luxuries.

Our troubles are these: The carpenters have been working in Nacogdoches always for \$2.50 per day, and we have asked for \$3 per day and have been refused.

We want to ask this much of the public. Don't you think we deserve it? There is hardly one of us that don't owe some debt that was due six or maybe twelve months ago, and it looks as though we can never pay, and no doubt the man has been stamped as a rascal, when it has been impossible to pay him and get something to live on.

We feel we are entitled to \$3 per day and are going to get it if we have to leave Nacogdoches to get it. Nacogdoches is about the only town in the state that pays less than \$3 and the scale of wages in most towns is \$3.25 to \$3.50. We have no ill feeling toward any of the contractors. If they can't pay it we lay no blame on them. This is strictly a live and let live proposition to us. We ask the good will of the public, and all who have work to be done, we will make it to your interest if you will please call on some union man.

This year he planted a less acreage and decided to use no fertilizer, and he has gathered a little over two bales from the ground. He thinks his experience will be corroborated by every farmer who had to contend with the weevil last year, that the crop was not bothered in the same district to the same extent as last season.

Government as giving courses of training sufficiently thorough and extensive to enable its graduates to go directly from the school room and pass the Civil Service Examinations. Their final examinations in both shorthand and bookkeeping are more rigid than those given by the Government. We have as bright and intelligent young people about our little city as are to be found, and if they will only secure a practical education, there is no reason why they cannot become promoters of our greatest enterprises and achieve great success.

### MRS. DAVIS' DEATH.

Widow of Departed President of Confederacy Joins Her Husband.

New York Oct. 16.—Mrs. Jefferson Davis, widow of the President of the Confederacy, who had been ill for a week at the Hotel Majestic in this city, died at 10:25 o'clock tonight. Death was due to pneumonia induced by a severe cold, which Mrs. Davis contracted upon her return from the Adirondacks, where she had spent the summer months. Although tears were felt from the first Mrs. Davis' wonderful vitality, which has brought her through a similar attack a year ago, gave a hope of ultimate recovery until last night, when a change for the worse was evident and attending physicians announced that the end was near. It was then believed that Mrs. Davis could not survive the night, but she rallied slightly during the early hours of today.

Shortly after 7 o'clock this morning she had a sinking spell and Rev. N. A. Seagle, rector of St. Stephen's Protestant Episcopal church, was hurriedly summoned to give religious comfort to the patient in her last moments of consciousness. The clergyman remained some time and an hour later it was announced that Mrs. Davis had lapsed into a state of coma. The period of unconsciousness continued to the end.

At the bedside when death came were Mrs. J. Addison Hayes of Newark, N. J., the only surviving daughter of Mrs. Davis; Jefferson Davis Hayes, a grandson, who is a student at Princeton University; Mrs. Charles E. Batson, a niece, Dr. and Mrs. Gustav Webb, the latter a granddaughter, and Dr. Robert H. Wylie, who with Mr. Webb cared for Mrs. Davis throughout the illness.

J. Addington Hayes, husband of Mrs. Davis' only living child had been summoned from Colorado Springs and was hurrying across the country when a message announcing Mrs. Davis' death intercepted him. Mrs. Davis had for some years made her home in this city, where she had a wide circle of friends. Throughout her illness solicitous inquires regarding her condition were continually made at her apartments.
