### MR. J. P. SUTHPEN DEAD.

A Former Citizen of Nacogdoches Passes Away at Merkel.

News was received in the city yesterday afternoon announcing the death of Mr. Jos. P. Suthpen at Merkel, Texas. While Mr. Suthpen had been in poor health for the past several years, yet his death was a shock to his old friends in Nacogdoches, as they had supposed that he was on the road to recovery. The following telegrams are self explanatory:

Merkel, Texas, Nov. 26.—Jno. P. Davidson, Nacogdoches, Texas.—Suthpen is not expected to live through the day. L. R. Parmelly.

Merkel, Texas, Nov. 26.—Jno. P. Davidson, Nacogdoches, Texas.—Suthpen died 2 p. m. today. Answer.

L. R. Parmelly.

Mr. Suthpen was a brother of Mrs. Jno. P. Davidson and she left on the Houston East & West Texas this morning at 3 o'clock for Merkel to attend the funeral.

Mr. Suthpen was raised in Nacogdoches county, and for many years clerked for John P. Davidson. In 1881 he went into business for himself, the firm being Davidson, Richardson & Suthpen. The firm became Davidson & Suthpen, and in 1890 he sold out his interest in the business to his partner, George H. Davidson, and formed a partnership with Allan Seale and Chas. Scott. After a few years of successful merchandising this firm sold out to John P. Davidson.

Mr. Suthpen moved to Coleman county, and engaged in business. From there he moved to Abilene and engaged in business in that place, but having left here on account of failing health and not being benefited by the changes made, sold out in Abilene and went to Kosse, and from there he moved to Merkel where he engaged in business, and was quite successful.

As his interests were at Merkel he will be laid to rest there.

Mr. Suthpen married Miss Mattie Muckelroy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Muckelroy, and his wife and six children survive him.

The government experts should have 200 acres of tobacco to superintend here next year.

All East Texas Pythians are invited to attend the district meeting to be held in this city during the holidays.

The large dividends annually declared by the various monopolies will ultimately lead to trouble between capital and labor.

President Roosevelt has started home, and immediately upon his arrival the country will be furnished with the latest canal news.

For many years Ireland furnished immigrants in great numbers to this country, but now the Italians outnumber the Irish about two to one.

Now comes the news that The United States Government has filed proceedings in the federal court at St. Louis to dissolve the Standard Oil trust.

## MANUFACTURING IN SOUTH.

That the manufacturing business is on the increase in the South is shown by statistics compiled at Washington. It is also shown that Texas is growing at a rapid rate along this line, the increase of the capital invested in manufacturing enterprises being 62 per cent in the past six years.

The following, taken from a special dispatch, from Washington, D. C., will be of interest to those interested in the development of Texas along manufacturing lines:

"In the preparation of the tables for the recently issued bulletin of the manufacturing industry of the United States, as well as in the preparation of the tables for the bulletins for the various States, the Census Bureau overlooked about the most interesting deductions that are to be made from the figures, and therefore leaves to the individual student of these bulletins the laborious task of making these deductions for himself.

"For instance, it is highly interesting to contrast the wages received by wage earners in the various states, and to contrast the average wages of these wage earners in 1900 and 1905, and yet the bulletins make no such contrast, simply giving the total wages paid and the total number of workmen, leaving the rest to the reader.

"After a great deal of laborious arithmetical exercise the writer is able to make some interesting showings as to the country at large, and as to nineteen states, they being as follows: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kentucky, Indiana, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, Massachusetts and Maryland.

"Texas and Tennessee were nip and tuck for position in 1900 in manufacturing. Each had a capitalization of \$63,000,000 and each had a production valued at \$62,000,000. But since that time Texas has been gradually forging ahead, until in 1905, it showed a gain of 82 per cent in capital, against 62 per cent for Tennessee.

"In production, Texas show-

ed and increased 62 per cent, while Tennessee showed 49 per cent increase. Tennessee outdone Texas in the number of wage workers, having 60,000 to Texas' 49,000, her increase having been 32 per cent to Texas' 27 per cent. Tennessee's annual payroll to wage earners was \$32,000,000, against \$24,000,000 for Texas, an increase of 55 per cent for Tennessee and 45 per cent for Texas. The average wages paid in Tennessee in 1905 was \$376 and the average in Texas was \$499, the highest average wages paid in any Southern state. In 1900 they stood: Tennessee \$321, Texas \$438. In 1905 Tennessee wage earners produced \$2,875 worth of finished work each and Texas wage earners averaged \$3,068. In 1900 the figures were: Tennessee \$2,018, Texas \$2,406.

"Louisiana is forging to the front as a manufacturing state. She holds the unique distinction of being the only state in the Union where capitalization was not increased faster than production. On the other hand, each dollar of capital earned more in 1900 it took 40¢ of capital to make a dollar's worth of gross earnings, while in 1905 it took only 31¢ of capital to make \$1 of gross earnings. Capital increased to \$150,000,000 in 1905, an increase of 49 per cent. Wage earners increased 37 per cent, total wages increased 72 per cent, while each wage earner averaged \$453 a year in 1905 against \$360 in 1906. The gross earning capacity of each wage earner was \$3,335 in 1905 against \$2,725 in 1900. North Carolina capital increased 106 per cent in the five years."

After the Waters-Pierce ouster proceedings, will it stop the sale of standard oil in Texas? Not much Mary Ann. The price of the oil will be pushed up several notches to pay the cost of the trial.

The business men of Nacogdoches should become interested in the culture of tobacco. The business men of Palestine have become interested to the extent that they will plant fifty acres themselves next year.

Now and then the news is circulated over the world that some big American corporation has advanced the wages of the working man 10 per cent. The corporations are doing this in order to check the growing sentiment against monopolies.

Farmers should remember that they will not have the help of the experts in growing tobacco forever, and if they propose to learn the culture of tobacco they should get interested. Don't quit all other crops; but try a few acres at a time until you become familiar with the business, and then if you like it well enough to abandon the cotton field, well enough, but for the present time try only a few acres.

"Human nature is the same the world over." We think most of those who treat us best and Cason does the same thing.

## AN INTERESTING MEETING.

The Business Men of The Town Meet and Talk Tobacco.

This morning one of the most interesting and business like meetings held in the city since the government has been conducting the experiment of growing Cuban tobacco here, was held in the office of Lindsey and Harris.

Mr. Robert Lindsey called the meeting to order and introduced Mr. Wm. Taussig, one of the largest leaf tobacco dealers in the United States, and also a grower of the weed in Florida.

Mr. Taussig stated that he would purchase all shade tobacco grown in this county the next season at 40 cents per pound contract price, and would advance to the farmers, without interest \$100 per acre in order that they could make the necessary preparations.

The tobacco to be grown under the supervision of the government experts. He also stated that he felt confident that the future of the tobacco industry in this section of the state would soon become one of the leading industries in the south. That the land here had been tested and that tobacco of a very superior quality had been produced, and that at the price he would contract for would insure the farmers a good profit on their investment. He also stated that this contact would be made for two or five years.

The meeting was addressed by Mr. George McNess chief expert of soils of the department of agriculture. He stated that the government would assist the farmers in the work as in former years, and that nothing new could be added to the department in the manner of disposing of the crops after grown, and as long as the farmers would grow tobacco that they could get all the assistance they would need.

After the close of the addresses and after the subject had been discussed in a round table fashion, the chair appointed the following as a committee to confer with the farmers; Robert Lindsey, Allan Seale, and W. S. Beeson, and to make their report at the earliest possible date.

It was announced that the county association of tobacco growers would meet on Saturday and the committee was instructed to go before the association.

### ORDERS CHARTER CANCELED

Southern Live Stock Insurance Company of Houston Affected.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 19.—In district court this morning, Judge Brooks, presiding, the case of the state vs. the Southern Live Stock Insurance Company of Houston, capital stock of \$10,000, to cancel its charter for not obtaining a permit from the insurance commissioner to be operating in Texas the court issued a decree ordering its charter to be forfeited.

In the case of the state vs. the Southwestern Live Stock Insurance Company of Dallas, no capital stock, the court sustained a demurrer to the state's petition holding that as the company had no capital and was a purely mutual concern that it was not necessary for the attorney general to pass upon its charter, or for it to obtain authority from the state insurance commissioner before transacting business. Assistant Attorney General Hawkins states that he will file a motion for rehearing in this last case.

F--Habitual drunkenness for two years. G--Hopeless insanity of the husband. The clause stricken out of article 4 of the bill is as follows: Such indignities, threats or acts of abuse as to render the condition of the other party intolerable and life burdensome, and to force such party to separate from the other and live apart. In reply to an inquiry as to why the insanity of a wife should not be included in paragraph G of article 4, a member of the committee explained that a husband should support his insane wife, because she may have become insane after marriage, and her mental trouble may have been due to the matrimonial state. Article 5

was adopted without debate. It is as follows: "No decree of divorce shall be granted if it appears that the suit has been brought by collusion, or that the plaintiff has procured or connived at the offense charged, or has condoned it, or has been guilty of adultery not condoned." Article 6, which relates to jurisdiction to be acquired by personal service in actions for the annulment of the marriages or for divorces, so worded as to minimize migratory divorces, was adopted as recommended by the committee which drew up the bill. Article 6 also provides that anyone charged as particeps criminis shall be made a party upon his or her application to a court subject to such terms and conditions as the court may prescribe; that all hearings and trials shall be public and be held before a court and not before a master, referee or any other delegated representative, and that in all uncontested cases, and in any other case where a court may deem it necessary or proper a disinterested attorney may be assigned by the court actively to defend the case.

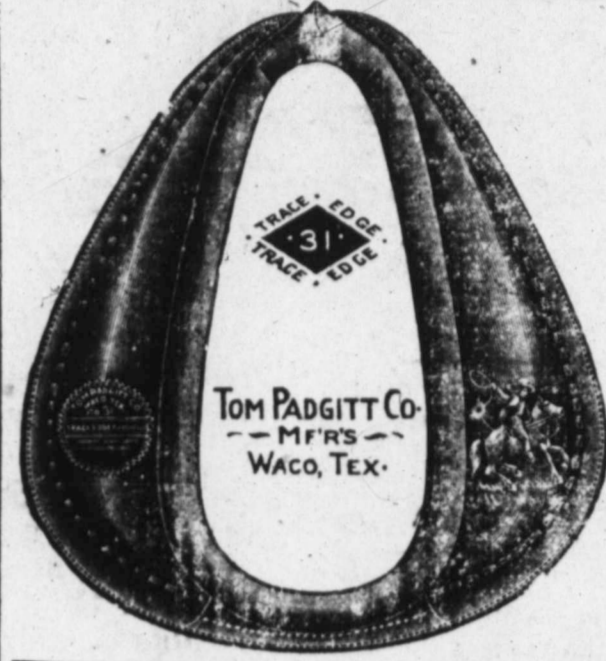

### THE NEGROES ARE EXCITED.

Chicago Meeting Condemns President Roosevelt and Tillman.

Chicago, Nov. 23.—Two thousand negroes in Bethel African Methodist Church last night severely criticised President Roosevelt for discharging the three companies of colored troops involved in the Brownsville (Texas) riots. In a personal letter to the president and in resolutions addressed to the war department, the mass meeting urged the rescinding of the action.

As an indication of the depth of their feelings in the matter, the spokesmen of the negroes declared that Chicago would take one of the companies and support it here until the president comes to see the injustice of his course.

Resolutions were adopted deploring the forthcoming visit of Senator Benjamin Tillman to Chicago, but calling upon Chicago negroes to control themselves during the event.

### Trinity Locals.

Since my 1st letter quite a number of changes have taken place and it is with some degree of sadness that we retrospect the past year. Many have failed socially, financially and morally, and we are ashamed of our meager attainments this year.

Death has entered many of our homes and claimed for its victims some of our best people. Many hearts have been made sad but the world moves on and people in this community are doing well and ought to be satisfied, and yet we see people moving east and west, north and south hunting a better country, dragging women and children half clad through the cold with a dog or two and one or two cows. Some men travel through this country and spend what they have moving, find others with comfortable homes and they become discouraged, feel like fate is against them and shipwreck.

They don't take into consideration that the man with the home has been a life time accumulating what he has. In this immediate section the people have made plenty of oats, corn, cotton, cane, potatoes and tobacco also plenty of vegetables, have plenty of butter, milk, and fat hogs to make their meat, chickens and eggs and plenty of fruit put up to do through the winter if they took time to put it up. One of my neighbors raised 1000 bushels of sweet potatoes on 5 acres of ground, and another, John Muckelroy, made up three thousand gallons of ribbon cane syrup year before last and thinks he will beat that this year. There are four or five other mills in the community doing good business. I made 10 bales of cotton on 9 acres of ground here and that is not the best.

150 bushels of corn has been raised here on one acre. A few years ago in a contest between three states South Carolina won, and that was only 237 bu. on 1 acre and on up lands at that. Now some may doubt this but facts can

furnished. A cow can also be made to give 10 gallons of milk or an ox grown to weigh 2600 lbs. but it has all been done.

We need less land more enthusiastic farmers, the study of the soil and the proper fertilizer to bring forth the best results.
