SHADE TOBACCO COMPANY.

Enthusiastic Meeting of Business Men Held Yesterday.

Yesterday afternoon a large and enthusiastic meeting of business men was held in the office of the Nacogdoches Land Co. for purpose of discussing the shade tobacco question and also the matter of organizing a business men's association for the purpose of planting fifteen or twenty acres of tobacco under shade next year.

Those present at the meeting were: E. A. Blount, E. C. Branch, I. L. Sturdevant, Chas. Perkins, John Schmidt, D. K. Cason, Dr. J. E. Mayfield, E. M. Dotson, Hal Tucker, S. L. Miller, W. C. Perkins, James Seale, June C. Harris, Robert Lindsey and J. L. Gill. Tausig & Co., were represented by H. Weinburg, and Otto Olson, the government expert, was also present.

All present expressed unbounded faith in the future of the tobacco industry in this county, and considered the proposition of Tausig & Co., a liberal one, and one which every farmer who is in a position to grow tobacco should take advantage of.

After a free discussion of the subject and the matter of cost estimated, it was the unanimous opinion of all that the business men of Nacogdoches should organize a company for the purpose of planting shade tobacco for market.

Mr. J. L. Gill made a proposition to rent the company fifteen acres of his farm on Henderson road, he also agreed to take stock in the company to get the organization started on.

At the suggestion of Mr. Olson, it was agreed that Messrs. Chas. Perkins, E. C. Branch, Robert Lindsey, and D. K. Cason, would act as a special committee to place the remainder of the stock with the business men.

It is now practically assured that the company will plant ten acres under shade, and possibly fifteen acres. If the company plants fifteen acres this assures Nacogdoches of something of thirty acres of shade tobacco. The business men 15 acres, Tausig & Co. 10 acres, Tom Moroney 5 acres, and W. A. King it is said expects to plant 5 acres. This makes a total of 35 acres shade tobacco and which if the season is favorable should bring to the growers approximately \$12,000.

The Implement People

John Simpson Dead.

Many readers of The Sentinel and many old timers of the county will learn with sadness of the death of John Simpson, colored, which occurred last night at his home in the Woden neighborhood, ten miles southeast of Nacogdoches, where he had lived for many years. He was totally blind during the last thirty years of his life, but he managed to make a kind of a living. He was about eighty years of age, and his mother is still living in this county at the age of one hundred and five years. She is known as old aunt Polly Crawford. She will probably attend the funeral.

John Simpson, was a remarkable character in his long life, and was a man of note in the prime of life. In the first place he was always a democrat and stood firm when it was dangerous to the party during the trying times of carpet bag rule, when the dirtiest kind of republicans held reign of terror in our county. He thus incurred the hatred of his own race, and he was often assailed and assaulted by them.

He had many personal scrapes and battles, some of them very dangerous and formidable, but he never flinched or feared, and his great firmness and courage made him a hero that was unquarrelable.

He went with his young master, Lieutenant A. L. Simpson into the Confederate army in Capt. Wm. Clark's Co. G., 4th Texas Infantry, which left this town January 1, 1862, and he stuck to it faithfully till the end of the war.

proving always true and faithful in every trying emergency. On two occasions he was captured and imprisoned by the federals, but he escaped and resumed his relation to his owner and his own army and once, he brought with him two fine mules that belonged

to the enemy and turned them over to our army. His Captain Wm. Clark, was promoted to Colonel and his owner became Captain of the Company. These officers and all this company never forgot old John's heroic devotion. He has outlived most of his comrades and friends. Peace to his ashes and honor to his memory, all the more because his color was black.

A RETROSPECTIVE view of the past twelve months reveals the fact that Nacogdoches citizens have many things to be thankful for.

GOVERNOR CAMPBELL'S newspaper friends, those who supported the other candidate, are busy fixing up the state for the official family.

THE news comes from New York, in a special to the Houston Chronicle, that Senator J. W. Bailey was elected president of the American Association of Trotting Horse Breeders at the recent meeting held in New York.

SENATOR BAILEY now has an opportunity to do some more explaining. "That Texas Case" of the Waters-Pierce Oil Co. is a thorn in the senator's side. Had Senator Bailey known then what he knows now—well it wouldn't have happened.

THE regular meeting of the Nacogdoches County Tobacco Growers association is the last Saturday in each month. If you have a few acres on your farm suitable for growing tobacco, join the association at the next meeting and get in the "swim" with your neighbors.

THE telegraphers strike in Houston is becoming rather ugly. A few nights ago a crowd of alleged telegraphers overpowered two "strike breakers" and administered a severe drubbing to the men. Beating helpless men by a crowd of rough men will not create sympathy for the men who walked out. In fact it is a poor way to conduct a strike.

IF the allegations set forth in the papers filed in the Waters-Pierce Oil case at Austin are true, Senator Bailey received a goodly sum (about \$15,000) in "the Texas Case." Senator Bailey has intimated that all men who would claim that he received pay from the octopus were liars, but it looks now like the liars told the truth one time.

THE farmer who diversifies his crops is the man who never has to give a mortgage, but on the other hand has money to loan the farmer who remains in the old rut.

TO the man looking for a location for a new home, East Texas holds out the best proposition of any section of the southland. Nacogdoches county alone can offer good schools, good churches, fertile lands, the best free-stone water in Texas and last but not means the least, the best people living.

PALESTINE has a negro preacher who recently advised the members of his flock to "use less face powder and perfume, and instead to use a good strong soap and plenty of water frequently." This little talk evidently was made immediately during the calm that follows a big spell of shouting. From a viewpoint of cleanliness the parson is right. But the "smell" Oh, no. It will never wash off.

IF Senator Bailey did not receive pay for his services and influence in the Waters-Pierce Oil Co. proceedings several years ago, the officials of that concern thought he was entitled to compensation and vouchers were issued for sundry amounts aggregating \$14,000. Perhaps Mr. Bailey returned the vouchers to Mr. Pierce and explained that he would not accept a fee from a public corporation. But did he do it?

THE present system of granting certificates to school teachers should be revoked. There are young men and women in this county teaching school, who could serve their country better and bring honor to themselves in some other profession. To become a successful teacher requires many days and nights of hard work. There is something more required of the teacher than his or her ability to pass the required examination.

THE legislature will have to take a hand in the matter of child labor in Texas. Too many little children under the age of fourteen years are made slaves in the factories and the work shop. Every labor union in the state should see that a good representative is stationed at Austin during the next session of the legislature to see that proper laws are made regulating the employment of children in factories and shops.

AS was expected, Senator Bailey has issued a statement and he says that the papers that were filed with the attorney general's department in the Waters-Pierce Oil Co. oyster suits are frauds, and the man who says that he ever received a cent from the octopus is "a liar." This was expected of the junior senator. Giving the "lie" is one of his long suits. But when the senator says that Attorney General Davidson had the statement published for the purpose of defeating "a democratic nominee" Senator Bailey is wrong another time. Mr. Bailey is up against the real thing and is aware of the fact.

THE entire press of Texas will regret the fact that Mr. R. T. Milner of the Henderson Times has sold his plant, good will, etc., and quits the newspaper business. For the past twenty-six years Mr. Milner has done valiant service for the democratic party in East Texas, and his paper has been long looked upon as authority on many issues before the people. The Sentinel hopes that he will reconsider the matter and get in harness again.

AN interesting sample of what a little thing will do to start a run on a bank is reported from Chillicothe, Ohio. A local savings bank had been called upon to make its regular report included among other items the following. "Balance on hand at the close of business, November 10." A depositor read it and immediately conceived the idea that the bank had quit business on November 10. He told another man what he had seen in the paper, and this man told another, and so on, until a mob of breathless and excited men and women and children was lined up in front of the bank's doors. They withdrew upwards of \$10,000 before the run was stopped, which was soon done when the bank management ascertained the cause of the trouble.

WHEN Mr. R. S. Carver of The Sherman Register resigned the position as managing editor of that excellent paper Mr. H. G. Stinnett was chosen by the stockholders to manage the affairs of the paper until a successor was elected to fill the place made vacant by Mr. Carver. Mr. A. W. Perkins of St. Louis, a newspaper man of many years experience has been selected to manage the Register. During the brief time Mr. Stinnett has been at the helm he has proven himself to be a good newspaper man and The Sentinel had learned to like him famously. The right hand of Texas newspaper men will be extended to Mr. Perkins and in a few weeks, when he has become accustomed to the new order of things he will be singing the praises of the southland like an old timer.

REPRESENTATIVE Charles H. Weisse, democrat of the Sixth Wisconsin district, has given an interview in which he suggests a fusion in the next congress between the democrats and tariff revision republicans; the object being to oust Joseph Cannon from the speakership. "If the republicans are really in earnest in their desire for a revision of the tariff schedules," said Mr. Weisse, "they will have the support of the democrats. But revision can not be accomplished with Mr. Cannon in the speaker's chair. With him anything but a 'standpat' policy is believed to be impossible. If the republicans consent to this union the democrats will consent to selection of any man whom the tariff revision republicans name for speaker. But a revision of the house rules will be asked in return. The democrats say this, too, is impossible while Mr. Cannon rules the house. It is not the de-

sure of the democrats to obtain more house patronage; simply a revision of the house rules which will enable a revision of the tariff."

SATURDAY, December 8, would be a good time to hold a county mass meeting to discuss the tobacco proposition for this county. There is money in tobacco to the man who will follow instructions. Farmers who planted tobacco this year made good money. One man netted \$86.00 per acre; the least money made was \$62 per acre net. This should be sufficient encouragement to the farmers to try a few acres as an experiment. There is not a farmer within a radius of six miles of Nacogdoches but what can take care of at least two acres of tobacco and never miss the time from other field crops.

There is no uncertainty about a market; there is a firm ready to take every pound of tobacco grown in Nacogdoches county next year at a price of 15 cents per pound for open field tobacco, and 40 cents per pound for shade grown tobacco. Tobacco was grown here last year at these prices and those who tried the venture are now enthusiastic tobacco men. The government experts will remain here another year to give the farmers instructions in preparing land, seed beds, planting, cultivating, harvesting, curing, and placing the product on the market; all this is done simply for the asking and at no expense to the farmers. It appears to The Sentinel that this is a good thing and a golden opportunity for the farmers of Nacogdoches to better themselves financially. Remember The Sentinel does not advise dropping all other crops for tobacco, but suggests that from one to three acres be planted in tobacco as an experiment and then if it proves entirely satisfactory to the farmer, the future acreage can be determined by actual results from the experimental crop.

PATIENCE seems more than a virtue when a publisher is patient under circumstances as trying as the following: Paper supply short, no paper obtainable and publication hour at hand, or past. Our store of patience has been tested in this wise this week. He will also ask for \$500,000 for another jetty at Aransas Pass to complete the channel started.

CHINESE BRIDES ADMITTED.

On the Ground That they Married American Born Chinamen.

El Paso, Texas, Dec. 1—Two faithful Chinese brides, who were married in Mexico City last July to two prominent San Francisco merchants native born, and after denied entrance to the United States at this port, but who then took an appeal to the department of commerce and labor, remaining in Juarez in the meantime, have won their contention that being the wives of American born Chinamen, they were entitled to come into this country.

The department of commerce and labor has sustained their appeal and directed the local immigration authorities to admit the two brides, who at once left for San Francisco to join their husbands. The women came direct from China to Mexico.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

The second session of the fifty-ninth congress convened today, and President Roosevelt delivered his message to congress. A synopsis of the message appears in The Sentinel this afternoon and should be read by every reader of the paper. Legislation on new and important subjects is laid before the law making body of the nation.

Injunctions, the negro problem, negro education, capital and labor, railroad employees hours, investigation of disputes, control of corporations, combinations are necessary, inheritance and income tax, agricultural interests, marriage and divorce, currency reform, naturalization of Japs, Cuban intervention, the army and navy. These are the subjects the president's message deals with.

Rev. Ellis Smith has been made presiding elder of the Jacksonville district. This promotion is pleasant news to his friends here who rejoice with him in his success. Rev. W. W. Waits will be the pastor of the Jacksonville church during the ensuing year.

If God has blessed your home with good healthy children, let them enjoy themselves, while they are young. Remember you was once a child.

Keeping the parlor shut up and living in the kitchen is one of the causes why boys and girls are anxious to leave home.

THE OPPORTUNITY IS NOW.

For the past several years the farmers in this section of the state have been conducting experiments in tobacco growing under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture. The experiments in the past have proven to be very profitable, and the leaf tobacco grown on the orangeburg soils of Nacogdoches county have been tested by the expert tobacco leaf dealers of the nation and it is the universal opinion of all who have tested the leaf grown in Nacogdoches that it is the best tobacco grown outside of Cuba. The tobacco that the farmers have been experimenting with is Cuban cigar filler, and every crop grown has been marketed at a good profit.

There is now an opportunity for the farmers and the business men to conduct the experiments a little further and that is by growing shade tobacco. The farm at Red Field has been growing shade tobacco, and every crop grown there has been up to a very high standard of wrapper tobacco. In fact the wrapper tobacco grown by Mr. J. L. Gill at Red Field last year was awarded the first premium at the International Fair at San Antonio. While the first premium is considered as a very high compliment, yet the average East Texas man is after the monetary side of the question. Mr. Gill and his associate cultivated ten acres under shade last year and their net proceeds amounted to \$2600. Think of two thousand and six hundred dollars net from ten acres of land—no other one crop which requires only a few months to plant, harvest and market, can show a record like this.

Besides agreeing to contract for all the open tobacco at 15 cents per pound, and pay a premium for crops that will grade above average. The same firm agrees to contract for a term of years with the farmers and others who will engage in tobacco growing under shade, to pay a fixed price of forty cents per pound, and further agrees to advance one hundred dollars per acre to all who will plant shade grown tobacco.

There will be a mass meeting of the business men and farmers in this city on Saturday, December 8, for the purpose of discussing the tobacco proposition for profit, and every man in the county is extended a most cordial invitation to be present and take part in the deliberations of the meeting.

The government experts and the representative of one of the largest leaf tobacco dealers in the United States will be present and fully explain every detail.

TEACH THE TEACHER.

Before the doctor is permitted to leave the college and practice his profession, he first must have completed the entire course of medicine and passed a satisfactory examination before being granted the much coveted sheep's skin. He leaves the school a competent man of medicine and surgery, equipped to take his place among the foremost practitioners of the country, with an equal chance to carve his name high upon the ladder of fame. The safe guards thus thrown around the people is one of the many great blessings the American people should be doubly thankful for. Now, then, the question presents itself that if such safe guards are placed around the body, why should not safe guards be placed around the mind. Dear reader, and thinking man or woman, have you ever given the matter of training the mind a careful thought? This is a question which the entire human family should be interested in—education. And, yet the matter of education and instructors is given but very little thought by others than the trustees of the schools of Texas, and then the matter is merely passed over at the meeting when teachers are being selected for the school; perhaps an examination of the certificate being the extent of the investigation on the part of the board. Never are the real qualifications of a teacher investigated.

It is at this very point where the educational laws of this state are weak. The school teacher, before being granted a certificate to teach school, should be required to fit himself, or herself, as the case may be for the profession, the same as the medical man. A man or woman to become a school teacher in Texas should be required to take a four or five years' course in a normal or teachers, and after taking this course should be required to pass rigid examinations not only in subjects now required, but in addition thereto the organization and government of the schools, method of teaching, building a mind, etc.

There are many noble young men and women teaching in Nacogdoches county today who would be far better off were they engaged in another work than teaching. These young men and women have passed the necessary grade to entitle them to a teachers certificate—when that's said the whole business is brought to an abrupt termination. Never has the question of governing the mind of "Young America" been given a thought by the young teacher until the first school has been secured.

This is a matter for school superintendents to think over. The Sentinel may be wrong in its conclusions as to other counties, but an investigation of the records in the county superintendent's office reveals the fact that there are some teachers in this county who cannot tell you "why, and what they are teaching."

IT HAPPENED ONCE BEFORE

Negro Troops Raided Town in Dakota in 1885.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The war department is preparing for an investigation by congress in the case of the companies of the Twenty-fifth infantry recently discharged without honor by order of President Roosevelt and to this end has compiled the record of the negro troops dating back to the civil war.

It is said that this record discloses a state of affairs not generally known, and that once before at least the Twenty-fifth infantry has "shot up a town."

The affair happened in 1885 at Fort Sturgis, Dakota. Some negro soldiers went on a rampage similar to that at Brownsville, Texas, and one of their number was killed.

In the first case the citizens took the matter into their own hands, forced the troops under pains of death to disclose the name of the man who did the killing and then took him out and lynched him.

Attributes Southern Development to Disfranchisement of the Negro.

Waltham, Miss., Nov. 27.—The South's rapid industrial development was last night attributed by Congressman John Sharp Williams to the substantial political disfranchisement of the negro. He said that from 1890 to 1900 Mississippi made greater progress in manufacturing than Connecticut, and the South generally a greater per cent than New England. As a reason for this he said:

"The reason consists in the fact that in 1890 Mississippi adopted a constitution virtually disfranchising the negro race, without, however, violating the provisions of the 15th amendment. Louisiana, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia and Alabama have done likewise, and the result has been racial peace, accompanied by material welfare."

As a solution of the negro problem Mr. Williams favored employing white laborers.

ONE MORE USE FOR SEAWEED.

Stuff That Passes For Citron and is Called Ceatron.

Seattle, Nov. 30.—Another use has been discovered for seaweed. It is hereafter to be used as a delicacy. The Christmas puddings of coming holiday times will be made palatable with expurgated essence of seaweed. In the grocery stores it will be labeled "ceatron." But the grocer probably will give it to you when you ask for citron. Exit the citron, enter the seaweed ceatron.

A company has been organized which will make ceatron at Ballard, a suburb of Seattle. The inventors of the process are Theodore C. Frye and Carl E. Magnussen, professors at the University of Washington. The ceatron, and the process of manufacture will be interestingly shown at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, which is to be held in Seattle in 1909 for the purpose of exploiting the little-known resources of the Northland.

The seaweed will be gathered in the summer time and dried on the shore, then stacked under shelter for some weeks until it becomes covered with a white, saline effervescence.

At this stage of the proceedings, seaweed is known as kelp. The next step is to

burn it, in a round, brick-lined pit or kiln, and as the weed softens it is stirred with a hot iron until it becomes a semi-fluid mass. It is then cooled and broken into pieces, and lo, there you have your ceatron, and it would take a mighty good judge to tell it from citron.

When salt was dear, kelp used to be valuable for soda, which was used in soap making. Now soda can be made cheaper from salt. Kelp is used extensively in the manufacture of iodine and chloride of potassium. A ton of kelp yields eight pounds of iodine. These other uses of seaweed will be illustrated at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

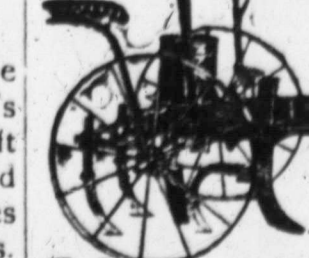
