TEXAS RANGER PENSIONS.

Slayden's Resolution Will Include Many of the Old Guards.

Washington, Dec. 17.—Congressman Slayden, on behalf of the committee on military affairs, reported favorably the resolution calling on the governor of Texas for certified rolls of Texas rangers who helped protect the frontier against Indians from 1855 to 1860. No opposition to the resolution is expected. Its adoption will enable many old Texas rangers to get pensions.

DON'T DO IT.

The Boys will Have to Cut Out The Cannon Crackers.

Justice of the Peace Huston and County Attorney Russell will take a hand in the matter of shooting cannon crackers within the city of Nacogdoches this year. This morning the reporter was called to the office of the justice of the peace, when the following law was given for publication:

Art. 336. P. C.—If any person shall discharge any gun, pistol or firearms of any description, or shall discharge any cannon cracker or torpedo on or across any public square, street or alley in any city, town or village, or in any street, or within one hundred yards of any business house, in this state, he shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

By the term "Cannon cracker" is meant any fire cracker or other combustible package more than two inches in length and more than one inch in circumference.

Money in Hogs.

Yesterday Mr. E. C. Muckelroy, Sr. of the Trinity community was in the city and had a bunch of 17 hogs for sale.

The hogs averaged 215 pounds and he received \$164.70. He said to The Sentinel reporter: "This is just like finding money. These hogs have been raised and fattened for market at practically no expense whatever."

FOUGHT WITH A HAT PIN

Chicago Girl Stood Off Five Highwaymen Until Help Came.

Chicago, Dec. 17.—Battling with a hat pin with five highwaymen who attacked her in broad daylight in a crowded south side street, Miss May Gates, cashier of the A. G. Morse Confectionery Company, held her assailants at bay until the police came to her rescue. Her resistance saved her employers \$5000, which she was bringing from the bank for pay roll.

Miss Gates left the bank at noon, took a street car within a block of the company's building and was almost in the door when the five robbers, masked and armed, attacked and dragged her into an alleyway, struggling to wrest from her the handbag containing the money.

Bystanders rushed to her aid, but the highwaymen drew their revolvers and fought so desperately that they were not only defying capture, but seemed in a fair way finally to overpower Miss Gates. Attracted to the spot by the commotion, a half dozen bluecoats and detectives at last ended the fight. After twenty or thirty shots had been exchanged the robbers attempted to escape on a passing street car. Three of them eluded the officers, but two, who gave their names as Harry Farnam and Harry Baker, were arrested.

Farnam, one of the policemen and one bystander were slightly wounded by the flying bullets.

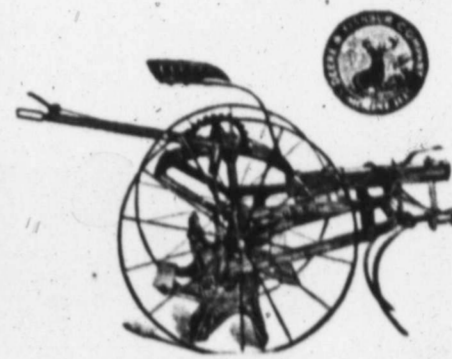

The school law of Texas provides that teachers while attending county institutes, are entitled to full pay for the time of such attendance, and trustees of schools are authorized to grant the time as required by law for the teachers to attend the institutes.

Section 37 of the school laws, provides that the county superintendent has the authority to cancel the certificate of any teacher who is willfully absent from a regular institute held in the county.

The truck growers of Nacogdoches county will meet in this city on Saturday, December 29 for the purpose of getting the Truck Growers' Association in shape for the business of next year.

The business men of Nacogdoches wish to see the tobacco industry a success in this locality. They will have to act quickly in the matter of subscribing to the remainder of the stock in the Shade Tobacco Company. There is only one thousand dollars yet to be subscribed.

The truck growers of Nacogdoches should get themselves in shape to intelligently handle the business of next season and to this end there will be a meeting in Nacogdoches on Saturday, December 29, for the purpose of electing officers and placing the organization in shape to look after the trucking interests of this section of the state.

Now and then the name of Governor-elect, Campbell is mentioned as the man to succeed Senator Bailey. Mr. Campbell would not accept the position even if tendered him on a golden platter. He was elected by the people of Texas to make the state its best governor and he will come pretty near filling the bill, by all odds.

With the future for the tobacco business of the county the best, and the prospects for a big oil strike in the oil fields, the town of Nacogdoches has a splendid future. Nacogdoches now is one of the best towns in the state and her farming and lumber interests will continue to make the town one of importance, but when the tobacco industry is fully developed, and a half dozen or more big packing houses are located here, and an oil refinery, and factories for the by products of oil are here, then will the old town be on city airs.

REV. J. M. GADDY.

In the death of Rev. J. M. Gaddy at Austin on December 13, 1906, the Baptist church of Texas has lost one of her best men and the state at large a valuable citizen. Only a short time ago, he announced in one of the state conventions that he would raise a hundred thousand dollars for the church. At the next meeting of the convention he was able to report that over a hundred thousand had been raised.

The work he undertook to accomplish was a huge undertaking, but he came out victorious. He was left a nervous wreck and it was while on his way to a sanitarium that he met his death. He was riding in a sleeping car and left his berth unnoticed and walked off of the platform. Bro. Gaddy was quite well known in Nacogdoches and was a brother to Rev. W. M. Gaddy.

THE SENTINEL is pleased to note some of the improvements made in the roads in precinct No. 1, of which Mat. Muckelroy is the commissioner. He is doing a good work and if he will just continue in well doing until the end of his term as commissioner, he will have established a name for himself and at the same time given his constituents good roads.

With weather so that a man can work out of doors, practically the year round, good schools and churches, and the best people on earth, it will be an easy matter to tell the friends in the old states that East Texas is the best place on earth for the poor man to make his home.

TEXAS is fast becoming the truck and fruit section of the nation, and especially is this so of Eastern Texas. Nacogdoches county is one of the favored counties in the state, and it behoves the truckers and orchardists to keep up their organization and keep in touch with the markets.

SHAW AND COTTON FARMERS.

Secretary Shaw has come to the relief of the "situation" again and will deposit \$10,000,000 in certain cities for the purpose of lightening the pressure for currency. We gather from his statement that the currency panic is due to the great demands of the cotton crop, which must be moved. "The cotton planter," he says, "unlike the Western farmer, demands actual cash, and he carries it home in his pocket." And in order to furnish a sufficient amount of cash for these cotton farmers \$10,000,000 will be deposited in such banks as the secretary chooses for that purpose.

Of the \$10,000,000 thus to be deposited \$1,500,000 each to Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, Baltimore and St. Louis and \$500,000 each to Cincinnati and Louisville. The banks of these cities will get \$7,500,000.

It is to be hoped that the cotton farmers of Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New York, Maryland, Ohio, Illinois, Kentucky and Missouri will appreciate this effort of the secretary of the treasury to assist them, and that as they carry home in their pockets the money thus provided for their convenience they will remember the intelligent service which he has rendered them.

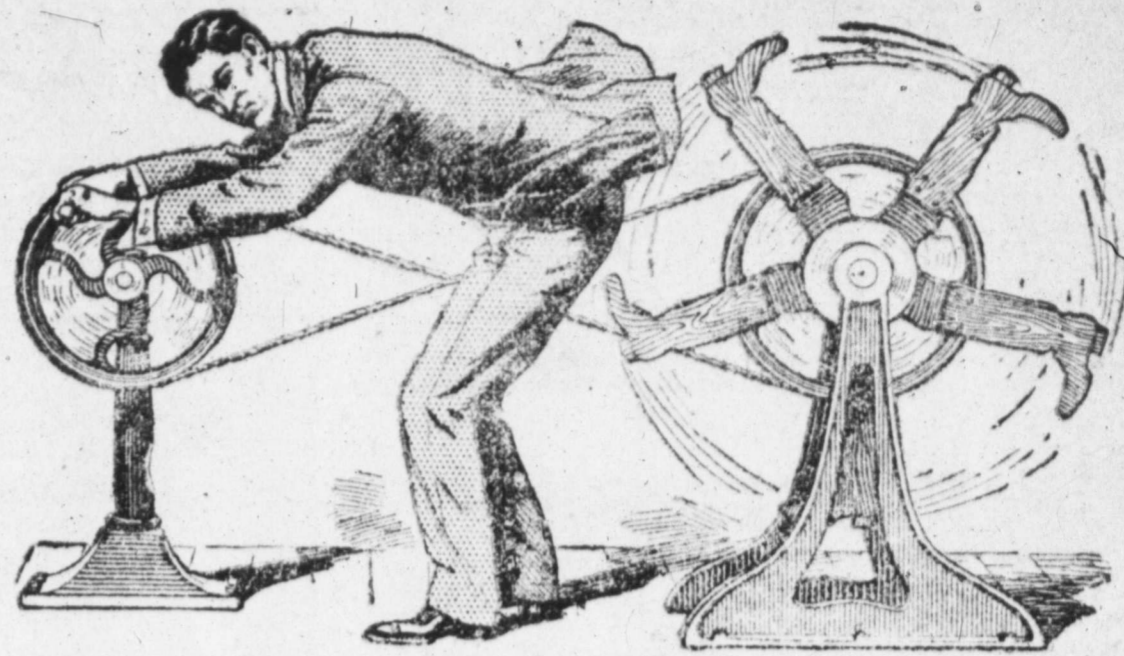
The Texas banks and the Texas farmers can take care of themselves. The crop in Texas this year is only 4,000,000 bales anyway, and the trifling sum of \$225,000,000 which it is worth has put no unusual strain on the banks. Houston, with her billion-dollar record of bank clearings, has been able to assist the Texas farmers.

The cotton farmers around Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, New York, Louisville, St. Louis, Cincinnati and Baltimore have not been so fortunately situated. The heavy yield in those vicinities, with the custom of those Northern cotton planters of carrying the money home in their pockets, has no doubt rendered the financial burden of moving the crop unusually painful.

We shudder to think of what the cotton planters of Labrador, Greenland and Iceland suffered. Those of Alaska must be well nigh ruined, and we assume that since Peary mentioned nothing about it that the cotton situation in the region of the North Pole has simply kerflummed for lack of currency, to move the crop.

But the Polar cotton planters can not justly lay the blame on Secretary Shaw. They are not of us. He has done his duty by his own people. Nobody can deny that. —Houston Post.

THE Nacogdoches truck growers should begin now to talk up the matter of getting the organization on its feet in time to take care of the business of the truck growers next shipping season. There will be a meeting of the truck growers in this city on the last Saturday in this month, and then the matter of reorganizing will be discussed. A cordial invitation is extended to every farmer who expects to plant truck next year for profit to attend the meeting.

DECISION OF COMPTROLLER.

May Increase Revenue of State Many Thousand Dollars.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 10.—The comptroller's department has rendered a most important ruling regarding the assessment of improvements on lands, and which, if carried out will likely yield to the state many thousands of dollars additional revenue in the way of taxes.

The question was brought about by Stuart Francis, the new tax assessor of Travis county, who request a ruling from the comptroller as to assessing improvements on farm lands. Heretofore it has generally been the custom of those owners of farm lands to assess the land at so much per acre, and in hardly any instances were the improvements included, while in cities not only the lots are given in but the improvements are included, as a result the owner of property in a city pays taxes on his property and the improvements thereon, while the farmer escapes the tax on the improvements.

Mr. Francis in discussing the question yesterday gave an illustration: He said that one farmer who owns 100 acres of land without any improvements renders his land, say at \$15 an acre and, while his neighbor owns the same amount of land which has probably \$10,000 worth of improvements on the land, renders his land at the same rate of \$15 an acre, and this is what prompted him to ask for a ruling from the comptroller. The comptroller's reply to Tax Assessor Francis' query, is as follows:

"Mr. Stuart Francis, Tax Assessor Travis County, Austin, Texas.
Dear Sir: This department is in receipt of yours of the 6th instant, in which you ask for information as to whether the value of improvements should be added to the value of farms and other lands on which they are made in taking renditions and assessing taxes.
In reply to same, I have to

advise that in valuing land to the purpose of taxation, the value of all buildings, structures and improvements, or other fixtures of whatever kind thereon, should be included (Article 5062, R. S.) In other words the value of the improvements should be added in arriving at the value of the land. Yours very truly,
J. W. Stephens,
Comptroller."

The bins may be full of feed-stuffs and the smoke house full of hams and bacon, but one of the surest signs of prosperity is the fact that all the banks are carrying large deposits and money is easy to borrow—on good security. Hovey, vice president of the Interstate National bank of Kansas City, who has been traveling through Texas lately for the purpose of placing some loans, said: "I am not meeting with a 'howling' success in placing loans in Texas, for the very simple reason, I am finding that the smaller banks of Texas are prepared to handle all paper that is desirable. It is evident that the larger banks will have to hunt a considerable distance from headquarters to place good loans and first-class security is gobbled up as quickly as it is offered all over the country." Texas is in good condition, from a financial standpoint, and conditions are growing better each year. —Sherman Register.

A charter has been granted to the company to do business as set forth in the application for a charter and as soon as a few minor details are completed the company will begin work in the Nacogdoches oil fields.

The Watch as a Compass.

Few people are able to go through life without occasionally getting "turned around," this is, being unable at times to locate the points of the compass. It is important to know that the watch can easily be utilized as a substitute for the compass. If the hour hand be pointed at the sun, or rather at the intersection of the sun's meridian with the earth, south will be half way between the hour hand and the figure 1 on the dial. For example, at 4 o'clock the figure 2 on the dial will show which direction is south. North, of course, is opposite. At 10 o'clock 10:30 will indicate south. In the forenoon the reckoning will be at the left of 12 on the dial, in the afternoon at the right. It is easy to imagine circumstances under which this information would prove exceedingly valuable. —Uvalde Leader.

WALKED FROM MOVING TRAIN

Rev. J. M. Gaddy Fatally Injured Near City of Austin.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 13.—Rev. J. M. Gaddy of Dallas, formerly of Waco, fell from a Katy sleeper near here this morning and died as a result of his injuries.

He was en route to San Antonio to be treated for nervous prostration, and, without being noticed, he left his berth before daylight and walked off the train. He was not missed until after the train left Austin.

His son-in-law, who was with him, left the train at San Marcos as soon as he learned that Rev. Gaddy was missing. He returned to Austin and discovered that the injured man had been picked up by a local train and brought here.

He died at the depot before the hospital ambulance arrived to convey him to a hospital.

All farmers who contemplate growing tobacco next year should attend the meeting, and come prepared to give an estimate of the probable amount of fertilizer that will be used next year, so that the association can order the fertilizer in bulk, and thereby get it at a saving of several dollars to the members of the association.

THE county clerk's office is busy this week getting the commissions of the road commissioners in shape for the sheriff to deliver immediately after the first of the new year. There are 181 roads precincts in the county. If every one of the new road overseers will study the laws governing the duties of the road overseers, and will begin an active campaign as soon as possible after receiving their commissions, Nacogdoches county should have the best roads in the state.

THE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

THERE is this much about the tobacco proposition. If the business men fail to take up the remaining stock in the shade tobacco company, it will practically mean the down fall of the tobacco industry in Nacogdoches county. Mr. Hanson of the U. S. Department of Agriculture says that unless the people show sufficient interest in the culture of tobacco that the services of the government experts will be withdrawn; that it required a great deal of assurance on the part of the experts in Texas that the acreage would be increased on both open field and shade the next season, in order that the services of the experts might be retained in Texas another year. He further stated that the failure to increase the acreage would practically mean the withdrawal of the present market and that it would be a hard proposition to get a buyer of standing to enter the field if it was known that the effort to build up a market here was a failure. All but one thousand dollars of the subscription has been taken, and this small matter should be looked after by the business men. Can they afford to have the tobacco prospects of Nacogdoches county blighted for a few dollars? The money paid into the proposed company is not a donation by any means. The company has a guaranteed market for three years at 40 cents per pound, and at this price based on a minimum yield the subscription money will be returned with a good dividend. To say the least of it all money will be returned and a market will be established for the farmers, besides building up an industry that will add many thousands to the taxable values of Nacogdoches county.

HENRY CLAY PIERCE, the man who has been indicted for perjury by the grand jury of Travis county, Texas, is one of America's most aristocratic millionaires. His home is in St. Louis, but he divides his time between that city and New York. His home in St. Louis is a palace worth going miles to see and he has more servants than any man in that great city; twenty-five of his servants live in a handsome residence near his own. When Mr. Pierce is in New York he lives at the Waldorf-Astoria in apartments for which he pays \$125 per day. He has one of the finest yachts afloat and is usually out for a cruise when the officers desire him to testify against himself or his company. But wouldn't Mr. Pierce look well wrapped in the striped uniform of the Texas penitentiary?—Honey Grove Signal.

If it was simply a donation the business men were asking for in getting the shade tobacco proposition started, there would be some excuse (?) for the business men to be a little backward in subscribing to the fund, but as it is it appears to be a money making proposition for all who may become interested, and to say the least of it they will get their money back. Right now is the critical period in the history of the tobacco industry, and it is right now that enthusiasm will count. A representative who is in a position to explain every detail, will call on the business men this week and when he calls be ready to subscribe to the stock in the company. Remember there is a market for this tobacco for the next three years at 40 cents per pound. Figured upon the minimum yield for three years all money will be returned and a very nice dividend. If at the end of that period the company desires to liquidate, well and good, if not they can increase the capital stock and engage in the culture of shade tobacco on a large scale.

REMEMBER if Nacogdoches fails to raise the subscription to plant the shade tobacco next season that it will practically mean that the future of the tobacco industry here is killed. When the solicitor presents the list to you give the matter serious consideration and let him explain this proposition to you. It is not a donation he is asking, but a business proposition that is a good thing for Nacogdoches, and the stockholders in the company.

The merchants of the towns in which these excellent papers are published took goodly spaces and told of the goods things for Christmas.

CANAL DEED PASSED.

Government Takes Port Arthur Waterway From Company.

Beaumont, Texas, Dec. 15.—The owner ship of the Port Arthur Canal today passed to the United States Government and today Port Arthur, by the terms of previous agreement, was made a port of entry.

Intelligence of this important event was brought to the city in the form of the following telegram received by Hon. R. A. Greer, from S. W. Moore, chief counsel for the Kansas City Southern Railroad, with headquarters at Kansas City, Mo.:

"Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 14.—R. A. Greer, Beaumont, Tex.: The Secretary of War accepts the canal and docks company deed and advises Secretary of the Treasury, who promises immediate appointments."

In discussing the receipt of this telegram Mr. Greer said: "This means that the title to the Port Arthur Canal and its right-of-way has been accepted by the United States Government and that, under the law, the Treasury Secretary of the United States is authorized to a point the necessary officials to make Port Arthur a port of entry. The chances are that it will be done before the first of the new year."

Intelligence that Port Arthur is to be a port of entry will be welcome news to all this section of the country. It means that the importance and consequence of the port is to be greatly enlarged and its business increased, and that the prosperity which will come to Port Arthur in this way will be distributed and reflected to the benefit of Jefferson county and this entire section.

The bill providing for a port of entry at Port Arthur passed Congress at the previous session, but was made dependent upon the delivery of the Port Arthur Canal to the Government before becoming effective. A provision of the bill makes Sabine a subport and a Deputy Collector will be installed at that place.

Secretary Shaw Addresses Note to All the Banks.

Washington, Dec. 15.—The Secretary of the treasury today issued the following to all banking institutions in the United States:

A very marked scarcity of small bills is noticeable everywhere, and the treasury is powerless to relieve the situation in the absence of legislation allowing national banks to issue a larger proportion of their circulation in denominations of \$5. The banks themselves must be relied upon to alleviate the strain as far as possible. There is in circulation nearly fifteen million dollars in certificates of denomination of \$10. Many of these are doubtless packed away in vaults of various banks and held as reserve. Permit me to respectfully ask that each institution, state and national, search the money in its vaults and send these certificates to the treasury. They will promptly be converted into ones and twos, to the very great relief of the country. It is the only remedy. Let no bank complain of conditions until it has literally searched its own vaults and contributed as far as possible to the relief of the situation.

Galveston, Texas, Dec. 12.—Owing to inadequate facilities for the handling of immigrants, the examination of passengers arriving on the North German Lloyd steamer Frankfurt was not completed until yesterday afternoon. All told there were about 500 to be exact, 492 passengers. On previous occasions, when the ship at pier 29 was not crowded with cargo, 600 passengers have been examined and passed upon in less than one-half the time, all of which is an argument for renewed efforts to secure sufficient money to begin the immediate construction of the proposed immigrant station.

After working along on board the vessel since yesterday morning, the passengers were finally landed, the last one permitted that privilege going ashore after 3 o'clock. Of the 492 passengers all were landed excepting three. Two of these were ordered deported because afflicted with trachoma of the eye. One young woman is of questionable character who has made previous attempts to land in the United States. Four are in the hospital, two suffering with chick-enpox and two under observation for trachoma. The chick-enpox patients will be allowed to go their way as soon as they recover. Should trachoma actually develop with the other two, the list of deported will be added to, making five in all.

The homeseekers were the last landed. All told there were 137 men looking for a job and all were placed before nightfall. About two thirds of the number will locate in Texas as farm and railroad laborers, the balance going to Louisiana to work on farms.

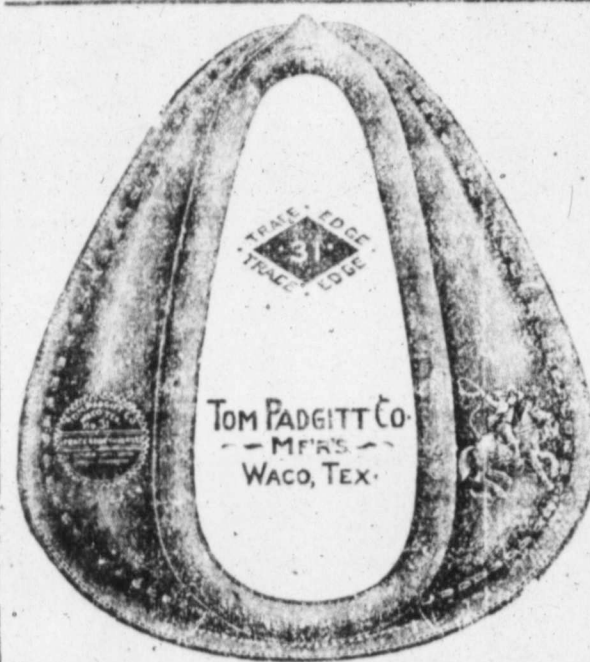
