### AMERICAN AID—DECLINED.

#### The Jamaican Government Rejects Offer of Relief.

The feature of the news from Kingston, Jamaica, is the declination of Sir James Alexander Swettninham, governor of Jamaica, to accept American aid and the departure in consequence of the American warships under command of Rear Admiral Davis. Swettninham's action it appears has not met the views of the people and the city officials of Kingston. It is reported that the city council met after the incident became well known, promptly disapproved the English governor's action and not only sent a letter of regret to Rear Admiral Davis, but asked him to reconsider the decision to leave and remain with the American ships, as every aid was still needed. Davis replied that he had no alternative but to go in accordance with the desire of the constituted authorities.

English newspapers com-

ment on the incident in unanimous in regretting the occurrence and expressing the hope that the good relations existing between the United States and Great Britain will not be endangered thereby.

No official American comment has been forthcoming inasmuch as the American government has not been officially informed of Swettninham's action.

### BATTLE ON BAILEY

#### BOTH HOUSES IN BATTLE ROYAL OVER BAILEY

Anti-Bailey Members Nominating Private Citizens—Resolution Providing for Resignation Voted Down.

Austin, Tex., Jan. 22.—A battle royal is on in both houses of the Legislature this afternoon over election of Senator.

Anti-Bailey members are nominating private citizens.

Resolutions providing for resignation of Bailey in case the investigation proves his guilt have been voted down.

Senator Bailey was re-elected to the senate by a large majority of both houses.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.—When the house got ready to nominate for senator yesterday, such a thing was never before witnessed in a Texas legislature.

Thirty-three citizens of Texas were placed in nomination. Mr. Blanton of Cooke nominated Bailey, saying that he had driven the Standard Oil to the rack by placing pipe lines under the interstate commerce commission.

Judge Duncan nominated W. L. Bostic, of Pine Springs, Smith county. He said Bill was a good man, a true democrat, but that he was a professional grafter—a grafter of fruit trees, but that he does not extend his profession beyond that pursuit. (Applause)

Mr. Pierce of Webb nominated Cecil A. Lyon, saying that his record, both in private and public, is clean.

Mr. James nominated a man who "has been in bad company for 20 years. He is a fighter and if it becomes necessary to choke a senator he will do it." He named Captain Bill McDonald.

Mr. Clements nominated a man who has never been investigated, Hon. C. K. Bell of Tarrant county. The name was applauded.

#### They Want The College.

Rev. T. W. Fowler passed through the city yesterday on his return from Trinity Church where he had preached twice.

He reports the church in fine shape and the citizenship there anxious for the Baptist college to be located in this city. Bro. Fowler says the country people can be counted on for a heavy pull in this great move, and as he is a man that goes in to find the true status of affairs one can bank on his reports.

### IN HONOR OF LEE.

Memorial Exercises at the Auditorium Sunday Afternoon.

A large number of the people of Nacogdoches assembled at the High School auditorium Sunday afternoon to witness the interesting and impressive memorial exercises given under the auspices of the Daughters of the Confederacy commemorative of the 100th anniversary of the birth of General R. E. Lee.

The time set for the exercises to begin had been fixed at 4 o'clock, and by that time the large hall was comfortably filled with patriotic men, women and children.

Mrs. P. C. Meador announced the object of the assemblage, and introduced Rev. A. J. Miller, pastor of the First Baptist church, who opened the exercises with a fervent and eloquent invocation, which was followed by the singing of that old familiar song, "How firm a Foundation," General Lee's favorite hymn.

"Massa's in the Cold, Cold Ground" was feelingly sung by Messdames I. L. Sturdevant and Geo. S. King, and Lee's farewell address was read by Prof. R. F. Davis, which he prefaced with a few appropriate remarks, commendatory of General Lee's heroism displayed in the surrender at Appomattox.

A splendid feature of the program was the numbers rendered by the male quartet, and the singing of "Old Kentucky Home" by the quartet and chorus.

The principal feature, however, was the address by Hon. Beeman Strong, on "The Life and Character of General Lee." Mr. Strong is an eloquent and forceful speaker at all times, but on this occasion he did himself proud, and demonstrated the fact that he is thoroughly familiar with the life and character of the great man whose memory the people had met to commemorate.

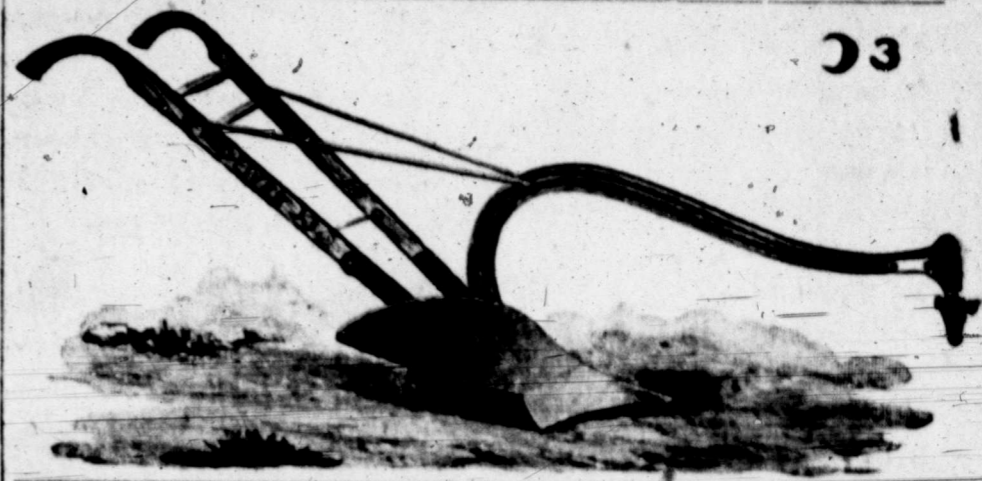
"The Future of the Confederate Flag," a poem read by Miss Jessie Ratcliff, was another interesting and appropriate feature of the program.

FOR GOOD ROADS.

The condition of the public roads in Nacogdoches county is becoming alarming. And, under the existing road law, there is little hope of bettering their condition to any very great extent. As is well known by nearly every taxpayer in the county who is eligible to road duty, any one who desires to do so can escape working the roads for one year by paying to the county treasurer \$3.00 road tax before the first day of February, and the number of farmers and road hands who are taking advantage of this provision of the law is surprisingly large. In fact it is stated that in some road districts every man subject to road duty has paid the tax, and the overseers are left without a hand to work their roads. For this reason the roads are not worked except as ordered by the county commissioner in whose district the roads are located. There is no disputing the fact that our road laws need revising and improving, and it is hoped that an effort will be made to secure a better law by the legislature now in session.

Do not forget to pay your taxes.

The city of Jacksonville owns her water works system. After being in operation about six months, it is now paying expenses. "Nuff sed."

The gist of Governor Campbell's message is an appeal to the legislature to carry out the platform demands. If the solons will heed the appeal they will have done well.

The Center News, in commenting on The Sentinel's statement that Wm. Seelbach of Caro had discovered a cotton bloom in midwinter, says: "Behind the times again, Mr. Sentinel. Mr. Enos Campbell, a good citizen living a couple of miles from town, is digging potatoes and gathering corn." It is not The Sentinel that is behind times, Mr. News; it is your Mr. Enos. He should have dug his potatoes and gathered his corn last fall. If he desires to keep up with his crops, we would advise him to follow the example of Nacogdoches farmers and plant tobacco.

FOR GOOD ROADS. Recommendations Adopted by the Texas Good Roads Association.

At the recent annual meeting of the Texas Good Roads association held at Waco, the following recommendations were unanimously adopted:

First—That the Texas State Good Roads Association, through its residing, appoint five members to present in person to his excellency, Governor Tom Campbell, also to the honorable members of the Thirtieth Legislature, or to a committee of the Thirtieth Legislature appointed for that purpose, and urge the recommendation and passage of suitable laws to enforce the action of this body.

Second—That there be created the office of State Highway Commissioner, who shall be a practical road builder and civil engineer, competent to advise as to manner and material for building roads; his duties to be defined by legislative action.

Third—That the Legislature repeal the law, abolishing the five days labor as now required, substituting therefor a road tax to be paid in cash.

Fourth—We recommend the repeal of the convict contract system, and that all available convicts and jail prisoners be compelled to prepare material for roads or work in their actual construction, and further that the system of employing convicts in the mechanical and other industrial departments of the State be discontinued, where they come in contact and in competition with honest labor.

Fifth—That suitable laws be passed carrying out the provisions of the Constitution, giving precincts or special political divisions of any county the right to issue bonds for the permanent improvement of the public roads in that particular county. That such laws be known as the "Local Option Good Roads Law."

Sixth—That a constitutional amendment be submitted to the qualified voters of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations for permanent road building.

Boycy in the Code Book.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 17.—Joseph W. Bailey was "The Man from Texas" in the Code book of the Waters Pierce Oil Company. A close scrutiny of the private record on the subsidiary company of the Standard Oil trust has failed to disclose the name of any other prominent man from this section of the country. In company with John D. Rockefeller, H. Clay Pierce, C. M. Wiams, J. P. Gruet and other officers and creatures of the trust, the name of the senator from Texas appears. Before it is the code name "Republish."

The names of practically every town and city in Texas has its synonym in the secret word of the code. The Dris- hotel in Austin is to be and. Gainesville, the home of Senator Bailey, is also there.

The present legislature is developing some great orators.

Food Adulteration in Texas.

Prof. G. S. Fraps, who has charge of the division of chemistry at the A. & M. College, has issued the following:

Bulletin No. 91 of the Texas Experiment Station is entitled "Food Adulteration in Texas." The Bulletin discusses the subject of food adulteration, the Texas food laws, the National Pure Food and Drug Act, and the extent and character of adulteration as found in a number of samples collected in representative Texas cities and subjected to analysis. A New Industry.

When it comes to new enterprises, the farmers of Houston county have our Nacogdoches county agriculturists skinned a whole city block, as the following from the Grapeland Messenger will show: "The farmers met last Thursday to discuss the sassafras tea proposition. Every farmer can contribute anywhere from one case upwards. The cash expense will be \$1.25 per case, includes 48 cartons, 1 wooden box, freight and committee expenses. These supplies will be arranged for distribution in Grapeland. Now is the time to dig the roots and have them ready to pack by February 15. J. M. Bourland, who is at the head of this industry, has moved to town so as to devote his entire attention to the enterprise."

We may boast of our shaded tobacco, and our fruit, potatoes and mammoth corn, but our Grapeland friends are entitled to the persimmon they already have the sassafras.

The Japs Are Coming.

San Antonio, Texas, Jan. 16.—The 30 Japs who arrived here, as mentioned in these dispatches, have been put to work on the Southern Pacific railroad as section hands. They will receive \$1.15 a day, and will replace the Mexicans heretofore employed, who have been receiving \$1.00 a day.

If The Sentinel will devote a great part of its time and space to the tobacco crop, Nacogdoches county will next year show above all counties the greatest increase in her taxable values.—Da' Gal News.

Bitten by a Mad Dog.

Irnie, the six year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Nettles, living six miles North of Trawick, was bitten by the family dog on Friday, Jan. 4th.

The dog grew worse until it was evident he had rabies. This alarmed the parents to the extent that they took the child to the mad stone at Alto on the following Sunday.

The stone was applied but refused to adhere, so they returned home. A State of uneasiness lingered in their minds until Thursday, the 10th, when they brought the child to Cushing. The Cushing stone was applied the next morning (11th) and it held fast for 17 hours, the next for 16 hours, and the next for 9 hours, and the next 30 minutes. It was applied again on Monday night but it adhered it was not perceptible. They returned home Tuesday full of joy.—Cushing Enterprise.

A Mooted Question. Some of the property owners and citizens generally have been somewhat agitated for several days over a proposition to cut off a portion of the burned block fronting on the north side of the square, and thereby widen the street.

In fact the matter has reached the petitioning stage, and two petitions have been circulated, and both have been liberally signed.

One petition asks that the new buildings to be erected be made to front on a line with the Cox building on the west and the outside line of the pavement in front of the Mayer & Schmidt building on the east, and another petition, addressed to the city council, asks that the council do not institute condemnation proceedings to force the property owners to sell the frontage of the lots necessary to move the buildings back, but that the city negotiate direct with the property owners and without such proceedings.

The matter has elicited considerable discussion, and various views of the question have been expressed.

**A NOVEL EXPERIMENT.**

Unique Proposition to Sacrifice the Battle Ship Texas.

The statement comes from Washington that Congress may soon be urged to vote upon a unique proposition of authorizing the bombardment, with dynamite shells, of the battleship Texas. It is not the purpose of Representative Mudd of Maryland, the author of the bill, and who is a member of the committee on naval affairs, to have the warship destroyed, but he wishes to have a test which he and the inventor of the dynamite shell think will prove so very expensive or disastrous to show whether or not desirable to make any decided change in the armor of our new naval vessels.

It is proposed to bring the Texas up in the Potomac navy proving grounds at Indian Head, anchor her in shallow water over a flat sandy bottom, turn in the guns, discharge the crew and then fire a dynamite shell against the thickest portion of the armor belt at the water line. The test is sought by Willard sham, inventor of the Isham shell. Mr. Isham has been working for many years in the development of his theory that the greatest destructive power is secured by outside explosion, rather than by shell penetration. The army authorities have at various times in the past tested his shells at Sandy Hook.

**TRIAL JUDICIAL DISTRICTS.**

Committee Heard Delegation for East Texas Counties.

Austin, Texas, January 17.—S. M. Davis, an attorney of San Augustine was here yesterday and appeared before the committee on judicial districts asking that the Second judicial district, which is at present composed of six counties, be divided into two districts. The district is composed of Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, Nacogdoches, Angelina and Cherokee counties.

The bill before the committee provides for leaving Sabine, San Augustine and Shelby counties in the old Second district and placing Nacogdoches, Angelina and Cherokee counties in a new judicial district.

Mr. Davis said the population of those counties had greatly increased since the districts had been originated, and that the court dockets were always several hundred cases behind. The lack of judicial machinery in those counties, he said, greatly increased the number of crimes in those districts.

A delegation from Sabine county will wait on the committee tomorrow and later in the week a committee from Shelby county. The committee will take no action on the bill until it has heard from other counties.

### ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING.

#### Citizens Demonstrate Their Anxiety for Baptist College.

If the committee appointed to select a location for the East Texas Baptist college had ever harbored any doubt as to the anxiety of the people of Nacogdoches for the location of the institution in this city, that doubt was most thoroughly, completely, absolutely removed when the distinguished gentlemen faced the immense audience which greeted them at the Auditorium last night.

It was indeed a demonstration seldom witnessed in the city, and there is no denying the fact that an impression was made upon the committee that will be difficult to remove.

The educational commission had been led to believe that Nacogdoches wanted the school when the committee from the Business League went before the body at Jacksonville, but the reception tendered the sub-committee last night fully confirmed that fact.

The members of the committee—Rev. H. C. Risner of Tyler, Rev. A. D. Sparkman of Palestine, Rev. A. J. Miller of Nacogdoches—were taken in charge of citizens yesterday afternoon and shown a number of desirable sites for the college, and they were very much pleased with what they saw. In fact they expressed themselves as being de-e-lighted with the splendid sites pointed out to them. As the two visiting members of the committee expressed it, one of the sites viewed by them is the most beautiful he ever saw for the location of such a school as it is the determination of the commission to establish.

The committee's stay in Nacogdoches was one continuous round of receptions from the time they alighted from the train, but the climax came when they witnessed the demonstration at the Auditorium last night. The large hall was literally packed with people—the representative citizens of the city, and they did not only demonstrate their interest by their presence, but they very forcibly convinced the committee of their earnestness by an unequivocal outburst of enthusiasm.

The program as published in The Sentinel was carried out to the letter, and to the satisfaction of those who had the meeting in charge.

The speakers delegated to discuss the different topics fulfilled their duties most admirably, each in their order emphasizing the wisdom of their selection. The benefits to be derived from the location of the college were portrayed from every standpoint by the speakers—its educa-

tional advantages, its benefits as a business proposition, its moral and religious influence, its correlation to the city schools, were each ably presented by Hon. S. W. Blount, Mr. E. H. Blount, Rev. J. M. Robinson and Prof. R. F. Davis. In the order named. But the most captivating speech of the evening was that of Mr. June C. Harris in which he demonstrated the fact that Nacogdoches is the logical location for the college.

At the conclusion of the addresses by the speakers representing the citizens, brief responses were made by each of the educational committee, and each in turn declared that so far Nacogdoches is ahead of all competitors in the contest for the location of the school. But they emphasized the fact that Nacogdoches must not stop at what has already been done, but every citizen must line up and do his part, and the whole citizenship combined must continue to work and strive to keep ahead of all competitors.

President S. L. Miller of the Business League presided at the meeting last night as master of ceremonies, and at the conclusion of the exercises he urged all citizens to do their utmost in securing the college, and announced in forcible terms that if each would do as much as he in proportion to wealth, the school will be secured for Nacogdoches.

#### Business Change.

Messrs. P. L. (Phil) Sanders and D. W. (Darwin) Buchanan have bought the grocery business and stock of J. D. McKnight, and will continue the business under the firm name of Sanders & Buchanan.

These young men are well and favorably known to the people of Nacogdoches and Nacogdoches county, and being men of rare business ability, excellent traits of character, and enviable popularity, their success is assured.

Mr. McKnight has been in business in this city for a number of years, and retires now only on account of ill health. He has friends almost innumerable in this city and county who wish for him complete restoration to health and unlimited prosperity.

It is fortunate, however, that Mr. McKnight is succeeded in business by such excellent and deserving young men as are Phil Sanders and Darwin Buchanan.

### THE SUNDAY LAW.

#### Officers Announce Determination to Enforce the Statute.

The officers of this precinct, assisted by County Att'y Russell, have expressed their determination to enforce the Sunday law in Nacogdoches in the future. That all may understand the law, and that none may be prosecuted without warning, the law is here published at the request of Justice F. D. Huston.

Art. 199 Penal Code of 1895, reads as follows:

"Any merchant, grocer or dealer in wares or merchandise, or trader in any business whatsoever, or the proprietor of any place of public amusement, or the agent or employe of any such person, who shall sell, barter or permit his place of business or place of public amusement to be open for the purpose of traffic or public amusement on Sunday, shall be fined not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars.

The term place of public amusement shall be construed to mean circuses, theaters, variety theaters and such other amusements as are exhibited and for which an admission fee is charged; and shall also include dances at disorderly houses, low dives and places of like character, with or without fee for admission.

Art. 200: The preceding article shall not apply to markets or dealers in provisions as to sales of burial or shrouding material, newspapers, ice, icecream, milk, nor to the sending of telegraph or telephone messages at any hour of the day, nor to the keepers of drug stores, hotels, boarding houses, restaurants, livery stables, bath houses, ice dealers, nor telegraph or telephone offices."

Note—The statute prohibiting the sale of goods on Sunday does not apply to the sale of drugs and medicines. Todd vs. The State, 30 App. 667.

#### Our Schools.

After consideration, I have concluded that a little write-up of my visits might do some good, in that more interest might be aroused among the people for the schools.

The first school visited since Christmas was Daw Creek, T. L. Martin teacher. This school has ninety scholars in the District. Only seventy-one has been enrolled this year, of which number only twelve were present on the day of my visit. I certainly hope those people will arouse themselves to a greater interest in school matters. It is wrong for the state to provide funds for schools and the people neglect to take advantage of it. We must wake up to our responsibility.

The next school visited was

Trinity. R. L. Synott and Miss Cleo Lilly are the teachers. They have a frame house, but unfinished. They have 72 scholastic scholars enrolled in this office, but Mr. Synott's roll shows 93, and there were 73 present the day of my visit. These people are discussing a local tax for school purposes. They ought to have such tax. This district is advancing and I believe will continue to advance.

After Trinity, Shady Grove was visited. This school is conducted by C. E. Thrash and R. R. Arthur. The office roll of this school is 72, they have actually enrolled there 74 and there were 60 present the day of my visit.

The Shady Grove District needs a house very badly and I understand contemplates building one. It should be done before the next school is taught.

Mt. Moriah came in next for a visit. J. C. Fondren is the teacher here and seems to realize the importance of the work before him. The office roll of Mt. Moriah is 67, only 32 present the day visited. Let us bend our efforts to get the children in school, not only here, but all over the county.

Next came Libby school, C. H. Muckelroy teacher. The office roll is 44. There were 33 present when visited. These people need their house ceiled and repaired.

The Libby people have built a splendid foot bridge entirely across the Nacacneche bottom. This is nice, but they should look after their house at an early date.

Martinsville comes next, A. L. Harris and C. B. Justice teachers. Two rooms to the house, ceiled throughout since the present session began, home made single desks have been put in. These are the best home made desks I have seen, and all are urged to put in this kind where a change of seats is made. Martinsville is on the upgrade and all indications are that the teachers are doing good work. The people could improve on the attendance. The office roll is 78, actually present on day of visit 48.

In conclusion let me urge everybody to help to make better schools. Whatever helps the schools, helps the country from every standpoint. More next week. Yours for better schools,

### BUILDING WAREHOUSES.

#### The People of the Territory 'Alive to the Move.

Mr. Hardy Dial has just returned from Oklahoma and the Indian Territory, where he has spent several weeks in the interest of cotton warehouse building.

Mr. Dial says that the people of that section are thoroughly alive to the benefits to be derived by the erection of warehouses, and he has succeeded in closing contracts for a number of buildings in the new state. Among the towns at which warehouses, will be built are Ardmore, Marietta, Lawton, Minco, Tuttle, Rush Springs and Marlow.

One commendable condition which exists in the territory, said Mr. Dial, is the harmony existing between the merchants and farmers in the warehouse movement. They realize that a warehouse is equally beneficial to the farmer and merchant, because they are aware of the fact that cotton wasted by mildew and rot from lying on the ground, is a loss equally felt by both farmer and merchant, and is a benefit to no one. The merchants also know that a warehouse in a town insures the patronage of the union farmers. Looking at it from a farmer's standpoint, said Mr. Dial, they can somewhat govern the market by the warehouse system, therefore procuring a good price for their produce.

Mr. Dial will remain with his family here a few days when he will return to the territory to finish his work.

#### Obituary.

Jno. P. Mettauer, Sr., was born in North Carolina January 10, 1822, and moved to Georgia with his parents when he was 3 years old. Married and moved to Texas with his family in 1859, and settled in Nacogdoches county near Chireno, where he raised a family of 10 children—seven boys and three girls—five of the number preceding him to the grave.

On first of October, 1906, he went to Rockland, Tyler county, to spend the winter with his son, and after three months, he was compelled to yield to the ravages of time and died a most peaceful and painless death on January 11, 1907, regretted by all who knew him. He died as he had lived—an earnest christian—as all his friends can testify.

He never sat on a jury, never was a witness in court and never was involved in a lawsuit. He leaves a wife, five children and a number of grand children.

Mrs. Jno. P. Davidson is in bad health, confined to her bed most of the time at her home. Jno. P. Davidson is sick at his ranch near Abilene.

**CITY COUNCIL MEETING.**

**A Called Session to Consider Two Petitions.**

A short called session of the city council was held yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock for the purpose of considering the question of widening the public square on the north side.

All the aldermen were present and Mayor Shindler presided. There were also present a number of citizens who are interested in the proposed move.

Secretary Beeson read the following petition, which is signed by 20 citizens:

**To The Board of Aldermen of the City of Nacogdoches:**

In view of the narrowness of the street as heretofore existing at the Northeast corner of the public square between what is commonly known as the Cox Building on the South and the Perkins building on the North, and in further view of the fact that the Perkins property is so far out of line with the buildings East of same, and in further view of the fact that since the fire there is no substantial improvement on the South end of the Perkins property and the necessity of widening the street in front of said Perkins property, we the undersigned citizens of Nacogdoches respectfully ask the Board of Aldermen of the city of Nacogdoches to at once take the proper steps to acquire from the owners of the property on the North side of the public square a sufficiency of ground to be devoted to the purpose of widening said street as may in the judgment of the council be necessary and suggest in this connection that the property to be negotiated for and acquired for such purpose, be determined by a straight line running from the Southeast corner of the Cox building in a direct line toward the Southwest corner of the brick pavement in front of the store of Mayer & Schmidt, and we believe from our past observation of the congestion of traffic and consequent danger to persons about the Perkins and Cox buildings, that the acquisition of the property or some portion thereof and for the purpose indicated is a necessity which the public demands and which should not be overlooked and that such action be taken at once while the property in question is without buildings.

Hon. S. W. Blount being called on by the council for an expression of his views on the question, suggested that in his opinion the proper course for the council to pursue would be to appoint a committee to have a line or lines surveyed across the front of the block on the north side, so that the council would have something tangible to work upon. He spoke at some length, expressing his views as to the feasibility of the proposition.

Judge Geo. F. Ingraham and June C. Harris, representing Perkins Bros. as attorneys, also spoke, and each said that while he would like to see the buildings set back and the street straightened, yet it would be an irreparable loss to Perkins Brothers, and inestimable damage to their property; besides, they contended, the city is not financially able to stand the expense of buying the property, even under condemnation proceedings.

At the beginning of his re-

marks, Mr. June C. Harris presented the following petition, signed by 111 citizens: To the Board of Aldermen of the city of Nacogdoches.

We, the undersigned citizens of the city of Nacogdoches, are opposed to setting back the north side of the public square of the city, unless it can be done by the consent of the owners of all the property fronting on said side of the square, and the same can not be taken by law without first paying the owners the value of the property taken, and we think the expense a greater burden on the city tax payers than it ought to incur.

Mr. Chares Perkins made a very feeling and impressive talk to the council, appealing to the members to leave the matter alone and permit the owners of the property to proceed with the erection of the new buildings without hindrance or delay.

The citizens then retired and the council proceeded to consider the matter. After some discussion, the mayor was authorized to appoint a committee of three to have surveys made across the front of the block with and diagrams, for the council's information. Aldermen Baker, Beeson and Floyd were appointed as that committee, and the council adjourned.

Bill to Relieve State Treasury at Once Introduced.

**PROFESSOR GREER KILLED.**

Meets Death in a Runaway Accident at Waco.

The following from the Waco Times-Herald will be read with sadness by every reader of The Sentinel in Nacogdoches. Prof. J. F. Greer, who was for four years superintendent of the Nacogdoches public school, was admired and beloved by all who knew him here, and his sudden and tragic death has cast a gloom over this city as dark and ineffaceable as if it had occurred in our midst. Here is the sad story as told by the Times-Herald:

"One of the most distressing accidents which has happened in Waco in a long while happened late yesterday afternoon, in which Professor J. F. Greer, principal of Sanger Avenue public school, was killed, and his daughter, Miss Lillian, who was in the buggy with him, was painfully though not dangerously, bruised.

Professor Greer and Miss Lillian were returning home from the funeral of Miss Evelyn Kyger, and when they reached a point about two blocks the other side of the South Waco fire station, and near to the residence of Alderman Garrett, the horse began running, being eager to get home. Professor Greer turned the horse on a cross street about two blocks the other side of the fire station, and the animal went running at a rapid gait towards Seventh street. Professor Greer held firmly to the lines, guiding the animal safely until about the time the vehicle reached Seventh street, when he met a buggy. In trying to avoid a collision with this buggy and to make the turn into Seventh street necessitated a double turn, and Professor Greer did his best to make it, but this was impossible, as the curve was too acute, and the buggy was overturned, throwing both of the occupants to the ground. Professor Greer struck on his head and was rendered unconscious. He remained in this state and never spoke afterwards, though breathing and circulation kept up for a little more than an hour. He was carried to the residence of his brother-in-law, Nat Harris, who lived near the point of the accident, and died there.

"Miss Lillian was given attention at once, but it was found that she was not dangerously hurt. A peculiarly sad feature of the matter is that Bachman Greer, a 12-year old son of Professor Greer, lies at home very ill from typhoid fever, and has not been apprised of his father's death. The entire community will be shocked by the news when it reaches them, and all who heard of it today expressed deepest sorrow. Professor Greer has been a resident of Waco since 1892, when he came here from Nacogdoches, and as a citizen and educator has won a place in the estimation of the people which only good and desirable men can secure and hold. He was one of the foremost educators of the state and has had a wide

experience in school matters. He held positions of responsibility in school matters before coming to Texas and was in charge of the school at Nacogdoches for four years. After coming to Baylor he was for several years professor of Latin in that institution, being also vice-president; he was later co-principal of the Grayson college at Whitewright; he was also co-principal of the Lancaster Military institute, and at the time of his death was one of the proprietors of this institute.

"At the beginning of the present term of the Waco public school Professor Greer was elected principal of the Sanger Avenue school, and has been holding this place with the same marked success and ability which have characterized his past career. He was 52 years old and leaves a family."

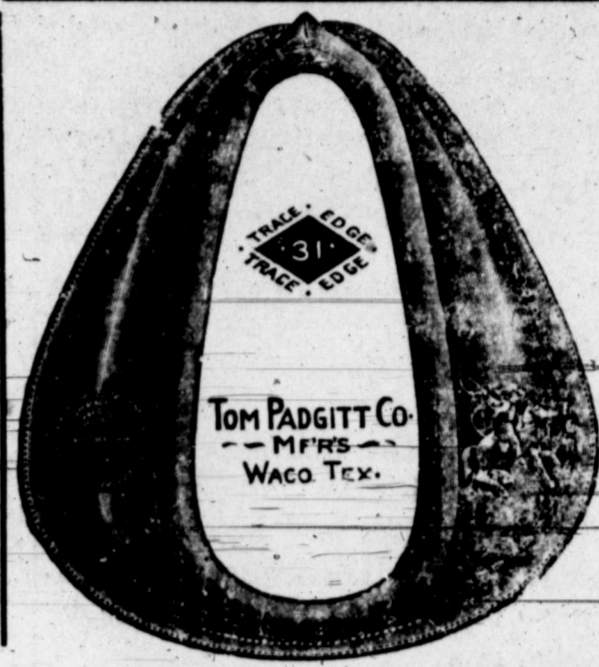

## BAPTIST COLLEGES IN TEXAS

Interesting Data Furnished by President Brooks of Baylor.

In order that the people of Nacogdoches may know something of the Baptist schools in Texas, and that they may appreciate the importance of the institution that the Baptist denomination will establish in East Texas, the following data, first appearing in an address issued by President S. P. Brooks of Baylor University, is reproduced from the Palestine Herald:

Baylor university, Waco, value of property \$600,000; number of teachers employed, 37; number of students enrolled, 1130.

Baylor Female college at Belton, value of property, \$150,000; number of teachers, 19; number of pupils, 420.

Howard Payne college, Brownwood, value of property, \$40,000; number of teachers, 13; pupils, 295.

Decatur College, Decatur, value of property, \$60,000; number of teachers, 8; number of pupils, 185.

Burleson College, Greenville, value of property, \$35,000; number of teachers, 10; pupils, 146.

Goodnight academy, Goodnight, value of property \$20,000; teachers, 6; pupils 80.

Canadian academy, Canadian, value of property, \$20,000; teachers, 6; pupils, 91.

East Texas Institute at Rusk, property value \$25,000, is also in the correlation but is now not open. This has been turned into an industrial school for girls.

The commission, which is backed by the general convention of Texas, stands pledged to the maintenance of a general school in East Texas for both sexes. This is the school that it is now proposed to build: It is believed that this school when completed will be equal in many respects to the Female College at Belton, while it will be for both sexes. These are all in the correlated system. There are other Baptist schools not in this system at Bryan, Abilene, Palacios and San Marcos. There is also one at Jacksonville and Dallas supported by the Baptist Missionary association of Texas.

Baptist schools, while under Baptist management, are open to all alike regardless of denomination or religious beliefs. Efforts are continually made to secure the best of teachers, up-to-date equipment and best results.
