CAPTURE OF MACLAIN.

Only Slightly Wounded He is Landed in Jail.

Mr. A. J. Spradley returned from his man hunt in Polk county this morning, and he relates a thrilling story of the capture of the negro outlaw, Willis Maclain, yesterday. Mr. Spradley states that the negro is only slightly wounded, one shot striking him in the chin and another in the left breast, but none of the shot striking a vital part.

Mr. Spradley says that he and Dr. Shines of Hortense, Polk county, came up on the negro about 8:30 Tuesday morning, and that he and the negro fired at each other at the same time, and only about twenty-five yards apart. When Maclain was shot he fell and apparently tried his best to die. He soon found he was not much hurt, and talked freely to the officers.

He admitted killing Jack and Ann Darden and wound-

ing Joe Severington and Georgia Rich, all negroes, and also says he killed one of the negro possemen that was trying to capture him, but denied killing J. F. Spurlock, the white farmer.

The wounded man was brought to Livingston and placed in jail last night.

CHARLEY SLAY CONVICTED.

Jury's Verdict for Three Years in the Penitentiary.

After having been out since about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon the jury in the case against Charley Slay, charged with theft of over \$50, returned a verdict at 10:30 this morning, finding him guilty and assessing his punishment at three years in the penitentiary.

This case grew out of a charge made against Charley Slay and Joe Bug Roquemore by J. S. Dearing about a year ago, in which Dearing alleged that the accused took from his person about \$54 in money while he was in an intoxicated condition.

At the last October term of the district court Slay and Roquemore were convicted of theft from the person and given two years each in the penitentiary. The cases were both appealed and reversed by the court of criminal appeals. The grand jury empaneled at the present term of court re-indicted them for theft, and the indictment for theft from the person was quashed.

When the case was called for trial last Thursday, the defendants severed, and Charley Slay was placed on trial, the result being the verdict of guilty with three years in the penitentiary. A motion for a new trial will be made. The case against Joe Bug Roquemore is set for next Monday, April 15.

Charley Slay is a son of Mr. W. D. Slay of Appleby, one of the best known and most honorable citizens of Nacogdoches county, and he has been the recipient of many expressions of sympathy from citizens from all portions of the county. Dave Slay was born and reared in Nacogdoches county, and as one old citizen remarked today, there has never been even a suspicion breathed derogatory to his good name.

Dennis Dixon and Wash McCoy, who were indicted a few days ago for the murder of George Rhodes, were arraigned before Judge Perkins this morning on a writ of habeas corpus and application for bail.

By agreement of attorneys for the State and the defense both were allowed bail—Dixon in the sum of \$3,000, and McCoy for \$2,000. Their cases are set for trial on Monday, April 22.

BIG BATCH OF BILLS.

Dennis Dixon and Wash McCoy Indicted for Murder.

The grand jury finished up the business for which the body had been called together Thursday afternoon and adjourned to meet again on Monday, April 22.

Before adjourning 24 bills of indictment were handed in

to the court—two for murder and 22 for misdemeanor offenses. The two murder indictments are against Dennis Dixon and Wash McCoy for the murder of George Rhodes in this city last Saturday night. Albert Walker, who was also held as accessory to the murder, has been released from custody; the grand jury having failed to implicate him with the killing.

Dixon and McCoy are both in jail, and may be given a trial at this term of court.

ACCORDING to the bulletin issued last week by the census bureau, the assessed valuation of property in the United States subject to ad valorem taxation, increased in the twelve years from 1890 to 1902, from \$25,473,418 to \$35,338,316,833. In the ten years between 1850 and 1860, under low tariff laws, however, it increased from \$6,024,666,909 to \$12,084,560,005, more than double.

THE \$10,000 appropriation for the erection of a monument to General Sam Houston should pass the house in a whoop and a hurry. The senate has put it up to the house. There is no room for objection to that bill at all. Too long has the building of that monument been delayed.—Austin Statesman.

FUNNY STORIES FATAL.

"The Sentinel is already an ideal newspaper," remarked a lady friend to the editor yesterday, "but if you would run in a few funny jokes every day, it would make the paper ever so much more interesting." If there is one desire The Sentinel has above another it is to please its feminine readers. But it is also because of the high regard and kindly interest we entertain for the ladies that a humorous department has not been added to the list of The Sentinel's interesting features. And we feel that we are justified in this conclusion. In fact, The Sentinel is seriously alarmed over the constantly increasing fatality of the deadly joke in this country. In justification of this anxiety, we will cite a few incidents. The first is the case of the Toledo, Ohio, man who told his wife a story about the patient in the dentist's chair. After suffering the gouging and mauling incident to a dental inquisition the patient told the dentist it was a pity men were not born without teeth. "But they are, you know," was the dentist's reply, and the woman to whom this was told died in great agony.

Here is another authenticated case that comes from Lockport, New York: "Lifeless, yet with a smile on her lips, 17-year-old Josephine Hochardel lies today at her home on Church street, where yesterday she laughed herself to death. Josephine probably was the prettiest, gayest and most popular student in the high school. She became ill with typhoid fever and while convalescent some of her school friends visited her and told her a funny story. Her heart was over taxed by the laughter and she died."

And another report of the pitiless effect of a funny story comes from Tulsa, Indian Territory, but happily in this case the victim recovered. Here is the way the case was reported in the telegraph news columns: "While laughing heartily at a remark made by a visitor, Mrs. M. Pruitt, an aged lady of this city, today dislocated her jaw. She said afterward it was no laughing matter."

There is still another horrifying case to add to the foregoing list. This is the sad case of Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Bennett, wife of Fred K. Bennett, of Trenton, N. J. Her husband told her a funny story in a thoughtless moment and she laughed so heartily that a week later she died of a broken blood vessel. The Bennetts were at dinner when the husband told the fatal joke, which was about a young man who telephoned to his wife that six or eight of their relatives were coming to dinner and that she had better get a slice of ham for the meal.

To dwell further upon the devastating influence of the funny story would be useless. Enough has been said to justify The Sentinel in refraining from inflicting upon its readers, both male and female, the deadly joke.

MR. KING'S RESOLUTION.

Declaration in Favor of a Permanent International Congress.

The following concurrent resolution was introduced in the legislature last Friday by Hon. Steve M. King of Nacogdoches and referred to the committee on Federal relations:

Be it resolved by the house of representatives, the senate concurring therein, That general treaties of arbitration should be negotiated by the United States with all nations granting jurisdiction to the international court at The Hague over as many classes of controversies as the other contracting power in each case can be induced to transfer from the field of battle to the precincts of the courts of justice.

That the United States should declare in favor of a permanent international congress containing representatives from every nation to assemble periodically and automatically for the purpose of suggesting changes in the law of nations and in the method of its administration as the course of events may make desirable and practicable.

That the United States should always pursue a progressive naval program for the protection of our vast seacoast, our great and ever-increasing volume of ocean going commerce, our growing interest in foreign markets, our distant possessions, and of executing effectively all the just foreign policies of the nation.

That the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of representatives are hereby instructed to transmit a copy of this resolution signed jointly by them to each representative in congress from Texas, the two senators from Texas, and the president of the United States.

THE Los Angeles News calls attention to the fact that in the death of Galusha A. Grow of Pennsylvania, which occurred recently, there is food for reflection. One vote in the republican national convention of 1864 would have made him vice-president instead of Andrew Johnson, and later president of the United States through the critical period of reconstruction. Grow was a pioneer abolitionist, while Johnson's sympathies were strongly pro-Southern. With Mr. Grow as president, congress would have been in harmony with the executive department. What the result would have been no man can say. A perpetuation of federal supervision of elections, to preserve the electoral privileges of the negro, and at least prolonging negro domination in the Southern states, with sporadic renewal of civil war, would have been among the possibilities. On the other hand, a united instead of vacillating and discordant policy in the north, might have brought order out of chaos sooner.

TRIBUTE TO JUDGE RATCLIFF.

Bar Resolutions Spread on Minutes of District Court.

The resolution recently adopted by the Nacogdoches bar in honor of the late Judge W. G. Ratcliff were reported to the district court yesterday by the committee, together with the request that they be spread upon the minutes of the court. Middlebrook, petitioners, praying that the resolutions heretofore adopted by the legal bar of Nacogdoches on the 25th day of March, 1907, relative to the death of Judge Wilton G. Ratcliff, be spread upon the minutes of this court, and the same being heard and considered by the Hon. James I. Perkins, Judge presiding, it is ordered, adjudged and decreed that said resolutions be recorded on the minutes of this court, the court announcing from the bench that he cheerfully granted the order, and further ordered, in compliance with the petition, that the District Clerk, Hon. R. W. Murphey, send to Mrs. Wilton G. Ratcliff a certified copy of said resolutions as recorded, under the Seal of this court."

STILL DRY AT DEL RIO.

An Interesting Letter From The Sentinel's Chief.

Del Rio, Texas.—I have just read with much interest and pleasure the letter from my good friend, Willis Richardson, now of Stevens county in Friday's Sentinel. I am grieved that Willis is "agin" my views on the Bailey question, but he has as much right to his opinion as I have mine and I won't fall out with him about it. Willis Richardson has made his way up in this world by hard honest toil, a tiller of the soil. It is his sort that are "paying the freight" while such politicians as Joe Bailey are sharing the profits of the trusts. My idea of electing an anti-Bailey legislature two years hence may be ridiculous, but is it any more so than Bailey's declaration that no anti-Bailey man shall be elected to office in Texas henceforward and forever so long as his influence and his money can prevent it. Bailey threw down the gauntlet, and I for one, am in favor of accepting the challenge. I am just that far "off" that I will never vote for any man for any office that endorses such high handed, brazen and shameless grafting as I am convinced Joe Bailey is guilty of. It is well known that only a few years back Mr. Bailey was insolvent. Today through a system of successful borrowing, seemingly known only to U. S. Senators of the Bailey, Depew and Platt stripe, he is classed among the wealthiest men of Texas. Isn't that enough, when Bailey himself confesses that he did all this borrowing from trust masters? Six years ago, The Sentinel and two or three other country sheets were the only papers in the state that had the nerve to oppose Bailey's election to the U. S. Senate. Today there 128 of the most influential newspapers in the state opposing him and defying his threat to drive everything into the gulf of Mexico that won't dance to Bailey's music. If there had been no instruction in the state primaries last summer the Bailey vote in the legislature would have been reversed. Bailey will find out two years from now that the democrats of Texas (at large) do not regard him as "the greatest statesman of the age," but the prince of grafters, or else I am mistaken in the signs.

It has not rained in Del Rio since October, though there have been scattered rains in spots over this section. The range and water supply, however, seems to be holding up fairly well.

I am sorry to inform my friends that the prospects of regaining my health and returning soon to my old stamping ground are not encouraging. Tax Assessors And the Law.

The county tax assessors have harkened to the voice of the State revenue agent and have promised to exert themselves as never before to secure correct assessments of property for taxation.

Before the adjournment of the meeting of the State Association of County Assessors a resolution was adopted pledging the members to use their best efforts to aid in the enforcement of the law, which requires that all property subject to taxation shall be assessed at its full value.

It was suggested by one of the speakers at the meeting that the county tax assessor's office in Texas has for a long time been run by custom, being to accept renditions of property at less than the proper valuation without particular inquiry and to allow large amounts of taxable property to escape assessment. It was also suggested that when the assessor begins to put the screws on—that is, to demand correct renditions he will make himself unpopular and he may have his political head chopped off by his irate constituents.

It is barely possible that some property taxpayers would feel so much aggrieved by the action of the assessor in the strict performance of his duty that he would threaten to vote against him at the next ensuing election, but no good citizen would carry out such a threat when convinced that the assessor had simply done his duty and exercised no favor or partiality. It is only discrimination that could reasonably be complained of, and when there is no discrimination there can be no complaint. The officer who does his duty fearlessly and without regard to consequences always commands the respect and confidence of the public and may be sure of public support.

Captain McDonald says he will be allowed several assistants in prosecuting the campaign against tax dodgers, and he promises to look after all cases to which the county assessors may direct his attention. If the plans shall be carried out as proposed, the next legislature will find the State on a cash basis, with a comfortable surplus in the treasury, and may cut the rate of taxation in half, at least.

A REVOLTING ASSAULT.

Shocking Attempt to Assassinate Claude Barrett.

The Garrison Gleaner gives the following detailed account of the attempt to assassinate Claude Barrett:

A drummer by the name of Brown, who was out with Claude—this being Claude's first trip as a drummer and was representing the Brown Manufacturing Co. of Greenville, Tenn., to coach him in the duties of the position he was filling and the driver, Huford Baker by name, left Athens for a three days trip in the country. It seems that Brown before proceeding far secured a couple of quarts of whiskey, one he appropriated himself, the other he gave to the driver. They had not proceeded far on their journey until they arrived at Stockard's store, and while selling Mr. Stockard a bill of drugs, the driver managed to purloin a pair of shoes. His theft was discovered by Brown and Claude after leaving Stockard. The driver sullenly agreed to take the shoes back, if the men would not say anything about it, which they promised to do, but on reaching Eustace the driver secured more whiskey and became considerably intoxicated. At Eustace Brown, who started out to stay with Claude until they returned to Athens, left him, taking the train. At this place Baker became abusive to Barrett and swore vengeance on both Brown and Barrett. After Brown left, Barrett consulted with another traveling man, Mr. Bowling, who visited him at Athens after the tragedy and proved himself a thorough gentleman, as to what course to pursue in regards to the shoes. Bowling advised phoning Stockard, which Claude did. Everything was arranged to return the shoes and drop the matter. But before leaving Eustace, Baker got on a high horse and made threats. To protect himself Barrett secured a pistol. They then started on their return trip to Athens, intending going by Stockard's to leave the shoes. Instead of going to Stockard the driver went around the town and when in 3 miles of Athens managed to catch Barrett unawares, jerked his gun off of him and clubbed him into unconsciousness, drove on into the edge of Athens with Barrett in this condition, stopped his team, got out and took deliberate aim and shot him, the ball entering just above the heart. He then called to ex-County Commissioner Coker, a perfectly reliable gentleman, who was near, and says to him: "This G-d-d-mn guy tried to take my pistol and I plugged him—believe I will give him another."

Mr. Coker interfered, whereupon Baker fires at him. His team then attempted to run away which required his attention. He then carried his unconscious victim to the ice plant, which was near by where he had a chum at work, and it is supposed he thought he could get assistance to dispose of the body. He was seen to drag his victim up the steps into the ice plant, where Barrett rallied some, and Baker not satisfied with his bloody work so far, attempted to carry his murderous designs further by stamping his victim's brains out. He was prevented in doing this by his chum's brother, who appeared on the scene, and the timely arrival of the officers.

PROSPECTS AT OIL SPRINGS.

The Higgins People Have a Twist-Off in Their Test.

It is reported that the Higgins Oil and Fuel Company's test on the Oil Springs tract at Nacogdoches is down below 1,100 feet with a twist-off. It will not surprise Texas operators to hear something favorable from this test. Five or six years ago when the Houston Oil company bought the Oil Springs tract a test was made of three of the shallow wells on the property. They were pumped for a month and averaged over ten barrels a day, despite the fact that the sediment and debris in the wells prevented the lowering of the working barrels to the bottom of the holes. Major H. M. Ernst, under whose supervision the test was made, thinks favorably of the prospects at Nacogdoches.—Oil Investor's Journal.

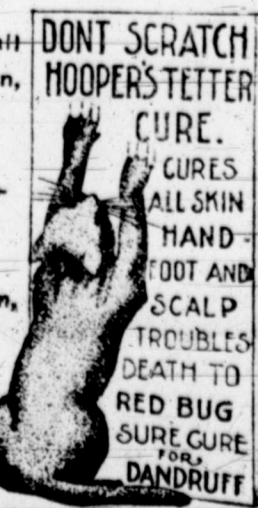

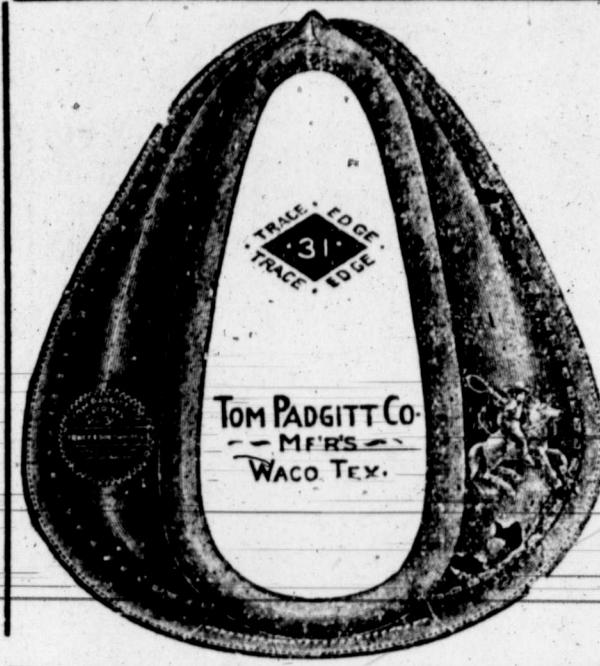

ORIGIN OF "LIZA WALKER."

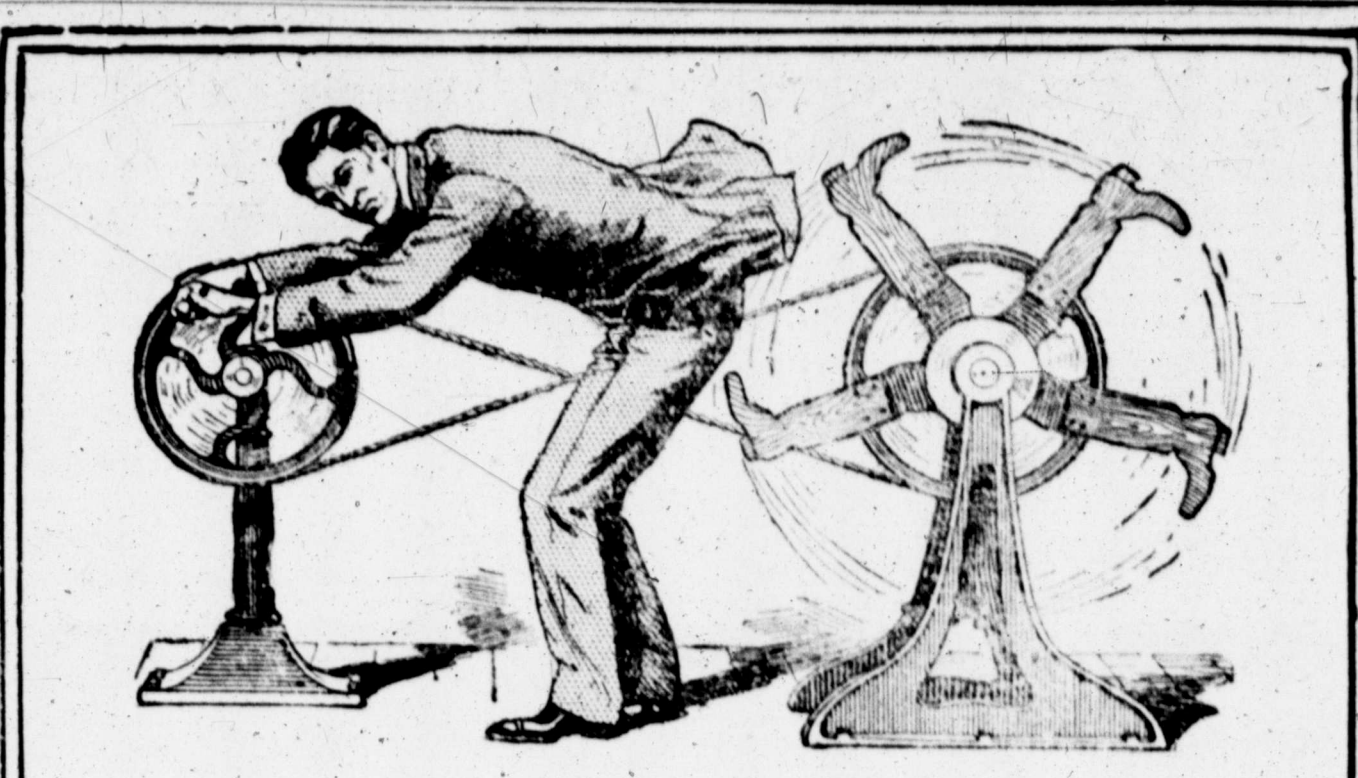
Received its Name From a Nacogdoches Negress.

There was a bill up for passage giving wholesale druggists the right to sell to retailers alcohol in one gallon lots or less in prohibition districts. 'Alky,' as it is professionally known in certain pro-society circles, is an important beverage, and mixed with the proper amount of rain water and a little red coloring makes good old 'Liza Walker,' and on a half pint of it a fellow can get as drunk as a hundred Indians. BATTLE OF MANSFIELD.

Forty-Third Anniversary of That Memorable Event.

On the 7th, 8th and 9th of April, 1864, there was something doing in the vicinity of Mansfield and Pleasant Hill, La. Things were lively along there, and continued for forty days and nights, ending at Simsport on Yellow bayou where the Federal army under Gen. Banks quit the land and took water to escape from the Confederates under Gen. Dick Taylor. Banks was on his way to Texas, but his army was driven back before it reached Mansfield.

The battle of Mansfield, as the Confederates called it, is not so named in the northern histories, for the good reason that their army never reached the place. It is called by them Sabine Crossroads.

On April 7, there were many skirmishes between the advance guards and rear guards of the armies. One of these skirmishes was at Robinson's mill, about half way between Mansfield on the west and Pleasant Hill on the east. It was a warm contest, and was ended by a night charge by the Confederates, who were all day retreating before Banks to get in shape, and when they did get into shape the tables were turned. The earth was torn up, the woods were mowed down, the roads and the fields were strewn with dead and with debris; blood flowed in gullies, a tornado of noise and a tumult of battle raged; wagons, teams, guns, cannons, baggage and a confusion of paraphernalia were piled or scattered in horrible wrecks for miles.

And thousands sank down to the ground overpowered, the weary to rest and the wounded to die." Night did not put an end to these battles, but it gave the enemy time to pull out, and they pulled. The "Rebs" called it skeedaddle.

"Oh, shade of the mighty! where now are the legions, That rushed but to conquer when thou leadest them on? Alas, they are buried in far hilly regions, And all save the fame of their conquest is gone." The ranks of these heroes are thinned down to a few gray haired veterans. How many can you name now here who were there in the battles? Using their army names, there were Tom Summers, Jim Cooper, Jim Curl, Giles Crain, Jim Thomas, John Hobbs, John Davidson, Fritz and Tilly Hoya, June Harris, Tom Hill, Bob Moore, Lias Paasche, Jim Haltom, Porter Fears, Lawrence Taylor, George Partin, Milt Mast, Joe and Billy Mayfield, Sam Hunt, John Richardson, Dave Lee, Reid Hyde, Dick Johnson, Mat Whitaker, Ed Whitaker, E. B. Lewis, Frank Ingraham, John Lilly, George Witkorn and there are a few others scattered abroad, some of them near, others far away, who were there, and still others not named who were there or in other battles.
