An Experienced Orchardist Gives Was for Years a Citizen of Was Issued During the Revoluthe Result of His Inspection.

Mr. J. Fred Haas of Greenville, Texas, an orchardist and horticulturalist of note, recently made an inspection of the orchards in the Jacksonville, Tyler and Longview fruit belt, and he thus gives the result of his inspection in the Tyler Times:

"At Jacksonville we went through some of the largest orchards there, and talked with quite a number of the representative growers. The crop estimate of the Elberta until they have gone. is from five to ten cars not likely that many will go out as solid

"The 'death rate' in some of the orchards is very heavy, seventy to eighty-five per cent-this takes in the Elberta, Alexander, Mamie Ross, Old Mixon Cling and a few others of minor importance commercially. The peaches of later ripening—September and October, have not had such a death rate, and the crop of peaches on these will be a good crop for this year.

"There are also several 'local sorts' which have good crops this year-Dr. J. M. Brittain having one of the largest of this sort, some six


