UNION CENTRAL RAILROAD.

Charter Filed for Another East Texas Line.

The following recently sent out from Austin is causing much comment among the East Texas newspapers:

The Union Central Railroad Company of Texas, with its principal office at Dallas, had its charter approved today by the Attorney General and recorded in the Department of State. The capital is \$225,000. The road is planned to be constructed from Dallas through the counties of Dallas, Kaufman, Henderson, Cherokee, Nacogdoches, Anderson, San Augustine and Sabine to a point on the Sabine river, an estimated distance of 225 miles. It will be a through East Texas line, it is said, and the incorporators are: W. S. Maple, M. C. Guillitee, W. J. Hogue and W. R. Stout, Dallas; W. H. Marsh, Tyler, J. J. Stubbs, T. B. Poindexter, Wortham; J. B. Gordon, Fairfield; H. H. Hyde, Houston; James A. Lucas, Edgewood.

RECEIPTS ARE LIGHT.

Evidence Unmistakable That Farmers are Holding Cotton.

The total cotton receipts at the four yards in Nacogdoches up to Wednesday, Sept. 25, this year, only 336 bales against 1302 bales same date last year.

While it is true that the crop is far short of last year, yet the extent of the crop cannot be judged by the receipts. It is an undisputed fact that farmers are not bringing their cotton to market as rapidly this year as they did in 1906.

The receipts at each of the four yards on this date in 1906 and 1907, are as follows:

Commissioners Court.

The commissioners court met yesterday afternoon and finished up the work of the September term. The court has had to prolong the term for lack of a quorum at times on account of the forced absence of Commissioners Sittou and Patton, who were kept at home on account of sickness.

The court has under consideration a proposition to improve the county roads, and the citizens of the county may expect some substantial and practical results at an early date.

Griffin Cases Set.

The cases against Mart and Cal Griffin, charged with the murder of I. M. Shepherd and who were released on bond on habeas corpus hearing Monday, are set for Wednesday of the fifth week of court—October 16—and a venire of 40 in each case was ordered by the court.

There have been seven indictments for murder returned by the present grand jury, and in each case the person indicted is in jail or under bond. This is a record quite complimentary to Sheriff Blackburn.

ENTHUSIASTIC MASS MEETING.

Anti-Lynching Resolutions Adopted Saturday Afternoon.

Saturday morning the following circular was circulated in the streets of Nacogdoches:

NOTICE.

The substantial and law abiding citizenship of Nacogdoches county who are interested in the good name of their county and willing to lend their active support to the court in the due administration of the law therein and to give assurance that the court may safely rely upon support and protection from the local citizenship rather than call upon the extraordinary military power of the state, are requested to assemble in the court house at 1:30 this afternoon for the purpose of devising such means as may be necessary to the accomplishment of the ends above mentioned.

James I. Perkins,
District Judge.

In response to the above call, a large number of citizens of the city and different sections of the county assembled at the court house.

In calling the meeting to order Judge Perkins said that he had invited the citizens to meet in an advisory manner and confer with the court in regard to the rumors that had come to him, and to ascertain their desires in the matter. He said that while a very regrettable circumstance had occurred in the county, in which a young white man had been killed by a negro, Dock Bailey, the people, he felt sure, were not inclined to disregard the law. It is true that tragedies sometimes occur that carry the best men off their feet, and tend to arouse in us all of the animal passions. But the best test of true citizenship is the cool observance of the law.

Judge Perkins gave it out straight that if the negro Dock Bailey could not be brought here for trial without an escort of militia, he would not be brought here for trial at this term of court.

At the conclusion of Judge Perkins' remarks, Mr. J. H. Summers was called to the chair and Moss Adams was selected as secretary of the meeting.

The following resolutions were read and a motion made to adopt them:

Whereas, it is currently and persistently reported that an attempt will be made to lynch one Dock Bailey, charged with murder in the district court of this, Nacogdoches county, and whose case is set for trial on the 4th day of October, when said Bailey shall be brought to said court for trial or while he is here on said occasion, and

Whereas, we realize and appreciate that it is the duty

of the judge of said court to take such precautions as may appear necessary to prevent such unlawful violence and to secure to said prisoner a fair and impartial trial according to the spirit and terms of law and to enforce its orders and judgments in an orderly and lawful manner, and

Whereas, it is necessary for said judge to call upon extraordinary power of the state by its military forces to afford such aid unless the law abiding citizens of the county will give support to the local civil authorities as will be sufficient for such purposes; therefore be it

Resolved, by the citizens of said county in mass meeting assembled, That we individually and collectively pledged to said judge and court our full and active physical as well as moral aid and support of said civil authorities in all such acts and endeavor as may be required to protect

said prisoner and to secure the full and perfect enforcement in a lawful and orderly manner of all the orders and judgments made by said court in said cause, and in evidence of our good faith and identity we each hereby sign our names.

Pending a vote on their adoption, expressions were called for from the citizens present and several spoke, among them being Rev. Bugley of Sevil, and J. E. Countryman of Trawick, each of whom favored the adoption of the resolutions and pledging their support and that of the citizens of their community to the enforcement of the law.

Wiley Owens of Linn Flat, a cousin to Doc Owens, the young man assassinated, stated that the family and relatives of the young man were willing for the law to take its course.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted and several hundred citizens attached their names to them.

WILLIAM J. Bryan has accepted an invitation to visit Palestine during December and deliver an address, the proceeds of which will be donated to the John H. Reagan monument fund. An effort is also being made to induce Mr. Bryan to visit Nacogdoches and deliver a lecture.

YES, the Journal is a little curious to see the line up of candidates for the democratic nomination in the Second congressional district. The Journal is of the impression that there are a bunch of starters in Beaumont, and their groomers should bring them from the paddocks.—Beaumont Journal.

No doubt but that Beaumont has a paddock stocked with starters, but the man who will finish in the lead in the next contest for Mr. Cooper's seat lives up Nacogdoches way.

THE peanut industry is on a boom in Texas. Years ago we made fun of Georgia because it grew "goobers," but we are at it now and we find we should have been in the business years ago.—Tyler Courier.

People may laugh at the goober grower, but that does not affect his bank account. And while the industry is growing at a rapid pace, still the supply is far short of the demand. One candy manufacturer in Nacogdoches is now advertising for one thousand bushels of Spanish peanuts.

THE Pleasanton News makes an insinuation that ought to be explained. The News says: "It is reported on the q. t. that some of the sports comfortably feathered their nests at the Simmons land drawing in Live Oak county last week. Reports are coming in slowly, but every one seems to indicate that the few caught a great many." There are several interested parties in Nacogdoches county who would like to know who were the "sports" and how the many were caught. Explanations are in order.

A RIGHTEOUS KICK.

The following is taken from the Tyler Courier and Times, but when you read it, use the word Nacogdoches where Tyler occurs, and readily appreciate its local application. The Tyler paper says:

"Outsiders will not believe it, but it is nevertheless true, that in a beautiful grove about 100 feet from the handsome third ward school building in Tyler, there have been built two large wooden closets to be used by some 300 pupils. The grove is now awfully disfigured. The beautiful building should remain vacant until these nuisances are removed, and it should remain vacant until such time as the proper authorities will connect the building with the sewer system which can be reached at a reasonable expense. The citizens of Tyler are paying a property tax of 50 cents on the \$100 for city school purposes, besides the appropriation of \$6 a year received from the state is set aside for each child in the scholastic age in Tyler. Only a few other towns in Texas are taxed as high for school purposes as Tyler, and Tyler pays the highest limit allowed under the law. There are ample taxes paid to have all our school buildings properly supplied by a system of sewerage and the tax payers should demand that it be done and done just as quick as it is possible to do the work."

While the tax levied for school purposes in the Nacogdoches-Independent district is not as high as that levied by Tyler, yet the sanitary condition of our schools should be looked after just as though the people were taxed to the limit. The citizens in the vicinity of the Central school buildings are making the same complaint the citizens of Tyler have made, and their kick is a righteous one. The Sentinel is glad to say, however, that a movement is on foot to put in a system of sewerage and sanitary closets at the High school building. At a meeting of the school board last evening a committee was appointed to secure estimates on the cost of the improvement, and it is sincerely hoped the matter will not be allowed to stop there.

Put the county convicts to work on the public roads of the county with split log drags if you want to have roads that you can travel over when it rains just about as well as when it is dry. This country will never be to where it can call itself up to date until it gets good roads, and the plan we suggest is the easiest and the cheapest way to get them. The split-log drag is no longer an experiment, but a proven success wherever tried.—Austin Statesman.

The commissioners court of Nacogdoches county is having some excellent work done on the public roads by the county convicts. But there is never enough of this character of labor at any one time to reach all of the county roads. The commissioners will have about \$15,000 in the road and bridge fund during the next twelve months, and it is the inten-

tion of the court to expend this sum in making the roads better. One obstacle in the way of making continuous good roads in this county is the numerous sand beds, and much of the fund will be devoted to an effort to surmount this obstacle. Nacogdoches county is going to witness a vast improvement in her public roads within the next twelve months.

THE press all over the country is talking about the excellent water supply in Nacogdoches. The Jacksonville Reformer has this to say about the artesian well recently brought in at the ice factory: "Nacogdoches now enjoys the purest of artesian water at a depth of five hundred feet. The well is flowing at a rate of two hundred and fifty thousand gallons of water per day. We hope Jacksonville will soon see the necessity of such a well and will lose no time in putting it down. Pure water means good health."

SHOULD Nacogdoches establish a peanut factory will they manufacture peanut politicians?—Lufkin News.

The woods are full of peanut politicians already. Should a peanut factory be established in Nacogdoches it would turn out nuts for the peanut politicians and amateur newspaper men to crack.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

And would it not also be advisable to have the same peanut factory shell some of those nuts so that our foggy newspaper men may use their gums.—Lufkin News.

Don't be uneasy, old man, our factory will also deliver the goods shelled.

In commenting on a communication received from Jones county, which gave a flattering report of the peanut industry in that section of the state, State Press of the Dallas and Galveston News says: "And in this connection, State Press attention was called to a paragraph in another paper a short time ago in which he was reprimanded in a gentle way for saying or intimating that there could be an overproduction of this crop. If anything of that kind appeared in this column, it was neither written by State Press nor endorsed by him." It is conceded that The Sentinel is the other paper referred to. Some weeks ago in commenting on the statement made by The Sentinel that "a peanut factory will be established in Nacogdoches if the farmers of the county will agree to plant 5,000 acres in peanuts," State Press said: "By all means establish the factory, but would not 5,000 acres planted to peanuts on those fine peanut-producing lands of Nacogdoches county oversupply the market?" It may be that State Press only intended to speak flatteringly of Nacogdoches county lands, "than which there are none better."

Judge H. B. Short is in the city looking after legal matters in the district court. Judge Short has many friends in Nacogdoches who are always glad to see him.

MORE ABOUT PEANUTS.

Beseiged With Letters Regarding the Ground Pea.

Since the publication of the item sent out from the agricultural department at Austin pertaining to the demand for peanuts, so many letters have been received by the commissioner that he cannot find time to answer them. The letters so far received have developed the fact that peanuts in large quantities are produced in Van Zandt, Wilbarger, Kaufman, Johnson, Cooke, Denton, Colorado and Jones. The sandy soil of Denton county produces the peanut bountifully, many crops averaging 150 and 200 bushels to the acre. The commissioner would be glad to have the amount of peanuts each county is raising, the yield per acre, etc. He says, judging from the letters received in his department, describing the vast territory in Texas adapted to this crop, the enormous yield and the slight expense of cultivation, the necessity of importing "goobers" from Africa to the United States ought to stop.

There is a factory near Wills Point where the nut is ground into meal and the oil extracted, and there is one being erected at Terrell.

At 10 cents per pound, the price paid by wholesale dealers for this nut, which equals \$2.20 per bushel, and the sandy land yielding from 150 to 200 bushels per acre, even the "goober grabber" ought to have his pockets bulging out with money.

The Demand for Peanuts.

Only a few years ago two young men started a soft peanut factory in Marshall, on a very small scale indeed.

A few days ago Judge Hull wrote to this establishment asking how many peanuts they could use from Panola county each season, and received a reply that was somewhat astonishing. They told him that they could handle the entire output of Panola county; that they bought peanuts from all Texas points, and that if Panola peanuts were ready for the market they would send their buyer over right away, as they would use about twenty cars within the next ten days.

They use the small Spanish goober. We merely make this statement in order to show Panola farmers that there is a market for all the peanuts they can raise. The prices of goobers is governed by the market—sometimes up and sometimes down, just like cotton. The hay or peanut vines readily sell for \$10.00 per ton and higher.

The farmers should take hold of goober culture in Panola county on a large scale, for it will beat raising cotton and fighting the boll weevil all to pieces.—Panola Watchman.

It now seems to be a fact that Nacogdoches will have a peanut factory next year. And still the good work goes on in East Texas.—Jacksonville Reformer.

Nacogdoches will have the factory if the farmers of this and adjoining counties will plant sufficient acreage in peanuts to justify its establishment.

"Please bear in mind that stenography is a trade, and you must work at it months, and even years, before you become an expert and draw the same salary an expert milliner or fitter does. There is no royal road to success in stenography simply because your parents can afford to pay for your lessons. Many of my correspondents seem to think that they can skim through school, without carrying away any thoroughly grounded information. My dear girls, some of you have fooled all your teachers all the years you went to school, but you cannot fool the man who pays your salary. The teacher was paid to do the best she could by you as a scholar, but your employer will pay you to give the best possible results for his business, and if you do not give them, he will find some one who can."

STATE RAILROAD EXTENSION.

Prospect for Nacogdoches to Secure the Road.

"Work on the extension of the state's railroad to Palestine is being pushed as rapidly as men can do it," said Attorney Bennett B. Perkins of Rusk to The Sentinel man. "The state put 65 convicts to work on the grade some weeks ago, and only a few days ago 85 more state prisoners were sent out to the camp. It is intended to have 325 more short term men on the road by Christmas," said Mr. Perkins.

"It is hoped," Mr. Perkins continued, "that the line may be eventually extended from Rusk to Nacogdoches. It will be remembered that a charter was filed in the secretary of state's office at Austin recently, providing for the construction of a railroad from Dallas through the counties of Kaufman, Henderson, Anderson, Cherokee, Nacogdoches, and San Augustine, and into Louisiana, and an effort will be made to have the new company purchase and utilize the state's road from Palestine to Rusk.

"If this is done, the completed road can be bonded enough to build the extension from Rusk to Nacogdoches, which would be a paying proposition to the company and a great convenience to the people of Rusk and Nacogdoches."

A NEW DOUGLASS

New Railroad in Course of Construction From Cherokee.

Editor Sentinel.

Douglass, Sept. 24.—Having been a subscriber to The Sentinel since its first issue in the long ago, and having written for the paper in years gone by, and though nearing my 70th mile post in life, I have concluded to take up my pencil again and send a communication occasionally to The Sentinel.

Health is good in our section. Cotton crop very short; corn crop is light; not as good as last season.

Prof. G. M. Hale opened up his school at Douglass on the 16th inst., and will say for the old town of Douglass, that our section of country is now on a boom.

Douglass was laid off in town lots in 1837, and named in honor of Gen. Kelsey H. Douglass, who was a prominent merchant and citizen of Nacogdoches in 1835. He was also a Brigadier General of all the troops in Eastern Texas in 1839 during the Indian war with the Cherokee Indians.

We have a fine country in and around Douglass; and generally is fertile, health good; good water, and fine range for stock of all kinds, and land is cheaper here than anywhere else in the country. All we want is more good people to come to our section and help build it up. We have here a fine two story school house with ample room and furniture sufficient for all purposes. Our school district numbers near 90 scholars in scholastic age; Prof. Hale has in his school 15 or 20 young ladies and men from other parts of the country that have followed him to this place to go to school; and will say for the citizenship of this section, it is good; we are a law abiding people; a fine church house with ample room here for all religious denominations.

So Douglass has now taken on a new life and in the future will be known as New Douglass.

In addition to other improvements in our section, the well known pine timber firm, Lipschitz & Co., are now at work on a broad gauge railroad from Forest, in Cherokee county, heading for our section. They are grading now near the Angelina river, and in a short time will be across the river and in the Douglass country, and the supposition is will either go to Nacogdoches or to Caro, on T. & N. O. railroad.

So everybody that wants good and cheap lands, good water, good range for all stock and good health, come and help us build up the best part of Nacogdoches county. Jernigan.

Made in Texas.

The newspapers of Texas are doing a great work for the state, in pushing its industries to the front and suggesting where others may be established, and in this connection the thought arises are the manufacturers, too,

doing what they can to press this advantage? This thought was brought out prominently recently in the discussion of Nacogdoches tobacco and cigars. Many papers throughout the state have been giving space to the tobacco industry and rejoicing at its growth. When the Enterprise suggested that cigars made from this tobacco were not on sale everywhere as they should be, it was met by the assertion that it had not looked.

Look where? The columns of the Nacogdoches daily are innocent of any announcement from the manufacturer, and there are many other manufacturers in the state who are similarly guilty of hiding their light under a bushel.

Big successes in business come through printers' ink. Dozens of men could be named who have made fortunes out of the manufacturing business through this medium. People naturally turn to the papers for this information, and the man who withholds it is the man who gets left.

The manufacturers must manufacture consumers as well as boots, and shirtwaists, and candy, and other commodities that are used by the people. The only way to make customers is to make them acquainted with the wares of the makers. The only way to do that is to use printers' ink. A drop of ink will make a million think, according to the old saw, and it is up to the manufacturer whether the people shall think of him or of the man in Massachusetts or Battle Creek, or where not.

The manufacturer wants the people to think of him and of his goods. A forgotten manufacturer is already in his commercial grave and one whose existence is not persistently brought to the attention of the public is losing even funeral expenses. It stands to reason that the manufacturer finds his most valuable market at home, where the cost of distribution is less, as well as the cost of production is comparison with the foreign manufacturer.

Newspapers can urge the establishment of industries and help make them go after they are established, but the manufacturers should do their share in the publicity contest.

After Nacogdoches Tobacco.

By the establishment of an Orange of a cigar factory, tobacco growers in East Texas need be under the heel of the American Tobacco company no longer. The Orange factory has had an agent in the Nacogdoches field recently contracting for the product of the farms in that section. The tobacco purchased from the Nacogdoches farmers will be shipped to Orange and manufactured here and the identity of the Texas tobacco will be maintained. The Orange factory is offering top prices for all of the tobacco for which they have contracted and the East Texas farmers seem pleased with the opportunity to sell their product to a home factory.—Orange Tribune.

A DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.

Lieutenant Commander Gaines Roberts of the U. S. Navy.

The Sentinel yesterday mentioned the visit of Lieutenant Commander Gaines Roberts, who is spending a week of his vacation with his sister, Mrs. M. N. Terrell, in this city. With the exception of the recent visit of Congressman Richmond P. Hobson to this city, it is doubtful if Nacogdoches has ever before had the honor of entertaining a member of the United States naval force. The following from the New Orleans Times-Democrat will be read with interest in Nacogdoches:

"Lieut. Thomas Gaines Roberts, United States navy, naval constructor of the naval station, received notice yesterday of his promotion to the rank of lieutenant commander. On coming here three years ago as assistant naval constructor, with the rank of lieutenant, he has planned and supervised work of the widest scope at the Algiers station. His promotion to the rank of lieutenant commander did not surprise those who know Lieutenant Commander Roberts, or have seen what he has accomplished by the use of his designs in the buildings of the department of construction and repairs at the station. He was placed at the head of the department when he reported for duty June 1, 1904.

"Lieut. Roberts was appointed to Annapolis from Anniston, Ala., through the influence of Gen. William H. Forney, a noted Alabama congressman. He was graduated in 1890, was assigned by the navy department to a three-year course at the French government school of architecture at Paris. After his graduation at that institution he served one year at the Union iron works, San Francisco, his service there being connected with the building of the battleship Ohio and Wisconsin, the monitor Wyoming and the torpedo boat Farragut. For a time during the Spanish-American war he served at the New York navy yard, under Admiral Bowles. He was afterward assigned to the Mare island navy yard, where he served for nearly five years, being relieved of duty there to take charge of the construction and repair department of the New Orleans station. During his service on the Mare island yard, Lieut. Commander Roberts was engaged in building the shipyard and plant, having charge of the work as naval constructor.

"When sent here he ranked as assistant naval constructor, but was raised shortly after to naval constructor, assuming charge of all construction and repair work at the local station. During three years he has been here Lieut. Commander Roberts has designed all interior arrangements of buildings on the government reservation in the construction and repair department. Lieut. Commander Roberts has made many friends since his trans-

PEANUTS IN TEXAS.

Resolutions Adopted by the State Farmers Union.

At the recent session of the State Farmers' Union the committee on peanut industry made the following report, which is worthy the consideration of every Nacogdoches county farmer:

We, your committee on peanut industry, find that Terrell, Texas, has secured a manufacturing establishment which has handled 1500 bushels per day for three years, eight months to the year, and will increase their capacity when the crop will justify, and they are not to work less than fifty hands at any time. And we find that the Spanish variety is the best peanut for oil and feed, and they stand the dry weather better than any kind, and they will yield from 60 to 100 bushels per acre. They bring on the open market 75 cents per bushel, and they will grow on nearly any kind of land; but the sandy land is the best adapted to them. We find that close cultivation in land that has alkali in it will take all the alkali out of it. Cotton will not die on the land where if once did die on; and we find that peanuts are one of the best and cheapest hog feeds that are grown on land on which alfalfa will not grow. And the meat and lard from the hog that is fattened on peanuts makes the finest meat and lard on the market. Peanut vines will make one ton per acre, and is worth just about as much for stock as alfalfa hay. The peanut is threshed by threshers made for the purpose. A thrasher will thresh about 1000 bushels per day. Toll for threshing is about 6 cents per bushel. We have planters that will plant the peanuts in the hull, and will plant them any distance that you will want to plow them. If they are cultivated level with the vines, they can be cut with a common mower, and the vines raked up with a sulky and hauled in and the stubs or the part that have the nuts on them can be dug and save the peanuts. They will have to be sunned a few days before they are ready for the stack. They ought to be covered over with hay or sorghum that is raised for this purpose, and the proper way to cultivate the peanut is to bed the land and plant in the water furrow; then when they come up take a two-horse section harrow and go lengthwise two or three times; then go across once or twice, then they are done or laid by. Any man can work about twenty-five acres with the grass in it; but when the land is worked two years or more a man can work more. We are not prepared to go into the full details of the peanut business, for we have not the United States statistics to refer to, but hope to be able in the near future to give out better information to the farmers of Texas.
