### ELECTED SPECIAL JUDGE

The Garrett Murder Case is Now on Trial

Immediately on convening of court this morning the case of the State against J. L. Garrett, charged with the murder of Thad Weaver, colored, was called, and it was agreed by the attorneys that the case would go to trial. Judge Perkins announced that he was too unwell to try the case, and asked that the bar elect a special judge to try this case. The bar met and in the manner prescribed by law elected Attorney George S. King as special judge.

The attorneys then announced ready for trial, and the work of empaneling the jury was begun. A venire of sixty men had been drawn and at the noon hour several jurors had been secured.

This case was tried in the former term of the court, and resulted in a mistrial, the jury failing to agree.

Garrett is being defended by Ingraham, Middlebrook & Hodges and District Attorney Roy Brown Strong is looking after the prosecution.

## DEPLORABLE CONDITION.

Few people realize the inconvenience that is experienced by the court, officers and jurors at each term of the district court of Nacogdoches county. The difficulty in procuring a room for the grand jury to hold its sessions, has long been a source of worry to the sheriff, and a lack of accommodation for petit juries has made the duty of serving as jurors an onerous one to citizens. This condition was brought forcibly to the attention of the court Wednesday afternoon, when he was impelled to discharge one jury and enter a mistrial in a case because, primarily, there was not room in the court house to accommodate the three juries then out. In discharging the jury Judge Perkins reminded the jurors that it was no fault of the court that ample provision had not been made for the administration of justice in Nacogdoches county, but that the responsibility is solely upon the citizens of the county, who have failed to provide a decent and commodious court house. The court also called attention to the fact that no other county in the Second judicial district had a court house so discreditable as that of Nacogdoches county. Let us as citizens profit by this lesson, and when opportunity is again offered to provide means for building a new and commodious court house, we should as one man give our sanction and endorsement to the undertaking, and without hesitation.

## DOCK BAILEY ON TRIAL.

### The Defendant Pleads Not Guilty of the Crime.

From Friday's Daily:

The trial of Dock Bailey, charged with the brutal murder of Dee Owens near Linn Flat on September 4, was begun in the district court this morning, and the indications now are that the trial will consume all of today.

The prisoner was brought into court under heavy guard handcuffed and his feet manacled, and he appeared to be somewhat excited.

Judge Perkins cleared the space between the bar of the court and the railing of all except officers of the court, members of the bar and representatives of the press.

Only so many as could be comfortably seated were admitted into the court room, and when the doors were opened the court was filled in a jiffy. The court announced that anyone making the slightest disturbance would be excluded from the court room.

The court called the case No. 5339, the State against Dock Bailey, and District Attorney Beeman Strong for the State and Judge Geo. F. Fuller answering for the defendant, each announced ready for trial.

The prisoner was brought into court under guard of Rangers, and, duly arraigned by District Attorney Strong, reading the indictment to him, and in response to the question whether or not he was guilty, the negro tremblingly replied: "I am not guilty, sir."

The first juror taken was J. Y. Baugh, the next J. L. Corley, the third was J. E. Tuetsch, and others were taken in the following order: W. H. Williams, Bennett Baker, T. H. Seale, H. B. Latham, Wm. B. Lovelace, B. H. McLendon, James Strahan, R. O. Ferguson, Roland White.

The jury was sequestered at 10:30 o'clock, and before half of the venire of 60 men had been exhausted. There were eight peremptory challenges by the defense, two by the state and five were challenged for cause.

The witness, some thirty in number, were all sworn in a body. The rule was invoked, and all witnesses were retired except officers of the court and character witnesses.

Boston Owens, a brother of Dee Owens, was the first witness. He said the last time he saw Dee was on Wednesday morning, Sept. 4, when he left the home of his mother about 7 o'clock riding a black horse, and in the direction of the place where his body was found. He had \$14 or \$17 in money. He next saw him about 1 o'clock Friday morning, Sept. 6. He was dead, and had been drug up into a tree top lying on the ground. He had been shot in the left breast, just under the nipple. His pants had been pulled off, and all pockets were turned inside out. He was 199 steps from the road. He next saw the horse when it was brought back from Rusk. Dee was about 22 years of age. His body

had been dragged from the road to where it was found.

Eddie Owens, little daughter of Jack Owens and cousin of Dee, testified that she last saw Dee Owens on Wednesday morning, Sept. 4, in front of her father's gate. He rode up to the gate where he was met by a negro man. He got off his horse, and he and the negro walked off together in the direction of where his body was found. In a little while she heard five or six pistol shots in that direction. When Dee came to her father's gate, she heard the negro call him, and Dee rode out to the road where the negro was. She would not know the negro if she were to see him. He was a small negro man.

Sam Owens, an uncle of Dee testified to finding the body of Dee, describing the position in which it was lying when found. The body had been dragged with a rope around his neck to a tree top and then pulled into the brush by hand. Hair from Dee's head was found on trees along the route the body had been dragged. His pants were found about half way from the road and where the evidences of a struggle in the road, and a piece of a pistol handle was lying in the road. Dee's head was beaten and the skull was crushed. He had been dead about two days.

Jack Owens testified: I am a cousin of Dee Owens. His body was found within 550 yards of my house on a straight line. We found Dee's body in a pine tree top that I cut last winter. He had on his underclothes, top shirt and shoes and socks. The witness described the wounds in the body. He also saw two shots on a small tree near the road where the killing occurred. Dee's pants were found half way between where the body was found and the road where the killing occurred. The pockets were turned wrong side out.

Here court adjourned to 1 o'clock p. m.

On convening of court after dinner Dred Martin, deputy sheriff of Cherokee county, testified as to the arrest of Bailey, and taking the coat of Owens and a pistol off of Bailey.

Frank Sherman testified to buying the horse and saddle from Bailey for \$45.

William Morris testified that he went to Rusk and got Dee Owens' horse and saddle from McDonald's stable, where they had been sold to Frank Sherman by Bailey. He brought the horse and saddle back and delivered it to Owens' family. Sheriff Geo. W. Blackburn testified that he went to Rusk and saw Bailey after he had been arrested. He got the coat of Owens from Bailey, also identified pistol and piece of handle which was found at the scene of the murder.

W. L. Weatherly, justice of the peace of Precinct 5, testified to viewing of the body of Dee Owens, in his official capacity. He also identified the bloody shirt found at Bailey's house.

Mrs. Pink Owens testified to Dee Owens leaving home

on the fatal morning, and also identified his coat.

Sheriff C. K. Norwood of Cherokee county testified to arresting Bailey, and that he had on no top shirt.

Here the state rested, and the defense put on several witnesses.

The following is the statement made by the negro soon after his arrest:

I, Dock Bailey, hereby make the following voluntary statement of my own free will and accord after having been duly warned by R. L. Robinson County Judge of Cherokee county, Texas:

First, that I did not have to make any statement at all; 2nd, that any statement made by me may be used in evidence against me on the trial for the offence concerning which this confession is made.

My name is Dock Bailey and I live four miles northeast of Cushing, Nacogdoches county, Texas. Tuesday, the 3rd of this month, I was down at Trawick. (I gamble.) I asked the boys for some games and a white fellow (Owens) standing off, said: "Negro, I will give you a game," and said: "Let us go over here behind the field of Henry Day and Jack Owens." I said: "I cannot play this evening, I have to go home." He said: "You meet me in the morning back of old man Jack Owens' and Henry Davis' field." I said: "I will meet you there and we will have a game Wednesday morning." I went over there Wednesday morning, and when I got there he (Owens) was there. We scraped off a place and went to shooting craps, and the game was at one dollar per throw, and I won \$30 in the horse. (His horse was up on the game.) I said: "I will shoot one dollar more and make it \$31." He said: "No, you are not \$31." I said: "Yes, Cap. I am \$31." He said: "You are a damned liar." He was a young man and I thought I would make him back down. I told him then that he was another damned liar. He grabbed a limb and hit me on the neck; you can see the scar here now. (A small scar is visible.) I jumped up to my feet and struck him twice with my fist square in the breast, and he said: "You are a son of a bitch," or a God damned son of a bitch. I do not remember which. I said: "If you hit me I will kill you." He slapped his hand into his pocket as if to get out a knife and I grabbed him around and held his hands in his pockets. I had my gun on me in my scabbard. He said: "No you won't kill me, either, I might beat you to it." I then commenced to get my gun out as he was still trying to get out his knife. I got my gun out and he grabbed it, but I soon got it away from him. We were still scuffling and I shot him, while we were hugging up just like we first were when we ran together. I shot him only one time. When I shot him I just pushed him loose from me. He fell and I jumped on the horse and rode off and went home. I left home just a while before night, and went through Cushing and by Hatchett's Ferry, and came to an old colored gentleman's house and stayed the balance of the night. I don't know the name of the old colored man. I left there about sunup and came to Rusk. I got here to Rusk and took breakfast in the colored restaurant. I sold the horse to Frank Shurman at Rusk for \$45 and went down to take the train, and the sheriff of Cherokee county came down and told me to

come on and go with him back to the sheriff's office, that Frank Shurman was not satisfied with the trade. He took me on to jail and that was the last of it. The man that raised me came to see me three times before I would tell the facts about the case; Mr. George Huston is his name. I told him exactly how it happened, what it started about and how I killed him. The gun that I shot him with was of 38 caliber on a 40 frame, Colts' make. I shot him but one time; he fell to the ground—dead. Witness my hand, this Sept. 6, 1907.

DOCK BAILEY TO DIE.

The Date of Execution Set for  
November 7.

From Saturday's Daily:

We, the jury, find the defendant, Dock Bailey, guilty of murder in the first degree and assess his punishment at death. W. H. Williams, Foreman.

This was the verdict of the jury that sealed the doom of Dock Bailey.

When The Sentinel went to press yesterday afternoon the argument in the Dock Bailey murder case had not been concluded, and for lack of time to set the type, none of the evidence for the defendant was published. The principal feature of the trial was the statement of the defendant, who testified in his own behalf.

There was very little variance in his statement on the witness stand from that made before Judge Robinson at Rusk, except that he admitted having tied the rope around his victim's neck after shooting him down, and dragging his body into the woods where it was found by the searching party two days later.

He also admitted that he fired as many as two shots, whereas in his original statement he contended that he fired only one shot.

Several witnesses were placed on the stand by the defense who testified to the former good reputation of the defendant for peace and quietude.

Quite a number of witnesses were also placed on the stand who swore that Dee Owens was never known to shoot craps or gamble in any way.

On the announcement of counsel that the evidence was all in the argument began, District Attorney Beeman Strong opening the argument for the State with a brief review of the testimony.

He was followed by a short speech by each of defendant's counsel—Judge C. D. Mims and Judge B. F. Fuller—each of whom pleaded for a life sentence for the culprit.

Mr. Strong closed the argu-

ment in a brief but earnest appeal for the infliction of the death penalty, and when he concluded some of the jurors and many spectators were in tears.

Judge Perkins delivered a fair and impartial charge to the jury, touching upon every phase of murder from manslaughter to murder in the first degree. He even charged upon the law of self defense.

The case was given to the jury at 5:15 o'clock, and at 5:45 the verdict above quoted was returned.

Some one unknown to the officers started the report before the jury had retired that a verdict had been returned giving the negro a life sentence, and this caused such a demonstration among the friends of the murdered man that a strong guard was placed at the entrance to the district court room and no one was allowed to pass. There were also reported threats of an attempt to rescue the prisoner from the officers if an attempt was made to take him to jail, and as a precaution against a conflict between the officers and citizens the prisoner was kept in the court house under heavy guard all night.

This morning at seven minutes to ten o'clock the prisoner was brought before the court, when Judge Fuller, as counsel for Dock Bailey, stated that the counsel had been unable to detect any error in the record of the trial or in the court's charge to the jury, and after consultation with the defendant he had agreed to waive the right to file a new trial and to receive the sentence of the court.

Judge Perkins asked the prisoner if he had anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced.

"You say do I have anything to say?" asked Bailey in a firm voice.

The court repeated the question, and Bailey said:

"All I want to say is, give me time to get ready to die."

Judge Perkins assured him that would be done, and after consulting a calendar, the court pronounced the decree that the self-confessed murderer of Dee Owens should remain in the custody of the sheriff of Nacogdoches county until Thursday, November 7, 1907, when he shall, between the hours prescribed by law, be hanged by the neck until he be dead.

The prisoner was carried to Rusk this afternoon in charge of Sheriff Blackburn and the Rangers, where he will be kept until on the eve of the day of his execution.

All witnesses and spectators attracted here by the trial have returned to their homes, and everything and everybody has quieted down.

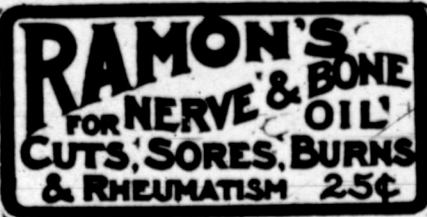
### Postoffice Moved.

Jennings of the Forj Fusileers, received a message late Friday evening from Adjutant General Newton, to assemble his company and keep them in barracks under arms, ready to move at a moment's notice. This action was anticipating a need for soldiers at Nacogdoches to protect the negro. Dock Bailey tried yesterday for the murder of Dee Owens, a young white man, a few weeks ago. The company was assembled in a short time and remained in the armory all night. They are still uniformed and accoutred, but have not yet received orders to move."

### PLEASED WITH THE SCHOOL.

Two Nacogdoches Boys at Tyler Commercial College.

Editor Sentinel.

Tyler, Tex., Oct. 7.—Some four weeks ago our discontent with a life of drudgery and toil at small remuneration and employment for only half the year took the form of a firm resolution and determination to attain to something higher in the world; to a position of trust; to one that will furnish employment the entire year and pay better. So we came to Tyler and entered the Tyler Commercial College and began the study of shorthand and bookkeeping, both of which we enjoy.

We thought perhaps we would be the sole representatives of Nacogdoches county in the College, but to our great surprise we found that a dozen or more had previously reached the same conclusion and had entered some three or four months in advance, and had already almost completed the course. **OLD CITIZEN GONE.**

**The Grim Reaper Claims Another Nacogdoches Pioneer.**

Mr. James G. Cooper, aged 81 years, died at his home, corner of Church and Pilar streets, Saturday evening, October 5, at 6:30 o'clock, after an illness of a little more than two weeks.

Mr. Cooper was a native of Georgia, but had been a citizen of Nacogdoches for more than fifty years.

He was a man of excellent habits, fine christian character and sturdy constitution, and he continued to be active in his accustomed pursuits till long past the age at which men ordinarily drop out of the ranks of the workers. To this end there is no doubt that his sunny disposition largely contributed. He met most of the conditions and situations of life with a genial, cheerful disposition. This cheerful spirit remained with him to the last, and he retained his clearness of intellect up to his closing days. He was invariably a good neighbor, and there was no happier family circle in the land than his. When he died, full of years and ready to be gathered to his fathers, the grief that was felt over the close of his long career was widespread and sincere. His best monument will be the good report that he has left behind him in the community in which he has lived for more than half a century.

Mr. Cooper had been for many years a devout member of the Baptist church, and he lived the life he professed. He believed that "Men and women, youth and children, seek the friendship of the sunny-faced;" that "all doors are open to those who smile;" that "all social circles welcome cheeriness;" that "a sunny face is the open sesame to hearts and homes."

He believed in the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. He believed that the man who scatters flowers in the pathway of his fellow-men, who lets into the dark places of life the sunshine of human sympathy and human happiness is following in the footsteps of his master. He leaves an aged devoted wife, soon to follow him to that haven of rest, an only daughter, Mrs. Rosa Black, and Mrs. Jno. M. Greene, an only grandchild, to mourn his death.

The funeral service was conducted at North Church at 4:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon; Rev. A. J. Miller officiating, and the remains were interred in North church cemetery at 5 o'clock.

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**OVERCROWDED COLLEGE.**

The following official announcement has been made by President Harrington of the Agricultural and Mechanical College:

"The Agricultural and Mechanical College is over-bowing with students. Some 600 are on the ground and his is considerably more than it will be possible to accommodate comfortably. Twenty-four extra tents have been ordered and one of the old buildings on the grounds has been converted into barracks, but even with this increased pace, some of those already here must be turned away and it is entirely useless for any others to come or to make application."

This is indeed an unfortunate condition, and one that should not be permitted to exist any longer than is absolutely necessary to erect more buildings at the A. & M. college.
