HURT AT A CIRCUS.

Aged Father of Nacogdoches Citizen Seriously Injured.

The following special appeared in the Houston Post and Fort Worth Record of Sunday:

Paris, Texas, Oct. 26.—W. Y. Chester, manager of the Chester Printing company here, attended the circus last night, and in going to his seat on an upper tier, slipped and fell through the opening between two rows. He struck the ground about ten feet below, broke his collar bone, and severely shaken. He is advanced in years, and the full extent of his injuries cannot yet be determined.

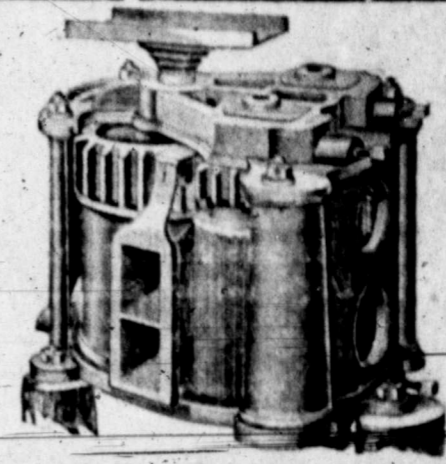
Dock Bailey's Day is Short.

The Houston Chronicle of Wednesday tries to make a mountain of a mole hill in a labored editorial, headed "The courts and the Negro." As a basis for its dissertation the Chronicle makes this statement:

"In the telegraphic columns of The Chronicle of October 22 there appeared a very brief special from Nacogdoches which deserves more than casual reading. It stated that a certain negro and his sister had been acquitted of the charge of having murdered a white man."

KELLIE FOR GOVERNOR.

Will Oppose Governor Campbell Before Next Primaries.

State Senator E. I. Kellie of Jasper has shied his castor in the ring and is an avowed candidate for governor of Texas, if Governor Thomas Campbell is really seeking opposition. Senator Kellie is very much aggrieved at recent utterances of the governor over the last legislative body and stated this afternoon that, as the governor had defied any one to oppose him, he would get in the game and become an avowed candidate. He states that he does not believe that there would be any hope of his being elected, nor no one else could cast aspersions upon the record of the last senatorial part of the legislature at least and then defy opposition without his taking up the challenge.

The senator is preparing a statement in answer to some remarks of the governor at the Dallas convention, and it is expected that these remarks will be of a very spicy nature. His statement will probably be ready for the press tomorrow.

Senator Kellie stated today that he would not care so much about the remarks of the governor if he had cut out the merger bill passed over his head in the interest of the Santa Fe. In his speech the governor is said to have declared that this act was the one that aggrieved him the most and he is said to have paid a "warm" compliment to the body for its action in doing so.

In speaking of the matter, Senator Kellie states that the passage of the Santa Fe merger bill was something of vital importance to all Eastern Texas from Beaumont to the state line, and in doing so the legislature simply gave the people another trunk line of railroad that would materially assist in the development of that section of the state, and that there was nothing in the passage of the bill that hurt the state in any way, took away anything from the people, or in any way injured the property of any one in any section of the state.

To the contrary, the senator declares that the passage of the bill enriched that section of the state immeasurably. He says the increase in valuation of property that will result from the building of another trunk line, the thousands of acres of land it will open up for development, the many new cities that will spring up, the many that will grow all the faster by the coming of the line, all go to show that Texas was benefited beyond the comprehension of any man by the passage of the Santa Fe merger bill.

THE STATE VICTORIOUS.

Court of Civil Appeals Affirmed Waters Pierce Case.

The court of civil appeals Wednesday affirmed the decision of the trial court in the receivership case of the Waters-Pierce Oil company, thereby sustaining the action of the district court of Travis county in naming a receiver to take charge of the property of the Waters-Pierce Oil company. No written opinion was rendered, but it is expected that an opinion will be forthcoming within a short time. The action of the court means that the appointment of the receiver to take charge of the Waters-Pierce Oil company property pending the result of the ouster and penalty suit, was right and proper. The action of the court of civil appeals is final and no appeal can be taken.

Receiver Robert J. Eckhardt of Taylor, who was appointed by District Judge V. L. Brooks of the Twenty-sixth district court, will take charge of the property of the corporation just as soon as the court's mandate is issued, which will be within the next few days. This decision of the president of the appeals is the next in line the state and the federal business affairs were such that he could not attend.

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The court of civil appeals also issued an order refusing to consolidate the cases and advanced the main or ouster case and set it for submission next Wednesday, October 30.

COULD FIND NO BILL.

Grand Jury Makes Special Report to the Court.

To the Hon. James I. Perkins, Judge 2nd Judicial District. We, the Grand Jury, for the September Term, 1907, of Nacogdoches County, Texas, in compliance with your request, make a written report of our findings in regard to the conduct of the State Rangers and other officials towards Mr. A. J. Spradley on October 5, 1907, beg to submit the following as the result of our investigation:

First—We have examined some twenty witnesses in our investigation in this matter, including all of the eye witnesses to the transaction, (except one, Sam White, who has been absent from the county during our present sitting, and whom we were unable to get.)

Second—We find that there had been some kind of understanding between Judge James I. Perkins and A. J. New Trial Refused.

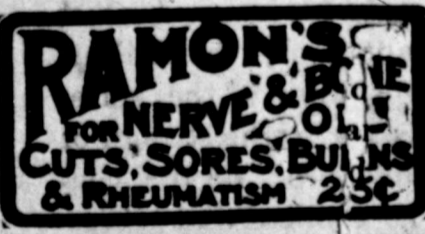
The motion for a new trial in the Octavia Sanders case was argued before Judge Perkins in the district court this morning, and the motion was overruled.

QUIET AT SAN AUGUSTINE.

Detachment of Rangers in Charge of the Situation.

Report from San Augustine today at noon states that the town is quiet and there is no anticipation of further trouble.

At the request of County Attorney Thompson Gov. Campbell sent Capt. Rogers with two of his company of rangers to investigate the trouble, and they arrived in San Augustine Sunday.

There was a report on the streets here this morning that there was more shooting in San Augustine yesterday, but Mr. John Burrows informed The Sentinel over the phone this afternoon that there is absolutely no truth in the report.

The negroes who assaulted and shot Lewis Head and Jack Davis Saturday night a week ago are still at large, and as they were transient negroes, it is doubtful if they are caught soon.

The killing of the two negroes, Oscar Garrett and Jack Greer, who were found shot to pieces near San Augustine Thursday morning, is still shrouded in mystery.

Guss Simpson has put in a planer at his mill. From what we learn here of our school, the pupils are in love with their teachers, which will add greatly to the advancement of the children.

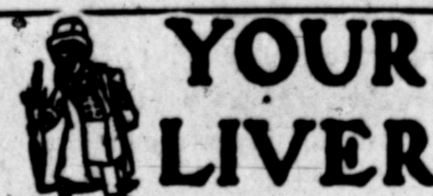

OKLAHOMA refuses to permit women to vote and one city council in the new state has adopted an ordinance forbidding them to ride astride. Now, there is an opportunity for State Press to do some missionary work.

THE average daily circulation of the Houston Chronicle during the month of September was 23,113. It is remarkable that the Chronicle's figures should begin with 23 and end with 13, but the lucky 11 is in the middle of them.

THE market reports tell us that another collapse has taken place in the price of silver, and an American standard dollar now has a market value of about forty-five cents. That may be, but a silver dollar will buy as much of the necessities of life as a gold dollar will.

STATE Press of the Dallas News deals Nacogdoches county this bit of roast, which is timely and well merited: "Nacogdoches County has no exhibit at the Fair. Yet Nacogdoches County is said to be raising the finest cigar tobacco in all the United States. Nacogdoches County has as fine hard wood timber as any locality in the world. Nacogdoches County has fine cotton lands, fine corn lands, fine peanut lands, fine vegetable lands, fine fruit lands and fine berry lands. But no one would know it who visits the State Fair, and who is inquiring for good locations for farmers and progressive people unless he should run across State Press, who would tell about it. Nacogdoches County is far from the only County in the State which appears to be oblivious to her own interests." Nacogdoches county pleads guilty to all State Press charges in the above, but The Sentinel promises now that this neglect of duty and indifference of the resources of this grand old county shall not be repeated next year. Nacogdoches County will have an exhibit at the Fair in 1908 and one that will be the cynosure of all eyes and the admiration of all visitors.

EGYPT'S ONLY COTTON MILL.

A remarkable report on cotton milling in Egypt from W. A. Graham Clark, special trade agent of the Department of Commerce and Labor, has been made public. Mr. Clark says that Egypt is behind all of the cotton producing countries in respect of cotton mills, there being only one cotton factory in the land of the Pyramids. This factory is the Anglo-Egyptian Spinning and Weaving Company, which employs 20,000 spindles and 500 looms in its Alexandria establishment. There were two cotton mills in Egypt, but the other one, that of the Egyptian Cotton Mill Company, ceased operation two months ago. This mill operated 20,000 spindles. A half century ago there were several cotton mills in Egypt, but this was before the present variety of Egyptian cotton had been evolved. During the past ten years persistent efforts have been made to bring the cotton mills back to Egypt, but this has been unsuccessful. The British government, while always encouraging cotton production, has never encouraged cotton manufacturing outside of the British Isles. Other things being equal, colonial cotton factories would have quite an advantage over Lancashire mills by having no freight and no duty to pay. But the British government, through the influence of Lancashire spinners, placed an excise tax equal to the duty on production, on all cotton mills in such countries. The Indian mill pays 3 1-2 per cent excise tax on all goods manufactured. The Egyptian has to pay a duty of eight per cent, besides an equipment special tax.

CENTER FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Center News contains this interesting bit of information. "The fire company last night ordered three hundred feet of hose, hooks, ladders, axes, etc., and a large bell which will be used only to give the fire alarm and to call the fire boys together. Thus a start has been made that will be worth much to Center, and it is hoped that the good work will be carried on until we have a fire department equal to any in the large cities."

This reminds us that it is about time for the Nacogdoches fire boys to get together and take definite steps toward securing necessary equipment for battling with he flames.

The city authorities have ordered hose and hand reels, which will be of considerable aid to the fire fighters, but this equipment is wholly inadequate for a city like Nacogdoches, and it is important that the department get busy right soon and procure the equipment needed.

It is high time the business men of Nacogdoches were doing something to bring more of the cotton raised in this county to Nacogdoches. It will soon be too late, and a little too late is much too late.

Nacogdoches Tobacco.

One shipment of 30,000 cigars was made by the Nacogdoches cigar factory yesterday. Nacogdoches cigars are growing in favor every day.—Nacogdoches Sentinel. It has not been so many years since the Agricultural Department at Washington told State Press that the time was not far in the future when the Nacogdoches locality would be celebrated for fine Havana tobacco. Indeed the Bureau of Soils informed him that the tobacco lands of the locality were as good as the lands which produced the fine Havana cigars. He was told that any analysis of such land showed that it contained the virtues of the Cuban lands for fine tobacco, but that it was yet to be ascertained whether the difference in climate would make a great difference in the cigar. That was several years ago, as has been stated. Since then time has been given to curing the tobacco, which is a long and tedious process. It looks as if the climate did not stand in the way of the production of a fine cigar. Hence the shipment, as stated above. State Press has been smoking these Nacogdoches cigars for the last year, and he finds them as fine as the Havana kind. But he admits that having been raised in the tobacco fields of Kentucky, he may not be a good judge. For the man who was raised on the burley leaf is not apt to be a good judge of the Havana leaf.—Galveston-Dallas News.

Mechanics in Public Schools.

President James W. Van Cleave of the National Association of Manufacturers believes and freely confesses that the large majority of the members of labor unions are law-abiding, public-spirited men. It is also his belief that the incapable, unfaithful and corrupt leaders of unions are to blame for most of the labor troubles which have been and are being inflicted on the country.

In an address recently delivered at Battle Creek, Mich., he said that all good citizens should unite in remedying the abuses which the labor unions have perpetrated. In order to supply the lack of apprentices which the labor unions have virtually abolished, influence should be brought to bear to have manual training departments attached to every public school of the primary grade in the United States, where boys from ten to fourteen years of age would learn to handle most of tools used in more important mechanical trades, and there should be established public industrial high schools open to boys who take the manual training course in the primary schools, and from these industrial high schools after a two or three years' course boys could graduate as firstclass mechanics. This plan of making the education of hand keep step with the education of the head in President Van Cleave's opinion, would give the country more and better mechanics than the dead and gone apprenticeship system ever furnished.

A PROSPEROUS COMMUNITY.

Interesting Facts About Mahl and the Singers Reunion.

Mahl, Oct. 28.—Mahl is located eight miles north of Nacogdoches on the T. & N. O. railroad. Mahl is surrounded by one of the best farming sections in East Texas. We have red land and the sandy lome. The surroundings and variety of soil makes this a good place for any agricultural enterprise. The fruit and truck lands can't be excelled anywhere. Large orchards are to be seen on most every farm. There is nothing to keep this from being as good fruit section as Jacksonville, and the time is in the near future when it will be.

We have good water, good health, good cooks and something to cook. Along with the other good things we have men with grit, grace and greenback to shove things to a successful end. In spite of the gloomy day Saturday, quite a number of the best singers in the county gathered here and made the welkin ring. Everybody seemed to enjoy themselves to the full extent of their capacity for enjoyment. A very inviting dinner was spread Sunday. Everybody ate and left enough for another such crowd.

Little End of Mallet.

THREE hundred prominent billboard advertisers of Cincinnati have agreed not to resort to this mode of display and have signified their intention to co-operate with the municipal arts committee of the Business Men's club, in its effort to beautify the city. This should encourage our fellow citizen, E. A. Blount, to persevere in the good work of wiping out these eyesores in Nacogdoches.

Old Story Revamped.

Every year or two the story is revived that Gen. Sam Houston spared the life of Gen. Santa Anna, when he was taken prisoner after the battle of San Jacinto, because he was a Free Mason and gave him the signal of distress. A few days ago Librarian Mayers, of Austin, wrote to Ex-Gov. James H. Porter of Tennessee, who had been an intimate friend of Gen. Houston, asking his opinion of the rumor. Gov. Porter replied promptly. He said he had talked about the rumor personally with Gen. Houston, and that the latter had told him he knew nothing of the story that Santa Anna was a Mason at the time of the capture. He said he regarded Santa Anna as a prisoner of war and felt honor bound not to harm him while he was under his care, and the reputation of Texas was at stake, for she was applying for recognition—even though Fannin and Travis had been murdered, Texas was above savagery.

Wise Men of the East.

The state insurance commissioner at Austin is said to have received a letter a few days ago from a woman at Hearne saying that she had taken a policy for \$100 in a society called the Wise Men of the East. She enclosed the certificate or policy and wanted to know if this organization had a right to do business in Texas. Commissioner Love stated that The Wise Men of the East had no permit to do business in the state, and therefore were not authorized to solicit business. The writer declared that a man was writing these policies. The dues are 50 cents for each quarter and on death the holder of a policy or certificate gets \$100.

THE Austin Statesman makes this pointed and pertinent observation: "Nacogdoches is shipping cigars—home made cigars made out of home grown tobacco—thirty thousand at a clip. That is the way to build up towns, and the country, too." Cigars are not the only home made articles that are being shipped from Nacogdoches. She is shipping show cases and store and bank fixtures, made from home grown hardwood; crates and boxes, made in Nacogdoches; home made handles, made from hickory grown in Nacogdoches county; all kinds of castings and machinery, made in the Nacogdoches foundry and machine shop; thousands of pounds of condensed chili, made by the Nacogdoches chili factory; the best of candies, made by Nacogdoches candy makers; and many other useful products too numerous to mention. There is no shriveled localism about the manufacturing industries in Nacogdoches.

I. W. Culp is a real estate man of Temple, and will be remembered as having represented Coryell county in the 26th legislature. The Sentinel has it from good authority that the fine Italian hand of Alice Webb Duke figured in the deal.

Whatever opinion one may have of his sincerity, the closing chapter of Orchard's autobiography in the November McClure's stands out as a remarkable human document. In fiction a story must be made plausible; it is the delightful incredibility of fact which makes it so entertaining. In a series of articles giving his life history, the coolness of the calculations by which Orchard destroyed his fellow-creatures is a fact continually emphasizing itself. "I had figured out a good many ways how to get away with him and not get caught," is his ever-recurring refrain. Then came his last and most important "job," the killing of the governor of the state. There is no slightest sign of over-conscience; on the contrary, he realized that Governor Steuermann was an extra hazardous risk, and his plans were made.

An Interesting Project.

Down in the Rio Grande Valley in the much famed Brownsville Country, there is now in course of construction an irrigation project which, in many particulars, is the most unique and interesting scheme of the kind that has ever been undertaken in the United States if not in the world. A half a million-dollar corporation, known as the San Benito Land and Water Company, is the promoter of the enterprise which contemplates the irrigation of 30,000 acres of land with the Rio Grande as the source of water supply.

The chief point of interest in the scheme is that practically the entire tract is to be watered by gravity, without the application, you might say, of a single pound artificial energy. This plan is feasible by reason of the peculiar lay of the land in that region. The Rio Grande Valley has been made by overflows of the river in years gone by in the same manner as the Valley of the Nile was formed. The San Benito tract lies in what was once the delta of the Rio Grande and in consequence thereof, the land nearest the river is higher than that which lies adjacent.

More About Peanuts.

R. B. Lancaster of Marshall, Texas, who was a guest at the Hotel Brazos, is connected with a company which has found a profitable market for all the peanuts that are grown in and around Marshall, in Harrison county. The peanuts are made into candy, for which the company has found a ready sale all throughout Texas at top prices.

Our factory, which was organized on the smallest scale, has recently been incorporated with a capital stock of \$25,000," said Mr. Lancaster, "and we are working forty hands on a day and night, shift to keep up with our orders. We use the Spanish grade of peanuts exclusively, and have encouraged the farmers to raise them. We buy all that they produce, paying 75 cents a bushel for the peanuts. In addition to this we send our own-thresher to the farms, and pay the cost of threshing. The acreage in peanuts will be greatly increased, and we will be able to handle all that are grown in this county. We furnish seed to the farmers, who agree to pay us back bushel for bushel in peanuts the following season."—Houston Post.

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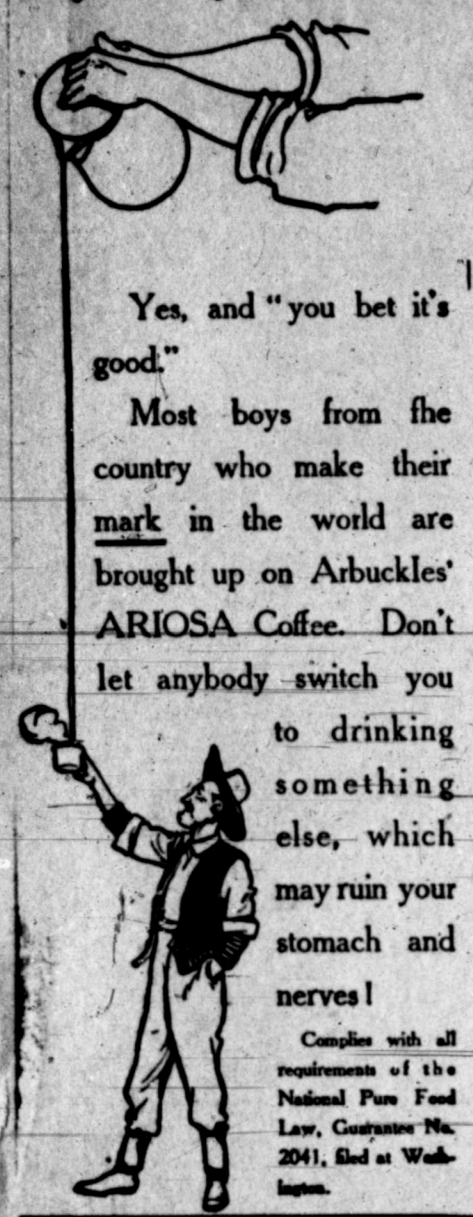

CUSHING TRUCK GROWERS.

Members Agree to Plant Peanuts—Premiums Offered.

In reporting the proceedings of a recent meeting of the Cushing Truck Growers Association, the Enterprise says:

There was considerable discussion on several subjects, among which was that of securing a complete trucker to superintend the crop of the association for the next year. The special committee was directed to correspond with several parties on this subject.

The subject of growing peanuts was also enthusiastically discussed with a strong tendency toward the growing of this all important crop. Every farmer present said that they would plant from 5 to 10 acres. The subject of growing the Spanish peanuts is today agitating the minds of the farmers of East Texas stronger than any other one thing. It is a crop that can be grown as extensively in the rural district as on the farms near a town or village. This country will be full of thrashing machines which will go to every home in the land where as much as five acres of peanuts are grown. Every railroad town will have a cash market for them whether there is a peanut factory there or not. In sacks a pair of mules can haul 50 bushels over any of our roads and any man can grow and market them at a good profit.

More Trouble at San Augustine.

The news has been received in this city that more trouble has been had at San Augustine, in which Henry Head killed Oscar Garrett and another negro last night.

The trouble is supposed to be a sequel to the former disturbance between the Head family and some negroes, no particulars having been given in the report.

It will be remembered that some months ago one of the Head boys was killed by a negro, and that later a negro was killed by one of the Head boys. More trouble was had between members of this family and a negro or negroes a few nights ago in which he and a man named Davis, who came to his rescue, were seriously wounded, and the killing of last night is supposed to be in some way connected with the former trouble.

Deputy Sheriff A. H. Mills went to San Augustine today after the negro who shot the young white men down there recently, it being desired to remove him to this jail for safe keeping.
