ASSAULT TO MURDER.

A. L. Phillips Attempts to Kill W. J. Calor.

Deputy Sheriff W. J. Calor of Clevenger had a narrow escape from being killed this morning, and A. L. Phillips is in jail on a charge of assault to murder.

Some time ago Joe P. Clevenger bought a tract of timber land, located six miles southeast of town on the T. & N. O. railroad, from Dr. J. E. Mayfield, receiving a warrant deed for the land. In the mean time A. L. Phillips, claiming it to be state school land, had a survey made of the tract and filed it in the county clerk's office. On this pretense Mr. Phillips claims possession of the land, and this morning he went to where Mr. Calor had a force of men at work cutting timber for Clevenger's mill. He was armed with a double barrel shot gun loaded with buck shot, and presenting his gun on Mr. Calor, ordered him off of the land. Mr. Calor remonstrated with Mr. Phillips until he got close enough to catch the muzzle of the gun, and when he did Phillips fired one shot, but fortunately no one was hit.

Mr. Calor disarmed Mr. Phillips, placed him under arrest, marched him to town and turned him over to Sheriff Blackburn who placed him in jail.

Mr. Calor then went before Justice Huston and made complaint against Phillips for assault to murder.

VISITING THE SCHOOLS.

County Superintendent Tillery Talks of Existing Conditions.

County Superintendent R. W. Tillery is making the rounds of the public schools of the county, and at the request of The Sentinel is giving weekly letters descriptive of conditions as they exist in our schools. The following is his second letter:

Editor Sentinel.

Monday morning, Nov. 18, found us at the Moral colored school. This school is taught in a church house and is comfortable, but has no desks. We found the teacher, P. E. Porter, using Quantrell's class book. We commend the use of some class book to all teachers in the county. A. Flanagan, Chicago, or G. R. Hammon Pub. Co., Fort Worth, will furnish excellent class books. Of course there are others.

At Gravel Ridge we found the teacher and forty children on the way that leads to knowledge. This school has a new house but needs some desks. Children should be taught to write. We insist that every teacher have a regular writing period each day, but this work cannot be well done on benches. A farmer to do good farming must have good tools, so with children in school.

During the noon hour we go to Alazan. The teacher here has enrolled about 70 pupils, which is too many for one teacher, especially where he has several different grades. The school house has been repaired some, and is much more comfortable than last year, but we still hope that the good people of this district will build a new house and use two teachers, at least part of the time. One teacher trying to teach a school large enough for two. You know the result, though each does his best.

We come next to the Pleasant Hill colored school. The school is taught in a church house and is comfortable. The school was small, many having yet started, yet work done here is above average for colored school. At Eden the teacher has enrolled nearly 70 pupils, though on account of sickness in the community less than 40 were present. Sickness was one cause, but there is another that prevails all over the county, and that is indifference on the part of parents. No one should keep his child from school when it is possible to send. The state furnishes the funds and every child is entitled to the benefit of these funds.

At Douglass Prof. Hale has a good school, and the people there seem to appreciate the school. There appears to be about 25 boarding pupils, who were greatly interested in

THE Tyler Courier and Times says the goober grabber is one of the coming capitalists of Texas.

ALL senators and congressmen are hiking out for Washington now. Congress convenes December 2.

SENATOR KELLIE objects to his Santa Fe merger bill being called a "scar." It is a little out of order to do that until it is permitted to heal.

THIS financial stringency may be a blessing in disguise, but are there a whole lot of people who would like to see it no longer disguised.

WE learn from the Timpson Times that Mollie Bailey and her great show is coming this way. If Aunt Mollie misses Nacogdoches this time she had as well cut her acquaintance with these people forever.

BRYAN says he will accept the democratic nomination for the presidency if tendered him by the convention. All that is now necessary is for the democrats of the country to see that the convention does its duty.

THE Texas State fair is now on a solid financial basis, and it is now one of the greatest and most valuable institutions in the state. The total cash in the treasury to the credit of the association is \$93,753.50, with no outstanding debt.

THE La Porte Chronicle thinks that with a bumper cotton crop in sight, no woman has any excuse for not having a good figure. That may be true, but it takes cash and not figures to make ends meet during a financial panic.

ONE member of the late legislature says that one reason why legislators do not attend functions given in honor of the governor, United States senators, and other political and official dignitaries, they are not able to pay railroad fare. It is hoped that for that or some other reason some of them will not be able to get back to the legislature.

In his speech at Lufkin Governor Campbell is reported to have said: "When a man announces for office hereafter, search him. If he has a corporate affiliation don't elect him. I don't believe that railroad attorneys, or attorneys for any corporation should be intrusted with law-making power. Watch your candidates for the legislature. Watch the man who gets favors from the corporations." The advice of the Governor is timely, and should be given prompt heed.

A GIGANTIC PLAN.

From a statement made by E. A. Calvin, former president of the Farmers Union, it is learned that a plan has been adopted by the Union whereby the farmers will be absolutely independent of the gamblers. According to Mr. Calvin the plan is to ship cotton direct to Liverpool where the Union has perfected arrangements by which it can draw \$80 per bale on consignment and hold for a stipulated price. The plan enables the farmer to hold his cotton for higher values, at the same time relieving the monetary situation in Texas by bringing in a stream of gold from foreign banks, and carry on the movement which was originally inaugurated, and which precipitated the panic with the Wall street gamblers. In discussing the proposition Mr. Calvin says:

"The plan has been under consideration only four days and in that time we have found many favorable responses. No cotton has yet been shipped, but we are trying now to make up a shipment, and it is expected that something like 4,000 or 5,000 bales will be moved within the next few days. There are approximately from 250,000 to 300,000 bales of cotton stored in the warehouses in Texas. How much of this will be moved in accordance with the plan agreed upon is difficult to estimate. There is one thing that should be remembered—this is not a selling proposition. We have simply found an outlet where we can consign cotton at Liverpool and other places to have it held indefinitely, or rather subject to our order to sell, and secure an advance of about \$30 per bale. It is simply a consignment proposition to get money into Texas, and those of the interior to whom the proposition has been submitted, look upon it with favor. The cotton will be held subject to the order of the consignee, and when it is finally sold, it is agreed that the prevailing price at the time of sale shall be paid. That is all there is to it. It is a strictly business proposition, and one that will enable the farmers to carry out their original intention to hold their product for a higher price."

THE Austin Statesman calls attention to an important fact in this way: "The tobacco industry in Texas groweth all the while; the onion production enlargeth with each passing year; the tomato crop increaseth with each coming season; the peanut acreage will be tenfold greater next year than any previous year; there are more peach trees, pear trees, plum trees, fig trees and vineyards in Texas than ever heretofore. With these conditions confronting us and abiding with us it is impossible for panics or financial furies to worry Texas long at a time." The farmer of Nacogdoches county who raises plenty of either of the above products is not worrying over a panic. Add to the above a genera-

tion hogs, cattle, horses, mules, corn, cotton and ribbon cane syrup, and the happiness and prosperity of the country will be supreme.

At Hattiesburg, Miss., two white men and a negro fell 80 feet. The negro was practically unhurt by the fall of 80 feet. Strange, but in Nacogdoches a negro fell only about 8 feet and was killed.—Mt. Enterprise Herald.

You are wrong, brother Enterprise. It was not the fall that killed the Nacogdoches negro, but the suddenness with which he stopped. He might have fallen 8, 80 or even 800 feet and still lived. It was the stoppage of his descent that caused his death.

In the district court at Corsicana Judge Cobb has ruled that the nineteenth amendment of the Terrell election law was unconstitutional in providing that parties over 60 years of age should secure an exemption certificate before becoming qualified voters imposed additional burdens upon them, the Constitution having already exempted them. That looks all right. As the law reads all persons over 60 years of age residing in towns of 10,000 inhabitants must not only take out exemption papers once to be entitled to vote but must do so every year hereafter. The framers of that law must have feared some old 60-year fellows would grow younger as the years flew by.—Denison Gazetteer.

THE beloved Nacogdoches Sentinel says that Congressman Cooper "dodged Nacogdoches." This because Mr. Cooper spent two hours in Timpson waiting for a trail to Longview, where he made connection with an I. & G. N. through train for Austin. If The Sentinel can't make a better showing than this in its attacks on our Congressman its cause is hopelessly lost.—Center Advocate.

This not because Mr. Cooper spent two hours in Timpson or anywhere else. But because "our congressman" has not made it convenient to visit Nacogdoches since his nomination in this city nearly eighteen months ago. The Sentinel is making no attack on "our congressman," but we would all like to have him call around and see us.

Against Public Execution.

Henderson News.
Curiosity has not yet deserted the human race. The Nacogdoches Daily Sentinel in giving an account of the recent hanging of Dock Bailey, a negro in that city, states that the crowds on the streets gave the town the appearance of a circus day. The people came on trains, wagons and by every possible means of travel and began to arrive the day before the execution. An immense crowd was on the streets at daylight. We have no disposition to censure this course on the part of those who are disposed to indulge in it, but still it is strange to us that any one can find pleasure in witnessing the death struggles of even a fiend. Such men as Dock Bailey should be hanged but do not believe such executions should be in the presence of the general public. We think that such a course destroys the effect designed to be produced, and we believe promotes crime rather than restrains it. There should be as much mystery thrown about these executions as possible and thereby increase the effect. No one is made better by gazing upon a scene of this sort, but that his sensibilities are rather blunted. These victims nearly all profess to be ready for heaven, and this fact is a comfort to the ignorant and vicious. Hang the guilty murderer, but do it as privately as possible and do not permit him to harangue the crowd.

ON Tuesday, November 19, the Dallas News made this announcement in a double headed editorial paragraph: "By reference to the latest market reports, published in another column, it will be seen that a marked reaction has set in all the markets, and that things are becoming normal again in the chief business centers. Cotton and wheat have scored a substantial advance, and railroad and other standard stocks have registered the greatest advance of any day since the financial disturbance set in three weeks ago." That may be true, but how is an increase in the price of wheat, cotton stocks, etc., going to relieve the poor fellow out of a job who has neither of those articles of commerce to sell?

THE Breckenridge, Mo., Bulletin says: "The kickers on the farm are not so hard to get along with as the kickers in the town. On the farm there is the kicking cow, and our long-eared friend, the mule, while in town there is the old mossback who wants all the municipal improvements without paying for them. REASON FOR CLOSING.

Cecil Lyon Explains why Mills Have Shut Down.

Houston, Texas, Nov. 21.—The announcement was made Wednesday evening by the receivers of the Kirby Lumber company that the Bronson and Kirbyville mills, which employ from 500 to 600 men will be closed down temporarily. The statement was made by Colonel Cecil A. Lyon that this step is not taken on account of the present financial condition. On this point he said:

"A number of mills have been closed down recently, and others are likely to take the same course. A majority of these mills are closed down, not because of the present financial condition, but because there is no disinclination on the part of the operators to put up to the timber and sell it at a prevailing price. The timber is too valuable to sacrifice it, and many of the mills have a large surplus on hand."

Colonel Lyon is of the opinion that the financial flurry has about spent its force and that better times will soon be here.

That Coin Inscription.

The discussion of the matter of leaving the inscription "In God We Trust" from the new coins has brought forth a copy of the original order under which this was placed on the coins, which reads as follows:

November 20, 1861.

"Dear Sir: No nation can be strong except in the strength of God, or safe except in his defense. The trust of our people in God should be declared on our national coins. You will cause a device to be prepared without unnecessary delay with a motto expressing in the fewest and tersest words possible this national recognition. Yours truly,

"S. P. Chase."

It would seem that the same spirit impelled this as dictated the observance of a national day of thanksgiving, and just as appropriately Thanksgiving proclamations could be dispensed with.

CARNEY TO GO.

Superintendent of Lufkin Public Schools Asked to Resign.

The News has absolute information that W. H. Carney, superintendent of the Lufkin Independent School District has been asked to resign by the school board and that the board has been in correspondence for some time with various educators throughout the country to fill his position. At the present time it seems quite likely that Mr. A. F. Armstrong of Dallas, a graduate of the Butler University, will be appointed to fill the vacancy.

The action by the school board has been prompted by alleged misrepresentations by Prof. Carney as to the class of certificate he holds and various other statements which the board claims he made and which they have since found to be incorrect.

Mr. Carney so it is rumored will resist any attempt on the part of the board to oust him and will if necessary take the matter into court. He has a contract for one year and may try to force the fulfillment of the agreement.



IMPORTANT RULING.

Many Teachers' Certificates Have Been Declared Invalid.

Report comes from Austin that the attorney general's department has handed down a most interesting and important opinion on the question of teachers' certificates. It was in the appeal case of Miss Lula Smith of Guadalupe county, from the decision of the state superintendent of public instruction to the state board of education, and the board certified the question to the attorney general's department for a ruling. The question was whether a four day's attendance on a five day's county institute would satisfy the requirements for the extension of a state teachers' certificate under the law of 1905? The attorney general's department held that it would not in as much as in the opinion of the department the special provision in the act referred only to attendance on the three two-days institute and that no amount of attendance in a five days institute would fulfill the requirement. The effect of this ruling is to forbid the state superintendent from extending a certificate for attendance on a five days institute as a compliance with the state statutes of 1905 for the extension of certificates. This ruling not only sustains the position of the state superintendent but goes farther. A logical result will be that a number of certificates will be invalidated.

DISASTROUS FIRE.

LUMBERMEN TO ORGANIZE Meeting to be Held in Houston for That Purpose.

At the meeting held by Texas lumber manufacturers in Houston recently it was decided to go into a permanent organization of Texas manufacturers for the purpose of handling the various matters with which the trade is concerned. It has been for a long time recognized that the saw mill interests have come to the parting of the ways with those antagonistic elements which have combined to retard the proper growth, handling and development of the business. It makes but little difference now whose ox is to be gored if the vast interests of lumbering are to be hampered and depressed in the future as they have been in the past. The ancient friendship existing between railroads and big shippers of lumber is about to be severed unless the railroad side makes a better showing in the future. Every lumber producer who makes a sale of his stuff to an innocent and confiding customer without specifying that the same is subject to delay is being placed in the position of selling goods under false pretenses. It has come to a pass that lumbermen know nothing concerning their business, and are unable to make a calculation that does not miss its mark many miles. This inposition is one of the things with which the association when formed will have to deal. There are many others, in fact every other question affecting the trade except the making of prices or in any way going contra to the laws of the state. There are many such things as lumbermen all know. They are interested in taking part in discussions of the rate and car situations. Also in the great question of demurrage. There are matters constantly coming up before the railroad commission, and there is that 2-cent differential, which has been worked on a little and which can be made to save hundreds of thousands every year, as well as to recover a vast sum which is now due to Texas manufacturers. If these are not important matters for future adjustment, then what is to be said of the labor problem, and the duty of the hour in that respect? All are interested in this. Work cannot be accomplished by individuals. This association is for a great and noble purpose, and every manufacturer is expected to join. There will be a meeting at Houston on Saturday, November 30, to which all are invited. The committee appointed to prepare by-laws and a constitution have finished their labors and are prepared to report back to the meeting of manufacturers on the 30th a full plan of organization. At this meeting the organization will be perfected and the officers of the Texas Lumber Manufacturers' Association elected.

Bryan on Free Silver.

William Jennings Bryan lectured at Ford's opera house in Boston Sunday afternoon under the auspices of the

Young Men's Christian Association, prior to which he was given a luncheon, by friends and admirers.

Just before the latter event, in response to a question as to whether free coinage of silver as advocated by him would have prevented the money stringency from which the country has been suffering, he said:

"The coinage of silver has no bearing upon the monetary conditions which exist today. The restoration of bimetallism would have given us more money than we have at present, but the unprecedented discovery of gold has given us such an increase in money that prices have risen."

A LATE special from Washington says: "The events of the past week in the financial situation have centered around the offer of the government to receive bids for \$50,000,000 in 2 per cent bonds for Panama canal construction and offers at par for \$100,000,000 in treasury certificates to run for a year at 3 per cent. The announcement of this project by President Roosevelt in his letter to Secretary Cortelyou, published on Monday last, has done much to restore normal conditions in the money market. The premium on currency, while somewhat obstinate, has been gradually declining and the rally in the stock market on Saturday following the visit to Washington of J. Pierpont Morgan and George F. Baker, indicates that confidence is being restored by the manifest cooperation between the government and big financial interests in New York. The manner in which the offers are being received for the new securities indicates that they will probably be over-subscribed."
