Judge Henderson Dead.

Judge John N. Henderson, associate justice of the court of criminal appeals, died at his home in Dallas last night at 10 o'clock from a complication of diseases, the principal cause being Bright's disease.

Judge Henderson was born at Ashville, North Carolina, February 18, 1844, but was brought to Texas by his parents when he was a small child. He was a member of Hood's Texas brigade during the war between the states, and lost an arm at the battle of Antietam.

Judge Henderson has held many positions of trust in Texas, and since 1899 has been on the state court of criminal appeals bench.

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
