"We have a man in this county by the name of Dean, who grew an orchard to the \$2412 worth of peaches off of 10 acres, and who does not growing truit trees.

In the first place the por tion of Angelina county lying along the T. \& N. O. railroad
hasn't a foot of soil adapted o the growing of peaches, it being a gumbo, hard pan, white crawfishy soil that patch. Why the T. \& N O has to haul sand trom Henderson county to a deep cut in the Angelina orchard to keep the track from going
out of sight
This great orehard has on pine stumps three teet hig and eighteen inches through to the acre. The land is as poor as the Lord ever made clay points with gullies washd all over it. THE LOWLY PEANUT
The lowly and neglected peanut has sprung into pop-
ular tavor in Texas as a forage rop, and a wave of peanut enthusiasm is sweeping over the state. Already four large peanut mills have been established in East Texas and one at. Falfurrias. This latter now building will have a eanow building will have a capeanuts a month and will give employment to 100 persons. This factory announces that it will pay 75 cents a bushel for peanuts of the right va-
riety, Arrangements have been made for the farmers in the adjacent country to plant 000 acres in peanuts this pring. In addition hundreds acres over Southwest Texas re being put into peanuts. n some localities they are pulled up by the roots and baled for forage or hay as altalfa. At other places the hogs are turned into the peanut fields and fattened for market. As teed for hogs and mules the peanut is considered superior to all other orage plants. As food for human beings it is also highly human beings it is also highly
nutricious and much used; nutricious and much used;
roasted peanuts and peanut andy are common, and experiments in making peanut
flour have been tried. A large St. Louis commission firm has bought a large farm near San Antonio and is rais$g$ high grade peanuts for he market. From the commercial the peanut has passed into the social life of Texas,
