

STATE QUARANTINE.

Yellow Fever in Cuba Arouses Complete Instructions as to How Health Otticer to Action.

Austin, Texas, March 2.-The state of Texas will establish quarantine against all points south of 25 degrees, north latitude. March 15, about two weeks earlier than customarily. This action is due to the prevalence of sporadic cases of vellow fever in Cuba, and follows the visit of State Health Officer W. M. Brumby to Galveston, where he discussed the situation with Quarantine Officer J. H Florence. The governor's proclamation will probably is sue this week. Dr. Brumby said today that an embargo is necessary owing to the man ner of yellow fever that pre vails in Cuba. It occurs sporadically, offering there Cuban health authorities to take proper precautions to prevent its spread. Were the disease not of this character prepare resolutions expressive a copy be sent to her family, an earlier embargo would hardly be deemed necessary provided the right effort were made to suppress it and pre vent its being communicated

> This year's quarantine will be but a mild restrictive order. of the 25th parallel will be held without Texas ports un til the time elapsing since their presence in presumptive five or six days. Therefore a ship making a voyage from Cuba in four days would be held in quarantine at Galves ton one or two days and then be permitted to enter the har bor after proper precautions have been exercised. The 25th parallel takes in Tampi co and other points in Mexico but Dr. Brumby asserts that the impending quarantine will in no wise interfere with traffic between Texas and Mexico. There is no yellow fever in Mexico at present and if the precautions and sanitary regulations that are now being exertised are per servered in none will develop Dr. Brumby paid Mexico a high compliment today re specting its sanitary work.

DOCTURS MUST REGISTER.

They Should Proceed.

At the request of District Clerk R. W. Murphey, and for the information of all physicians who have not yet complied with the new law requiring them to register their certificates or diplomas in the office of the district clerk. the following from the Texas State Journal of Medicine is

reproduced: Every physician now legal ized to practice medicine in Texas, and expect to continue to practice legally—after July 12, 1908, before that date must register a Verification License in the Medical Register in his district clerk's office and make oath as to his age, postoffice address, place of birth and school of practice. The following directions for registration are issued on the authority of the State Board of Medical Examiners:

1. Those legalized by a District Board certificate should send the original cer tificate, bearing the annota tion and seal of registration in the district clerk's office. together with a 50-cent money order, to Dr. G. B. Foscue. Waco, secretary of the board. If this is not at hand, for 50 cents (some clerks exact more one should get a district derk's certificate proving reg istration in his office. This, together with a 50 cent money order sent to the secretary. will secure one a Verification

Lincense. 2. Those legalized by a registered diploma must so cure a certificate like the above from a district clerk, showing registration of diploma, and an affidavit from the dean of the college testifying to the issuance of the diploma. This secures the Board against receiving bogus diplomas. The secretary of the board re quests that no diplomas be sent him, as they are useless and will immediately be returned by express. Upon submitting to the secretary such clerk's certificate and dean's affidavit, with a 50-cent money order, a Verication License will be

GUILTY OF MALIGERING.

A Unique Case Reported From San Texas, J. M. Wright. Antonio.

San Antonio, Texas, Feb. 29. Sentenced to prison for Commission, J. L.
