### A CHALLENGE.

Hon. S. W. Blount Proposes to Meet Cone Johnson.

Nacogdoches, Tex., April 15. Mr. E. A. Blount, Chairman anti-Bailey Club, Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Sir: We note that you have arranged for Hon. Cone Johnson to speak at this place on Friday, the 24th day of this month, upon which date it has heretofore been announced that there will be at this place a joint meeting of the agricultural and commercial interests of Southeast Texas; and in order that the Democrats of this county may be fairly and impartially advised upon the issues now being presented to them in this campaign against Senator J. ### NACOGDOCHES MEETING.

Commercial Club Preparing for Convention April 24-25.

The Nacogdoches Commercial Club is making extensive preparations for the conference of agricultural and commercial interests of the coast country, to be held here April 24 and 25. Mr. Robert Lindsey, president of the Commercial Club, has secured reduced rates from all railroads entering the city and considerable interest is being manifested in the meeting by the citizens of this section.

An interesting program is being arranged for the conference covering every phase of the resolutions adopted by the State convention at Fort Worth March 12. Public speakers of prominence and familiarity with the subject under discussion will address the meeting. The program will be given to the press early next week. Nacogdoches and the entire section of East Texas are particularly interested in state aid in the development of latent resources and legislative encouragement to the investment of capital. This territory is sleeping over a bed of iron ore proven by the Rusk furnaces to be of superior quality and productivity to the Birmingham field. The Rusk plant has demonstrated the value of the yield and established a market for the product, and with legislative restriction removed, capital will give this line of industry careful consideration.

Under the soil of Nacogdoches is a green marl into which a few men have thrust tobacco plants and gathered a leaf the like of which does not grow nearer than the West Indies. This remunerative line of agriculture has flourished at different intervals throughout the past fifty years, but through lack of opportunity for the farmers to school themselves in the cultivation and curing of the plant so as to retain the delicate flavors, the industry has languished and a demonstration farm is needed to firmly establish the superiority of this important plant.

The good roads problem will receive its share of the discussion, and the advantage of improved public highways will be presented by Hon. R. E. Smith of Sherman, Texas, president of the Texas Good Roads Association. This important subject will embrace the issuance of bonds by precinct, methods of intelligent supervision in construction, establishing rural routes and fostering a spirit of patriotic co-operation among the farmers in improving their country thoroughfares.

When these results are accomplished, Nacogdoches will need a dozen more rail-

### BROWN PLEADS GUILTY.

Negro Confesses and Gets the Lowest Penalty.

Will Brown, the young negro who was indicted during the present term of district court for the murder of James Wade, another negro boy, near Cushing a few weeks ago, pleaded guilty in the district court today to murder in the second degree and was given five years in the penitentiary.

Brown was also indicted for criminal assault on the sister of Wade, and he pleaded guilty to that charge before a jury this afternoon, and upon the suggestion of District Attorney O'Quinn the lowest penalty, five years, was assessed in this case.

Brown accepted sentence in both cases, and now awaits the convenience of the officials to transfer him to the penitentiary to serve out his ten years time.

## THE SENTINEL'S POSITION.

The Sentinel has been of the disposition to let the Bailey question rest since the legislature gave him another "white wash," and has had absolutely nothing to say about the matter, pro or con, up to this time. But since Mr. Bailey is not satisfied with his "vindication" by the legislators, who were instructed to cast their vote for him before the voters realized, or knew that he had continued the practice of "influence" that he had found it necessary to be "vindicated" for before a previous legislature, we feel that it is time that we were showing our colors.

We are very sorry, indeed, that circumstances have worked around in such a way as to bring the Bailey issue before the public again, and especially at a time when the agitation can have only one effect—that of precipitating it into a national campaign, as well as local affairs.

We have always believed it true that you could not mix oil with water. If this adage is true, we also believe it true that you can not mix Baileyism with Bryanism. The principles of the two men will not mix.

In our position on this question we shall endeavor to treat the opinions of the Bailey men with as much respect and kindly feeling as we would have them treat us. A bitter, harsh stand can result in no good to the public and will reflect only on those indulging in such conduct.

We regard the question as meaning one of two things, and that is:

First—If you believe that a United States senator should and could represent you and your interests one day against trusts, that are regarded as your most deadly enemy, and the next day line up with the trusts, that are your bitterest foe against you, then vote for Senator Bailey and his ticket as delegates to the National convention.

Second—If you believe that a United States senator should represent his constituents faithfully and honestly and hold himself ready at all times to fight to the bitter end for their protection and drive the trust enemies of the people from the country, then you should vote for Cone Johnson and his ticket as delegates to the National convention.

The issue before you is not one of personal friendship or appreciation of high intellect, but purely the vital question of whether you think that a United States senator should represent the people or the trusts. If you want to go on record as endorsing the trusts against the people that is exactly what your vote for Senator Bailey as a delegate to the National convention will be construed to mean. If you want to go on record as being against the trusts first, last

a delegate to the National convention and your vote will so record you.

If you had a case in court and had employed a lawyer to represent you and your interests what would you think, when the case was called, to find that your attorney had engaged to represent the other side too? The conditions that we are facing are practically this.

## SEAL IN A BOTTLE.

Advice of Authority. Also a Single Prescription.

Hon. Martin Dies of Beaumont, candidate for the Democratic nomination for congress, delivered a ringing address at the court house Saturday afternoon in which he administered a scathing rebuke to Baileyism.

Despite the fact that a torrential rain had been falling during a greater portion of the day, the district court room was crowded to its full capacity, and a goodly number of the audience was composed of farmers.

Mr. Dies took for his theme the following recent declaration of Hon. W. J. Bryan:

"A man is lacking either in intelligence or honesty, or both, who will defend the acceptance by a public official of employment by those whose interests are antagonistic to the interests of the people."

Mr. Dies said:

Fellow citizens, the principle that "no man can serve two masters" is as old as time. Francis Bacon, Lord High Chancellor of England, violated that principle when he accepted fees and gifts from litigants in his court. The people of England refused to place the stamp of their approval upon his conduct. They drove him from the bench. Their act of disapproval did not disrupt the party to which Bacon belonged—it made it stronger. Senator Burton violated the principle when he accepted money from the government and at the same time accepted money from those in conflict with the government. He declared that he was the Republican party in Kansas, and that to expose and prosecute him would split and disrupt the party. The people took a different view. They did "split and disrupt Senator Burton politically," but the effect in the hearts and consciences of all honest men was to increase respect for the party.

Mr. Dies reviewed at length Senator Bailey's connection with H. Clay Pierce and the Waters-Pierce Oil company, frequently quoting from the record of the legislative investigation, in each instance giving, as he termed it, the book and page.

In concluding his speech he said:

If Senator Bailey, fellow citizens, was god-like, and superior to most men, as his friends allege, and he seems to admit, still his example is a dangerous one for our country. If you endorse his course by electing him to this second office and thus exalt him for the thing he has done, what will be the import and effect of that endorsement upon public servants and officeholders all over Texas?

Will it not be a suggestion to your sheriff, that he may borrow money from the defaulting cashier? Might not your district and county attorneys conclude that it gives them leave to borrow money from those who violate your laws? Are you willing to endorse this thing in your

highest officer, and next week, or next year, condemn some smaller officer who does the same thing? Are you willing, fellow citizens, that this sort of practice should extend and spread itself to each officer and every representative in the government? Don't let us become confused and undertake to pass upon the acts of all public officers at one time. We elected Bailey to represent us. His course is laid before us. He has become a candidate for delegate to the National convention. He says we must either approve his course now or condemn it. There is no middle ground. Which will you do? "Choose ye this day whom ye will serve."

Mr. Bryan is to be nominated at Denver as your leader in the great contest this year. His views upon "Baileyism" are well known. He has described "Baileyism" minutely and condemned it in scathing terms. He has not told us that his words applied to our junior senator. He naturally supposes that we can and will apply the facts in our possession. He is to carry our banner this year. Do we want Bailey to help write the platform? Do we want to send Bryan forth to this conflict embarrassed with "Baileyism?" Texas is the banner Democratic state. What will the Republicans say? Bryan will flash the sword of Democracy in the face of trust ridden Republicanism, and declare, as he has often declared before, "that no man can serve two masters." Some Republican will yell out, "How about Bailey?" When this our great leader tells the Republicans, from whose ranks we must have recruits or lose, that: "I believe the time will come that when a man turns a public office to a private advantage he will be whipped from society along with the embezzler of money," they will flaunt the Bailey record in his face. They will accuse us of hypocrisy. They will tell us we preach a doctrine we do not practice. They will politely tell Mr. Bryan to go home and sweep around the Democratic door before he begins to preach civic righteousness to Republicans. They will quote Senator Bailey's own words in which he said he did it and would do it again. They will tell us that we have endorsed this thing and named this senator to write our platform. It would be an awful load for Bryan to carry. Why should we embarrass and shackle him?

But suppose the Democracy says to the world that it does not stand committed to "Baileyism;" that it stands today as it has always stood, for a single standard of public service. Suppose our party sends a message to every

voter in this land that we have fought this thing out at home and placed upon it the stamp of our disapproval. That would be a message of hope. It would give the words of Bryan and the words of Democracy the impress of sincerity. "It is a good divine that follows his own instructions."

Let us settle this question at home, and settle it right before we send our leaders forth to preach pure politics to our erring Republican brethren. Nothing could injure Democracy or pure politics like the campaign arguments of some of the friends of Senator Bailey. They say his course should be approved because all of our public servants are either "doing the same" or only want an opportunity to do so. Don't let them poison the mind of your son with that kind of doctrine. Tell them they have mistaken the exception for the rule. Point them to every Southern senator who ever held that lofty position. None of them ever amassed a fortune in public office. Point them to Jefferson, the founder of our great party, who served the people in almost every office in the Republic, and who not only died poor, but actually congratulated himself that he left the service of the people with "clean but empty hands." Point them to the thousands of faithful servants who this very hour, in obscurity, are patiently and honestly doing their duty without the shadow of turning.

May we have the vigilance to pursue the truth, and the courage to proclaim it, and may this contest be decided to the honor and glory of our country.

Chairman Elected and Provision Made for May Primary.

The Democratic Executive committee of Nacogdoches county met Saturday afternoon in obedience to call, with eleven of the 18 members present.

On motion of J. W. Cariker of Cushing it was ordered by the committee that a primary election be held on Saturday, May 2, for the purpose of voting for delegates at large to the National Democratic convention...

The matter of raising funds for defraying the expense of the primary was left to the Bailey and anti-Baily clubs of the county.

It was reported to the committee that R. F. Davis, who was elected county chairman at a previous meeting of the committee, was ineligible for the position on account of his being a member of the state text book board...

**Anniversary of Famous Battles.**

The old Confederate veterans are talking and thinking about the anniversary of the big battle fought at Mansfield, La., just forty-four years ago, April 8.

This was because the northern army failed to reach Mansfield, being repulsed and defeated at the cross roads. Gen. Dick Taylor on our side put up this fight against the wish of his superior officer, Gen. E. Kirby Smith.

The old boys surviving can recite some exciting experiences. Several of the soldiers from the county were killed, and many wounded. L. S. Taylor and Ed Whitaker were badly wounded. Mose Davis and John Norris were killed; so was Capt. S. M. Noble.

The 7th of April was eventful too. There were several hot skirmishes on that day. And on the 7th of April occurred the big battle of Pleasant Hill, La., which place is about fifteen miles east of Mansfield...

Gen. Taylor wrote a book entitled "Construction and Reconstruction," in which he gives the details of these and other noted events. He was a son of Gen. Zack Taylor, and had a fine military and literary education, and was a true and valued patriot.

We want every name on our books that we can get, but we don't want to push the Sentinel on any one that does not want it. It is also possible that we have made a few mistakes and some name might be left off of the new list that should not be. In such cases we will be thankful if the parties will kindly call our attention to the error. It affords us as much pleasure to correct a mistake as it does to receive the cash for a years subscription in advance. Please don't get mad about mistakes, but remember that you make them as well as the other fellow.

There seems to be an impression that subscriptions must be paid in advance. This is a mistake. The publisher can extend credit for 12 months on Weekly papers and 3 months on Daily papers. If the subscriber is not ready to pay at the end of time limit he can arrange with the publisher for an extension by agreement.

In all Mr. Bailey seems to have received about a quarter of a million dollars from the trusts during the past six or eight years and this quarter of a million dollars, in fees, has cost the people of Texas a little over nineteen million dollars. Is this the kind of results that we are to expect from our United States senators?

THEY are all talking about the big tobacco crop that East Texas—and especially Nacogdoches county—will produce this year. The Austin Statesman says: "East Texas promises to raise more tobacco this year than ever before in the history of that country. Diversity is what the country needs and we hope the spirit of diversity will swell and grow and sweep the whole state."

THE Honey Grove Citizen very correctly states the proposition thus: "The issue in this campaign is not whether or not Cone Johnson voted for Hogg or Clark, but whether or not it is right for Bailey to serve corporations and accept fees and loans from them while serving the people in the exalted office of United States senator. Tom N. Jones, John Durst and others who love Bailey would have you believe that it is the democracy of Johnson, Holt, Young and Thomas that is the issue, rather than the actions of Senator Bailey."

### USURPING AUTHORITY.

In this day of political intoxication, many remarkable things are being done by passionate leaders and those clothed with legal authority. The latest drastic move recorded is that proposed by the democratic executive committee of Taylor county. The Abilene Reporter says: "The democratic county executive committee adopted a resolution at its meeting Saturday to assume that the precinct chairmanships are vacant and to fill them at its meeting on the 18th inst., in all cases where they do not report on that day. Let every man interested in the party take a hand in this matter far enough to help get this notice to all sections of the county, to the end that all committeemen be notified of the meeting and what the meeting means to do at that time. The sentiment of the members present at the meeting on the 4th inst., is that hereafter no proxies will be given seats in the business meetings of the body, and it is quite likely that this action will be taken. We give notice of this in order that members of the committee may not be taken by surprise. Let every precinct be represented, if possible."

There is no question but that the Taylor county committee will usurp authority not delegated to it by law if the threat above made is put into execution. Nowhere does the election law authorize a county committee of any political party to declare the position of a member vacant. Provision is made for the filling of vacancies in the committee, but no authority is given the committee to create a vacancy, or to declare a member's seat vacant except upon the resignation of that member. Such drastic steps and the usurpation of authority go a long way toward creating a very large disgust among the fair-minded citizens of any country.

THE issue before the people is not to determine whether Mr. Bailey is guilty of the charges brought against him, but to decide whether the people want their United States senators to serve them one day and the trust corporations the next.

A MAN ought to be able to keep "meal in the barrel" a good long time on a few quarter million dollar fees from the most oppressive trust that has ever been organized in the world, but how about the poor consumers of coal oil who have paid that same trust a little over nineteen million dollars, in profits, to offset the fee.

WHY is it that if Senator Bailey is the strongest man, politically, in Texas that his friends would make the assertion that he is being persecuted by scheming politicians who want his place in the senate? It looks as if they would let Bailey alone and go after Senator Culberson, who has never claimed the distinction of being the strongest man in Texas or the whole Democratic party.

### GOV. CAMPBELL'S RECORD.

Some of the newspapers that attempted to make sport of the fact that Gov. Campbell told the people that he intended to hold the legislative nose to the grindstone until the platform demands were enacted into laws are now loudest in trying to lug in the Bailey matter whenever they mention his name. They seem to forget that the governor, in his campaign before the people, told them that he was against public officers representing trusts or corporations, and this is the only principle involved in that matter.

No governor in twenty years has been near as successful in having all of the platform demands passed by the legislature as has the present governor of Texas. He promised the people that what they demanded would be carried out, if it were in his power to bring it about, and he has been true to every promise he made the people.

In spite of the fact that the trusts and their organs have been busy throughout Gov. Campbell's administration trying to make trouble, his direction of state affairs has been of the best, and the people can no longer be deceived by the organs of the trusts and corporations. It is a well known fact that the organs and the trusts ransacked the state trying to find a man to make the race for governor against Gov. Campbell. They could not find a man who was foolish enough to make the race.

Gov. Campbell has declared in his speeches that when the trusts cannot control a man, then they set about to ruin him. In other words, the trusts and corporations make a business of politics, and they are always ready to put up money to defeat any man whom they cannot control.

That is really the condition of affairs in this state today, and it takes men of the courage of Gov. Campbell to oppose them and their schemes. Therefore it behooves the people to back up to the fullest extent public officials of the courage of Gov. Campbell, in the stand for honest government for all the people.

If the people appreciate honest government, they must stand behind the officials who have incurred the enmity of the trusts and corporations in fighting for the maintenance of their rights.

Gov. Campbell's stand on all public questions is well known to the people of Texas, and those who are inclined to find fault were never really in favor of this kind of man for governor.—Houston Labor Journal.

It is charged, says the Temple Times, that every agent of the Waters Pierce Oil Company in Texas is an ardent Bailey man and is giving most of his time to the senator's cause just now. If Mr. Bailey's adherents deny that the Standard or Waters Pierce Oil Company is turning money to carry Texas for Bailey, then maybe they will tell us right quick who is paying three agents' salaries for April.

### Wants Good Roads.

Editor Sentinel. As the papers are talking and working for better roads in our county, I will write a few lines on the subject, as I see it, and where the fault lies.

First, I will take up the road overseer and his duty and how he gets his position. He is appointed by his successor or elected by the hands and when they elect one they will get one that will not be too hard and make them work. And if he was appointed by the commissioner and one that would enforce the law on the hands it would help a great deal; and why not pay the overseer say \$10 or \$15 per year to attend to his work? When we have men at work on the poor farm the manager is paid a salary and takes a pride in his work, but as it stands now the overseer will warn out his hands one day and work the next, or pretend to; in fact the overseers are too careless.

Second, the commissioners do not discharge their full duty on the road question. I heard of one commissioner in the county who, when traveling over the roads in his precinct, would stay at a place at night and leave his knife on the center table and get off six miles and come back for it in order to put in his full ten days traveling over his roads. And when they find sign boards and bridges on the road not in first-class condition you never hear them make any complaint.

If they would increase the rate of taxes on road and bridge funds and properly distribute the same and see that every road overseer did his full duty as the law provides he should do, and if not let him suffer the penalty, there would be better roads in this county.

Third, if the representative of our county would do more work and press measures for special road laws for our county that would call for say two more days work from every man in our county between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, because the young men eighteen to twenty-one travel over our roads more than those who are forty-five.

But as it stands now one may pay into the treasury four dollars and be exempt from eight days road duty, while he may go on with his public work, making from \$1 to \$1.50 per day, and when it is paid into the treasury it will lay there until some farmer comes to raise a kick about the bad roads.

Now if the above was carried out and even our present laws enforced as they should be, we would not have so much kick coming. The farmers are beginning to see the need of good roads, for as it is now they can't go to market and back with a load without breaking harness or wagon, and the best of buggies and wagons are soon torn up, and one can not go out driving on Sunday with pleasure on account of our roads.

The papers have offered their space for our officers to

plan for better roads and give their opinions, and many voters are silent and waiting to see who is for the improvement of our roads and county highways that they have to travel over, and the fellow who has or will, will have their support. Respectfully,

### NACOGDOCHES' OPPORTUNITY.

Santa Fe Going After Kentucky Tobacco Growers.

The following from the Houston Chronicle of Sunday ought to be an incentive for Nacogdoches county to make an effort to secure some of these people. The Chronicle says:

"For the purpose of inducing tobacco growers to come to Texas from that section of Kentucky where troubles have existed for some time, Garrett Dobbin, colonization agent for the Santa Fe, will leave Monday. He will go to the districts where independent tobacco growers have met with fire and pillage, and he believes that with the showing he can make regarding Texas lands he can prevail on some of them to take up their abode along the Santa Fe lines in Texas. Many of the independent Kentucky growers are moving out rather than face further difficulty.

"Mr. Dobbin will take with him samples of the tobacco grown in East Texas. He will also carry with him a government analysis of lands adapted to tobacco, and these, the low price placed on tobacco land in Texas, are anticipated to cause an exodus from Kentucky to Texas. Many Kentucky farmers, he is informed, are casting about for locations in other parts of the country, where strife and flames are not at their heels. Texas offers these inducements and Mr. Dobbin is going to lay the proposition before them.

"As further indications of what can be grown in Texas Mr. Dobbin will take with him a number of samples of vegetables and fruits just now coming into the markets. Among them will be the famous Texas Bermuda onion. He returned Saturday morning from Falturrias, bringing back half a dozen of the white pearl variety—onions measuring six and eight inches in diameter. When these are placed before the Kentucky farmers, and the tobacco samples are shown them, it is expected that they will prove attractions hard to resist."

It is a well known fact that railroad companies are all the time looking to their own interests as well as that of the people or sections tributary to their lines, and they have men employed for that purpose. Mr. Dobbin occupies such a position with the Santa Fe, and it is a foregone conclusion that he will locate all of the tobacco growers or other class of farmers he can secure on the Santa Fe lines. If Nacogdoches and Nacogdoches county want to secure any of those dissatisfied tobacco growers from Kentucky, the effort must be made by Nacogdoches people and Nacogdoches interests, and there is no question but that such a move will receive the hearty co-operation of the Southern Pacific Railroad company.

The city of Nacogdoches proper is overdrawn \$95.00.

Accompanying this report and considered a part of it, I submit a statement rendered by the Commercial National Bank of Nacogdoches of each of the three above mentioned accounts under their respective captions—E. H. Blount, City Treasurer, Water Works Sinking Fund and City of Nacogdoches.

These statements show all credits and their proper dates and canceled vouchers covering all moneys paid out by me since the last statement rendered you.

Accompanying the statement of the water works sinking fund, I surrendered a receipt of the State Treasurer for \$2,500, also 50 coupons for \$50 each, showing that on April 1, 1908, the interest on the bonds of the city was paid.

#### AFTER ANARCHISTS.

No Incendiary Newspapers to go Through Mails.

In one of the shortest messages which he has yet transmitted to congress, President Roosevelt has called the attention of that body to the necessity for further legislation on the subject of anarchy. With the message was transmitted a report reviewing the legal phases of the question by Attorney General Bonaparte. The message of the president is as follows:

"To the Senate and House of Representatives:—I herewith submit a letter from the department of justice which explains itself. Under this opinion, I hold that existing statutes give the president full power to prohibit the postmaster general from being used as an instrument in the commission of crimes, that is to prohibit the use of the mails for the advocacy of murder, arson and treason, and I shall act upon such constructions. Unquestionably however, there should be further legislation by congress in this matter. When compared to the suppression of anarchy, every other question sinks into insignificance, for

the anarchist is an enemy to humanity and an enemy to all man-kind and his actions are in a deeper degree criminal than any other. No immigrant will be allowed to come to our shores, if he is an anarchist and no papers published here or abroad will be permitted to circulate in this country if they propagate anarchistic opinions."

(Signed) "Theodore-Roosevelt."

New City Government Starts Off for Year's Business.

A called session of the city council was held yesterday afternoon when the new officers elected at Tuesday's election were duly installed, and the council organized for a busy year's work.

Hon. W. U. Perkins was duly inducted into the office of mayor to succeed himself, and June C. Harris and Guy A. Blount were sworn in as aldermen to succeed Messrs. T. E. Baker and E. H. Blount, who refused to stand for reelection. Guy A. Blount was unanimously elected to serve as mayor protem, which imposes upon him the duty of filling the office of mayor at any time the mayor may be absent from the city or from a meeting of the council.

The offices of city secretary and city treasurer were consolidated, and Alderman Ben T. Wilson was appointed to fill the position of city secretary and treasurer, which appointment was unanimously ratified and approved by the council.

The city secretary was instructed to purchase new tax rolls for the city assessor and collector.

Mr. W. X. Pressler appeared before the council and complained that the city pound, which is located across the street in front of the Catholic church, is a source of great annoyance to the residents of the neighborhood, and asked that it be removed. The matter was referred to the city marshal and pound keeper for action.


