BROWN PLEADS GUILTY.

Will Brown, the young negro who was indicted dur ing the present term of dis trict court for the murder of James Wade, another negro boy, near Cushing a few week ago, pleaded guilty in the district court today to murder in the second degree and was given five years in the penitentiary.

Brown was also indicted for criminal assault on the sister of Wade, and he pleaded guilty to that charge before a jury this afternoon, and up on the suggestion of District Attorney O'Quinn the lowest penalty, five years, was assessed in this case.
Brown accepted sentence in both cases, and now awaits the convenience of the officials to transfer him to the penitentiary to serve out his ten years time.
