CHARGED WITH MURDER: nd Daughtef Accu
Killing a Baby.

The inquest proceding at Garrison Saturday, instututed by the officers to ascertain the cause of the death of the
infant of Miss Nolar Baile resulted in a charge of murder being made against the mother of the baby and its grandmother. Mrs. Nacy Bailey.

The facts developed at the inquest showed that the infant had been murdered by being struck over the left temple with a . blunt instrument, and the left
Miss Nolar Bailey, daughter of a well to do tarmer residing about two miles from Garrison, returned home bringing with her a bright and healthy baby boy, which had been born to her while in Shreveport.
Two days later the baby disappeared, and the neighbors ot course wanted to know what had become of it. It is said that the first reply to this inquiry was that it had been sent away, but this did
not-satisfy the suspicions not-satisfy the suspicions
of the neighbors, and they insisted on a more definite explanation.
Finally, it is alleged, on May 12, Mr's. Bailey and her daughter both admitted that the child was dead, but they stated that it had died of star
ration.

## ' PASS BELLON MARK.

Stritelh Congress Eelipses Records in Appropriations.
Washington, May 18.The Sixtieth "congress will Darn the title of the "Binon session and before adjourn ment is taken at the end of this week it is estimated the total appropriations will reach the enormous sum of $\$ 1,020$ 000,000 , which is said to be the largest ever appropriated at a single session. The appropriations are for the fiscal
year, which begins July 1, year,
1908.
It is too early to give anything like an accurate estimate of the revenues of the government during that period of 12 months, but numbers of the appropriation committees think they will run somewhere between $\$ 850$ 000,000 and $\$ 900,000,000$. This would mean a deficit of between $\$ 125,000,000$ to $\$ 175$,000,000 .
Chairman Tawney of the house of representatives committee warned the house that the deficit would reach $\$ 150$ $\mathbf{0 0 0}, 000$, and if this prediction is fulfilled the surplus now in the treasury would be wiped out by June 30, 1909, inasmuch as at the end of this fiscal year there will be a deficit of between $\$ 60,000$,000 and $\$ 65,000,000$
