ESCAPED CONVICT CAPTURED

Will McMillian Goes to Galveston After Charley Jones, Negro—Charged with "Boot Legging"

Galveston, Nov.

Mr. W. E. McMillin, superintendent of the Nacogdoches County farm, arrived in the city yesterday morning and left during the afternoon for Nacogdoches with Charley Jones, the negro, arrested Monday night by Detectives Duffy, Johnson and Lemons as an escaped convict.

It developed yesterday that the negro who was returned to Nacogdoches was the brother of Williams Jones, the man who died at the John Sealy Hospital on the 29th of last month, as the result of knife wounds inflicted about the chest by another negro, alleged to have been Percy Jones, on Nov. 15. The escaped convict yesterday expressed a desire to find the man who is charged with the murder of his brother.

The negro taken to Nacogdoches yesterday afternoon is said to have escaped from a county road gang about three years ago. He was sentenced to a term at hard labor on the roads of Nacogdoches county for selling whiskey without a license. He came to Galveston from Bay City, it is said, at the time his brother met death here.

The five year old negro girl that was so badly burned a few weeks ago, died last night.

FARMERS ARE BUSY.

The Nacogdoches Sentinel observes that the farmers of Nacogdoches county, many of them, are already preparing their lands for another crop. A most advisable thing and one that will cause a reward in dollars and cents and cultivation. Now to plant well, work thoroughly—and diversity—will mean a great deal. Lots of corn and hay; meat, hogs, poultry and cotton and tobacco will mean a living at home and money in the bank.

The Sentinel is acquainted with farming conditions in its section and cannot be accused of "newspaper farming." No man is more thoroughly alive to the interests of the agriculturalists than is the newspaper editor, whose business, like that of the merchant and mechanic, depends in a large measure upon the efforts of the tiller of the soil. The newspapers of Texas are all, without exception, more largely interested in farming and the general progress of the agricultural interests of the state than any other class, aside from the farmers themselves, and no man takes a greater interest in the general welfare of the country surrounding his home town than the newspaper man. A feeling has, as a result, been established which brings the farmer and the newspaper into close proxy with each other, and which has resulted in a great way in the material advancement of the general welfare of the state.—Beaumont Journal.

You wish you could succeed in business, you wish you could do as well as your neighbor who does succeed. You are overworking your wishbone. Give it a rest; it's tired. Marshall Field has competition, but his backbone gave him nerve to advertise big in newspapers when advertising was not known to be a necessity of business life as it is now universally recognized. Jno. Wannamaker had the same sort of backbone. Their backbone backed up their wishbone. Backbone builds business by booming business. Business is boosted by backbone, and the backbone of business is newspaper advertising."

BUILDING A CITY.

In the meantime the sidewalk building has been pushed with all possible vigor and the two contractors are kept busy all the time, and both have large forces of men. In many instances concrete walks have been laid in vacant lots and practically every one in the city is joining in the movement.

The above news item taken from a state paper is in reference to Stamford, a hustling, bustling, busy city of West Texas, and of which, no doubt most of the people have heard more or less. Less than a decade ago this same little city was just a prairie, no railroad, no residents, no farms—only a broad pasture and considered not extra good for grazing purposes. A railroad was extended some twenty miles, the big pastures were put on the market, people flocked from every section to that country and in a fortnight Stamford was a city of a thousand souls—a white city—a city of tents. Those people build—invited others—they build. Farms took the places of the pastures and pretty homes sprang up in every direction. That was nine years ago, a remarkably short time in the history of a town, yet that nine years history would read almost like a romance. Today we have Stamford a city of more than 5,000 people, elegant business houses, beautiful homes, a paved Main street and the construction of sidewalks and street crossings going on with a rush. Why is it thus? Is Stamford located in a more favored spot? Is the soil around that city and the climate of that section more conducive to crops and health of its people? Are that city's people reaping more prosperity than people of other parts? Has that country any advantages over any other? We believe "no" will answer every question. And a comparison of that country with East Texas will find the latter far superior. Not that we would take one honor from the great west, and she has won many of them. Not that we would, if we could, pluck a single flower from the garden of that section—and those people have made the whole west bloom. But it is a fact. A cold blooded, business fact that East Texas overtops the plains country as our stately pines do their scrubby mesquites. Our climate is unsurpassed, a growing season almost the entire year. We can raise here everything those western folks can, and dozens of things they cannot. Corn and cotton and hay; potatoes and cane and tobacco; the finest fruits in the southwest and garden truck that will equal the product of the coast country. East Texas is as much a fine stock country as the other sections, if that industry was but developed. Name a single thing that West Texas has an advantage in! But East Texas, as a whole, is sadly lacking in the arts of town building, country development, progress. The allurements of the beaten paths blind to the possibilities that exist. Civic pride is wanting and

public enterprise is in the list of unknown quantities. Wealth abounds even in greater proportions than our western neighbors enjoy, yet apathy is prevalent to the detriment of this favored section. The habit of "let well enough alone" seems to have taken root as the habit of hustle has done in other sections. Stamford is not the only town that is building, spreading out, improving, progressing. There are dozens and dozens of them that are going the gait—that all East Texas, and especially Nacogdoches, should go. The opportunities are here; the soil, the climate, the wealth. What those towns have done and are doing, Nacogdoches can do. Is there a single advantage that the little city above mentioned has over our own East Texas town? If a town of 5,000 people, nine years old, lacking in many ways of being an equal to Nacogdoches, can pave and build sidewalks, isn't it fair to reason that such could be done here? Nacogdoches certainly needs sidewalks and street crossings, needs them badly and without delay, and the people are entitled to them.

TOBACCO GROWING.

Beaumont Enterprise. The San Antonio Express tells of the methods of curing the weed that are used in Kentucky, by the tobacco growers and advises that Texas growers should get busy. There is a difference in curing methods incidental to the use to which tobacco is to be put. The methods of Kentucky apply to tobaccos that are to be made into plug, or to be used by pipe smokers, for years the Kentucky burleys have held a high place in the trade, because of their perfection in curing, but each particular branch of the tobacco trade has its methods, and each neighborhood as well.

In the meantime Texas is making great strides in growing cigar leaf which is harvested and cured by the methods used by the Cubans and the leaf is sold for Cuban leaf. The business is in the hands of experts, fully qualified to care for their end of the business. What is needed now is more farmers who will plant, cultivate and harvest their tobacco under instructions until they too have become proficient in the business.

Given plenty of tobacco farmers and the position of Texas in the tobacco markets of the world is assured from now on insofar as cigar tobacco is concerned. But in a state as big as Texas there is a variety of soils and in cigar tobacco can be grown in the east, why not burley in the west and North Carolina bright in the north? The state should not stop its work of experimenting, merely because it has been found that one kind of tobacco will grow here.

PEOPLE of Yoakum are advocating the passage of an ordinance requiring the citizens to build sidewalks. The city "dads" there have already let the contract for street crossings.

EAST TEXAS SHOULD GET BUSY

Beaumont Journal. The Rusk Press-Journal and the Palestine Herald are advocating that a number of East Texas counties join hands and advertise this section. This proposed movement is along the line of a suggestion made by the Sentinel some three or four months ago, and we now express a hearty approval of such a plan. I hardly think it advisable at this time for the Commercial clubs of the entire state to organize for an advertising purpose, and for a number of reasons. We do think, however, that a dozen—or two dozen—cities or counties of East Texas could hand together and do a great good, bring lots of people here and aid in developing the rich lands, hidden resources, and possibly, too, do much toward resurrecting the latent energies of the people who are already here. The plan suggested by these papers is no doubt a good one and it is moved that one of these towns get into it a little further and make definite steps toward such an organization.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

West Texas today affords one of the most convincing examples of what may be accomplished by such a movement that the country has ever known. Until a few years ago the western section was regarded as nothing more than a stock growing country, with even serious drawbacks in this line. Through some manner a movement was started along the same line as that now suggested by the Sentinel and other papers of East Texas. The idea was taken hold of in the proper manner and today there is not a greater country in many ways in the world.

The soil of West Texas is unchanged, the climate is the same and the country occupies the same position on the map that it always did, but its people are organized more thoroughly than are the folks of any other section of the country. They are a big bunch of boosters, and a lot who will experiment with anything on earth that promises financial return. As a result of this their section has been made one of the most productive in the world for many crops and their continual boosting has brought hundreds of thousands of people who are among the most satisfied citizens of the state into their country.

What West Texas has accomplished has been through close organization of its people and the proper advertising of its counties and towns, and should be not only equalled, but greatly surpassed by the people of the Eastern section of the state if the proper interest is manifested. East and Southeast Texas offer hundreds of opportunities that cannot be equalled by West Texas and each section will reap even greater results when its people wake up and go after business in the right manner.

RETIRING COMMISSIONERS' COURT

Party of Nacogdoches Citizens Are Hosts to the Men of "Good Roads" Fame—Barbecue at the Historic Eggnog Branch.

From Friday's Daily:

It looked like imposition on even "coming" appetites to proffer such a feast of good things just a few hours after Thanksgiving turkeys had been so ruthlessly hid away, but it was the decree—a proclamation coming as it intended that it be obeyed—and it was. No one hardly gets to that point when an announcement of "something to eat" doesn't find welcome, though he may treat the inner man to the choicest viands that may be gathered from everywhere, and at every hour of the day or night. Of course the party was close around during all this performance and most of the members kept an eye on the scene despite the fact that "not a single, solitary one of them was the least bit hungry."
