Interesting Meeting of Association Held Saturday at Court House—Letter From Secretary Wilson and Petition to Legislature.

On the night before, Thursday night just after dark, the spirit of this aged and beloved citizen, took its flight and the home so long made happy by the presence of "Uncle Jonnie" was made sorrowful.

The news of his death surprised every one, yet his death was not unlooked for, health having failed about two years ago. 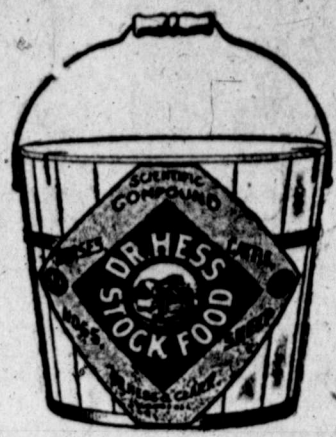
