It should be remembered that the creamery uses the products of the cows as a raw material, and without this raw material at hand in reasonable quantities and convenient to the factory the tactory cannot run. The creamry as an institution is a re cent innovation. it is less since the cream of the best dary districts of the country was manufactured into butter on the farm, and less than a halt century since the cheese was made in the farm pentry. The first creameries were established in sections where every 360 acres kept from hirty to forty cows-cows that had been bred for many
generations as milk givers. This must all be considered inconnection with the creamery in Texas. Beaumont tonorth, its dainy cows are ranging the pastures trom Kansas to Illinois. It bripgs in many carloads of butter in the course of a year and
would turnish an excellent market for a creamery, but the dairy cows are not here in
sufficient number, nor do the armets give sufficient attention to keeping up and feedng such stock as they have cows a profitable undertaking There are but two months in the year that the northern armer does not have to feed eavily. This would not be
o necessany here, but the armer must, hovever, resolve to addjto the sustenance the cow may pick up in pasture Takendall around the keep ng of dairy'cows and the op ation of a creamery would more profitable here than in the north, owing to eli-
matic conditions and the fact the cows may run in the pas tre from one year's end to the other, but that does not absolve the farmer trom work, or from giving extra and mont Enterprise.
