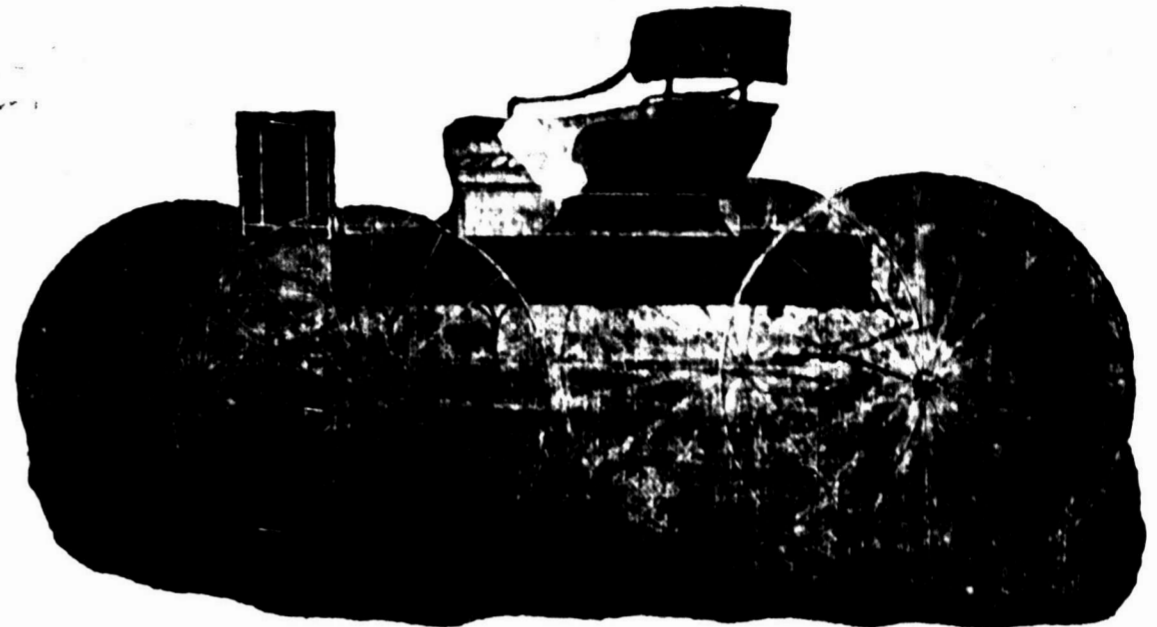

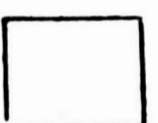

### RIGHT VS. WRONG.

In speaking of the tariff Harper's Weekly says: "It is no longer a question of protection vs. free trade, but of right vs. wrong. And when that idea becomes fixed in the minds of the American people it is there to stay until right has triumphed. That is pretty strong for a former protection journal, but it is true. The people are beginning to realize that selfish interests are aiding each other in securing protection that they may enrich themselves at the expense of the people. It is true that certain interests even in the South and West are now demanding protection on the ground that the East is robbing the people on some things by means of the tariff, and that the South and West must retaliate by robbing them by means of the tariff and other things. This is justified on the same ground that warring clans once acted upon, that if one stole horses the other would steal cattle. But the people have made up their minds that horse stealing is wrong, and they will not justify cattle stealing as a means of righting the evil.—Bonham News.

## ARRANGEMENTS ARE COMPLETED FOR THE BIG FAIR AT DALLAS

Thousands of Dollars Have Been Spent by the Association to Make This Year's Exposition Excel All Previous Ones—Every Department Has Been Enlarged and Improved—Fifty Thousand Dollars in Purse Money

Dallas, Texas, October 4, (Special): With the lowest railroad rates and the finest attractions in history, the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the State Fair of Texas, which begins in this city Saturday, October 16, will undoubtedly be the most successful and the most brilliant ever offered to the thousands of patrons of the institution. All the improvements contemplated have been completed. The entries in the livestock department have taxed the splendid accommodations there to the utmost. With forty-four counties exhibiting their farm, orchard and garden products, the agricultural development of the Southwest will be measured even better than last year. In spite of additional show cases installed this year in the textile department every square foot of this division will be given over to the display of the handiwork of the women of the South. The art loan exhibit will be paramount. There will be three thousand birds exhibited in the poultry department. Officials of the national association will deliver lectures each evening on matters pertaining to the poultry industry. There will be matinee horse shows every afternoon of the first week. During the last week cattle, sheep, goats and jacks and jennets will be judged. Ten acres will be devoted to the implement, machinery and vehicle display. The bee and dairy products departments will have many new features of an educational value and exhibitions that will show a marked improvement over last year. The bench show will have dogs galore—750 in fact—and all the popular breeds and varieties will be represented.

All that is beautiful, strange or extraordinary in the world of flowers will be found in that department. The corn show will demonstrate the possibilities of the Southwest in the production of this crop. Displays of the industrial arts, totaling in value millions of dollars will be found in the Exposition building. Gowns, frocks and millinery direct from Paris will be exhibited. Children of the Southwest will find many exhibits of interest in the manual art department. There will be a strange collection of Aztec archaeological remains in the geological department. The mineral resources of the Southwest will be exploited as never before. In fact every interest, industrial, livestock and agricultural, will be represented in a manner that will make every citizen of the Southwest proud; and make him firmer in his conviction that this is the greatest and grandest portion of the Union.

All the latest devices in the scientific world will be demonstrated. The famous Curtiss aeroplane—the same type with which the American

aviator won glory in the European contests—will be at the Fair. The Strobel dirigible, another type of the airship, will also be there. Aerial navigation will be demonstrated for the first time in the South.

In Music Hall programs will be given three times daily that will alone be worth the price of admission to the Fair. Band Master Alessandro Liberati with his seventy talented musicians, twenty great vocal artists and a grand array of instrumental soloists will be the feature. Vaudeville acts will add additional interest. The management has booked several additional vaudeville artists, and a brilliant page is assured for the State Fair's musical and entertainment history.

Every evening Pain's peerless pyrotechnic drama will be given. This drama introduces fighting airships, aeroplanes, armored autos, aerial torpedoes, etc. There will be a gigantic outdoor stage for 250 performers. There will be acres of realistic scenery, a military band, novel marches and sports. There will be a whole circus of acrobats, gymnasts, clowns, high wire experts and sensational specialties. The depicting of this thrilling pyrotechnic drama and battle will necessitate the most gigantic display of fireworks in the history of the South.

As predicted earlier in the year the \$50,000 in purses and stakes offered in the speed department have attracted entries from the owners of the greatest race horses in both running and harness classes in America. There will be ten days of horse racing and three days of automobile events. Dan Patch and Minor Heir, the former champion pacer of the world, will race on the afternoon of Monday, October 18, for the championship of the world. There will be five running races and three harness races, each afternoon. Saturday, October 16, one of the greatest steeplechase races in the history of the United States will be held. The afternoons of October 28-29-30 will be featured by sensational automobile and motorcycle events. Strang, Burma and Chevrolet and other world-famous drivers will participate in the automobile events. In the motorcycle events a race for world record on circular track will be made. The automobile track is the longest, widest and fastest in Texas. Proper safe-guards have been made against accidents.

Jupiter Pluvius has been eliminated by the management. Whether the rain god frowns or not is a matter of indifference. The great lake which percolates beneath the Fair Grounds has been tapped by wells placed at different localities on the Grounds. Water of the purest and best quality is flowing

into great tanks at the rate of hundreds of thousands of gallons daily. The city has been cut off and the fair will run its own water system. Water in abundance will be had for sewerage, drinking and washing purposes.

In the matter of rates the railroads have treated the management better than ever before. For the first and second Saturdays of the Fair a long distance rate of \$4.80 has been made from Galveston, Houston and San Antonio. The limit of tickets of this kind is the Monday night following so that patrons will have an opportunity of spending Saturday, Sunday and Monday at the Fair. The same low long distance rates will apply from all points in the Southwest. Season tickets will be sold for one and one-third fair for the round trip from all points within ninety miles; beyond that distance one and one-fifth fare the round trip. Sale of these tickets will start October 15, with the return limited to November 1. A rate of \$1 for the round trip will be made to Dallas during the three Sundays of the Fair from all points within 100 miles. For points within 150 miles the rate will be \$1.50. A special two days' fare of one fare plus 10 cents has been made for points within 175 miles of Dallas. A visit to the great exposition will be within the reach of all.

## FIRST ANNUAL COUNTY CORN SHOW

Possibly Fifteen Hundred People in the City Saturday to See the Exhibit and Enjoy the Occasion—Exhibit Surprises Even the Men Who Promoted It—Commissioner E. R. Kone Spends Day Here.

The First Annual County Corn Show was a great success, and fully fifteen hundred people were in the city Saturday to visit the exhibit and to otherwise enjoy the occasion. The new City Hall upstairs, was used for the display, and by ten o'clock the place was packed with people—from every section of the county—desiring of placing some samples in the contest or coming for the purpose of viewing the corn, seeing what the other fellow had and learning how he did it. The white corn was more in evidence than any other variety, and in the yellow class there were not enough entries to get all the prize money offered, but this was put to a good use however by dividing among some of the white corn entries that did not come under the first and second prize awards. There were several varieties too that had no class, but these were given favorable notice and by some received even more attention than the class samples. All in all the entire exhibit was splendid, and people from afar, who were here just to see, pronounced it as really wonderful that such good corn could be grown in this section—or any where else—under such unfavorable circumstances and in the face of such backward seasons. Some of as large ears as have been seen seen anywhere and at any time were on display in the hall, and nearly all of the corn was well filled, very few samples showing even the dry weather marks. Every body was well pleased with the contest, and to say that it will prove of wonderful benefit is merely putting it mildly. The men who won premiums went away determined to grow even better corn and those who did not get a division of the coin, are just as jubilant and just as determined to grow the best possible. The County Corn Show will be an annual affair, and no question about it. The people have become enthused over the proposition, and are seeing more fully each day just what can be done in this county, despite seasons. In West Texas and other portions too, the corn crop is especially short, though their seasons were no worse than were experienced in East Texas. The people absolutely cannot compete with the exhibits that were here Saturday, and this one thing ought to be sufficient proof of the excellent country we have. The only thing is to farm right,—cultivate intensely,—breed seed for the best results,—and do all work intelligently. That's the secret of the whole thing.

### DEATH CLAIMS I. A. FOYE

Well Known Citizen of Nacogdoches for the Past Ten Years, Passes Away at His Home This Morning—Remains Carried to Shreveport.

From Monday's Daily:

I. A. Foye died this morning at 2 o'clock, at his home on East Main street, of rheumatism, and with which he

had been afflicted for many years. Mr. Foye has been a citizen of this city for the past ten years, coming here from Hot Springs, Arkansas, in 1899. He entered the jewelry business in the building at the corner of Main and Church streets, and where his business was located up to the time of his death. **How the Southern Farmer May Even Up With the Northern**

In the course of a conversation I had with the editor of an Illinois farm paper just before I started farming, thirteen years ago, came the question of climatic conditions, and their effect on the soils. Special stress was laid by said editor on the desirability of locating North for the ground to be subject to both frost and snow; for with those conditions, he told me, there would be an advantage over the soils farther south, where the frost was very slight or was no factor at all, and where the winter rains robbed the soils of their fertility, and the question of maintaining a profitable productive condition was a serious problem.

In a previous article I referred to the necessity of having at least a cover crop to protect the southern soils from winter leaching, and if that crop is of the legume family, such as the vetches and crimson clover, and adds to the nitrogen already existing in the soil, it can readily be seen that it has the advantage over one that does not do this— one is a nitrogen consumer; the other is a nitrogen gatherer.

**WHAT A CROP OF VETCH IS WORTH.**

The New York state experiment station issued a bulletin a few years ago giving the results obtained, after several years' experimenting with both cowpeas and the vetch, as to their value as soil improvers. The station credited the pea with 56 pounds of nitrogen per acre per season, while the vetch gathered 257 pounds. That was in the state of New York; the difference might be less in the South; I cannot say, but after my experience with it, I am about ready to believe anything, however extravagant, concerning vetch. Corn that I have planted after it has done better without any fertilization than similar

land that has had no vetch, but has been heavily coated with well rotted stable manure.

This is an age of progress and if we would be in the van we must use not only our own brains, but also the thoughts from the brains of others.

Just so long as the farmers were controlled by conditions of climate the North would have the advantage in soil fertility over the South, for Jack Frost would aid him by locking up the fertility of the soil until the spring crops were ready to take it up, while that of the South, or a great quantity of it, would be washed into the Atlantic ocean or the Gulf of Mexico.

**VETCH BUILDS UP LAND AND PAYS BIG PROFITS AT SOME TIME.**

But the twentieth century demands the farmer should control conditions, and instead of the southern farmer being a creature of circumstances. Then, whenever that takes place he has an advantage over his northern brother of at least two to one. For, while the latter's soil is firm in the icy grip of winter, the southerner can, by fall sowing, have fields of living green through the months of winter, which he can, if he chooses, use for pasture, and in any event get a good crop of hay that is worth in this locality \$20 per ton, and at the same time improve his soil ready for the summer crops of corn, potatoes, or whatever. Thus he makes two crops, each of which is more valuable than such crops would be in the North, where the northerner can only make one. Remember, all this is done at the same time that you are improving your soil at a faster rate than Jack Frost can do it in the North. I only fertilize for the winter legume, using the cheapest form of fertilizer—300 to 400 pounds of acid phosphate and 50 pounds of muriate of potash per acre, costing not more than \$4.50. This does not

look a very large sum alongside the \$40 to \$60 I get in value per acre from the hay. Thus it can be readily seen that the winter legumes can build up worn out soils and pay you handsomely while doing it.

**GET READY NOW TO SOW VETCH.**

I like to plant vetch at the end of September or the beginning of October, although it can be planted in November but unless very open weather the latter date cannot be depended on for winter grazing. The vetch plant depends on rye, oats or wheat to keep it from the ground, as it is something of the same nature; in fact, I believe it belongs to the same family of plants as the garden pea, only more slender in growth. Wherever the garden pea thrives, so also will vetch. Soil that has produced the garden pea can be used to inoculate the ground for vetch, and without inoculated soil the vetch is not to be relied upon the first year. With the soil inoculated, it is customary to sow twenty-five pounds of vetch and a bushel or five pecks of oats or other small grain per acre.

Sometimes it is a little difficult to get the crop started where conditions are not just right, and if you do not succeed at first, try again, for it is worth trying for. I find a little stable manure sometimes very helpful in getting a start, but after you have once succeeded in getting it adapted to your soil, stable manure will not be needed.
