FROM the signs of the times, the Congressional race in the old Second District will be a warm pumber the coming year. There are already three avowed candidates for the place, Martin Dies, J. C. Box and J. H. Brooks,—all strong men and calculated to stir up something. Shed your coats and get ready for the finish.

THE corn crop in Nacogdoches county is better this season than it is in any other part of the great state. It shows conclusively that for all round living at home, prosperity, progress and sure crops, East Texas wears the blue ribbon. Come to East Texas and enjoy life while you are making the best living in the world.

Last week the sentence of John R. Walsh, the convicted Chicago banker, was affirmed by the United States court of appeals and Walsh will be compellee to wear stripes for five years in the Federal penitentiary. Today the United States court of appeals affirmed the sentence of Charles W. Morse, sentenced to a term of fifteen years for violation of the Federal banking laws and stripes and a convict's cell are staring Morse in the face. Since his conviction he has been enjoying his liberty on bail and is said to have cleaned up \$7,500,000. He was confident of a reversal of the judgment of the trial court and his ability to again become a Napoleon of finance. Walsh was worth \$20,000,000 in 1907. He is said to be practically penniless today. Morse was worth \$25,000,000 in 1907 and he is to be on Easy street on account of his recent winnings. Walsh and Morse were daring plungers and desperate gamblers. They played the game for all it was worth. The panic of 1907 caught them, they were stripped of their possessions by their fellow-gamblers and now it is the pen and oblivion. Walsh is 70, Morse is 58 and their plunging days are over. —Dallas Times Herald.

## EXTRACT FROM JUDGE BOX'S SPEECH

Cherokee County's Aspirant to Congressional Honors Addresses Large Crowd of Representative Citizens at the Court House Thursday Afternoon—Some Views in Reference to the Billion Dollar Congress and Party Platforms and Pledges.

The following extract of Judge J. C. Box's address is furnished The Sentinel by Miss Webster, who made some notes. The Sentinel regrets that it cannot furnish the speech in its entirety, but no request for such was made until after the gentleman had finished, and only a portion had been taken. The speech was well received, and Judge Box seemed to have made a number of friends by his remarks. The gentleman's talk in part, was as follows:

"The man who accumulates wealth is not the man who enjoys it, but he is the man who stints himself.

When men get in the presence of mammon, when they get before the show they forget the folks at home, and lose the idea that I mentioned there. Servants of the folks at home, and the one idea is to fall down before the "god of wealth" there and worship it. Some body has said in connection with this principle that we are inclined to drift away from the government and our duties. I call your attention to the details by which the distribution of wealth is made bare. I say to you that very few of us have failed to find out that it now cost about one billion dollars a year to support the government. Divide one billion by ninety million people and you will see that it means more than \$10 by every man and woman. Do you think that money is carried in there by some far off country while you are sleeping. Now think about it; what Nacogdoches county part is. If you have something like thirty thousand people, you pay more than three hundred thousand dollars a year to the National government. If you had to pay \$30,000 to build a court house every year some of you people would have fits. You pay enough to build ten court houses every year, and sleep sound and smile over it. The man who is spending it is not the man who makes it. You pay it all the time. You appropriate millions and millions to build ships for our Navy, for which I am not in favor of, but the most oppressive thing in connection with it all is the manner of collecting it. You have all read from practically every man that has spoken on the subject. You have read that we pay from five to seven times that amount to the great manufacturing trust. Now get that idea in your head that you are paying the enormous sum that multiplied by five would be fifteen million dollars,—in other words, when you pay the National Government you pay the Trust five to seven times that amount. You buy a pair of shoes that's imported from Europe, you pay a tariff on them. The seller raises his price to correspond. You pay one dollar to your National Government and seven to the men that manufacture shoes in the

United States. These same goods that you are paying these enormous prices for are being sold in foreign countries at prices that you can't buy them for. They say that you must have that price on them, yet they make goods and sell them elsewhere cheaper than you can make them at home. It's an undisputed fact I say: Now I want to read to you just a moment. Here I read you from a statement made by ex-Secretary Shaw; "Our opponents lay much stress on the fact that some American manufactures sell abroad much cheaper than at home, and a few of them in times past have downed our opponents in recommending a removal of tariff from all such articles." I read that just to show you the authenticity of these facts which I have stated.

What's done up at Washington ought to be done with a view of your interest, and I mention these things as gross and shameful departures from the principles that I am talking about.

Jeremiah M. Rusk said: I have had an opportunity to take stock in the harvesting company and I know that the sales in Russia and other wheat growing countries are cheaper than they are here. I need not offer anything to prove this assertion. Now that's true of iron, and a great many other articles. I can mention contracts to sell railroad steel rails; they will sell them for \$28, and Canadian railroad companies will buy the same rails from the same parties for \$7 less per ton than the American railroad company can. I want to say to you now, gentlemen, that I think these speculations are enough to at least suggest to your minds that your government is not being administered for the welfare of the people themselves. Now what's the remedy for it? That's the question; what's the remedy for it? Now I will tell you one remedy that won't work. That's sitting down and letting it go, and another is, sending men to Congress who are in sympathy with those people. It won't do to send men who are in sympathy with those people. This practice of the people of electing men to office who are rich,—I suggest to you, without regard to what I shall do,—I suggest to you that you put a stop to that practice.

First he figures up that he must get up several thousand dollars to put him in office, and if you allow that system to go on and grow, first thing you know the power of your government will be bought from it. Quit telling your boy that he may be president unless you have accumulated thousands of dollars. Don't tell him stories. Tell him you and Uncle Joe, and Uncle Tom have so fixed it that unless you have money you can't hold office.

If your servant is unable to vote conscientiously upon a question he regards as important he ought to go back and you send a man who can represent you. Remembering that it's your government, remembering that when a man goes to Washington he goes there to carry out your will on the theory that this government is in your hands.

I very much regret that circumstances will not permit me to go further into this and

I must acknowledge my obligations to this court for this opportunity of speaking to you now that should I ask for the suffrage placed in your hands.

## REPORT OF GRAND JURY SEVERE

Couched in Words That Can't be Misinterpreted, the Document Tells of the Shame of This Wealthy and Prosperous County—Conditions of Prison are Almost Unbearable—Recommends New Structure.

The Grand Jury adjourned Friday afternoon, after being in session about three weeks, all told, and returning fifty one bills. This is considered an unusual amount, and yet is not as large a number as on some former occasions. The report to the Court was made and is rather severe in some particulars. The condition of the jail and court house is commented on in terms that can't be mis-interpreted,—and every word the naked truth too.

The people of Nacogdoches county ought to read the report of the Grand Jury and ponder over it. Then, for a change, come to Nacogdoches and visit the jail and court house. The fact that you have to hold your nose while on a trip to the former should not deter you, for it is your property,—the property of the people of this county. The court house is in just as bad condition, and is a shame on this wealthy and prosperous county. The need of a new court house and a new jail is so evident that it seems queer that such structures are neglected. The report of the Grand Jury is here given:

To the Honorable James I. Perkins, Judge of the Second Judicial District.

We, the Grand Jury for Nacogdoches county, are pleased to report to your honor that we have finished our labors, having been in session thirteen days altogether. We are glad to say that we believe the citizenship of Nacogdoches county as a rule are law abiding people and that the violators are the exception. We find that in ferretting out the acts of the trespassers that the best people are willing and eager to do all that they can to assist the officers and courts. While this is a fact we regret exceedingly to have to say that there is still a class who, when brought before us testify, will withhold, evade and even lie in order to screen and protect the criminal. Especially is this true with regard to the Boot-legger and their allies. May the time soon come when this particular class together with the gamblers can no longer stay in this community. In our opinion, this will be the case when each man does his duty beginning with the Jury Commissioners and ending with the on man the Pettit Jury.

We would not over-look the fact that we have had the co-operation and assistance, to a marked degree, of some of the peace officers of the county and if they will continue to keep everlastingly at it and the better people will back them up the parties carrying on these nefarious and damnable practices will very soon have to quit or get out of this county. The time is here when the lawabiding citizen is not going to stand for these things longer and the sooner the evil doers take notice the better for them.

It seems to us that the

warnings that have been sounded by the Just Verdicts of our recent juries should be sufficient to warn them. We come now to speak of the matter that we fear we can not do justice to. We as a body visited what some are pleased to term our county jail. Shame on Nacogdoches county and her most excellent citizens. We wish we had the language to express our disapproval of this particular place where the poor unfortunate criminals and sometimes more pitiable insane are forced to remain for days and even months where we honestly believe disease germs will flourish and grow. In making our visit we could not afford to remain inside for any great length of time, therefore, our visit was not very lengthy there, and we want to suggest at this point that the water connections should at once be looked after in order that the filth may be taken care of and carried off. We say it with all candor and frankness, that we would not, if we had such a place on our premises, as individuals allow a healthy hog to be placed therein. Are we to continue this practice of putting the man who has been so unfortunate as to have violated the laws of our country in this hole where a well man would become sick. Would we do unto a human being that which we would not to an animal of the low-type? It is time that the people of old Nacogdoches county were rising up with their ballots and saying we will not commit this grievous sin any more but will build a respectable court house and a commodious and sanitary jail.

We would be glad to impress all men with the gravity of this matter for we conscientiously believe that Nations and Communities, are guilty of sins just as much so as the individual and that the heavy hand of a just and righteous God will be upon us if we do not do what is surely our plain duty. We do not believe that there is a county in the State with the wealth of Nacogdoches that has not have a respectable court house and an adequate jail. We recommend, therefore, that the county fathers get their heads together and see that at least they are blameless in this matter. What we have said we mean, and surely trust that not more than one body of this kind will be forced to call the attention of the people to these conditions.

If, in our work, we have caused the standard of morality to be raised and the law, which is supreme, to be better respected and enforced we feel that we have been amply paid.

Letter to P. E. DeLamar.

Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Sir: Here's something every painter and builder ought to know.

Mr. J. J. Hall, Sheffield, Pa., painted two houses, 5 years ago, lead-and-oil; took 40 gallons. Last year, he painted Devoc; bought 40 gallons; had 10 left.

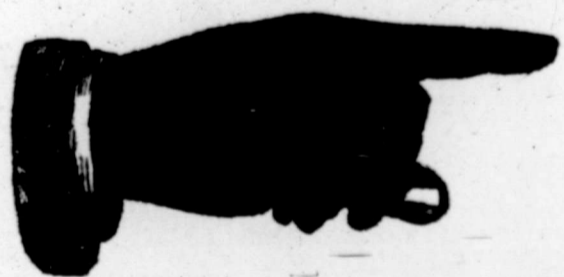

**Letter From Dr. Mayfield.**  
 Kerrville, Tex., Oct. 12 '09.  
 Dear Sentinel:  
 I saw it stated in one of our state daily papers that Jake Lewis was dead. I have missed some numbers of our home paper. If it be true, or not true, that J. J. Lewis is dead, I can't resist the inclination to say, that dead or alive, he was a man among men, and well worthy of special mention. I think he was born in Nacogdoches County, Texas. His father was Jacob Lewis, a genuine San Jacinto veteran, and more than that, he was one of the heroes, that fought beside the Immortal Ben Milam, who fell in the streets of San Antonio, and who, at a most critical moment before the siege of that city, assembled the few Texans there in line and drew a line in front of them with his sword, and called upon all who would fight with him to the death to toe the line. They all stepped up to the test line.

The mother of J. J. Lewis was a Skillern, one of the earliest and most patriotic families, probably a Texan by birth. No wonder then that this son, J. J. Lewis, with such blood in his veins, was one of the heroes of the Lost Cause, a volunteer soldier in the Confederate army. He left home January 1st, 1862, in Capt. Bill Clark's Company. Clark later became the Colonel of the Regiment 8th Texas Infantry. On the second day after starting a man of the company named Ashworth made the mistake of trying Jakes metal. No one tried it again. Jake Lewis never showed the white feather any where, whether in battle or in private peaceful life. He was always true and did not need to be tried. His retiring rural life was of the model type, his sense of honor was the highest. His children proved their blood by their deportment.

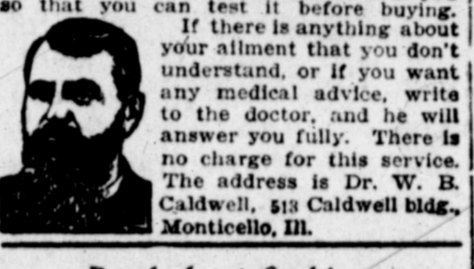

### GOES TO RUSK PRISON ALONE.

Jasper Driver, the Aged Negro Convicted of Manslaughter, Leaves Sunday for the Pen, Unaccompanied, to do Service for the State—Has Two Years Term.

Jasper Driver left Sunday afternoon for Rusk, where he goes to serve a term in the state prison for the killing of another negro, by the name of Anderson, which occurred in the early Summer at the former's home near this city. The details of killing are familiar with most people, having occurred one night as Anderson was coming from his field, through Driver's yard. The negro, Driver, immediately came to town and surrendered, but was released on bail to appear for trial at the past term of District Court. He was placed on trial on a charge of manslaughter and convicted, being given a term of two years in the state prison. Driver accepted sentence and at his own request left Sunday for Rusk to enter upon his service for the state. Sheriff Spradley gave him his commitment, trusting him to deliver it to the Superintendent at Rusk, also writing this later person that the negro was coming alone. Driver is sixty three years of age and has lived in this county practically all his life. He has accumulated some property, is well known to most people and is considered a very good negro and a hard worker. Driver will no doubt be made a trusty at Rusk and given light work and if his behavior is good, will get a credit of three months on each year's work for the state. This is probably the first case on record where a negro has been trusted to go alone to the pen to serve a term.

## Vetch---How to Grow It---And What to Plant it With to Get the Best Results

(E. W. S.)

It is hoped that a great many of the farmers are planning now to put in crops that will give them forage for their stock during the winter and spring. The planting of such crops in the fall is on the increase in the South and rightly so. The use of such crops as rye, oats, barley, vetch, and rape, planted in the fall, is a long stop along the road of right farming. The use of such crops frees you from the necessity of buying feed for your stock, it improves your land, it keeps your stock in better condition and enables you to own more stock, and it consistently and thoroughly carried out, it will be the means of making you independent instead of being simply a cotton growing farmer.

There is nothing that can be planted that will produce more forage, than Vetch. But do not misunderstand this article, and plan Vetch alone, but to get the best results, plant Vetch with oats, barley, rye or wheat, for the different grains, when planted with Vetch, holds the Vetch off the ground, which enables one to mow it as it was hay.

Below I wish to give some experiments that have been made with Vetch, and the results.

"Mr. S. M. Tracy, Director of the Mississippi Experiment Station, says of this plant: "Seed of this species was sown in October, 1888, and since that time it has give heavy annual crops on the same ground, although it has received no attention and the ground has now been plowed since the first sowing. In 1889 another field was sown and has give equally as good results. It is an annual plant, similar in growth to a pea vine, the vines often reaching 10 or 12 feet in length, and covering the ground with a dense mat of forage two feet in depth. Its seed germinate with the first autumn rains, and in favorable seasons cover the ground by the first of January, and then furnish good grazing until April or May. If the stock is taken off the field in March the plants will mature and reseed the ground freely for the next year, but if pastured until June the plants will be destroyed. "Stock of all kinds eat it greedily, both in the pasture and when cut for hay. It bears our heaviest frost without injury; and is one of

the green plants that can be grown during the winter for green manuring. I regard the Hairy or Winter Vetch as the most valuable winter forage plant that the Department of Agriculture has imported, and unhesitatingly recommend it."

Hairy Vetch, thrives better in this immediate section of the State, than Oregon Vetch, because the soil is especially adapted to it.

Professor R. J. Reeding, in charge of the Georgia Experiment station, sowed Hairy or Winter Vetch on bermuda grass sod, and obtained a yield of 29,500 pounds of green forage per acre. This seed was sown in October, on a heavy Bermuda sod, which had been plowed.

At the Colorado Experiment Station a yield of 31-8 tons of dried hay per acre was obtained from Winter Vetch-6250 pounds.

Other Experiment Stations report similar yields, showing that this Vetch is to be depended on for a winter crop, as the cow pea for the summer. Seed may be sown from August to December. We advise sowing with oats, rye or wheat, as the Vetch is a trailing plant and needs a support of this kind.

If the seed is drilled in, use 50 per acre (owing to the fertility of the soil in Nacogdoches county, 25 to 30 pounds is sufficient) making the rows about 2 1/2 feet apart. If broadcasted, you will need 75 pounds (40 pounds is sufficient for this county) per acre. With other grains use, sow broadcast, using 20 pounds of Vetch and one bushel of Oats, rye or wheat per acre. In cotton or corn fields it should be sown broadcast at the last cultivation and cultivated in.

The crop does best on sandy loams, and this county is an ideal place to cultivate it. It appreciates rich soil and will yield its heaviest crops on such land, but will grow well on poor land, and is as good as either cow peas or clover in improving the soil, for it is legume, like the cow pea, and stores nitrogen in the soil.

It sometime occurs that Vetch gives rather a light yield the first year. This is usually due to the fact that the soil on which the crop was grown did not contain the bacteria necessary for a heavy growth. This is more apt to be the case if the seed was planted on land which had never grown any clover, cow peas or other legume.

For making hay treat Vetch as you would a crop of peas. It should be cut three or four days before it comes into full bloom. There is no danger whatever that it will become a weed or pest on your land. It may be easily killed off by pasturing or cutting, but once it is established, you would no more want to get rid of it than you would want to let your best cotton land grow up to weeds and become "old field".
