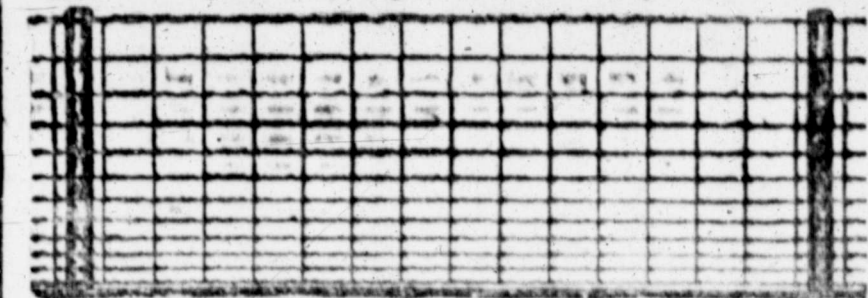

THAT "East Texas is the best poor man's country in the world" doesn't signify that a man can come here and stay poorer easier and longer than at any other place. It means that there are more opportunities in this section for the poor man, and that he can quit being poor easier and quicker than any where else.

MINISTER RODRIGUEZ has been giving his passports, and with it a scathing note in reference to the Government of Nicaragua, meaning of course that two nations have fallen out. Zelaya's actions are condemned and Secretary Knox recognizes the revolutionists. Pears like there is to be real war,—and the torture and murder of Americans should be avenged.

SEVEN hundred men of Nacogdoches county have so far become citizens for another year, and thus are in a position to help name the officials,—from constable to governor. The payment of your poll tax cannot be made too early,—and must be made before February 1st,—if you are allowed to exercise the right of ballot. This county should have at least 4,000 real citizens during the year 1910.

IF Governor Campbell and other high officials have not the power to eliminate the wrongs that exist in connection with running the penitentiaries and farms, for the sake of all that's good,—who has? There is no argument in favor of an extra session of the legislature, and no cause for this body of men being called together to spend thousands of dollars of the people's money,—when the things can be righted without it.

RUNNELS county people are to vote this month on the proposition of issuing \$100,000 worth of bonds to be used in building good roads. Ten years ago East Texas regarded that county as included in the drouthy-mesquite-section. fit only for cattle, prairie dogs, owls and rattles. Today it is a regular garden, and is proving a splendid place for the agriculturists. But then just such things as good roads make a country more prosperous,—and Nacogdoches ought to profit by experiences of other counties. \$100,000 for good roads would be worth while.

This will never be a representative government until the people get wise and patriotic enough to elect as lawmakers the best read, most capable, intelligent, thinking, successful men as legislators from other ranks than law. We have farmers, mechanics, doctors, editors, merchants, real estate men, stockmen, etc., who would make splendid legislators. Elect such as these, with a few lawyers to represent that profession, also—and our government will be a representative government, and be freer from graft and useless litigation than now. But not until the people do wake to this fact.—Arling Journal.

THE SHAME OF TEXAS.

C. E. Gilmore, editor of the Wills Point Chronicle, and a member of the recent penitentiary investigation committee, has returned home and takes up his pen again to say:

As a member of the legislature the editor of the Chronicle would regret very much to incur the financial loss of attending a special session for a cause less important than the reformation of our penitentiary system, but believing it in the interest of all humanity and the good name of Texas and necessary on account of existing conditions, we sincerely hope that the question of reforming the penitentiary system will be submitted to a special session of the legislature. We will never again have an opportunity to perform a public service that will more strongly appeal to us than this and if the work of this committee comes to naught we shall continue to exert our energies as a private citizen to this end.

The Sentinel will not question editor Gilmore's purpose being other than from pure patriotism, as it is known that the compensation received by a legislature while at Austin, is insufficient to more than meet actual expenses, but in performing that service "for the sake of Texas," the people should be considered. They pay taxes to support this government, and they bear the burdens of the entire commonwealth, while the few representatives are in the capitol city, for strictly "patriotic" purpose. The rottenness of the penitentiary system has existed for years according to the folks who are in closest touch, and yet not a hand has been raised before. Several regular and special sessions of Texas' law-making body have been held,—the same old prison system in force,—though the statute books were not changed, nor were the rules of conducting these unfortunate places, amended in the least. To right the wrongs that have been, and are being done, is a commendable purpose, but don't forget that the people pay the bills. The men who are directly at the head of these prisons and farms are immune from responsibility, in a sense, it is said,—and in that feature it may be termed "The Shame of Texas." But these same fellows can change matters, if they will, and without, the rules. Humanity is a pretty good rule itself, and can be considered a powerful good thing to consider in governing the unfortunate criminals of the state. Editor Gilmore, as a member of the committee on investigation, is in position to know the needs, but with all that information, we hardly deem it wise to burden Texas and her people with an extra session of the legislature, for the sole purpose of "prison reform," when, if they will exercise their prerogative, there are officers high up, who can remove the black spot on the good name without incurring

the enormous expense of an extra session. The penitentiary investigating committee's report smells beyond endurance, but Texas don't want an extra session of the legislature.

POLITICS of a warm nature will not be confined to the old Second Congressional District the coming year. Will Hair of Temple has announced for Congress against Henry of Waco, and the way the fur is flying already indicates that the contest will be equally as warm as the fight some years ago when Cullen Thomas scared Henry out of several years growth.

TOBACCO continues to come in, though the bulk of it has been marketed and delivered for some time. Today there were several farmers in the city with their crops, and of course they had no delay in disposing of it, and at prices satisfactory. The moral of the whole thing is that tobacco is just as staple as cotton, corn, and other farm products, and is far more profitable.

THE fact that Burley Tobacco is being successfully grown in Texas, puts another feather on the cap of the famous Lone Star State,—though the fellows up East seem to be surprised that such has been done. They ought to be reminded that the finest cigar wrappers and fillers in the world are grown in Nacogdoches county,—same Texas,—and that the industry promises to stir the market from center to circumference. Come to think of it,—you can grow anything that can be grown, in this same old-sunny, prosperous, smiling Texas,—and especially our own section.

CREAMERIES in Texas seem to be having more business than they can handle, and a number of them are "running short", because they can't get the butter fat. Belton plant reports that last week it lacked 100 pounds having enough butter to supply the demand, and yet some folks will argue that there "is nothing in such little institutions". Some of the moneyed men of Nacogdoches could fill a long felt want, and at the same time reap good interest, by establishing a creamery in this city.

Jud Riley in the Grand Saline Sun is bemoaning the fact that the bitter mast crop is a failure. He takes it to heart real sorrowfully, but finds some little solace in the acorn yield, thought it is light and some faulty. But Riley is too serious and forgets that porkers fed from the overflowing corn-cribs and drinking good, thick Jim Lowry buttermilk are better appetizers than the old-time leather-hided rank animals.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

That is exactly what is the matter with Jud; he wants the good, thick Jim Lowry buttermilk for himself and the bitter mast for the pigs. When there isn't enough of a good thing to go round it is human nature not to want to share it with swine, and Jud Riley is as full of human nature as a turkey's full of stuffing.—Dallas News.

MORE "CRUELTY" EVIDENCE

Citizen of Nacogdoches, Former Penitentiary Transfer Agent, Desires to Appear Before Investigating Committee— Says Durham Sold his Job for \$200—Dismissed Thrice for Cruelty.

More evidence in reference to the state penitentiary and farm investigations is promised for the near future, according to a story that has leaked out in this city, and a resident of Nacogdoches will do the testifying. Representative Homer A. Dotson, Tuesday afternoon, wrote letters to C. E. Gilmore, of Grand Saline, and C. B. Hudspeth, of El Paso, stating that there is a citizen in Nacogdoches who desires to testify. Mr. Dotson gave the gentleman's name in the correspondence, but is withheld from the public at present, by request. It is expected that a summons will be issued the witness in a few days, and more than likely he will go to Rusk to appear before the committee, as the members will meet at that place next. When asked about particulars, and the nature of the evidence to be given, it was stated that the witness was at one time a transfer agent for the penitentiaries. That the man is well acquainted with Mr. Durham, now assistant superintendent of the Rusk prison, and previous to his accepting that position, was sergeant at various farms. That Durham secured the refusal of a position through the influence of Congressman DeGraffenried with Governor Charles A. Culberson, and sold the position he held to another for \$200. That Durham was dismissed three times on account of cruelty to the convicts, but each time managed to be reinstated. And it is stated that in addition to the fore-

going, other evidence of a rather startling nature will be given, in reference to other men connected,—at that time, and maybe now,—with the prisons or farms, in the capacities of sergeants, guards, etc. As soon as a hearing is had from the committee,—gentlemen written to about the matter,—it is promised that some of the other matters may be aired as well as the above. No disclosure of the would be witness' name will be made until a reply is received from the committee.

LOCAL OPTION IN ANGELINA COUNTY.

Hon. S. W. Blount Says Adjoining County is Prohibition in Seven Precincts, According to Supreme Court Rulings, and Has Been So for Six Years—Cites Several Cases of Similar Nature—Other Decision Awaited

For several days, there has been a much talked of rumor that Local Option was legally now in effect in Angelina County under an old Local Option election, and that such fact would be soon declared judicially by the Courts. As Angelina County is so near to Nacogdoches, our people feel a great interest in the matter. In endeavoring to arrive at the true status and basis for the rumor, the Sentinel Editor interviewed S. W. Blount, of this city, and in explanation Mr. Blount, who is an ardent anti-saloon man, states about as follows:

"Some five years ago the Commissioner's Court of Angelina county ordered a Local Option election in seven Justice Precincts combined in Angelina county, being all the territory in the county less one precinct in the extreme eastern end of same. Local Option carried, and was so declared by the Commissioners. Pending the publication of the result the Antis obtained an injunction from Judge Pope, at Beaumont, and the injunction suit was duly tried before Judge Tom Davis in the district court at Lufkin, and decided against the Antis, and in favor of local option, and judgment was duly entered; said judgment fixing the time some weeks ahead when local option should go into full force and effect in the said seven precincts, and giving the saloon men some sixty days to wind up their business.

This judgment was never appealed from and stands today as the declared status of the liquor business in these seven precincts in Angelina county. Shortly before the election in Angelina county there had been held in Cook county an election in seven precincts combined in one order, exactly as in Angelina. A man by the name of Heyburn was arrested in Cook county for violating the Local Option law, appealed his case to the court of Criminal Appeals, attacking the validity of the election so held upon the ground that the order of the Commissioner's Court combining more than one Justice Precinct in one order for an election was illegal and unconstitutional, and a majority of said court (Judge Brooks dissenting) held said election invalid. This judgment of the Court of Criminal Appeals was announced within a few days of the time when Local Option would have gone into effect, under the judgment, in the Angelina county case, and upon the rendition of this Cook county judgment, by common consent and without any further judicial action, the Antis considered the election in Angelina county as invalid, and the same has been so treated until this day.

Some two years afterwards another election was held for whole of Angelina county and Local Option was defeated by a small majority. This county election, however, under the law, had no effect upon the seven precincts in the county, if they were, under a previous election, dry, for the reason that when a given territory is once dry they must be an election held within that same territory, no more and no less, to change its dry condition.

Now since the decision of Court of Criminal Appeals, in the Heyburn case, a similar question has been decided by three of the Courts of Civil Appeals contrary to the Heyburn case, and last spring the Supreme Court of Texas, in the case of Tucker versus Griffin, practically overruled the Court of Criminal Appeals and held with the Courts of Civil Appeals, and hence, if these courts are correct, Local Option is legally in effect in the seven precincts of Angelina county, including the city of Lufkin, under the said election adopting the same five or six years ago.

In addition to these holdings by the Civil Courts, it will be borne in mind that Judge Brooks, one of the three judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals, originally held the Cook county election valid by a strong dissenting opinion in the Heyburn case, and that since then Judge Ramsey has succeeded Judge Henderson on said Criminal Court and is believed to agree with Judge Brooks in his former holding in the Heyburn case.

In addition to this an Act of the Thirtieth Legislature gives to the Civil Courts the exclusive right to pass upon the validity of such elections, and the direct question in the case of the State of Texas versus Schwartz is now pending in the Supreme Court, recently appealed from Cook county, and upon the decision in the case, which may be looked for any day, depends absolutely the continuance of the Boozariums in Angelina county.

For the reasons above given, and upon the authorities of the decisions heretofore made of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the Supreme Court, I feel absolutely confident that in the case now pending in the Supreme Court from Cook county the Supreme Court will hold the old election valid. And the moment it does, so is the end of the liquor traffic in the seven precincts in Angelina county, comprising all the county except the extreme Southeastern portion.

Whereas, a petition, signed by the requisite number of freeholders, was presented to the commissioners court of Nacogdoches county, Texas, at its regular November term, 1909, praying for an election to be held in the Spring Hill common school district, No. 31, in Nacogdoches county, Texas, the boundaries of which district are fully set out on page 117, Book H, of the minutes of the Commissioners Court of Nacogdoches county, for a full description of which territory reference to said Book and page is hereby made, and whereas, the said Commissioners Court of said county and state duly granted said petition as prayed for. Now, therefore, I, F. P. Marshall, in my official capacity as county judge, do hereby order an election to be held at Spring Hill school house, in said school district in said county and state, on Monday December 20, 1909, to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large within the boundaries of said Spring Hill school district.

All persons qualified to vote under the constitution and laws of this state and who are freeholders resident within said territory are entitled to vote in said election.

W. H. Green is hereby appointed to hold said election, with authority to select such assistants as the law directs.

Within ten days after said election due returns thereof shall be made to the county judge of Nacogdoches county, Texas.

In testimony hereof, witness my official signature at Nacogdoches, Texas, this November 15, 1909.

F. P. Marshall, County Judge of Nacogdoches county, Texas.

Stock Law Election for Linn Flat and Trawick School Districts.

Whereas there was presented to the Commissioners Court of Nacogdoches county, Texas, at the regular November term, 1909, a petition signed by the requisite number of freeholders of the Linn Flat common school district and of the Trawick common school district, praying for an election in said districts to determine by a majority vote of the legally qualified voters to be cast at said election whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large within the boundaries of said school districts, and whereas the Commissioners Court of said county and state duly granted the petition. Now, therefore, I, F. P. Marshall, in my official capacity as county judge of Nacogdoches county, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held at Woden in said voting precinct in Nacogdoches county, Texas, on Monday December 20, 1909, to determine whether hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large within the boundaries of said Woden precinct.

All persons qualified to vote under the constitution and laws of this state and who are resident freeholders within said territory are entitled to vote in said election.

R. J. King is hereby appointed to hold said election, with authority to select such assistants as the law directs.

Within ten days after said election due returns thereof shall be made to the county judge of Nacogdoches county, Texas.

In testimony hereof, witness my official signature at Nacogdoches, Texas, this November 15, 1909.

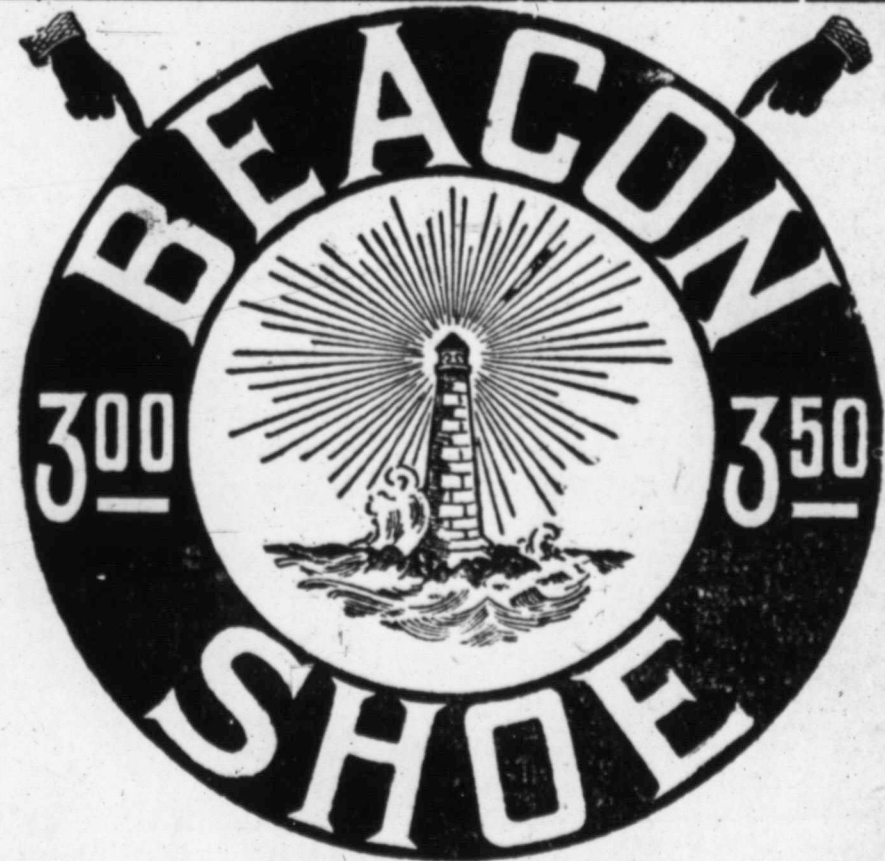
