Mrs. N. G. Wade, widow of Norvell G. Wade who died in this city about fifteen years ago, passed away this morning at 2 o'clock at her home on Pilar street, after an illness of a few weeks, and will be buried at Oak Grove cemetery tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

### Oil Driller Killed by Wife.

Shreveport La. April 15.—Jessie Stroud, a rigger in the oil fields, about 28 years old, was killed by his wife, Della, Stroud, yesterday afternoon between 5 and 6 o'clock, four miles from Vivian, on the road to Oil City. Stroud was shot through the breast and through the head.

Ed Beeler, who was with Mrs. Stroud, was shot by the woman accidentally and his leg broken between the knee and the thigh. He is being cared for in a hotel at Vivian, and will be brought here this morning and placed in a sanitarium.

Mrs. Stroud, a comely woman of 25 years, was hurried to this city last night and placed in the parish prison at 10 o'clock. City Marshal Lewis, of Vivian, brought the woman here. He says he feared violence should the woman be kept in the city jail at Vivian over night. Much feeling has been aroused in Oil City among Stroud's friends by the killing.

### Steiner Goes East to Seek Friedmann Serum for Texas.

Austin, Texas, April 14.—Dr. Ralph Steiner, state health officer, leaves here today for Washington D. C., New York, Boston and other Eastern cities. Several attempts to secure the Friedmann tuberculosis serum for Texas have proven ineffectual and unsatisfactory and while in the East Dr. Steiner will communicate with the proper authorities and endeavor to secure sufficient quantities of the serum to meet demands that have already been made.

He will also make a study of the important health boards, their methods of registration, etc., with the intentions of bettering the state health department.

The above is taken from one of our exchanges, and was its comment on the editorial of another paper with reference to the progressive movement which is now foremost in the country.

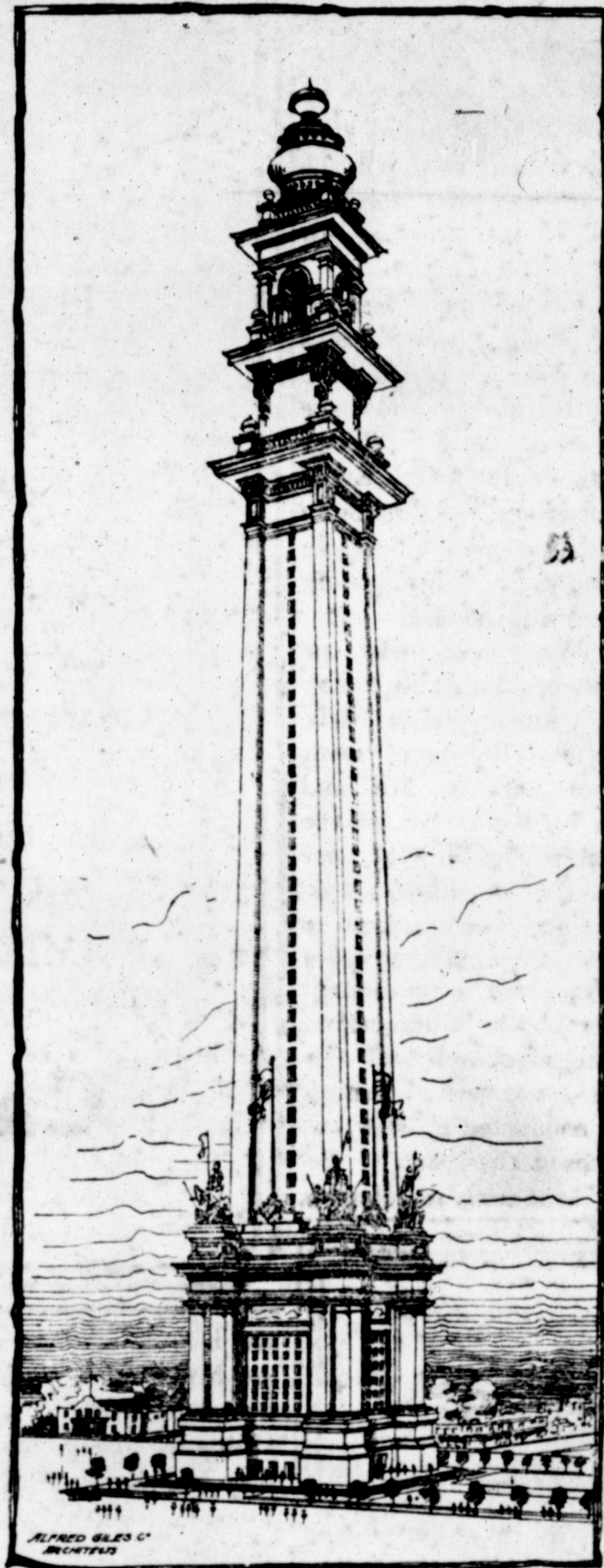

### Alamo Heroes Monument Association.

San Antonio, Texas, April 12.—On the anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto, the evening of April 21, the replica of the Alamo Heroes Monument will be unveiled. A program is being arranged that will impress on people in all parts of Texas the purpose in erecting the proposed monument and encourage all loyal Texas to give all the assistance they can. This replica, now being erected, will be attractive and a work of art; it will be an incentive to create a pressing demand for the greater monument.

Judge A. B. Storey of San Antonio, chairman of the board of trustees, will make the principal address. Each of the trustees, has been invited to speak and it is hoped that among the visitors who will be here to give support to the movement will be Major Geo. W. Littlefield of Austin, Joseph Hirsh of Corpus Christi, D. E. Waggoner of Dallas, Ben O. Smith of Fort Worth, W. W. Seley of Waco, J. S. Rice of Houston, State Senator Claude Hudspeth of El Paso, and Fred W. Catteral of Galveston. An invitation has been extended to each

honorary vice-president to attend the unveiling and every Texan interested in this work is also urged to come.

The question has been asked why the claim is made that the Alamo Heroes monument, which will be erected 802 feet in height, will be the highest building in the world when it is known that the Eiffel Tower in Paris, France, is 985 feet high. The answer is that the Eiffel Tower is merely an iron framework or skeleton tower within which elevators are operated to carry passengers to and from the various landings up to the top, and the Alamo Heroes Monument will be an actual building, containing upwards of three hundred rooms, several immense auditoriums, art galleries and museums, and it will be several hundred feet higher than the highest building now in existence. The Eiffel Tower cost about \$1,000,000, the Alamo Heroes Monument will cost \$2,000,000 and will represent the highest development of engineering skill. It will be a new world wonder and nothing could more forcefully depict the appreciation of loyal Texans for the men who died in the Alamo.

### Women's Influence is Already Large.

Although I do not think woman suffrage a subject which can be decided without difficulty and tossed aside in a few sentences. I find when I look deep into my heart that I am oppressed to it—certainly to the extent to which claim is now laid to it.

In many departments women might well be admitted to the suffrage—for example, in those departments which have to deal with legislation touching the mental, physical and moral training of our youth.

In ordinary Government matters I do not feel it in the least, necessary for them to take a formal and public part.

They already exercise influence in all such matters, and I believe that their influence will be more likely to be well directed as matters stand at present than it so radical a change as that which they are seeking be carried through.

As to their rights, to suffrage, I will say that I do not know any absolute reason why they should not be given

suffrage if the majority of them, counting character and enlightenment, seriously and truly desire it. But I confess that it seems to me that the better class of them who really lead are better off now than they would be should they have the formal right of suffrage and that they would only diminish their influence by sacrificing their privilege to these so-called rights.—Thomason Nelson Page.

The London suffragettes not only are demanding the ballot for women, but seek to change the ritual of the Church of England with reference to the marriage ceremonies. They object to the indignities embodied in the ceremony and demand that they be eliminated or like indignities be imposed on the man. They insist that the words "obey and serve" be cut out, and that the question "Who giveth this woman to be married to this man" be changed to "Who giveth this man to be married to this woman."

### The Penalty of Over Production in Nacogdoches County.

The Federal Census Report proves the wisdom of the Farmers' Union in appealing to the farmers to reduce the cotton acreage this season and the statistics bring out with mathematical exactness the penalty of over-production. The Federal Reports show the United States produced 16,109,849 bales in 1911, which sold for \$732,420,000 and in 1910 there were 11,965,962 bales produced which sold for \$820,000,000. The 1911 crop exceeded the 1910 production by 4,137,887 bales and sold for \$87,900,000 less. There are 151,888 acres of cultivated land in Nacogdoches county and 40,321 acres are devoted to the production of cotton. The record shows that 26 per cent of our improved farm land is devoted to cotton and it has been the predominating crop ever since the county was settled.

Nacogdoches county produced 22,273 bales of cotton in 1911, which sold for 1,002,285 against 14,181 bales in 1910, which sold for \$964,308, making an increase of 8092 bales and a decrease in the average farm value of \$23.00 per bale.—Commercial Secretaries.

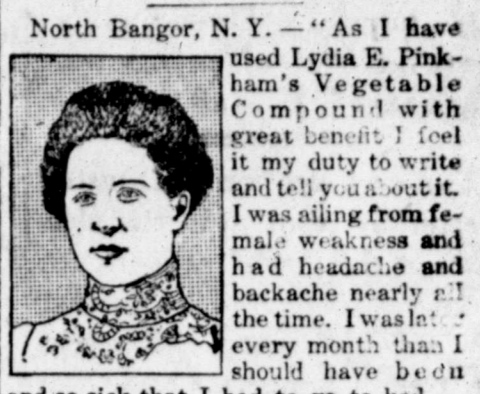

## SERIOUS PROBLEM FACING FARMERS

More Attention Must be Paid to Feed Crops or Farmers Will Suffer.

E. Gentry of the Agricultural Department at Washington, field agent for the state of Texas, has issued a circular letter and sent it to every agricultural agent in the state, insisting that they make an earnest effort to impress upon the farmers of the state the absolute necessity of raising their feed stuffs and meat, and points out that unless this is done the farmers are almost sure to suffer.

Mr. Gentry calls attention to the fact that South Africa has gone heavily into the cotton raising business, having secured from the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas the very best cotton man they had to look after the matter, and will this year plant two million acres in cotton. In the United States the increased acreage will not fall far below three million acres. It is easy to see that with an increased acreage of five million acres there will be an enormous production, and in consequence the price will more than likely be very low.

Take this matter into consideration, and add it to the further fact that the farmers of this county have already bought \$300,000 of commercial fertilizer, and will before the crop is made run the amount up to over half a million dollars, and most of it bought on a credit, it will be seen that with cotton away down and feed stuffs to buy the farmer will not have funds with which to pay his fertilizer bill to say nothing of buy meat for himself.

In conversation with Jas. D. Greer our county agricultural agent on the subject, he expresses himself as very much worried over the matter. He says that he is trying to get the farmers to put some of their best, or good, land into corn and to plant all the poor land they can in Spanish peanuts and raise a few hogs and a yearling or two. Plant enough to feed stuffs to insure an abundance for the farm, and then the cotton will be the money crop, but the money will not have to be spent for feed for the farm. Mr. Greer encourages the farmer with any crop he is growing and tries to help him to grow the most possible on an acre, but he believes they are making a mistake if they do not plant corn, peanuts and hogs.

Atrica is already drawing on the United States heavily for feed for the teams they are working in their cotton patch, and feed is sure to be high next fall. Meat is already as high as a cats back and going up. Only this week hogs were quoted on the Fort Worth market at 9 cents a pound gross, and a good yearling fat will bring around \$20. The situation in one that demands thought and action.

**Scholastic Age.**

I have been asked frequently if the children who are seventeen years of age this year should be taken as scholastics by the census enumerator. I have a letter from the State Superintendent that says this, "You are advised that the Thirty-third Legislature enacted a law amending Article 2893, Chapter 18, Title 48, of the Revised Civil Statute of 1911, so as to permit children over seven years of age and not over twenty-one years of age on the first day of the scholastic year to attend, free of charge, the public school. The scholastic census will be taken on the basis from seven to seventeen years, as heretofore, no change having been made in the law with respect to taking the scholastic census of the State"

This will permit children to attend school this year over seven and under twenty-one free of charge, but the census trustees will take the census as indicated in the blanks sent out from seven to seventeen.

The judge made a very beautiful and eloquent address, dealing in part with the early history of the town, the class of citizens which originally settled here, and closed his remarks only when the shrill blast of the locomotive whistle notified them that the time for departure of the train had arrived. The crowd then hiked, for the station, and left to visit Lufkin and other points between here and Houston.

Shreveport, La., April 5.—A. Bunch, painter and decorator, upon returning home this afternoon, called his bride wife, Myrtle Cox Bunch, aged 19, and shot her twice through the heart, causing instant death, and then turning the pistol on himself, sent two bullets through his body, barely missing the apex of his heart inflicting wounds that will probably cause his death.

## W. J. Weaver Dead

From Monday's Daily: W. J. Weaver, who has been sick for a week or more at his home on Fridonia street with a complication of disease pneumonia and gastritis, died yesterday afternoon late and his remains were sent to Huntington on this afternoon train for interment.

Mr. Weaver was quite an old gentleman, being past 73 years of age, and had been living in this city something over a year, conducting a livery business with his sons under the firm name of W. J. Weaver & Sons. He came to Texas about sixty years ago and settled at Huntington where he resided for a number of years. From Huntington he went to Alto in Angelina county, where he resided until he moved to this city. He was considered by all who knew him a splendid old gentleman, and a good citizen, and his death is very much regretted.

Deceased is survived by two sons, Hollis and Wyatt, and two daughters, Mrs. Wm. McGaughey and Miss Georgia Weaver, all of whom reside in this city.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community.

### Slaughtering of the Birds.

Dr. William T. Hornaday, director of New York Zoological Park, estimates that if the bird population of this country was as large today as it was 60 years ago it would mean a saving of \$250,000,000 to American farmers, says Democrat and Chronicle. There is a direct connection, in his opinion, between the multiplication of insect pests, which are among the gravest problem of modern agriculture, and the slaughter of migratory birds. In 50 years he says, the bird life in this country has dwindled 75 per cent. Thirteen species of migratory birds have been entirely exterminated, and 30 more are traveling the same road. At this rate in 25 years there would be practically no so called game birds, except those in game preserves. On the other hand, with sweeping national protective laws in five years the county would teem with birds again. There is no use in mourning now over the shortsightedness and folly that has wrought such havoc among feathered creatures.

What remains for us to do is to check the slaughter and give nature an opportunity to repair the damage done in the past.
