WILL BRIDGE THE ANGELINA.

The Committee From Nacogdoches Finds Angelina Citizens Enthusiastic.

Yesterday morning a committee of seventeen citizens of Nacogdoches accompanied Commissioner Mat Muckelroy to Lutkin to appear before the commissioners' court and to present to that body a proposition to bridge the Angelina river at the Spradley ferry on the Purcella road, the proposition carry with it the construction of a highway from the river each way, connecting the two cities.

the court house. D. K. Cason was elected chairman of the caucus, and it was decided that Mr. Muckelroy should present the Nacogdoches proposition to the court, and he should be followed by Beeman Strong and E. A. Blount.

After the caucus adjourned the party separated and scattered about over the city in quest of friends and acquaintances, to discuss the matter with them and enlist their support.

A call on the County Judge developed the information that two of the commissioners would not arrive until the 8:15 Cotton Belt train came in, and that at 8:30 the court would convene and would give an audience to the Nacogdoches delegation.

At 8:30 the court assembled in the county court room, the Nacogdoches delegation and citizens of Lutkin and other parts of Angelina county made an audience which filled the court room. Judge Robb announced that the court was ready to hear what the Nacogdoches people wanted to present, and Mr. Muckelroy proceeded to state the proposition—"The bridging of the Angelina river at the Spradley ferry, the counties of Angelina and Nacogdoches to share the expense equally."

Beeman Strong followed with argument for the proposition. After he had closed the judge said the court would like to hear from others, and pretty soon the discussion became general; but every

speaker argued on the same side. Everyone and especially the Lutkin citizens and business men were enthusiastically in favor of the proposition.

At the suggestion of several of the speakers the court agreed to appoint a committee who with a civil engineer, would meet a like committee from Nacogdoches and go on the grounds, make a survey and plat of the proposition and estimate the probable cost. This committee to meet just as soon as the river is low enough to make it possible to get to it.

In the evening the citizens of Lutkin entertained the visitors from Nacogdoches with a lunch and smoker at the Elks rooms.

THE Spanish peanut will solve the feed question in the East Texas country. There is no feed crop that we can grow which has the same feeding value per acre, and which is produced so cheaply. An acre of Spanish peanuts will fatten ten hogs; but an acre of corn will not fatten even third as many.

When the Houston Boosters train reached Lufkin this morning, after visiting Nacogdoches, Sheriff R. V. Watts had them to close up their buffet car, and would allow no drinking in the city either by the excursionists or friends whom they wished to treat, Gee! but wasn't that Lufkin bunch disappointed.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

Our understanding is that there was not much left in the aforesaid buffet car after the Houston boosters had spent the night in Nacogdoches, and that Lufkin bunch was not much disappointed as were the several friends from Nacogdoches who accompanied the car as far as Lufkin with the hope of getting a last pull at what was left before the boosters proceeded on their journey from here.—Lufkin News.

Commenting on the notice of the ball game last Saturday between Nacogdoches and Garrison which appeared in the Sentinel, editor Gibbs of the News gives the line up of the Garrison team, with the names of the parents of the boys, heading the list with the name of Alvin Fears son of Dr. and Mrs. J. B. Fears, fifteen years old. The News is careful, however, not to give the ages of any of the other members of the team, nor does it give the height or chest measure of the team. Far be it from us to wish to start a controversy with the News but had Editor Gibbs been here and seen the two teams on the ground we believe he would agree with us that the teams were not at all evenly matched as to size. The Garrison team would weigh the Nacogdoches team at least a third, and in height there was about the same difference. Admitting that they were all high school boys, it would seem that a boy becomes a matured man before graduating from the Garrison high school.

A Stricken Industry.

The latest census report on manufacturing, while showing a satisfactory comparative increase in the total number of establishments and in the capital invested, have in them a vein of sadness when the statistics on the flour and grist milling industry are considered. The mills show a decrease of fifty-one establishments and nine million dollars in investment and a twenty million dollar decrease in value of the output. This is exceedingly unfortunate in view of the early opening of the Panama canal which gives us access to the Orient trade. Texas is the logical milling-in-transit point for the wheat belt of the Mississippi valley and it is only artificial obstructions that can cause the wheat to detour via interior mills and eastern seaports on its journey to continental and island trade.

"Our heart-broken bachelor on looking into this strange matter, found that he had foolishly bought the muffler from a dealer who didn't advertise."


Remember Fire Boys.

DISCUSSED FAIR DATES.

Committee From Nacogdoches Fair Visit Timpon and Discuss Change to Prevent Conflict.

From Monday's Daily:

Early yesterday morning G. M. Haltom, president of the East Texas Fair Association; W. B. Hargis, secretary of the association; R. S. Jordan, a member of the directorate of the association, and F. M. Littlepage, editor of the Sentinel, went over to Timpon for the purpose of meeting with the management of the Timpon fair association, and discussing the matter of adjusting the dates of the two fairs so that they should not conflict. At Garrison the party picked up Editor Gibbs of the Garrison News who went along to lend what aid he could to the Nacogdoches county representatives.

The party left this city about 8 o'clock in the morning, and had a splendid drive in the cool atmosphere, arriving at Garrison at 9:45, and pulled up in front of the Garrison News office. Quite a number of the Garrison citizens were on the street and an hour or more was spent jolly-ing with them. They are a nice, congenial bunch and treated the visitors as cordially as could be. Before they would allow Mr. Gibbs to be taken out of the county they exacted a promise that he should be returned safely. Gibbs is their fighting man and they back him up every time.

At Timpon a very pleasant day was spent and in the afternoon a meeting was held with several of the officers of the Timpon East Texas Fair association, and the matter of dates discussed. It so happens that the Nacogdoches fair dates and the Timpon fair dates are the same, and it is the wish of each association that one or the other should change their dates so as not to conflict with other. Timpon was of the opinion that their dates were selected first, and as they had put out some considerable advertising matter, they of course favored Nacogdoches changing their dates. As a matter of fact, however, Nacogdoches selected her fair dates a month or more before Timpon did her dates, and went ahead with her advertising campaign. Each association was ignorant of the fact that the same dates had been selected. A matter which makes the changing of the Nacogdoches dates impossible, unless to the detriment of the fair, is the fact that engagements have been made with prominent public speakers for the fair, and if the dates are changed these dates will be lost. This matter was discussed and the Timpon people seemed to appreciate our position.

No final agreement was made, as to change their dates would require a meeting of their executive board; but they promised to call a meeting and see what could be done in the matter.

At the adjournment of the conference the Nacogdoches party were taken for a visit to the Timpon fair grounds, and shown other courtesies

From Nacogdoches to Appleby the county roads are as fine as could be wished, from Appleby to Garrison they are a little rough and there is some bad sand and from Garrison to the river the roads are not in as good condition as they should be, but we understand an effort is being made to have some good work done on the roads right away. Shelby county roads are not as good as are the roads in Nacogdoches county, but the people over there are waking up to the fact that the road proposition is one that cannot be neglected further, and will get busy in that line.

Port Arthur—During the month of March there were 81 vessels entered at this port, representing a tonnage of 250,000 tons. The entries were with few exceptions, steamers and were largely in the oil carrying business.

Brooks Wins Land Suit. In the case of John H. Brooks vs Temple Lumber Company, the trial of which began at Hemphill in Sabine county Monday morning, and in which the argument was finished at 10 o'clock Monday night, the jury on Tuesday returned a verdict for the land sued for against the Temple Lumber Company in favor of the plaintiff, John H. Brooks, and give a judgment against the warrantors to the Temple Lumber Company for the amount it paid for the land with legal interest. The entire tract of land is one of the finest pine timbered tracts in Sabine county. It is estimated to be worth \$25,000. Messrs. H. B. Short of Center, and J. F. Lanier of Beaumont, represented the plaintiff, John H. Brooks.—Beaumont Enterprise.

Preparing for Veterans.

Chattanooga, Tenn., April 18.—Amid the great activity of preparation for the Confederate Reunion in this city, May 27-29 inclusive, of course the greatest task is establishment of Camp Stewart, named for the famous Confederate general, which is to be the home of the veterans while here. Located in one of the city's largest parks and on land next to it, the camp, for which 1,400 large tents—each with room for eight or more cots—and 12,000 cots have been obtained, will be quite a town in itself. Arrangements for the veterans stay are being put on the basis of comfort, pleasure and health in every possible way. The camp is located on land which has belonged to the government for many years and right next to the beautiful National cemetery with its rolling lawns, beautiful trees and fine monuments. A large part of the tract to be occupied by the camp is also well wooded and will be cool.

With two or three committees of experienced, energetic citizens working out various details, the intention and effort is to make Camp Stewart the best camp ever furnished by any city for the Confederate reunion.

Washington, April 17.—Demand probably will be made on the state department within the next day or so for all the information in its possession concerning the state of affairs in Mexico, under the provisions of a resolution now being drawn by Senator Smith of Arizona and which he proposes to introduce in the senate.

Truck Growers Meet.

Tyler, Tex., April 22.—There was a largely attended meeting of the Four States Fruit and Truck Shippers' Association held here for the relief of the shippers of the four States, namely; Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, embracing the association. GOLD MEDAL FOR COMPOSITION.

United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. Will Award a Medal to School Children

A gold medal to the school boy or girl between the age of 10 and 15 who writes the best composition, not to exceed 800 words, on the repair and maintenance of earth roads, is to be awarded by Logan Waller Page, Director, Office of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. All compositions must be submitted to Mr. Page before May 15, 1918, and the medal will be awarded as soon thereafter as the compositions can be graded. The composition may be based on knowledge gained from books or other source but no quotations should be made.

After many years' experience in dealing with the public road situation of the country, it is Mr. Page's belief that ignorance on the subject of repair and maintenance of roads is as much the cause of their bad condition as any other factor. It is expected that the competition will bring about a better understanding of the subject of repair and maintenance in the rural districts.

Many children living in the rural districts have experienced the disadvantages of roads made impassable through a lack of proper maintenance and it is expected that their interest in the competition will stimulate greater interest among the parents. Bad roads have prevented many children from obtaining a proper education and have even prevented doctors from reaching the side of rural patients in time to save their lives.

Any child between the ages mentioned, attending a country school, may compete. Only one side of the paper must be written on; each page should be numbered; the name, age, and address of the writer, and the name and location of the school which he or she is attending must be plainly written at the top of the first page. The announcement of the competition has been sent to the superintendents of school in the rural districts. No further information can be obtained from the Office of Public Roads. This announcement should be plain to everyone, and all children will thus start on a basis of equality.

Marble Pudding

Fifty-Four Hour Bill Now Filed.

Austin, Texas, April 17—

The fifty-four hour bill passed by the legislature after numerous amendments, so as to exempt cotton factories and laundry workers for certain contingencies, although signed yesterday by Governor Colquitt was not filed by the secretary of state until early this morning. The bill passed to the secretary of state several week ago, but owing to the fact that the governor had promised some hearing on the measure before acting he recalled it, and held it up until yesterday.

The bill makes it unlawful to cause female workers to labor more than fifty-four hours in any one week or more than ten hours in any one day. Its effectiveness applies in a greater measure to department store workers.

The measure does not become a law until October 1. This is a special date set by the drafters of the bill and approved by both houses of the legislature.

While in Dallas the councilmen saw all kinds of paving material, and streets paved with each kind, inspected them thoroughly and had estimates made on each.

When the council meets May 8th, a decision will be made as to which material will be used. The councilman

Special Meeting City Council

The city council met in special called session last night at the city hall and transacted quite a deal of business, that is just now of interest to the citizens.

Dr. A. C. Scott of Dallas, the city's consulting engineer, and who has been here since last Sunday night, making an inspection of the electric plant in order to determine just what improvements should be made to place it in first class condition when the city takes charge of same, was present and presented his report to the council. This report was to the effect that it would require \$7,000 to place the plant in first class condition.

The council made a contract with O. E. Hubbard to by Superintendent of the city light and water plants, with a salary of \$150.00 per month. It being stipulated that the city should have 60 days notice should Mr. Hubbard desire to be relieved of the position, and he should be given 60 days notice should the city wish to relieve him.

It was ordered that Dr. Scott and the superintendent expend at once the amount of \$8500 in improvements on the light plant. These improvements will consist of the installment of large boilers at the light plant instead of the small boilers now in use, the changing from oil as a fuel to coal or lignite, which it is believed will reduce the fuel account nearly half, the installing of electric power for the pumps at the water plant,

and other improvements which are most necessary.

It was decided to reduce the light rates as follows: For lighting 15 cents for the first 10 KW, and 10 cents thereafter. For power, 7 1/2 cents for first 10 KW, graduated down to 4 1/2 cents.

The street lights will be changed to 100 candle power on the square, instead of 60's as at present, and in the residence sections to 60 candle-power lamps.

A minimum water rate of 50 cents was adopted.

The council will be in session May 8th, at which time they will take up the matter of the paving of Main street, as per the ordinance passed at the last monthly meeting. Bids will be received on the different materials and a selection will be made and the contract placed.
