BUSS WYERS ARRESTED.

Officers Captured Man Wanted in Falls County in Connection with Murder of John Richie.

Deputy Sheriff C. C. Wren, of Marlin, assisted by a posse from this city consisting of Deputy Sheriff's Frank Maples, Mack James, Ollie Strode, Josh Henson and Moss Adams yesterday afternoon arrested Buss Wyers who is wanted in Falls county on a charge of murder, and placed him in jail here. Deputy Sheriff Wren left Wednesday night with his prisoner for Marlin.

The charge for which Wyers is wanted is the culmination of a family feud in Falls county, in which it is charged that about 18 years ago Richie killed a brother of Wyers and about four years ago he shot another brother. On May 10 the body of John Richie was found near the road four miles north of Marlin with the head gone, and a search revealed the head lying in a bayou nearby. Deed Reed, Bounce Beaty, Clyde Beaty and Dock Wyers were arrested charged with the crime and this man was wanted in connection with the same offense, the parties all being cousins. ACCREDITED HIGH SCHOOLS.

Nacogdoches one of the 135 Schools of South and of the 28 in Texas.

Superintendent R. F. Davis the Nacogdoches City schools is in receipt of two letters which are particularly gratifying to the patrons of our high school and which conveyed information of which the trustees and faculty of the school feel proud. These letters were read at the recent meeting of the board of trustees, and by a unanimous vote of the board they were ordered published.

There are two reasons why the board wished these letters given to the public, and these reasons may be given as follows: First the board is proud of the recognition this school has received, and second the patrons of the school should be advised of the superior work this school is doing.

For several years past the Nacogdoches high school has been affiliated with the State University and other universities of the state, beginning with a credit of 11 units, which from year to year has been added to until now we have a credit of 19 units. The action of the Commission on Accredited Schools of the South in placing Nacogdoches on the list, when it is noted that in the South there are only 135 accredited schools, and only 28 in Texas, shows conclusively that the work of our school is of a very high order.

My Dear Sir:—The Commission on Accredited Schools of the Southern States met at Richmond, Va. 3 weeks ago and make up a tentative list of Southern High schools. 135 schools were placed in the tentative list of which 28 are in Texas. I am glad to report to you that the Nacogdoches high school was placed on this list. There is some question about the degree from Ouachita College I hope that in making up your list of teachers for next year, you will maintain the ratio of degree teachers now employed. Remember that no teacher should have more than 6 classes and that the number of pupils per teacher shall not exceed 30 on the average. We shall meet next fall to make up the permanent list and I hope that your

school may be retained on the list. Yours sincerely,

Eleven Million Annually For Feedstuffs.

The farmers of Texas do not raise enough cereals and forage crops for their own farm animals. They expend, according to a recent census report issued by the Federal Department of Commerce and Labor, \$10,800,000 annually for feed stuff. The official figures show that twenty-seven per cent of the farmers buy feed.

Peter Raaford, President of the Farmers Union, in discussing the subject, said: "A farmer should, as a rule, raise his own feed. While cotton is our money crop and the moisture requirements of cotton and cereals are in a measure antagonistic, and nature usually favors cotton, yet a farmer should plant enough feed to take his stock through the season."

The farmers of Nacogdoches County expend \$42610 annually for feed stuff. 911 of the farmers of this county report purchases of feedstuffs and the annual expenditure per farms reporting is \$47. By proper diversification of crops this money can be kept at home.

Quite a unique situation was disclosed at the high school in this city when arrangements were being made for the closing exercises, and one, too, which is very gratifying to the faculty, though a proposition which they never before had to contend with. According to the rules of the school an examination is held at the close of each month, and at the close of the eighth month the averages of all the students is computed. The student making the highest average is given the honor of being valedictorian and the one making next best is given salutatorian. This year two young ladies, Misses Marguerite Graves and Edna Munsell tied for first honor, and Mr. Eugene Thompson got second honor. The suggestion was made that the young ladies draw for first honor; but they would not hear to such a solution, so the graduating class of the Nacogdoches High school will at the graduating exercises have two valedictorians.

As the result of a ruling from the Attorney General's department that a concurrent resolution does not carry the force of law and consequently an appropriation made by the legislature under such a resolution is invalid, the 245 newspapers throughout the state that printed the proposed constitutional amendments will have to wait until the next legislature makes an appropriation to pay for such printing. The fact that the State stands most in need of the money at this time more than the newspapers should assuage the disappointments of any of the latter, to some extent at least.—Henderson News.

"Japan Lives in Glass House"

Berlin, May 26.—The excitement in Japan over the question of California alien land ownership legislation is well founded and comprehensible, according to an analysis of the Japanese-American situation sent here by the Tokio correspondent of the Welt Korrespondenz agency printed today in the semi-official Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. The Japanese however, he says, are scarcely in a position to place difficulties in the way of California's land policy.

The correspondent declares that the Japanese are living in a glass house because foreigners even now are barred from owning land in Japan—a feature of the situation which hitherto has been left unnoticed in Germany. The writer expressed doubt whether the Japanese government will favor abatement from the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco, which he regards as Japan's only weapon against the United States.

Nacogdoches has promised their hearty support to help make Timpson's fair a success, and in return Timpson will do the same thing by Nacogdoches. Grasshoppers by Millions.

Report come from Amarillo and the Panhandle country of Texas to the effect that grasshoppers by millions are invading sections of Eastern New Mexico between Elida and Texico. The central body of the insect army is five miles wide and eighteen miles long, and they are entirely denuding the lands of grass and crops and even the trees of their leaves. Their course seems to be from the southwest to the north east, and it is believed that northwest Texas and Oklahoma will receive like visitations.

The pests are spreading and increasing in numbers. Government, states and railroad experts will combine to exterminate the pests. The greatest alarm is felt in the irrigation districts.

San Francisco, May 28rd.—President C. Moore of the Panama-Pacific Exposition issued the following statement today relative to the action yesterday of the Japanese parliament committee in favoring an appropriation of \$600,000 for Japan's participation in the exposition:

"The action of the Japanese parliament regarding that nation's participation in the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, confirming the assurances previously given, especially in view of the recent events in California, is a matter of deepest gratification to the exposition management. We have confidently expected that the Japanese participation would be of a character to make the world take notice even at this universal exposition."

The board of trustees of the city schools was in session yesterday and last night and went over all the business of the schools for the past term and made arrangements for the schools for the next term. It was found that while the schools entered this past year with a considerable deficit, that deficit has been wiped out and the schools are now in much better shape than they have been in their history. A number of substantial improvements have been made in the equipment of the several schools, which will enable the work to go forward in a more satisfactory way with little annoyance on account of insufficient equipment.

SHREVEPORT WANTS AUSTIN TEAM.

The Austin Franchise and Admission into the Texas League is Offered to Shreveport, La.

Shreveport wants professional ball and have an opportunity to secure the Austin club franchise for the sum of \$8,500. The option has been secured and an effort will be made in that city to raise the required sum by Saturday at which time the option expires. The following is taken from the Shreveport Times of Wednesday:

"With an option on the Austin base ball franchise safely trucked away in his inside vest pocket, William R. Hirsch, whose trip to Waco in behalf of Shreveport baseball interests was noted in the Times of Tuesday morning, is expected to reach home today. Manager George O. Leidy, and those who are associated with him in the ownership of the Austin team, want \$8,500 in good American coin for the Texas city franchise, and they want it by Saturday, which is the date upon which Shreveport's option will expire.

Mr. Hirsch wired the glad tidings about securing the option yesterday to Mr. Louis N. Bruggerhoff, who worked with him in the effort to obtain it, and will follow up his wire with full detail when he reaches Shreveport this morning. Immediately after Mr. Hirsch's arrival, a whirlwind campaign will begin in Shreveport to raise the required amount by popular subscription. It is expected that the people, and especially the business men of Shreveport will respond promptly to the demand on their patriotism."

A Creamery or No Creamery, That's the Question.

A day or two ago we were talking to an enthusiastic booster for Nacogdoches and particularly for a creamery for Nacogdoches, and were informed that a certain gentleman had in mind the establishing of a creamery here at a very early date and that this gentleman had approached him on the matter of securing pledges of the necessary cows to furnish the raw material. The proposition looked specially good to us and we proceeded to make an investigation.

We called on the gentleman in question and wished to know more of his plans and what assistance the paper could be in the matter. He informed us that the proposition was rather misty at the present; admitted that he had the matter in mind and had made some inquiries, but that he was unable to say what, if anything, would become of it. He had gone so far as to make a selection of a suitable site for the enterprise, but when he inquired as to the price of the property, 100x200 feet, it was offered at \$1600. Another lot was selected, not in as good a location as the first but which would have answered, but this property was priced at \$600. He had about decided that if he established a creamery it would be necessary to build it at Harmony or some other point off the railroad if land was to be secured at a reasonable price.

Railroad Officials Visit the City.

Yesterday afternoon F. B. Irwin, General Superintendent of the T. & N. O. with headquarters at Houston; H. J. Michsch, Assistant Superintendent of the T. & N. O. with headquarters at Jacksonville, were in the city on a visit and to discuss with the citizens the change-in the night train out of here to Jacksonville and on to Dallas, mention of which proposed change has been noticed in the Sentinel and also discussed on the streets the past few days.

These gentlemen were callers at the Sentinel office, and while here discussed the matter quite fully. Mr. Irwin does not wish to discontinue the train entirely, but at the same time states that the train as it has been run the past two months, a regular passenger, does not pay one-half of the operating expense of the train from Jacksonville to this city, and in consequence of this fact the railroad would have to do something in the matter. The actual number of passengers hauled on this train during the two months total 535 one way and about the same number the other way.

In discussing the matter Mr. Irwin seemed inclined to substitute a mixed train between here and Jacksonville for the passenger train, and to arrange a schedule which would give Nacogdoches a better service by making it possible for the train to make all stops between here and Jacksonville, or in other words have the train a day light train.

The T. & N. O. have finished laying steel rails on this line for this year, but will begin again in July laying heavy steel and will probably close up all gaps in the line before the end of the summer, which will put the road in much better condition. Mr. Irwin indicated that the road would probably try extending the mixed run through to Beaumont, but did not give it as a certainty.

MARITIME COMMITTEE

Of the Galveston Cotton Exchange and Board of Trade.

Galveston, Texas, May 15, 1913.

To the Farmers, Ginners, Oil Mill and Cotton Exporters:

Please take notice, effective on and after July 1st, 1913, that the STANDARD size of gin boxes is to be 27x54 inches and that an extra charge of \$1.00 per bale on cotton and cotton linters will be made for ocean freight on all bales from boxes of greater length or width than above size.

That each and every bale of compressed cotton and cotton linters must be perfectly tied with EIGHT steel ties or bands.

That each and every bale of cotton and cotton linters must be completely covered with bagging to protect the cotton from damage.

That on and after July 1st, 1913, no Dock receipts, Mate's receipts, Master's receipts, Agent's receipts or Bills of Lading will be issued without describing actual condition of the bales of cotton when received by the ocean carrier. Any bales delivered in other than apparent good order and condition will be signed for accordingly.

The following clauses descriptive of bales of cotton will be used in Bills of Lading:

1. Not thoroughly covered.
2. Covering insufficient to retain marks.
3. More or less wet.
4. More or less stained.
5. More or less soiled.

The STANDARD size bale 27x54 inches is the basis of the freight engagement with ocean carriers, and each and every bale of cotton and cotton linters from gin boxes of 27x54 inches must, on delivery to the steamer at the port, contain a minimum density of 22½ lbs. to the cubic foot. Any bale of these dimensions that does not show this density, if not re-pressed to the required density, at the port, shall pay extra freight to the steamer of 50c per bale.

Each and every bale of cotton and cotton linters must be well marked and branded so that the marks can be read without any question of a doubt.

Bales must be marked with the best quality of ink, that will not fade, wash or rub away. Marks to be placed between bands so no part of the mark will be covered by the band. No other mark allowed upon the bale except head brand (if any), and the mark under which the bale is moving for export. All other marks to be thoroughly obliterated so no part of any old mark will appear. Upon Round Bales the Gin Mark will be allowed to remain.

When the quality of the bagging is insufficient to carry the marks to destination a patch of good bagging or cloth should be put on the bale under the bands to bear the mark.

These rules will be strictly enforced, and the object of this circular is to give the general trade due notice so that they may comply with the Maritime requirements.

Chattanooga, May 26.—The recent order of Gen. J. P. Hickman, commander of the Tennessee division and grand marshal of the veterans parade, prohibiting women from riding astride during the reunion here, has brought forth expressions of protest and commendation. The opposition is voiced largely by the sponsors and the ladies of honor effected.

In defence of General Hickman's order, Dr. A. A. Lyon of Nashville, Tenn., secretary of the Army and Navy Medical Association, United Confederate Veterans, today is quoted as follows:

"This unnatural cross-saddle movement appears but the logical outgrowth of this 20th century agitation among a lot of distempered women who are clamoring for 'women's rights.'"

"It is known that Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, Mr. Roosevelt's oldest daughter, and Miss Helen Tait eschewed the cross-saddle entirely and it President Wilson will pardon even the illusion to his daughters on this subject. I will wage an imaginary bet of a five-dollar gold piece against the stump of a cigar that the public will never have occasion to associate any one of them with the cross-saddle.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN

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Washington D. C. May 24. The bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross continent May 25 to 29, warm waves 24 to 28, cool wave 27. Preceding this disturbance a frost wave was predicted to cross continent trying frosts farther south than usual, after which the temperature trend will be toward. For May 9 to 18 we predicted severe weather for vicinity of great lakes. May several people were killed in Oklahoma and the U. S. Weather Bureau put out its storm warnings for the great lakes.

Next disturbance will reach Pacific coast about May 28, cross Pacific slope by close of great central valleys 30 to June 1, eastern sections June 1. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about May 28, great central valleys 30, eastern sections June 1. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about May 31, great central valleys June 2, eastern sections June

temperatures of the five days ending on the day this disturbance reaches your vicinity will average lower than usual and will bring cooler weather not of the best quality. Some local showers are expected May 24 to 31 and a few localities will get good rains but, as a general average, the moisture will be less than usual, crop weather rather unfavorable and on the side of higher prices for cotton and grain.

About May 24 the cool wave is expected to be near meridian 90, a line running north from New Orleans, thru Louisiana, a little east of the mouth and thru Canada. One wave will be near Pacific coast and another near Atlantic coast. Just then the storm waves are expected to largely

increase, the two lows become severe storms and the high increase the cold and danger of frosts in northern part of great central valleys. We would hang out storm warnings on both coasts and the lower lakes for May 28 to 25.

From May 27 to 31 severe storms are expected in the great central valleys, particularly in the middle Mississippi valleys. They are not expected to be so destructive as the storms of the past few months but no risks should be taken.

East of Rockies June will be cooler than usual in the northwest, about normal in northwest and warmer than usual east of meridian 90. Probably warmer than usual on Pacific coast.

June rainfall will be greater last part of month than first part; less than usual in Ohio valleys and in southern states; elsewhere about normal rain. Up to June 15 drouth in large sections will injure crops; following June 15 fair rains may be expected in most places. Severe storms are expected near June 5 to 9. In later bulletins we will endeavor to locate these severe storms.

Recent developments indicate that we will have access to all the U. S. Weather Bureau records and we do not anticipate anything but fair treatment from that institution. Indications are that the new Secretary of Agriculture, the Hon. David F. Houston, would not permit any such injustice as was permitted by his predecessor. The making of weather records by the U. S. Weather Bureau will sometime be recognized as its most valuable work during the past 42 years and all investigators should have access to those records under reasonable rules.

Oh! how she loved her grandchildren, just one of them with her when she died, Genie. Ebb was in California, Joe and Ford in Des Moines, Nettie in Georgetown, Edith at Melrose. They loved their grandma and always remembered her with a present. She would say "God bless the children."

We have no mother or grandmother, for she is gone, but we know where to find her and by the grace of God we will meet her up there. Bro. Jones, our pastor, performed the funeral services and made a good talk. A. D. Parks traveled this circuit 38 years ago. There were 14 appointments on the work, but few old men are here now who were here then.

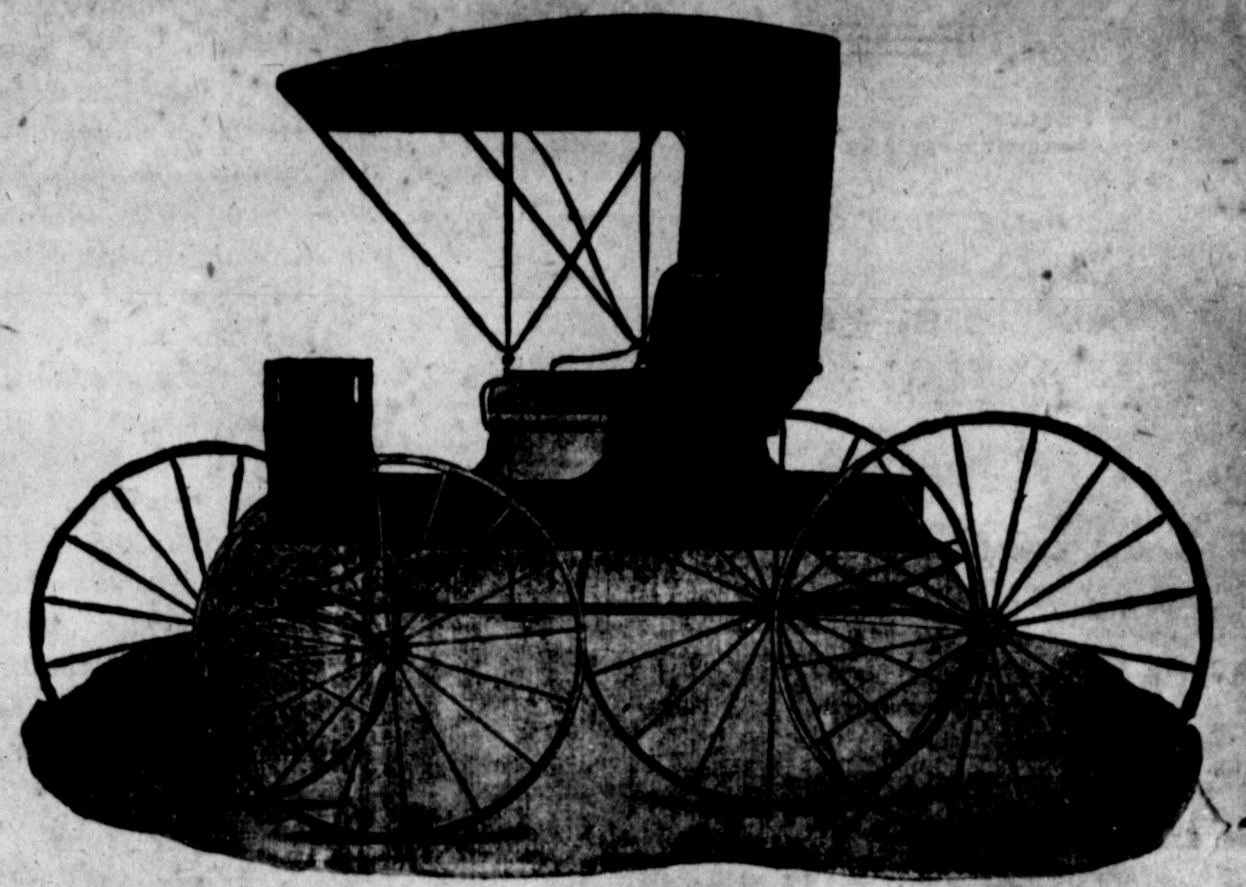
